Archery season opens Saturday for county

Archery Season in Coke County for white-tailed deer and turkey (either sex) opens Saturday, Sept. 28, and runs through Oct. 27. Hunting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset. An archery stamp endorsement (\$7.00) is required if you didn't buy it with your hunting license. You cannot carry a gun while hunting in archery season. You may have one in your vehicle, in camp, or while hunting other game besides deer and turkey, such as feral hogs, rabbits, or squirrels. If you will be tending game feeders and will be hunting over them, you cannot shoot migratory doves since that would constitute baiting.

A new law this year for

hunting white-tailed deer concerns filling out a harvest log found on the back of the license. Some regulations on this, as well as kind of weapons (bows, points, etc.) need your self-education. Please make yourself familiar with the invaluable TPW Outdoor Annual, especially pg. 65-72. Folks, we are not in Kansas anymore. Hunting is an enjoyable, monitored sport like any other. We also call your attention to pg. 64 of the above mentioned outdoor annual. It explains about the hunter education course required of everyone born on or after Sept. 2, 1971. Requirements for tagging, care of the carcass, and lesser, but important regulations are also found in this section.

Exercise Your Right to Vote

The November 5th election is just around the corner. There are several important dates to remember related to this election.

If you are not registered to vote and would like to vote in the November 5, 2002 election, the last day to register to vote is October 7, 2002. Voter registration cards may be picked up in the Coke County Tax Office.

If you are currently registered to vote and have changed your mailing address or your physical loca-

tion since you received your voter registration card last December, please contact the Voter Registrar's office in the Coke County Tax Office by October 4, 2002. It will be a time-saver to you as well as to the poll workers if all information on your voter registration card is correct when you go to vote. *Please Remember To Bring Your Voter Registration Card With You When You Vote.*

The early voting clerk must receive your application for mail ballot no later than October 29, 2002. For infor-

mation concerning a mail ballot please call (915) 453-2631.

If you wish to early vote you may do so from October 21, 2002, through November 1, 2002. Early voting for all precincts will be conducted in the Coke County/District Clerk's office located in the Coke County Courthouse. Branch polling will be held at the Annex Building in Bronte on October 23 and 30 from 9:00 am - 12:00 pm.

If you have questions concerning your voter registration card or if you are unsure if you are registered to vote please call the Voter Registrar's Office at 453-2614.

For questions on a mail ballot or early voting please call the Election Administrator's Office, 453-2631.

Please remember that every vote counts and each of us has a right to vote for the leaders of our government.

TAX TIME!

Once again it is time for taxpayers to watch their mailboxes for those pink tax statements. All the jurisdictions have set their rates, and the Appraisal District and the Tax Office have been working together to get the tax rolls balanced. Property owners should look for tax bills to show up in their mailboxes by the middle of next week. If you do not receive a bill and you owe property taxes in Coke County, please call the Tax Office so your mailing address can be verified.

The Coke County Tax Office would like to remind you to check your statements carefully to verify that all the property you own is on the statement, and to make sure you are not being taxed for property you do not own. Problems are easier to correct if detected early, and before payment deadlines. Property taxes accrue penalty and interest for late payment beginning February 1, 2003.

The Property Tax Code provides for payment options for taxpayers. For

questions concerning a payment option or questions concerning your tax bill, please come by the Coke County Tax Office in the Courthouse in Robert Lee, or call 453-2614, and ask for Gayle or Vallery.

Jeff Barnes of Robert Lee recently headed up a fitness and combat training camp in preparation for deployment to Kosavo. He left the United States on Aug. 28 for a one-year mission in that area. This is his 3rd stint of service with the United Nations, having

previously been in Bosnia. His family was there with him part of that time.

Melodie and boys, Tim and Josh, will remain in Robert Lee for now. Although the family enjoyed their experience in Bosnia, living conditions were tough and the country's unstable political climate became a threat to Americans, forcing the family to return home to visit for another assignment.



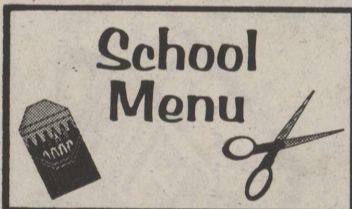
Steers fall to Cougars

informing the board that Gwen Whitfield had been hired as a Special Ed Aide at CCJJC. Mr. Richey also updated the board on the facilities and financing.

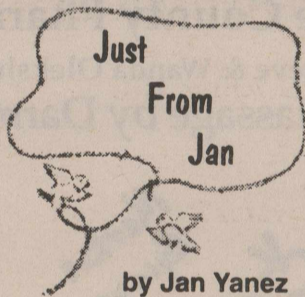
The meeting was adjourned at 9:10 by the president. The next regular meeting will be October 10, 2002, at 7:00 pm.

If your child is overweight

The overweight child can benefit from all of the advice and strategies discussed in the previous news articles. In addition, parents need to tailor their communication in a way that is sensitive to how it affects their child's self-image.

Make healthy eating habits

and an active lifestyle the primary goal. Weight management should be secondary.

Discuss whether your child wants to adopt healthier eating and activity habits. If he or she is not ready, efforts are not likely to work and may hurt self-esteem. Also, evaluate whether your family is ready to change. A family that is not ready to change can undermine the efforts of your overweight child.

Present your child with different healthy alternatives and allow the child to choose among them. Children feel better when they can make choices. Since feeling in control breeds confidence, their choices can lead to habits.

Work together to help your child get in touch with his or her feelings of hunger and fullness. Encourage your child to stop eating when satisfied.

Discuss strategies for including favorite foods in your child's diet. Allow your child to decide which foods to limit or eliminate.

Don't be a "food cop" who strictly controls what and how much your child eats. This could lead to overeating when you are not around and does not teach a child how to be in control of his or her eating.

Don't describe behavior or foods as "good" or "bad".

Help your child find physical activities that he or she enjoys. Encourage him or her to pursue them as much as possible. Be patient if his or her interests change.

Work with your child's school to modify and personalize his or her activity schedule to your child's needs and sensitivities. Overweight children may be self-conscious about doing certain activities.

If you are concerned that your child is overweight, you are encouraged to discuss this with your child's doctor to create a plan of action. Keep in mind that your overweight child may not actually need to lose weight. Just holding a steady weight while your child grows may allow him or her to "grow into it".

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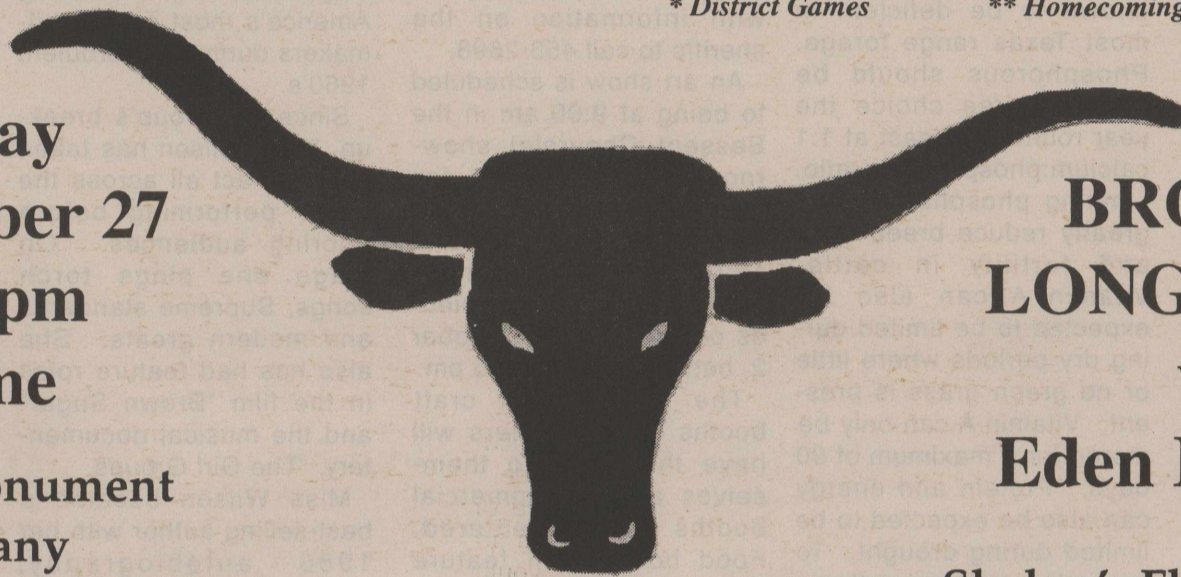

Five rules of drought survival

Due to the extended drought condition that we have been in for the past 5-7 years, there are some basic maintenance and management practices that livestock producers can perform to ease the effects of the drought and maintain a viable and productive cow herd.

Rule 1 - Constantly evaluate ranch forage supplies and strive to balance livestock numbers with forage availability.

Rule 2 - Manipulate the livestock mix to reduce drought risk. 60% breeding herd and remainder in stockers or held over yearlings.

Rule 3 - Supplement to ensure proper nutritional requirements are met.

Rule 4 - Be vigilant for possible poisonous plant toxicity as livestock may have to eat these types of plants due to poor forage.

Rule 5 - Concentrate on other sources of income such as nature tourism or wildlife harvesting during drought conditions.

Let's look at these rules one by one in a little more depth. Rule 1) Reducing stocking rates during drought pays dividends in terms of less damage to desirable forage plants, more rapid recovery following drought, reduced supplemental feeding costs and fewer losses of livestock due to toxic plants. When estimating forage supplies, care should be taken to not over-estimate the probability of receiving rainfall. For example, a rancher near Brady has only a 50% chance of getting a 2 inch rain in September. For Robert Lee, this probability drops to less than 40%. Being aware of the possibilities will help make stocking rate adjustments based on fact and not hope.

Rule 2) By limiting total carrying capacity to 60% of breeding animals and using stockers or calves held over to make the other 40% allows you to do several things: 1) When additional forage is available extra animals can be purchased to take advantage of the forage produced. 2) When forage is limited, the livestock numbers can be reduced by selling the stockers or calves first without destroying the integrity of the breeding herd. 3) Accurate records should be kept so that when it is time to reduce the breeding herd, the poor producing animals

can be recognized and sold off first.

Rule 3) Supplement cattle to ensure that nutritional requirements are met. This is essential to prevent a reduction in reproductive rates and overall performance. Phosphorous is known to be deficient in most Texas range forage. Phosphorous should be provided free choice the year round in a least at 1:1 calcium:phosphorous ratio. Limiting phosphorous can greatly reduce breed back and fertility in cattle. Vitamin A can also be expected to be limited during dry periods where little or no green grass is present. Vitamin A can only be stored for a maximum of 90 days. Protein and energy can also be expected to be limited during drought. To properly supplement these nutrients, it is beneficial to use a forage testing program. When the range becomes severely forage depleted, caution should be used that supplemental feeding does not evolve into maintenance feeding.

Rule 4) The possible consumption of toxic plants during drought conditions is greatly increased due to reduced grazing selectivity by livestock. If there is not enough "good grass" available and the livestock are not supplemented to meet their requirements, they will turn to less desirable plants that could be toxic. Most toxic plants are bitter tasting and unpalatable, but livestock will choose these over constant hunger. Deficiencies in phosphorous and Vitamin A can accelerate and alter grazing behavior.

Rule 5) Harvesting wildlife can be good drought strategy in that it promotes a reduction in the incidence of starvation, and associated disease, and will help maintain the remaining wildlife in a more desirable condition for recovery when the drought breaks. Besides getting rid of more animals that will be eating forage on the range, it can provide much needed cash flow.

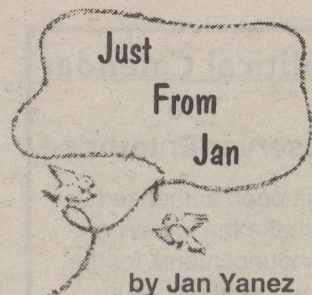

Talking with your children about a healthy lifestyle

Now is the time to start the dialogue with your children about healthy eating and an active lifestyle. The next few tips and suggestions are for improving communication so that you can positively influence your child's behavior. Try one or two at first, rather than all of them at once - it takes time to change ingrained habits.

It may be that you and your children already have conflicts over food and physical activity. Your past efforts at talking with your children may not have been all that successful. Rather than abandon your efforts, take the time to begin anew, utilizing the three-part strategy that follows: building rapport, being a role model, and creating a supportive home environment.

Building rapport is developing a two-way, mutual communication so that each of you listens to the other. Even if there's disagreement, the two of you are open to hearing what the other has to say. Don't be discouraged if your past communication efforts have been unsuccessful. When you commit to being in rapport, you will find strategies that work for the two of you.

First, evaluate yourself.

*Examine your current communication style. Are you a listener or a talker? Do you truly hear what your child is saying? Does your child feel that you are listening and understanding?

*Listen to the tone of your own voice. Is it positive or negative, supportive or condescending? Role play with a friend by pretending that your friend is your child, and ask for honest feedback.

*Do you often talk about you or your child's weight or body size? Research shows that children are more likely to become dieters when their weight is important to their mother or father.

*What tone of voice do you use when expressing your opinions? Your child is more apt to listen when you speak in a non-judgmental manner.

*Have you been taking control of and responsibility for your child's eating and physical activity? Instead, help your child find tools that allow him or her to take charge and make decisions.

Are your expectations realistic? Work toward small, gradual improvements rather than major changes.

Next, take a new approach

when talking with your child about healthy eating and an active lifestyle.

*Let your child know that you are working together as a team. Encourage all family members to "play on the same team".

Understand each child's temperament, personality, and communication style. You may need to communicate differently with each of your children.

*Communicate with each child at the appropriate level. For example, a 10-year-old and a 15-year-old have different levels of understanding and different motivations.

*Ask your child questions to draw him or her into the conversation. Phrase questions in a way that invites a response rather than a yes/no answer.

*Think before you speak so that you talk to your child the way you would want to be spoken to.

*Refrain from making negative comments about your child's appearance, such as mentioning that a pair of pants is getting too tight. A seemingly innocent comment from a parent can spark abnormal eating habits - including starving or bingeing - in a child.

*Help your child discover his or her own reasons, or motivations, for improved eating and physical activity.

*Work with your child on developing a rational system for making decisions about food, exercise, and other aspects of life. When a child offers you a problem, don't offer an immediate solution. Instead, encourage the child to think of alternatives, then discuss their pros and cons to help identify which solution will work the best.

*Share your own feelings, frustrations, challenges, and successes about healthy eating and an active lifestyle.

*Make an extra effort to listen to you child, especially if your child doesn't listen to you. The child who doesn't listen may be crying out for attention.

*Give your child positive feedback without overdoing it or being insincere.

*Understand and accept your child as he or she is, and your child will feel better about himself.

*Expect some conflicts with your children, especially adolescents - it's normal!!

Being a role model is essential since children form most of their behaviors by observing others, including their parents. Information alone will not change your child's behavior - you have to "walk the walk" as well as "talk the talk".

Develop a positive body image. Avoid criticizing your own weight and body size in front of your child; it sends the message that our self-worth depends on your weight.

*Improve your attitude about your own eating and activity habits. Parents who are frustrated about their own diet, lack of physical activity, and weight may deal with their frustration by trying to tightly control the eating and activities of their children.

*Be consistent in your own eating and activity habits and in your attitudes about a healthy lifestyle. Avoid sending mixed messages.

*Set an example by eating healthfully and fitting regular physical activity into your day.

*Be a role model without talking about it. Your child is more likely to copy your behavior if not pushed or forced into it.

Creating a supportive home environment, both the physical environment and the way that family members interact with each other, provides your child with many of the tools needed to develop healthy eating habits and an active lifestyle.

*Make a family commitment to a healthier lifestyle. If your child is the only one making changes, he or she may feel deprived, singled out, or resentful.

*Encourage other family members - your spouse, other children, parents, in-laws - to be supportive of the child and of each other.

*Establish regular meal and snack times rather than having an open kitchen around the clock.

*Stock the kitchen with a choice of healthy options, and limit temptations at home. However, don't overly restrict your child's access to favorite foods. It can affect a child's ability to regulate his or her eating.

*Keep the garage or playroom stocked with plenty of balls and other sports and activity equipment.

*Look for activities you can do together. Take a walk with your child after dinner; it's a great time to catch up on the events of the day.

*Support your child's experience of having some control over his or her lifestyle. Research shows that when parents consistently impose their opinions upon their child's decision process, the child becomes less confident of his or her ability to make independent decisions.

*Keep this advice in mind: Your job, as a parent, is to decide what food goes on the table. Your child's job is to decide what, whether, and how much to eat.

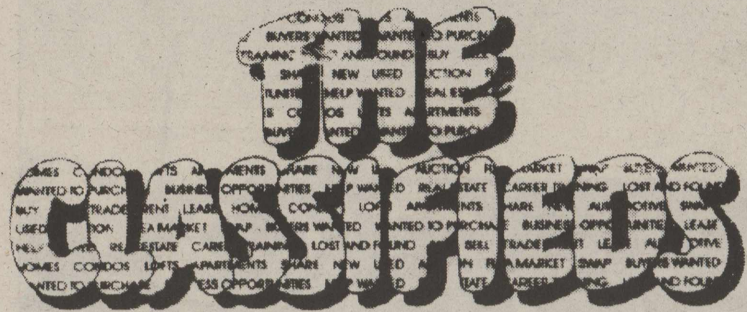

October is a very important month for some people and places. There is Columbus day on October 14th for the United States, Thanksgiving Day for Canada and Physical Culture Day for Japan, and who can forget about Halloween on October 31st for United States, Canada, Mexico and the UK. Gene therapy study shows promising results

A study on using gene therapy to save the sight of young children with a rare type of eye tumor is showing promising results, according to researchers at Texas Children's Cancer Center.

"Although this study is at an early stage, all of the children have shown improvement, though not all have been cured," said Dr. Richard Hurwitz, associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston and the lead investigator of the study. "The results to date show that this approach of gene therapy is safe, can be delivered successfully and is well-tolerated."

Retinoblastoma is a rare disease affecting children under the age of three. The traditional treatment has been to remove the diseased eye. The children in the gene therapy study were at risk of losing a second eye to the disease.

The National Cancer Institute recently awarded

Hurwitz a \$600,000 grant to continue the study for an additional two years. Six children have been treated with the new therapy, with an additional six more able to be treated under the study guidelines. The research has also received support over the past five years from the Foundation for Research and the Retina Research Foundation.

"One child in the study received gene therapy 14 months ago and is now tumor-free, with excellent vision," Hurwitz said.

Retinoblastoma can be treated with local therapies when the tumor is very small, but it is usually not diagnosed early.

"Usually, by the time you suspect it, the tumor is too big," Hurwitz said, adding that the disease is probably present at birth.

The success of gene therapy could give oncologists an avenue other than radiation and chemotherapy to try to save the vision of affected children. Those standard therapies to reduce tumor size can produce toxic side effects.

With this technique, the herpes simplex virus gene is injected into the tumor, causing it to alter its structure and appear like the virus to an anti-herpes virus drug. When that drug is then injected into the patient, it kills the altered cells and reduces the size of the tumor.

"We are very encouraged by these preliminary results," Hurwitz said. "This study is ongoing and we will continue to closely monitor the treatment and its effects to establish the long-term success of this new therapy."

The results have been presented at the Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology meetings and will be presented at the upcoming International Society of Pediatric Oncology and the American Academy of Ophthalmology meetings.

Texans who have lost their jobs may now apply for unemployment insurance (UI) benefits through the Internet. UI provides temporary and partial wage replacement to eligible workers who have become unemployed through no fault of their own.

"I am extremely pleased to offer our customers the added convenience of applying for their UI benefits online," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chair Diane Rath. "I believe we've created a secure, reliable system that users will find extremely intuitive and useful."

The Internet address for workers to make their initial UI claims is www.texasworkforce.org/ui/uiclaim.html. Instructions and applications are available at this address in both English and Spanish.

"I'm always an advocate for ensuring that those who qualify have ready access to unemployment benefits," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor T.P. O'Mahoney. "Allowing online UI benefit claim applications is yet another effective way for us to continue in these

efforts.

If a claimant's application for UI benefits is valid, the claim begins the Sunday of the week the application is submitted. TWC's online UI benefits application is for regular, initial claims only. UI Claimants will continue to file two-week continued claim certifications through TWC's easy-to-use automated voice response system, Tele-Serv. Claimants also may continue to file their initial application for benefits by calling a UI Tele-Center.

Recently, TWC introduced another Web-based application that allows employers to respond to UI claims via the Internet, in addition to the tel-

ephone options of telephone, mail or fax.

"Providing all of our customers - employers, workers and job seekers alike, with a wide range of easily accessible options for finding the services they need to succeed is one of our primary goals," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Ron Lehman. "Our online UI applications for employers and claimants are just another step toward fulfilling that goal."
