## Emergency farm Ioan

apps being accepted Applications for emergency farm loans for losses due to damages and losses cause by drought that occurred from January 1, 2002, and continuing, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Sweetwater.

Coke County, as a contiguous disaster county, was recently declared eligible for FSA EM loss loans.
Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or $\$ 500,000.00$, whicheve is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private com mercial lenders the interest rate is 3.75 percent
As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the PIC or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in pro ceeds from those programs in determining their loss
Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until 2/27/2004 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing. The FSA office in Sweetwater is open from 7:30 am to 5:00 pm , Monday through Friday.

## New brush tests established

This past week we placed some new brush tests out in the county to test various chemicals. One of the tests is located on the Bill Luckett ranch west of Bronte on Highway 158. This test was conducted to test the comparison of Remedy and a new generic form of Remedy that will be coming out soon that should be cheaper in price. The four plots include: Plot 1. Brush Busters Stem Treatment using $15 \%$ MicroFlo (generic remedy) plus $85 \%$ diesel with surfactant. Plot 2 - Brush Busters Stem Plot 2 - Brush Busters Stem
Treatment using 15\% Remedy Treatment using $15 \%$ Remedy
plus $85 \%$ diesel with surfactplus $85 \%$ diesel with surfact-
ant. Plot 3 - Brush Busters ant. Plot 3 - Brush Busters
Leaf Spray using $1 / 2 \%$ Remedy plus $1 / 2 \%$ reclaim in water solution with blue dye and surfactant. Plot 4 - Brush Busters Leaf Spray using $1 / 2 \%$ Micro-Flo plus $1 / 2 \%$ Reclaim in water solution plus blue dye and surfactant. The plots are laid out beginning at the double gate with Plot 1 on the west side of the ranch road and Plot 2 on the east side of the road followed by plot 3 and 4 going east. There are some buffer zones of untreated plants between the plots $2-3$ and 4 .
The stem spray method was applied with backpack sprayers and the X-1 nozzle with the solution sprayed on the lower 12-18 inches of trunk of each tree to completely surround the trunk. The lead sprays were applied using a 4 -wheeler and electric sprayer with regular nozzle and the solution sprayed on the leaves until they glistened, not to point of runoff
Other tests put out included a test of salt cedar control using a comparison of chemical. One plot was sprayed with a leaf spray mixture of $1 / 2 \%$ Arsenal and 1/2\% Glyphosate (Roundup) mix in water solution with surfactant
and blue dye. The other treatment was a mixture of Cimarron Max in water solution with surfactant and blue dye. These, were placed on salt cedar on CRMWD land at Lake Spence. Later this month we will be placing tests out using both a fixed wing airplane and a helicopter for salt cedar control.
These test will be evaluated over the next couple of growing seasons for efficacy and

## Preparation for small

## grain production

Hopefully, we will receive some showers to be able to sow our winter small grain crops either for grazing or grain production. There are several important decision to make before we sow our grain.
First, fertility is probably the most limiting factor besides moisture. The best source of information for fertility is a soil test to see what is actually available in the soil. If a soil test has not been taken, there are a few rules of thumb to assist in determining fertilizer needs. For forage production, small grains will use about 6070 pounds of Nitrogen per ton of forage, 20-40 pounds of Phosphorous and 20-40 pounds of Potassium for each ton of forage produced. Another way of figuring fertility requirement is that for each 100 pounds of beef produced per acre small grain will use 30-40 pounds of Nitrogen. For grain production, it takes 2 pounds of Nitrogen and 0.8 pounds of Phosphorous to produce one bushel of grain.
Secondly, moisture is the most limiting factor we have. Through several field trials where grain was sown at different intervals of mid-August, early October and midNovember results show the August planted wheat used most of the available moisture before spring resulting in lower forage production in the spring. In contrast the

November planted grain couldn't use the early moisture and produced most of its forage in the spring. The October planted grain produced about half of its forage in the fall and about half in the spring. If you need early grazing, plant early, if you need spring grazing wait until October. Field preparation is also very important to consider. Small grains need to be sown in a weed free, firm seed bed. This firm seed bed is very important for emergence of all small grains. One of the worst practices you can do is sow right behind the tandem. If your drill does not have depth bands, sowing grain behind the tandem can cause the seed to be planted too deep. When the seed has enough moisture to sprout and send up the coleoptile, or first emerged leaf if the seed is too deep the coleoptile will not is too deep the coleoptile will not
emerge through the soil line and emerge through the soil line
die, resulting in poor stands. If grain is to be grazed, about $2 / 3$ 's of the nitrogen needs to be applied at or near planting. If it is for grain production only, then $30-40 \%$ needs to be applied in the fall and the rest in the spring, if moisture conditions are favorable. With the unpredictability of our rainfall, it is a wise idea to split the fertilizer applications so that you don't put all your eggs in one basket, so to speak. One major important fact of small.grain fertility is that the fertility levels at or near emergence of small grain can genetically determine the future production of that crop. If the fertility level is too low at this critical time, no amount of fertilizer and moisture can greatly enhance the pre-determined genetic potential of a grain crop.
Another key factor is what kind of small grain to sow. If you are going to strictly graze the crop out, there are several options to use. Beardless varieties of wheat such as WinTex, WinMaster or Russian have performed well in forage tests in this area, plus the awnless heads allow for more complete graze out by livestock. Also, if grazing is the only purpose of the crop, a producer might want to mix early and late maturing varieties together for extended grazing or mix oats, rye
and Triticale for increased forage production.

Licenses may be purchased locally, in Robert Lee, at Jimmy's Tires, 121 West 10th St. and Wildcat Marina on Lake Spence. Be sure and specify that you will be dove hunting or you won't be legal for that on Sept. 1.

## 'Click It or Ticket'

 messageTexans are getting the "Click It or Ticket" message.
For the first time since Texas' safety belt law went on the books in 1985, safety best use in the state's urban areas is nearing 90 percent, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) announced Aug. 8
On TxDOT's behalf, the Texas Transportation Institute has conducted multiple traffic surveys in 10 urban areas of Texas, tracking safety belt use prior to and after the "Click It or Ticket" education and enforcement campaign, beginning in April 2002. Successive survey results show that more Texans are buckling up after TxDOT, the Texas Department of Public Safety, and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration launched the state's largest ever public education campaign and safety belt enforcement crackdown.
For a two-week period, from May 19 to June 1, an unprecedented barrage of TV and radio commercials, billboards and movie theater slides warned Texans to buckle up or face hefty fines.
Thousands of extra law enforcement officers patrolled Texas streets and highways to locate and ticket safety belt violators.
"Our efforts paid off, and we're delighted that so many more Texans got the message to buckle up," said Sue Bryant, TXDOT traftic safety director. "In cities with heavy 'Click it or Ticket' advertising and stepped up law enforcement, we saw significant increases in the number of drivers and passengers using their safety belts."
In 10 Texas cities, observational studies conducted by the Texas Transportation Institute indicated a safety belt compliance rate of nearly 90 percent, up from 81 percent just a year ago.
"For every percentage point that safety belt use increases, we can save an additional 25 lives and prevent almost 600 injuries every year in Texas," Bryant said.
Not all motorists heeded the "Click It or Ticket" message. State troopers, police officers and sheriff's deputies issued more than 50,000 citations for safety belt and child safety seat violations during the special enforcement period. Officers also arrested 2,200 safety belt violators who also had outstanding warrants for felonies or misdemeanors.
"Click It or Ticket" campaign supporters included the Texas Department of Health, the Texas Municipal Police Association, the Texas Police Chiefs Association, the Sheriff's Association of Texas, hundreds of local law enforcement agencies and scores of community organizations.

## Custody disputes delayed with deployments

With deployments in the armed forces being lengthened, many child custody and child support disputes are on hold, says Webster Watnik, author of "Child Custody Made Simple".
That's because a federal law, The Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act of 1940 (SSCRA) 50 U.S.C. App. Section 501, requires judges throughout the U.S. to consider whether a service member's rights would be affected by proceeding in his or her absence.

Watnik points out the SSCRA is often used to reduce outstanding debt and mortgage rates to $6 \%$ but it also allows military personnel involved in child custody or child support disputes to request a delay.
"If a soldier is on active duty and is far from home, he can be and is far from home, he can be
taken to court and not even taken to court and not even
know it. This law stops that from know it. This law stops that from happening," says Watnik.
The SSCRA covers all members of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Coast Guard, and officers of the Public Health Service on duty with a military branch. It also covers reservists on active duty and, in some on active duty and, in some
instances, National Guard meminstances, National Guard mem-
bers called to federal service. It bers called to federal service. It
does not cover retired or reserve does not cover retired or reserv
personnel not on active duty.
Under this federal law, protection begins when a service member receives orders to enter active service and ends when he, or she is released, though under some circumstances it may last some circumstances
up to 90 days longer.
The SSCRA allows military personnel to postpone a case or the enforcement of a judgment while on active duty. If a judge rules in a case while a service
member is on active duty and is unable to appear, the law also allows the judgment to be voided.
Watnik points out that if the service member is represented by an attorney, or the matter is purely administrative-such as calculating child support-the court may refuse to postpone the case.
"Basically," says Watnik, "to get a delay you have to show that your rights would be 'materially affected' by the court proceeding in your absence. That means you need to be there, and if you're not, you will be harmed." Watnik advises service members to request leave to go to court, and if turned down, ask their commander to write a letter explaining that military commitments prevent the court appearance. The judge may then decide to postpone the case until active service ends, or more likely, until the service member can appear.
"The law allows the judge to use his discretion," says Watnik. "In child custody, that means almost anything. It's very important to diligently protect your legal rights."
