Deer, turkey season opens Saturday

The month long archery season for whitetail deer closed October 26, 2003. Local processing facilities are reporting a better than average bow season, with some very good racks being harvested (or seen) during bow season.

The special youth season held last weekend, October 25 & 26, was very successful, from all reports received. Samuel Rawlings of Bronte harvested a big buck with a 21-inch spread during the youth weekend. The picture should be included in this issue of the O/E.

The general season for whitetail deer and turkey opens this Saturday, November 1, 2003, and will run through Sunday, January 4, 2004. A special late general season will run from January 5-18, 2004, for antlerless and spike bucks only. The bag limit for deer is five, with no more than two bucks, all seasons combined.

As stated previously in the annual Coke County Hunting & Fishing Guide, anticipation for some excellent racks is high in Coke County due to the good conditions for antler development during the growing season. We have received several reports of big buck sightings from local ranchers.

The general turkey season runs concurrently with the general deer season, with a special turkey season set for April 3 through May 9, 2004. The turkey bag limit is 4 (all seasons combined), with either sex being legal during the general season and gobblers only during the spring season. Predictions for the fall turkey season mirror that of deer season. Locals have seen more wild turkey this year than in any other year that most of them can remember. You may want to harvest your turkey(s) early in the season, because they have a tendency to disappear after some hunting pressure is applied.

Serving will begin at 11:00 am and go until 2:00 pm. The location is B&K Processing (behind Hall's Grocery) in Bronte.

If you haven't eaten the variety of wild game sandwiches and sausages prepared at Bronte, don't miss this opportunity to sample some of these excellent meats. In previous years, the menu has also included rattlesnake and other exotic wild game cooked on the grill for your sampling pleasure. While you're there, don't forget to tour their state of the art processing facility.

WCCCD Hunter Appreciation Barbecue

West Coke County Community Development will sponsor its 15th annual Hunters Appreciation Barbecue on Saturday evening, November 1. It will again take place at the rec hall in the county park at Robert Lee. The supper will include plenty of barbecued brisket and sausage, beans, potato salad, iced tea, and fixings. Serving will begin at 6:00 pm and will continue until 9:00 pm.

The feed is at no cost to hunters, but tickets are necessary. They are available from the party from whom they lease, or from participating individuals or businesses who have supported the barbecue by donations.

Great volunteers and WCCCD members do the work -- preparations, cooking, serving, clean-up - whatever it takes to make the event happen. Area landowners and hunting lease managers may make a donation and pick up barbecue tickets at the following locations in Robert Lee: C&H Auto and Hardware, Key Feed Store, or Wink Insurance. The subject left the accident scene and pursuit began between San Angelo and Sterling City on Highway 87. Pursuit continued to Sterling City, where the subject turned eastbound on Highway 158. At this time, the pursuit included a Texas Department of Public Safety officer and members of the Sterling County Sheriff's Department. Entering into Coke County, officers with the Coke County Sheriff's Department joined the pursuit and attempted to disable the subject's vehicle by shooting out the tires. As the vehicle was coming into Robert Lee, the subject appeared to lose control and left the roadway on the north side of 158 where she struck a ditch, causing the vehicle to become airborne. The vehicle entered into the west wall of Gideon's Sheet Metal, where employee Kent Cole was working in the shop. Mr. Cole was pronounced dead at the scene by Joan Davis, Justice of the Peace, Pct. 1. The subject was airlifted to Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo where she is listed in stable condition. The identification of the subject is unknown at presstime, according to Coke County Sheriff Rick Styles. The crime scene is currently under investigation and charges will be filed later in the week. Robert Lee Street Affair Dessert Cook-off recipes

The Dessert Cook-off at the Robert Lee Street Affair October 4, 2003, introduced the following recipes to the judges and those who bought portions of the entries:

Mary Williams "PJ's **Banana Split Cake**"

1-yellow cake mix

1-can Eagle Brand Sweetened **Condensed Milk**

1-can crushed pineapple in heavy syrup

1-24 oz. container frozen sweetened strawberries (thawed)

3-bananas

1-small package vanilla or white chocolate instant 3-eggs 1-cup Karo light or dark corn syrup 1-cup sugar

1-Tbsp. margarine, melted 1-tsp. vanilla

1/8 tsp. salt 1-cup pecans 1-unbaked (9 inch) pastry shell

In a medium bowl with mixer at medium speed, beat eggs slightly. Beat in next 5 ingredients. Stir in pecans. Pour into pastry shell. Bake at 350 degree oven 55 to 65 minutes or until knife inserted halfway between center and edge comes out clean. Cool before cutting

Skylar Rainwater's "Frosted Orange Cookies" 2-medium navel oranges 1/2-cup butter flavored Crisco 1-cup sugar 1/2-cup milk 2-cups all-purpose flour 1-tsp. baking powder 1/2-tsp. baking soda 1/2-tsp. salt 2 & 1/2-cups confectioner's sugar 1-Tbsp. butter, melted

With a sharp knife, score each orange into quarters; remove peel. Use knife to remove white pith from peel and fruit; discard. Quarter oranges and place in blender. Add peel. Cover and process until smooth. (Mixture should measure 3/4-1 cup.) In mixing bowl, cream shortening and sugar. Beat in milk and 6 tbsp. orange mixture. Combine flour, baking soda and salt, add to creamed mixture and blend.

Drop by teaspoons, 2 inches apart. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-13 minutes or until edges are lightly brown. Cool. Frost with confectioner's sugar, butter and enough orange mixture to spread. Shaylee Bell's "Grandma Young's Pineapple Pie 2-cups sugar 3-Tbsp. flour 1-stick butter-softened 4-eggs 1/2 cup milk 1-20 oz. can crushed pineapple in heavy syrup 1-cup chopped pecans 1-nine inch, deep dish pie shell Mix all ingredients together and pour into pie shell. Bake at 325 degrees for one hour. Pie should be firm. Faylin Bell's "Hawaiian Wedding Cake" 2-cups sugar 2-eggs 1-20 oz. can crushed pineapple in heavy syrup 2-cups flour 2-tsp. baking soda 1-cup coconut 1-cup chopped pecans Beat sugar and eggs then

add pineapple. Mix in dry ingredients and add coconut and pecans. Grease and flour two round cake pans heavily. Pour mix into pans and bake at 325 to 350 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes. Toothpick inserted into middle should come out clean. DO NOT use cooking spray on pans instead of grease and flour or cake will stick to the bottom. Let cake cool completely! lcing

1-8 oz. Philadelphia Cream Cheese

1-stick of butter-softened 1-lb. box powdered sugar 1-tsp. vanilla

Blend together cream cheese and butter. Add powdered sugar and vanilla and mix well. Double the icing recipe if you like more icing. Spread onto cooled cake and sprinkle the top with chopped pecans and coconut to finish.


The meeting was opened with prayer by Wayne Coalson.


Richard Rogers, Architect with CADCO met with the board to discuss construction plans for a new gym.



Marrs receives awards for outstanding work in vocal music



New eyes







The event is cosponsored by the Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences - Texas A&M University System, Sheep & Goat Predator Management Board, and Texas Department of Agriculture.

Two-stepping with fire ants

And we don't mean an ants-in-your-pants dance. We mean the currently best proven approach to effectively manage fire ants, called the Two-Step Method. This approach works best in fully infested areas (five or more mounds for each quarter-acre of yard) or where there is little or no concern for preserving native ant species.

Two-stepping includes broadcasting a bait insecticide over your entire yard sometime between late August and mid-October. and then treating individual, problem mounds with an approved mound drench, granule, bait or dust amounts of toxins. For best results:

*Use fresh bait, preferably from an unopened container.

*Apply when the ground and grass are dry and no rain is expected for the next 24 to 48 hours.

*Apply when worker ants are actively looking for food, usually in late afternoon or in the evening. To test, put a small pile of bait next to a mound and see if the ants have found it within 30 minutes.

*Apply baits with handheld seed spreaders. Don't apply baits mixed with fertilizer or seed.

*Baits can be applied anytime during the warm season. When applied in late summer/early fall, ants are still foraging and it's easier to predict weather patterns. Then the bait can take effect over the winter while you're indoors. Re-apply baits once or twice a year. Step Two: Individual mound treatments:

Chemical. With dust products, no water is needed and they act fast. However, they leave a surface resi-



Natural gas is colorless and odorless. As a safety precaution, TXU Gas and other gas providers add a strong, distinct and readily identifiable scent. The scent smells similar to rotten eggs.

If you discover a gas leak inside or outside your house, go to an area where you no longer smell gas and call 9-1-1 or your gas provider immediately. "Avoid doing anything that might cause a spark," Burnett said. "Don't turn on a light, don't strike a match and don't use a telephone in an area where you smell gas. Telephones use a small amount of electricity that might produce a spark."

Routine maintenance of your gas appliances by a qualified individual can ensure they are working properly and guard against carbon monoxide emission.

"First, the color of the flame should be checked," Burnett said. "It should be blue. A red or yellow flame could indicate that gas is not burning properly. This usually is caused by an improper mixture of air and gas. A yellow flame could indicate as a build-up of carbon monoxide."

A qualified individual also should check the connectors on appliances such as an older water heater. "All-non-approved connectors should be replaced because they can cause a gas leak. And any gas lines or valves not connected to an appliance should be capped or plugged," Burnett said.

With proper maintenance of your natural gas appliances, your house will be safe and warm this winter. If you detect a natural gas leak in or around your home, contact TXU Gas at 1-800-817-8090. Have a safe and spooky Halloween

Halloween is that magical time of year when children get to dress up in wonderful and outrageous costumes as they gather a bag full of treats. Halloween is really for children and children should ideally participate in all aspects of Halloween from helping to decorate the house to helping pick their costumes.

Costume safety. Coming up with creative disguise doesn't mean that safety needs to be forgotten. Here are some safety tips to keep in mind.

· October 31 can be a chilly night so make sure that costumes are loose enough to be worn over warm clothing but not so baggy or long that trick or treaters can trip over their costumes.

· Trick-or-treaters should wear sturdy walking shoes.

· Choose brightly-colored costumes that will be clearly visible to motorist. For greater visibility, add or incorporate reflective tape into the costume.

 Make-up and face paint are better than wearing masks which can restrict breathing and/or vision. If you choose to use a mask, make sure it is one that allows the child to see and breathe easily.

· Swords, knives and similar accessories should be made of soft-flexible material.

 Look for costumes, beards and wigs labeled "Flame-Resistant" - nylon or heavyweight polyester costumes are best. Flame Resistant does not mean 'fire proof'. Avoid costumes with baggy sleeves or flowing skirts to minimize the risk of contact with candles and other fire sources. Costumes made of flimsy materials have been found to burn more quickly when exposed to fire sources.

Decorating your house. By decorating your home, you signal to other trick-or-treaters that your household is taking part in Halloween.

· Children too young for trickor-treating can dress up in costumes and help answer the door with a parent nearby.

· Small children should never carve pumpkins. Instead, let

Parents should accompany their children each year until the children are old enough to go by themselves. Still, safety-minded parents can follow along at a distance to keep an eye on the children. Other Tips:

 Tell your children not to eat any goodies until you see them. Make sure that your child eats dinner before they set out, so they'll be less tempted to eat their goodies along the way.

· It might be a good idea for parents or children to take along a backpack to empty the goodies into if the trick-or-treat bags become too heavy.

· Children should walk, not run, from house to house and stay on the sidewalk or at the side of the road facing traffic, cross the road at the corner and look both ways before crossing the road.

Bringing out the best in veggies

The sharp taste of broccoli and other cruciferous vegetables means you're getting sulforaphane, a strong anti-cancer agent that can help prevent breast, colon and stomach cancers. Here are some hints for enhancing the taste of these nutritious veggies so they can be regular health protectors in your meals. When you bite into broccoli or any vegetable in the cruciferous family, you create a compound called "sulforaphane." Biting breaks down plant cell walls, converting glucoraphanin, a compound whose presence among cruciferous vegetables varies, into sulforaphane. The sudden, sharp taste when you chew these vegetables signals this change. Sulforaphane's potency was identified in 1992 by AICR grantee Paul Talalay, M.D., and his' colleagues at John Hopkins University. Dr. Talalay showed that sulforaphane could trigger the production of enzymes that detoxify carcinogens before they damage DNA. Other studies have shown that sulforaphane may help prevent breast and colon cancers.

ers in France, they also found that sulforaphane easily kills Helicobacter pylori, a bacterium that causes a majority of stomach Japan, where 70% of the population over 60 are infected, a clinical trial is now underway to test the ability of broccoli sprouts to eliminate the bacterium.

Note: Contaminated sprouts can cause illnesses from foodborne bacteria. Therefore, children, the elderly and people with weak immune systems due to HIV infection, diabetes or other illnesses are advised to avoid raw sprouts completely

Recruiting cruciferous benefits:

By eating foods rich in glucoraphanin, you can help mobilize your body's natural cancer-fighting activities. Although sulforaphane can come from non-cruciferous vegetables, such as carrots and green onions, it is primarily derived from broccoli and related vegetables. These include cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, kale, mustard greens, rutabagas and turnips.

If you are bothered by a bitter taste in cruciferous vegetables or their cooking odor, here are some tips to make these highly beneficial foods appealing.

*Buy them during fall and winter. A frost sweetens them.

*Eat within 3 days of purchase. *Combine with other vegetables, like carrots, sugar snap peas, snow peas, sweet onions, mushrooms, red or yellow bell peppers and tomatoes.

*Finely chop and add to soups and casseroles.

*Steam briefly, then stir-fry in a bit of olive oil and garlic.

*Sprinkle with teriyaki sauce. *Microwave to produce less of a cooking smell.

Forest service offers windbreak trees

Seedlings for conservation windbreaks are now available for order through the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD). Landowners in Coke County are encouraged to purchase the one-year-old seedlings before preferred stock is sold out.

Each year thousands of regionally adapted seedlings are grown from seed by the **Texas Forest Service West** Texas Nursery in Lubbock. The agency's primary objective is to produce and sell quality seedlings at a price landowners can afford, allowing them to plant large quantities of trees for windbreaks, says Robert Fewin, Texas Forest Service forester, Lubbock. "Windbreaks are trees and shrubs systematically planted adjacent to fields, homesteads, or feedlots as a barrier to reduce or redirect the wind," Fewin explains. "They create permanent, natural protection and habitat for wildlife, reduce erosion, and increase land value and aesthetics." Available species for Coke County include afghan pine, Arizona cypress, redcedar, Italian stone pine, aromatic (skunkbush) sumac, black cherry, bur oak, catalpa, desert willow, green ash, hackberry, honeylocust, lacebark elm, nanking cherry, osage orange, Russian olive, sandcherry, sand plum, shumard oak, and smooth sumac. The hardwoods are sold in multiples of 50 seedlings per species. They are very inexpensive and can be divided among your neighbors. Wildlife packets for habitat

establishment also are available. Each of the four wildlife packets contain 100 bare-root trees and shrubs which cater specifically to the habitat needs of quail and pheasant, deer, turkey or squirrel.

Orders will be taken through Monday, January 26, 2004 and will be delivered on Thursday, February 5, 2004.

In Sterling County the beginning and ending dates are May 1st through November 25th. Because LAP payments will be factored no payments will be issued until after sign up has ended and Washington has determined the factor. The final date to sign up for the program has been extended by Washington. The final date for signup is now November 21st. There will be no late-filed applications allowed since all signup information will be forwarded to Washington as soon as sign

up ends for the factor calculation. Don't wait until the last minute, make an appointment today.


 Make your home safe for trick or treaters. Remove all objects around the outside of your house that could cause children to trip or fall. Turn your outside light on so children will know they can visit your home.

ACT deadline is November 7

The postmarked registration deadline is Friday, November 7. There is also a late registration postmark deadline on November 20 (an additional fee is required for late registration). Students can get information from their high school counselor or register online at www.act.org. ACT scores are accepted by virtually all colleges in the nation, including all lvy League schools.
