

In the study Making the Case for Library Services to Children and Teens, Barbara Heyns followed sixth and seventh graders in Atlanta public schools through two school years and the intervening summer. Among the findings of her research are:

The number of books read during the summer is consistently related to academic gains.

Children in every income group who read six or more books over the summer gained more in reading achievement than children who did not.

The use of the public library during the summer is more predictive of vocabulary gains than attending summer school is.

With their kind words and smiles and gentle teasing, the people here seem to have a gift for knowing exactly what to say to make a person feel welcomed, special and at ease. My heart is held captive by the love and caring in this town. I have no interest in living anywhere else now.

It is hard to believe it has been over a year since we moved to Robert Lee. In that time I have learned a lot about the town, but more importantly, I have learned from the town. I have learned patience and caring, giving and receiving nurtures and enhances our lives and relationships. I have learned openness and laughter, respect and loyalty can ease and comfort during hard times. I have learned how important it is to pass encouragement on. A few kind words and a smile can do so much to make any situation better. And perhaps most importantly, I have learned that you do not have to know someone for a long time to call them a friend.

For all I have learned and all I will learn, thank you my friends.

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Drinking For Health

To keep your body well hydrated, consume enough water--eight to twelve cups-throughout the day. Because milk, juice, and some other beverages are mostly water, they count toward your daily water intake. So does water from solid foods, although you can't really measure it.

Caffeinated beverages--coffee, tea, and some soft drinks--and alcoholic beverages aren't your body's best sources of water. Caffeine and alcohol act like diuretics, causing the body to lose water through increased urination. Decaffeinated beverages, however, don't have a diuretic effect.

*Alternate sparkling water and alcoholic drinks at social gatherings.

*Keep a bottle of water with you as you commute, while you work, as you run errands. Travel with a supply of bottled water, too, even for day outings. Airline travel promotes dehydration.

From the bone-chilling days of winter to the hot, sultry days of summer, your body needs water to maintain its normal temperature.

In hot, humid weather your body perspires, increasing water loss. Cool, refreshing drinks may help cool your overheated body. States reach settlement with top wireless companies

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott recently filed an agreement with 31 other states settling a deceptive practices investigation against three top telecommunications companies over misleading advertising and service charges.

Under the terms of the Cingular agreement, Wireless, Sprint PCS and Verizon Wireless must provide customers with coverage-area maps that are as agree to provide comprehen-

gy allows; give consumers at least two weeks to terminate service contracts without incurring penalties; and change the way they advertise and sell services and coverage.

"Texas consumers depend on quality cell phone services, so today's settlement will ensure that these telecommunications companies shoot straight with Texans about the nature and extent of these services," said Attorney General Abbott.

The settlement allows consumers a 14-day period to try out services. Customers will not be charged an early termination fee if they cancel during this period, and if customers cancel within three days after activating service, they will not have to pay an activation fee.

In addition, the companies

The carriers must clearly disclose any recurring monthly charges; the number of peak and off-peak minutes and the hours these apply; charges for excess minutes above the allowance; charges for long-distance and roaming minutes; the minimum contract term; early termination fees, and information about any additional fees tacked onto monthly bills.



Your Vote Matters

By Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison The great American heroine, Susan B. Anthony once said, "Suffrage is the pivotal right." Today, voting is still one of the most significant rights extended to United States citizens. This presidential election year provides an excellent opportunity to exercise this right.

Under British rule, the American colonists were forced to pay taxes to Great Britain, yet they had no one to represent their interests in Parliament. The colonists rebelled against this policy of, "taxation without representation," fought a major war to win independence, and then founded the United States of America as a "Republic." This form of government would allow the citizens to elect people who would then represent their interests in Congress.

For many the new government was an improvement over British rule, but not all could enjoy this new, hard-fought right. Initially, only white, male, property owners could vote. It was nearly 200 years before all American citizens over the age of 18 had the right to vote.

Less than a century ago, women could not legally vote. The Women's Suffrage Movement, led by Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton throughout the latter part of the 19th Century, argued women should also have a say in who represented them. In 1920, the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution finally granted women the right to vote.

While black men were enfranchised by the 15th Amendment at the end of the

Civil War, many African Americans still were obstructed from casting their votes in several states until the mid-1960s. A major element of the Civil Rights Movement focused on getting African Americans registered to vote and calling an end to tactics, such as poll taxes, and property ownership requirements, which created hurdles for many blacks from being able to vote. It was not until 1965, not quite 50 years ago, that African Americans were able to freely exercise their right to vote.

During the height of the Vietnam War, Americans expressed their concern over the idea that men could be drafted to fight in a war at 18, yet could not vote until they turned 21. With the passing of the 26th Amendment in 1971, nearly every U.S. citizen over the age of 18 could register to vote.

Surprisingly, however, less than half of the voting age population votes. Many Americans may have forgotten the historical significance of being able to vote or believe their votes don't matter. Others neglect to register in time to vote in an election. For instance, in Texas you must be registered to vote at least 30 days prior to the election. This means if you are not registered by October 3rd, you will have forfeited your right to cast a vote for our next president on Election Day, November 2, 2004.

Don't pass up your opportunity to vote. Registration is as easy as going to your local Department of Motor Vehicles. For information about polling locations and other local election details you can contact the Office of the Texas Secretary of State at www.sos.state.tx.us http://www.sos.state.tx.us/ or call them at 1-800-252-VOTE.

If you know you won't be in your home district on Election Day, you can still cast your vote. Contact your county or city election official in advance to request an early or absentee ballot. Also, the Federal Voting Assistance Program (FVAP) serves military and non-military citizens abroad by helping them register and vote by absentee

The law exempts most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend.
