## TYC removes prisoners from GEO facility at Bronte

Action will likely cost BISD \$2 million per year in lost revenue

The Texas Youth Commission on Tuesday, October 2nd, removed all of the juvenile offenders from the GEO Group facility at Bronte. Concerns of unsanitary and unsafe conditions led to the cancellation of the state's contract, according to TYC officials.

That action has left local officials scrambling to determine the extent of the damage to the economies of the Bronte Independent School District, City of Bronte, and to Coke County. County Judge Roy Blair, BISD Superintendent Alan Richey, and State Representative Drew Darby have been meeting with prison officials, but there doesn't seem to be much of a glimmer of hope on the horizon.

According to County Judge Roy Blair, "I don't think we're going to be putting the genie back in the bottle," which means in this case that "we won't be having juvenile prisoners at the facility."

Both Judge Blair and Supt. Richey indicated they thought the TYC went about this in a very unprofessional manner. Judge Blair went on to say the action was poorly planned and very poorly conducted. It was also noted that neither State Representative Drew Darby's or State Senator Robert Duncan's office was contacted prior to the closing. Both Blair and Richey believe that politics played an important role in this decision, and what the TYC is saying about the facility is

untrue. As to the extent of the damage, Superintendent Richey stated, "the juvenile facility housed about 200 students, and that amounts to somewhere around \$2 million in lost revenue for the Bronte Independent School District per year."

Judge Blair reported that BISD had about 20 employees at the facility, and the closure could affect as many as 52 BISD employees.

Regarding the reasoning behind the closure, Richey stated, "any school is going to have some problems, and just because you have some kids plugging up the toilets, and flooding the cells, it doesn't mean you have a bad educational system. Most people are aware that some of those kids at the facility are just bad kids. But that's no reason to condemn the whole facility."

Judge Blair echoed these sentiments by stating, "when you are dealing with these kind of people, you're going to have problems. You just fix them and move on." And that is exactly what the judge reported that Brett Bement, the director of the facility for the GEO Group, had been doing. Judge Blair reported that Brett had been at the facility for somewhere around nine years, and has never had a bad audit. The last audit of the facility was conducted approximately three weeks ago.

Additionally, there are 5 TYC employees on the grounds

of the facility at all times. If they were aware of a deficiency, they corrected it. According to Judge Blair, all 5 employees of TYC have been fired.

This reporter met with Mr. Bement on Tuesday, Oct. 2nd. As always, Mr. Bement was cordial and considerate, but stated that he could not comment on the allegations at this time.

None of the employees contacted were allowed to discuss the closure. The only

comment from one employee was, "we're all just wondering whether or not we'll have a job tomorrow."

Concerning the county's involvement in the facility, Judge Blair indicated that the county owes \$3.2 million on the facility (including interest), until the final payment, which was to have been made January 1, 2010. As to who's on the hook for the bank note, that to date remains unclear. According to the judge, "under one set of circumstances, it would be GEO's liability, under another set of circumstances, it is the county's responsibility. It's still too early to make that determination until we contact our legal counsel and get a ruling on the closure."

State Representative Drew Darby had this to say about the prison closure: "I am shocked and deeply concerned about the actions of TYC. We don't know all the facts, but we are trying to find out all we can. My office had no prior knowledge of the closure, but we are doing everything we can to find out the basis for the closure. We are trying to lessen the impact on the community of Bronte and Coke

County."

As to where we go from here, Superintendent Richey stated, "we have a special called (BISD) board meeting set for Saturday, Oct. 6, at 9:00 am to discuss this. We also have another regular meeting of the school board set for next Wednesday."

Judge Blair reported that he, along with Darby and Richey, were meeting again on Wednesday morning (Oct. 3) with GEO regional director Don Houston, and they would be looking into alternative situations involving other types of prisoners at the facility.

Judge Blair also said they were not going to limit the scope of the facility to prisons, indicating that the facility might be used for some other type of business or industrial complex.

Ending the interview on a positive note, Judge Blair reported that in other county business, the wind energy construction had begun in Coke County, and they will be taking delivery of windmill towers by November 4th. He is hopeful that we may see some of the towers erected by the end of the year.

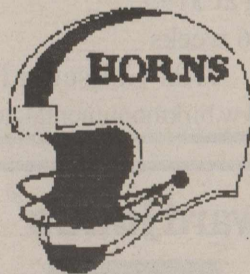

### Geographic Information Systems Workshop slated

A geographic information system workshop is set for Oct. 18 at the Texas A&M University System Research and Extension Center at San Angelo.

The workshop is being sponsored by Texas Cooperative Extension and the Texas A&M University System's Institute of Renewable Natural Resources.

The workshop will last from 8:30 am to 5:30 pm.

Dr. Dale Rollins, Extension wildlife specialist at San Angelo, said most people, even those with a global positioning system in their car or pocket, don't fully understand the technology.

"While an increasing number of landowners and recreationalists are aware of GPS, most don't appreciate the power and utility of what they have," Rollins said. "Whether your interest is in recreational mapping or precision agriculture, you'll benefit from this training."

Rollins said much of the workshop will be hands-on training outside with various equipment. Participants will then move indoors for classroom instruction on incorporating and using data from the various morning exercises.

Equipment used during the

workshop will include: Precision Ag fast-update global positioning systems, Lightbar Guidance Systems, Envisio Guidance Systems, Tablet Personal Computer and heads-up navigation, and Landitude Heavy Equipment Software for tracking heavy equipment efficiency.

"The workshop should be helpful to landowners, hunters, brush control contractors or anyone else interested in global positioning system technology," Rollins said.

**City Secretaries awarded scholarships**

**"File of Life" for senior citizens to begin in January**

A new program sponsored in part by United Way Venture Grant funds will begin in January 2008 throughout the Concho Valley. Any individual, who is 65 years of age or older; people, who suffer from chronic illnesses, and individuals, who have sensory, physical or cognitive impairments may obtain a FILE OF LIFE magnetic refrigerator holder and medical information card FREE OF CHARGE.

In times of emergency, every second counts. An ambulance soars past traffic, sirens screaming and lights flashing, the medical technicians race toward the home of a senior citizen. When they arrive, the senior is unconscious and they have few facts to go on. Does the patient have any existing conditions? Is he taking any medications? Does he have allergies: the FILE OF LIFE is a mini-medical history that is posted on the outside of one's refrigerator. The FILE OF LIFE enables medics to obtain a quick medical history when the patient is unable to offer one.

The card, which is kept in a red plastic pocket labeled FILE OF LIFE, lists the patient's name, emergency contacts, insurance policy numbers, health problems, medication, dosages, allergies, recent surgeries, doctor's name and a health proxy. The entire pocket is held with a magnet to the outside of the refrigerator.

When police, fire department personnel or emergency medical technicians respond to a call they have immediate access to this information and they know exactly where to look. Emergency personnel know that if newspapers are piling

up on a porch and they have to go into a residence, the first thing they do is look for the person. The second thing is to look on the refrigerator.

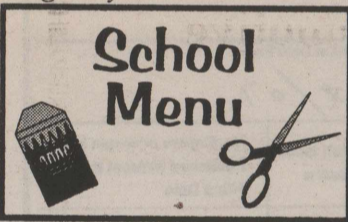

### Get your kids involved in family finances

That anguished roar you hear is the sound of millions of students returning to school after summer break. As a parent, you might feel relief that teachers are taking over the reins, but hold on: School may be the best place for kids to learn the three R's, but you're probably still the best source for the fourth R - financial Responsibility.

Although a nationwide movement to institute financial literacy curricula in our schools is gaining momentum, currently the vast majority of schools either don't offer such courses or don't require them to graduate. Until that happens, it's up to parents to ensure their kids have the financial management skills they'll need to face the responsibilities of adulthood.

Charles Schwab's annual "Teens and Money" survey confirmed that most teens want more money coaching from their parents. It found:

- \* 64 percent of teens would rather learn money management basics through experience than in the classroom.

- \* However, only 30 percent believe their parents are concerned with ensuring they learn those basics.

- \* Only 39 percent said their parents discuss money issues with them at least weekly.

- \* Only 34 percent feel knowledgeable about balancing a checkbook, while 26 percent understand how credit card interest and fees work.

Visa USA recently conducted a survey that shows not much has changed over the years: Only 48 percent of its cardholders said they'd learned money management skills from their parents, while 41 percent said they learned it the hard way or were self-taught and only 9 percent in school.

Say you're 22, earn \$30,000 a year and put aside 6 percent of pay (\$150 a month) until age 65. At an 8 percent average annual rate of return, your \$77,400 investment will grow to \$619,000 by then. But if you

don't begin saving until 32 and set aside the same monthly amount, you'll only accumulate \$274,000 by 65 - a huge difference. By increasing the percentage of pay you save and factoring in annual raises, your savings will skyrocket even further.

Here are a few ways to give your children a leg up:

Set a good example. Kids see right through "Do as I say, not as I do." If you consistently spend more than you earn, don't set aside emergency savings and don't budget, that's the behavior they're learning from you.

If you need help creating a budget, check out Practical Money Skills for Life, a free personal financial management site sponsored by Visa USA ([www.practicalmoneyskills.com/budgeting](http://www.practicalmoneyskills.com/budgeting)). And consider consulting a financial professional for your particular situation.

Set realistic expectations. According to the Schwab survey, teenagers expect to earn \$145,500 a year, on average. If only. It's easy to see how unrealistic pay expectations might lead young adults to take on too much student-loan or credit-card debt in anticipation of being able to pay them off quickly.

When your kids start discussing career choices, help them research what various jobs pay, what educational requirements they'll need to meet and how much that education will cost. The Salary Wizard at [www.salary.com](http://www.salary.com) contains pay data for a broad array of jobs by geographic location.

Share the bills. Have your kids help review monthly bills and balance the checkbook. They'll be shocked to learn how much money goes toward the mortgage, gas, utilities, food and clothing. Give them a voice in the family budget by looking for ways to save money in some areas (turn off the lights, fewer trips to the mall) to increase funding for others (better vacations, college savings).

Show how savings add up. Curb your kids' impulse spending and encourage saving by matching a portion of any money they save each month.

Take the mystery out of finances now so your kids will be able to fly the nest when the time comes - and, so you'll be able to afford to remodel the nest when they do.

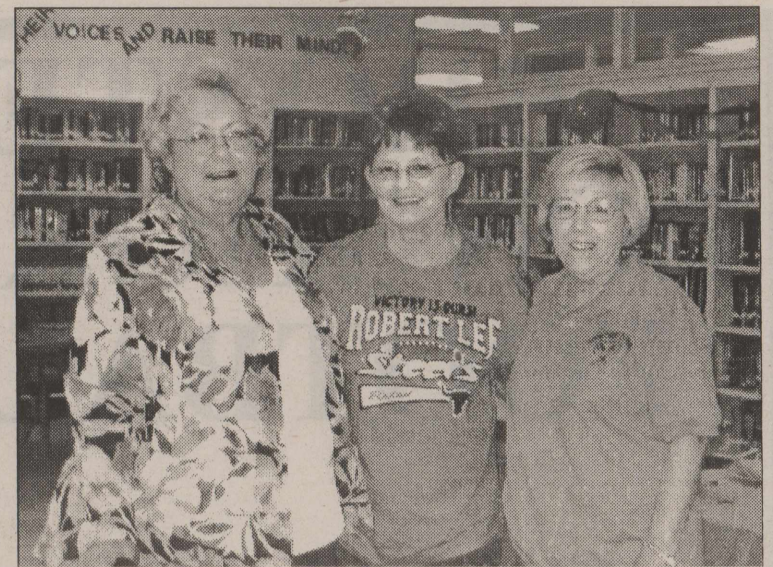

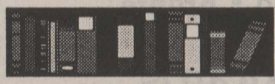

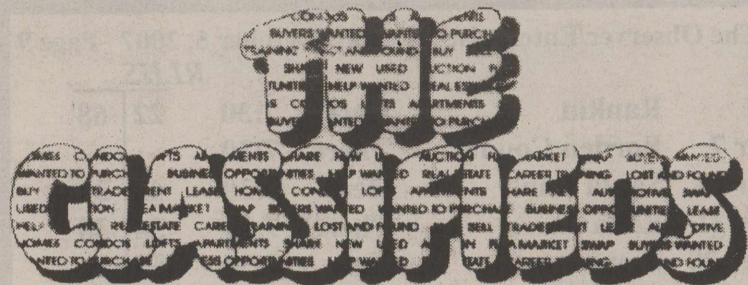

Dear Ms. Pope:

Bronte Independent School District believes that the student comes first. Part of our district mission statement professes: "We further believe our behavior as professional educators has a direct relationship with student achievement now and in the future." The comment has a direct impact on the educational philosophy for teachers that were employed at Coke County Juvenile Justice Center. Bronte ISD, a small public school, provided the education services to the student-residents at Coke County Juvenile Justice Center. The school district provided accelerated instruction to recover high school credits, a GED testing site, vocational training, and teen leadership classes.

The decision to move all student-residents from Coke County Juvenile Justice Center will affect many lives in the months and years to come. Your agency cites unsafe conditions as the reason to evacuate 197 incarcerated juveniles from Coke County Juvenile Justice Center in Bronte, TX on Monday, October 1, 2007. Not a person from GEO Group Inc. or Bronte ISD was aware of your intentions until 5:00pm on Monday, October 1st. Every single resident was removed from the facility by 4:30 p.m. the following day. This means that over eighty employees from GEO Incorporated and nearly twenty-five Bronte Independent school's staff had less than twenty-four hours to understand that

your decision would affect the rest of their lives.

When it comes to the safety of children, sometimes there is no other choice; nevertheless, the information cited in the Dallas Morning News uses as reasons for closure from as far back as eight years ago. None of the allegations were directed at the education Bronte ISD provided; however, over twenty employees didn't even get a chance to wish the best for the student-residents you ripped out of the facility after they left work. Many student-residents have left Coke County Juvenile Justice Center with a deeper appreciation for education, the number one key for successful rehabilitation. Education is the key to developing successful, productive citizens, and it is unfortunate that you could not have contacted the Bronte Independent School District before you decided to move residents. You have affected a community with your decision to use clandestine practices to remove students from Coke County Juvenile Justice Center.

In my opinion, these student-residents will not be better served in any other TYC facility in the state. I have been to other facilities, and your educators and TYC staff deal with the same problems you have cited in reports at CCJJC. I am by no means an expert on the Texas Youth Commission, but I had been an avid supporter of the agency since I started working with the Buffalo Soldier Pilot Program, a TYC initiative, in 1994. Students need chances to correct mistakes. Why was there no opportunity for corrective action for GEO Group Inc? I thought this was the entire premise behind the Texas Youth Commission. There is not a single claim of neglect reported that hasn't happened in any other juvenile facility in the state of Texas or in the nation. No one would claim Coke County Juvenile Justice Center is perfect, but it is dealing with some of the most troubled teens in the state. It is a special population of repeat offending young men. These same

young men caused thousands of dollars of damage to dorms that your specialized TYC staff was supervising the night before they left CCJJC. The Governor was quick to applaud the quick action and approach by your agency to remove the TYC inmates, yet they will be no better off for the decision.

Our district has always understood the possibility of CCJJC's changing to fit the needs of student-residents in the state. We support this endeavor. However, it bothers our district to think that your agency knew far in advance that it had no plans of renewing your contract with GEO Group Inc. This information could have helped had it been shared earlier. Now we are at serious risk, our district will fight to survive. Our district needs the opportunity to understand; we feel we are owed an explanation. It is important to note that as of Wednesday, October 3, 2007 nobody from your agency had communicated with Bronte Independent School District about your actions. Your agency has conducted annual audits in our education department at CCJJC for many years that have lasted many days; nevertheless, your agency doesn't have the courtesy to notify our district of something that will affect the lives of many. Our district encourages you to review the Bronte ISD education evaluations conducted by TYC for the previous years.

Bronte, a small town of about 1,100 people, has some struggles ahead. Our District still believes our behavior as professional educators has a direct relationship to student achievement now and in the future. You never know how long you will have to provide that influence in a student's life. The District owes it to every student who was enrolled in Bronte ISD to act professionally. For your agency, it would have been a professional courtesy to offer an explanation, or at least to say that your agency understood what it was doing. Currently, our education office at CCJJC is working diligently to collect

grades, withdrawals, transcripts, GED scores, and records so that the education process can continue for the 197 student-residents that have been moved. Bronte ISD hopes that the student-residents are doing well.
