Program set for Old Coke **County Jail**

The Old Coke County Jail was built 100 years ago by Southern Structural Steel, and it still stands as a reminder of our county's contribution to Texas and American history.

To showcase the Old Jail, a program is planned for Saturday, October 13, during the Robert Lee Street Affair. At 9 am, the jail will be open for tours. A third grade musical program of Texas songs, including the favorite "Old Coke County" will begin at 10 am under the direction of Mrs. Myers. A cowboy poetry reading will follow.

At high noon, the first hanging in the Old Jail will be held. The Old Jail was awarded a place on the Department of Interior's National Register of Historic Places because of its unique construction and lock-up system. The certificate of placements will be hung to remind visitors of the jail's significance. There will be no death pronouncements.

Local families have assembled pictures and artifacts of their family history and they will be on display as a reminder of the role their family had in the history of the county and of the country. Collectively, family histories tell the story of the foundation on which present citizens stand.

A History of the Old Coke County Jail and Sheriffs by Bonita Cartrite, whose father Melvin Childress was the last sheriff to live in the building, will be available. The proceeds from the sale of this book have been dedicated to the restoration of the Old Jail.

BISD begins process of cutting jobs by Hal Spain, Publisher

As a result of the Texas Youth Commission pulling its contract with the GEO Group, the Bronte ISD school enrollment instantly went from 500 students to about 340. "The problem is," according to school superintendent Alan Richey, "we are now overstaffed and have to reduce those numbers."

According to Richey, one of the worst elements concerning the closing is that TYC seemed to have no deliberate process which governed their actions. The board of trustees at BISD is trying hard not to make that same mistake, according to their superintendent. Richey thinks the process of reducing staff at the school may take most of this year.

If Saturday's school board meeting is any indication, he may well be right. During Saturday morning's meeting, board members went into executive session for nearly, six hours to discuss this issue. Another regular board meeting is set for tonight (Wednesday, October 10), as we are at our deadline with this week's paper.

As a result of Saturday's meeting, the board has reduced from 15 to 20 staff positions at the school. Buyouts and retirement incentives also may be offered. The board has also cancelled the incentive program, which will save the district over \$130,000 per year.

The news here at BISD is not all bad, according to the superintendent. "We have been truly blessed at this facility. We have great facilities, a healthy fund balance, and no bonded indebtedness. And we are very fortunate in that respect. The bad news is that in a school district, the only method of saving money is to reduce personnel."

The superintendent concluded by stating, "we have to be as fair as we can to all our employees." This is the reason the board is going through this very deliberate process in evaluating their personnel, including the administrative positions. Richey concluded the interview by thanking the "We really community. appreciate all the community support and all your thoughts and prayers."

TAC Officials Tackle TB Entry and ID Requirements

Texas livestock health officials, striving to protect Texas' hard-earned cattle tuberculosis (TB)-free status, have adopted new cattle entry, testing and movement regulations that go into effect Saturday, October 13. The 13 commissioners for the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) have tightened regulations, due to concerns about the recent findings of cattle TB infection in two New Mexico dairies, a Colorado bucking bull herd, and an Oklahoma beef herd. Additionally, over the past two years, at least five infected cattle herds and infection in free-ranging deer have been identified in Minnesota. For several years, Michigan also has waged war against TB in both cattle and free-ranging deer.

Texas originally achieved cattle TB-free status in 2000, only to lose it in 2002, after two infected cattle herds were detected. To regain the state's status and ability to move and market cattle without restrictions, a rigorous TB testing program was initiated to detect any remaining infection and provide proof of sufficient disease surveillance. In October 2006, Texas regained its TBfree status, after testing 342,937 cattle in the state's 818 dairies, and 128,489 head in 2,014 beef purebred and seed stock herds.

"Reclaiming TB-free status was hard work for Texas producers and veterinary practitioners. who participated in the testing program, and for TAHC and U.S. Department of Agriculture staff in Texas," said Dr. Bob Hillman, TAHC executive director and Texas' state veterinarian. "It's not

enough to just find and eradicate TB." He stressed that proactive measures are needed to prevent reintroducing this

contagious, bacterial disease that can cause lesions on an animal's lungs, lymph nodes and other internal organs. "We must be able to find

the disease quickly if it is reintroduced and trace those animals that may be the source of infection or be exposed to TB," he said.

Dr. Hillman said the new TAHC regulations include:

* lowering the TB testeligible age from six to two months for sexually intact dairy cattle entering Texas. These animals also must be officially identified individually and be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection stating they tested negative for TB within 60 days prior to entering Texas. Sexually intact cattle less than two months of age must have an entry permit and go to a designated facility, where the animals will be held until they are tested negative at the age of two months.

foregoing TB testing on out-of-state dairy cattle delivered to an approved feedlot in Texas for finish feeding for slaughter only, unless the animals are from TB-infected herd. These dairy feeder animals must be identified, and have a TAHC entry permit and certificate of veterinary inspection.

* identifying all Texas dairy cattle, regardless of age--with an official or TAHC-approved identification device prior to movement within the state.

* requiring TB tests for Mexican-origin (or "M"branded) steers that are recognized as potential rodeo and/or roping stock, and entering Texas from other states. These steers must have had a negative TB test

Dr. Hillman explained that dairy animals are managed in close confinement and, therefore, are at greater risk for TB exposure if they have an infected herd mate. Lowering the TB test-eligible age for imported dairy cattle will help reduce the chances of introducing a TB-infected animal into a dairy.

"Regulations already were in place for importing steers from Mexico, requiring them to be "M"-branded, and then retested annually in Texas, if they are used for rodeo or roping activities," said Dr. Hillman.

"The new regulation addresses situations in which Mexican-origin steers have been maintained in other states. Requiring these animals to be testnegative within the previous 12 months provides greater assurance that the animals will not introduce TB into Texas herds."

He advised producers to avoid commingling U.S. cattle with Mexican-origin rodeo steers or feeder cattle. Although these imported animals enter under strict TB testing requirements, he noted that TB has not been eradicated in Mexico and there is significant potential for disease exposure.

"Cattle tuberculosis infection may be a 'silent' infection. For years, the infected animal can appear healthy, and only when it is tested or slaughtered, is there evidence of infection. By then, the infected animal may have exposed many herd mates to this insidious disease," said Dr. Hillman. "We must act proactively to prevent disease introduction and ensure the ability to identify sources of the' disease, in order to maintain Texas' well-deserved TBfree status."

"File of Life" for senior citizens to begin in

January

A new program sponsored in part by United Way Venture Grant funds will begin in January 2008 throughout the Concho Valley. Any individual, who is 65 years of age or older; people, who suffer from chronic illnesses, and individuals, who have sensory, physical or cognitive impairments may obtain a FILE OF LIFE magnetic refrigerator holder and medical information card FREE OF CHARGE.

In times of emergency, every second counts. An ambulance soars past traffic, sirens screaming and lights flashing, the medical technicians race toward the home of a senior citizen. When they arrive, the senior is unconscious and they have few facts to go on. Does the patient have any existing conditions? Is he taking any medications? Does he have allergies: the FILE OF LIFE is a mini-medical history that is posted on the outside of one's refrigerator. The FILE OF LIFE enables medics to obtain a quick medical history when the patient is unable to offer one. The card, which is kept in what they have," Rollins a red plastic pocket labeled FILE OF LIFE, lists the patient's name, emergency contacts, insurance policy numbers, health problems, medication, dosages, allergies, recent surgeries, doctor's name and a health proxy. The entire pocket is held with a magnet to the outside of the refrigerator. When police, fire department personnel or emergency medical technicians respond to a call they have immediate access to this information and they know exactly where to look.

Emergency personnel know that if newspapers are piling up on a porch and they have to go into a residence, the first thing they do is look for the person. The second thing is to look on the refrigerator.



Scan a wide swath of the roadside. Slow down when approaching a deer standing near the side of a road and be prepared. If startled, the deer can bolt onto the road and into your path. If necessary, honk your horn and flash your lights to try to scare it away.

• Be alert for more deer than you may see at that moment. Where there is one deer, there are often more nearby.

• In many instances, it is best not to swerve around the deer since the deer may move

in the same direction. You may also inadvertently hit another vehicle, or go off onto a dangerous shoulder. Unless certain of those road factors, it is often best to simply brake and continue in your lane of traffic.

• Be particularly careful at dawn and dusk and when driving either over a hill or around a curve, where visibility is limited. Use your high beams to give you a greater area of visibility and allow you to see the deer's eyes sooner.

• Deer whistles or ultrasonic deer avoidance systems attached to vehicles have never been proven to work by independent studies and may give drivers a false sense of security.

• Take deer crossing signs seriously, particularly those installed specifically for this time of year. Be particularly cautious in wooded and agricultural areas where there is little distance between the road and the woods.

* If you have a small and short room, try painting thin vertical stripes three-to-five inches wide in two toneon-tone shades. Try Valspar's Honeysuckle Beige (3007-6A) in a satin finish together with a cream color in a flat finish to give a warm subtle look.

Remember, cool colors recede. Warm colors advance, appearing to come towards you.

A decorative paint finish can add a feeling of depth. Try painting a wash of a cool color over a warm off-white base. Create the wash by filling a bucket half way with water and then add the cool color. Lightly brush on the diluted paint in a crisscross fashion until you've covered the entire wall surface.

* Incorporate surfaces that reflect light: metals, mirrors, polished surfaces and glass. These open up a room, making it appear more spacious.

Also, be sure to unclutter a small room to give it the illusion of space. "Above all, when

choosing colors for your home, select ones that make you feel happy, since you have to live there. Get inspired; let your creativity come out and literally cover your walls," said McGuire.

students over half of Texas

AP test takers Minority students rep-resented 52 percent of all Advanced Placement (AP) test takers in Texas in 2007.

High school students who make high scores on AP exams can earn college credit for

courses, saving their families thousands of dollars in tuition costs and giving students a head start on a college education.

Figures just released from the College Board, which oversees the AP program, show that 135,130 Texas students took Advanced Placement exams, an increase of 10 percent from 2006 and a 49 percent increase in the last five years. Of that total, 125,526 were public school students.

Many students take more than one AP exam each year. In 2007, the total number of tests taken was 246,096, up almost 10 percent from 2006.

Of those, 52 percent self-reported that they were minority students, compared to 50 percent in 2006 and 45 percent five years ago. Nationally, 35 percent of test-takers self-reported as minority students this year.

Hispanic students represent 34 percent of Texas AP exam-takers compared to 13 percent nationally. Over the last five years, the number of Hispanic test-takers in Texas has increased 79 per-cent from 25,436 to 45,612.

Performance on Advanced Placement tests improved as well, reflecting a 7.3 percent increase in the number of exam scores of 3 or higher from 2006 and an increase of 37 percent in the last five years.

The grading scale on the exams is one to five, with five being the highest possible score. All totaled, 116,809 tests earned scores of three, four, or five. Universities typically award college course credit for AP scores of three or more. Many selective colleges give special consideration to AP and honors classes when making admissions decisions.
