Take Precautions to Prevent Burns

When we think of things in our homes that might cause burns, there are some obvious culprits; curling irons. cook stoves, and heaters. But what about tap water?

As surprising as it sounds, it's true. Each year, thousands of emergency room visits are attributed to scalds - injuries caused by hot liquid or steam. Adults often experience mild scalds, perhaps when washing dishes, and quickly adjust the temperature without a second thought. But older adults and children's skin is much more sensitive and can sustain a burn in a matter of seconds.

In an effort to prevent scalds and other painful

Volunteer Fire Department and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) have teamed up for Fire Prevention Week to help our community "Stay Fire Smart! Don't Get Burned." The public safety campaign, taking place October 4-10, focuses on burn prevention and treatment, as well as ways to keep your home and family safe from the leading causes of fire.

Simple acts such as setting your water heater's thermostat to no higher than 120 degrees F, and installing "anti-scald" devices on tub faucets and shower heads can help protect you and your family from scalds. But these measures things hurt. alone are not enough. Test your water at the faucet using a sleeves when cooking. cooking thermometer to hand as your main guide.

burns, the Robert Lee water should feel warm, not hot. Before you put your child in the tub, test the temperature with your wrist, elbow, or the back of your hand. If you're using a thermometer with a read-out, remember that bath water should be no more than 100 degrees.

Of course, tap water isn't the only liquid that can cause burn injuries. Other precautions you can take to keep your family safe from burns include:

· Keep hot foods and liquids away from tables and counter edges so they cannot be pulled or knocked over.

· Never hold a child in your arms while preparing hot food or drinking a hot beverage.

· Teach children that hot

· Wear short or closefitting

All the vigilance in the world make sure it is no higher than may not be sufficient to pre-100 degrees Fahrenheit. Even vent every single scald or if your water heater is set no burn. That is why it is also higher than 120 degrees important to know how to treat Fahrenheit, use your wrist, a burn. 

adults in our nation are overweight or obese. In Texas, 28 percent of adults and 32 percent of students fall into the overweight/obese category.



Naturally, soldiers returning from Iraq and Afghanistan are sometimes struggling to deal with cognitive and emotional traumatic brain injuries, often caused by blasts from improvised explosive devices, as well as combat stress, including post-traumatic stress disorder.

The numbers of service members needing help is expected to grow as deployments continue and more service members experience multiple deployments. In fact, according to 2007 Post-Deployment Health Re-Assessment (administered to service members 90 to 120 days after returning from a deployment) data, 38 percent of soldiers and 31 percent of Marines reported psychological symptoms. This is why it is vital that these men and women have a confidential, easy to use

resource, such as the TexVet Web site and 2-1-1. It's free and available around the clock, so they can get the help they need, even in the darkest hours.

As patriotic Texans, we need to reach out to our servicemen and their families. It can be as simple as writing a letter to a soldier or to the family of a soldier; calling or visiting a vet; volunteering at your local USO or some other support group; donating money or care package items to an organization; or just stopping a soldier in the airport or on the street and thanking them in person.

The point is, on Veterans Day and on the other 364 days out of the year, we have to do whatever we can for our troops, our veterans and their families, because every single day, they are doing do so much for us.





Coke Co. schools flu update

As you know, seasonal flu and the H1N1 flu can easily be spread from person to person, therefore, Coke County schools are taking the following steps to help keep students, teachers, and staff from getting sick with flu. At this time, there are not any cases of the flu at Bronte ISD, but these steps should be followed all the time and not only during flu season to keep your children healthy.

- · Educate and encourage students and staff to cover their mouth and nose when they cough or sneeze. All students have easy access to tissues, soap and water, and alcohol-based hand cleaners.
- · Remind teachers, staff, and students to wash their hands often.
- · Send sick students, teachers, and staff home and advise them and their families that sick people should stay home until at

least 24 hours after they no longer have a fever (without the use of fever-reducing medicine).

- · Clean surfaces and items most likely to have frequent hand contact such as desks, door knobs, keyboards, etc.
- · Move individuals to a separate room if they become sick at school until they can be sent home.
- · Have masks available to be worn by the school nurse and other staff caring for sick people at school.
- · Encourage early medical evaluation for sick students and staff.
- Stay in regular communication with local public health officials.

In addition, parents can help by teaching their children not to share personal items and to send a water bottle or small container of hand sanitizer in their backpacks. Parents also need to know the signs and symptoms of the flu which include fever of 100 degrees or greater, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache and feeling very tired. Some people may also vomit or have diarrhea.






