# Farm hand

ATTENTION: Mr. Farmer and Rancher

This is the time to start planning for your winter crops.

We have been missing a good bet by not taking advantage of the conserving base acres and some of our diverted acres. We need to be sowing them in a small grain and either pasturing

our own cattle or pasturing someone else's cat-

It is a proven fact that cattle grazing on wheat will pay the fertilizer bill. So if you didn't get anything but this out of it, it would be a big help to you in increasing your income and getting a return on every acre of your land.

The time has passed when you can afford to lay part of your land out and it not produce something every year. Land prices are too high and the interest rate is too great to let

this happen to your land.

There is no telling how many head of cattle are shipped out of El Paso to the wheat belt to be wintered. We are a lot closer than Kansas or the other Mid-Western states. Lets take advantage of our location and our water, by plant ing it to wheat so we can not only get the income of grazing but also the wheat, that is, as long as there is no program on wheat. This unallotted land we have is just made for this type of enterprise. With proper fertilization, we can make this land produce two crops in one year. Not just a grazing crop and a wheat crop, but also a milo crop. With the advent of the quickie hybrids that bloom in around 45 days, we can plant them in July and harvest them in late October or early November. This would give us a good rotation. Early milo, wheat, milo. Most of this kind of pasturing will be of the yearling variety.

Mr. Rancher, have you considered the possibility of holding your calves over till the next year to sell them. I think you can make a 100 cow operation produce like it was 200 cows by doubling the price you will receive for that calf. The above plan works perfectly with this kind of operation. If the small grain is good, you should be able to run 3 yearling to the acre for 4 to 5 months. I think I would be looking real hard at a crossbreeding program on most commercial herds, the hybrid vigor you will get will make a big difference in the earning the cows will return.

Cattle is one item that we will always have to have. The American people have become meat eaters and this creates a market for beef. As long as we can produce it economically we will stay in business, but if we try to hi-jack the public, we will be out of the business. So this behooves each of us to study our operation and weed out all the overhead that we can and to streamline it where we can, so we will be able to compete with the poultry and swine enterprises.

TWO TWENTY-FOUR ROW PLANTERS



IF YOU CAN NOT FIND THEM, CALL THE NEWS

In 1932 Mr. Criswell said to Mr. Jones; "It wo'nt work". "Mr. Jones said, "Yes, it will work". They were discussing the first two row planter in the area. The two row planter worked. The four row worked. Then they tried the six and the eight planters. They worked. More equipment and larger equipment has been a real blessing to the plains. Would you believe today in Gaines County there is a twenty four row planter? It sounds too much like a 'TEXAS' story. This means that fourty inches between rows, times twenty four equals 960 inches or eighty feet. An out of the state visitor from the west coast looked it over and said, "just think, I will not even be able to tell this when I get home because they will not believe me".

To tell it big, let us do some arithmetic together. How much land would you plant in one round if the rows were three miles long? It will take approximately ten rows one quarter mile long to make one acre. The field where this planter has worked is three miles long, how many acres would you plant in one round? Would you believe fifty-six acres? (56) To go a little further; If a 'D-8 Caterpillar' tractor pulled the planter three miles per hour, how much could be planted in twelve hours?

Three-Hundred-Thirty-Six Acres! Twenty-Four rows! Fifty-six acres per round! Yes, the story is big, but true. Three sections in six days. Richard Patterson, from Lamesa, built the planter, and it could be seen by driving out on the Frankel City Highway about six miles. It is next to the road on the left going out.

THE LAFOLLETTE FAMILY

Metz LaFollette, assistant principal of Seminole High School, and nounced his resignation effective July 1, 1967. LaFollette has accepted the principalship at Carthage High School and will report for duty there August 1. Carthage, in Deep East Texas, near the Louisiana border, is a AAA school with an enrollment of 630 in high school.

The veteran coach and administrator came to Seminole in the fall of 1950 as head basketball coach and assistant football coach. He coached here until 1959, the last two years as athletic director and head football and basketball coach, when he returned to his Alma Mater, West Texas State, to assume the duties of head basketball coach. After four years at the Canyon school, he came back to Seminole as basketball coach in 1963. His 1963-1964 team won the district and went to the regional finals where Seminole was defeated by Graham, the eventual state titlist that year.

In September, 1964, he was named assistant high school principal and has served in that capacity since then. No replacement has been named

for LaFollette at this time.

Starting from scratch in the sense that Seminole had previously know few moments of basketball glory, he built a roundball program that paid off in an eventual State championship by the 1955 team in AA. This team also started a parade of district championships, some in AA and some in AAA, that reached a string of 11 before being broken in 1966. The crown added by this year's Indians gives Seminole 12 titles out of the last 13 years of competition in the hoop sport.

Although never blessed with an abundance of height or superstars, LaFollette's teams were well-known for their hustle, their disciplined teamwork, and their unrelenting and sticky defense. In addition to the State crown gathered by the 1955 team, the 1957, 1958 and 1959 Indians were regional champions and finished with one third place and two

fourth places in the State contest.

LaFollette went to school one year at Decatur Junion College where he played football and basketball prior to moving to West Texas where he played three more years in the two sports. He graduated in 1948 after a two-year interruption for service in the Navy. He is a native

of McKinney and a graduate of McKinney High.

Married to the former Mary Bourn of Canyon, the LaFollettes' have four children. The oldest, Steve, is married, has one small son, and is a junior high coach and teacher in the Borger school system; Katy, 18, is a senior in Seminole High School and is the currently reigning "Peach Queen" of Texas. Sherry 13, is a seventh grade student, and the youngest, Collin, will start to school in September.

"We certainly hate to leave Seminole", Metz said, "but this is an



## To Aid Latins

WASHINGTON — Sen. Ralph Yarborough has introduced two education and job training bills authorizing more than \$100 million to give Spanish speaking Americans better economic opportunities.

One is a billingual education act providing \$7 million for teaching in both languages for Americans of Mexican or Puerto Rican descent for whom Spanish is the mother tongue and English a foreign language.

The other bill, called the Southwestern Human Development Act of 1967, authorizes \$100 million in federal funds in self-help program for Mexican-Americans. It calls for education, training, health and leadership programs to help those affected to overcome economic barriers.

Yarborough said there is precedent for the latter regional approach in the Appalachian Regional Development Act, "only in this case we concentrate on the development of human productivity rather than the physical environment."

"A program of this magnitude is a necessity if our words about equality of economic opportunity are ever to lose their hollow ring," Yarborough told the Senate. "In Texas in 1959

the median income of Mexican-Americans was only 57 per cent that of Anglos.

Yarbrough said the Mexican-American child "is wrongly led to believe from his first day of school that there is something wrong with him because of his language. This misbelief soon spreads to the image he has of his culture, of the history of his people and of his people themselves. This is a subtle and cruel form of discrimination."

His bilingual education bill, he said, is "not a general aid bill to all schools with Mexican-American students. Rather it is a bill which will enable many schools to make the large expenditures required to revamp their courses."

He said schools selected for the program will get resources they need "to experiment, try new things, blaze new trails and demonstrate to other schools what might be done."

"The bilingual education bill also establishes an advisory committee on education of bilingual children, provides for establishment of language centers for teachers of such children and institutes summer institutes for such teachers.

The Association's audit report which will be presented at the meeting shows that the gin made net savings of some \$20,000.00 for the 132 producers who own it. This figures a net saving of over \$13.00 per bale.

This home-owned business paid out \$42,290.32 in wages and salaries to people in the community, reports manager Gary Weaver. An additional 334,819.95 was spent locally for taxes, insurance, utilities, repairs and supplies and advertising. The total cash released in the community by the gin amounts to 0114,110.27, including the 037,000.00 cash refund which will be paid to the stockholders at the meeting.

During the past three years, this cooperative has ginned a total of 18,793 bales and has returned to the producer some \$83,500.00 in savings. The Association's plant has been steadily improved and it is now one of the best in the area.

He was a retired farmer and had been an ordained Baptist Minister for more than forty years, but refused to be called Reverend, prefering the simpler title of Brother Robinson.


