One of the largest bodies of water to be found anywhere in the United States is located in western Gaines County. Part of the vast Ogalala formation, each well drilled in this body of water will produce upwards of one thousand gallons of water per minute and is estimated to continue doing so for at least fifty years.

The soil in western Gaines County is not of the best, according to Soil Conservation standards. Composed of sandy loan, (mostly sand) and numerous outcroping of rock. fertility is very low. Because of this, the price per acre for this land is well below that of outher areas, primarialy to the north where blackland is the basic soil.

To overcome the lack of fertility and make use of the vast amount of available water, Gaines County farmers are the pioneers of the most elaberate water systems found anywhere in the world. The purpose of these systems are to apply an exact amount of water at a specific time without pushing the water through the soil below the root zone. This system, in turn, enables the farmer to use a vast amount of chemical fertilizer. The chemical fertilizer applied to sandy loam will be completely utilized by the growing crop, provided the water is applied in a proper manner, and the end result is production on a par with any other type of soil. Sometimes, much great-

The only drawback to this type of water application, regardles of the net efficiency,. is initial cost. To prepare a quarter section for irrigation, a well is drilled, a punp is installed, and a motor is used to lift water to the top of the ground. This alone is sufficient to irrigate some types of soil. In Gaines County, this is only a starting point. In connection with the irrigation pump, a system of aluminum pipe must be installed to distribute the water evenly. The total cost of the system can vary as much as fifteen thousand dollars, depending upon how elaborate or how mechanized the requirement.

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

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

MENTAL HEALTH GROUP HEARS MRS. PAUL CONDIT

The Mental Health Group of AAUW had its last meeting of the season, Thursday, April 13, in the home of Mrs. Nora Salter. Mrs. F. J. Young and Mrs. John Thompson were co-hostesses.

Mrs. Paul Condit, graduate of Washington University, St. Louis, Mo., in Physical Therapy, spoke on Rehalibitation. A challenge for the Individual and the Community. Rehabilitation, making a handicapped person aware of his potential, is divided into three age categories. In the children's group, accidents alone account for thirty percent of disabilities. The middle group, twenty to forty years of age, are many times disabled due to accidents, strokes, heart disease, multiple sclerosis and arthritis. Chronic diseases in older people prove their biggest disability. To restore the injured part to maximum potentiality is the aim of physical therapy.

Mrs. Condit brought out that there are no personality characteristics which distinguishes a disabled person from a normal one while some attitudes may change, the personality does not. A therapist must learn her patient before physical therapy starts. She must know what motivates the individual and be aware of limitations

In conclusion, we were reminded men live by four things: work, play, love and worship. A physical defect may impair one's ability to enter into all of these but there's no disability that can destroy desire to do them. No one is so disabled that he can't do some work, play in some fashion, invest love in someone and find someway to worship. Remember God does not forget this handicapped. How can we?

PIPELINE TO HELP AREA FARMERS

Gaines County Farmers will be helped when the new 'Thirty Inch Line' is completed from Kermit, Texas to Gauge, Oklahoma. The big line will run from the south-west to the north-east part of the county, crossing the Andrews highway about eight miles south of Seminole and about three miles east on the Lamesa Highway. It will pass near Loop covering about forty miles crossing this county.

Northern Natural Gas Co. of Omaha will deliver natural gas to the St. Paul-Minneapolis area upon completion by R. H. Fulton Construction Co. This project is to cost about fifty million dollars, not including the pump stations and small lines

coming off of it.

The auxiliary lines coming from it will begin near the gin about three miles east and will serve the Elam, Moore, and Ward farms, then south serving the Ridens, Cobb, Thompson, then on through the Norman's, and to the Cope farm. Then west and south to the Planters gin, serving the Jackson, Clanton, And Anderson farms; southwest serving Clyde Jones, L. G. Miller, Fincher Norton, Williams, and Myers farms, making a total of about forty miles. The estimated spent on the small lines only will be near \$200,000.00





REED, CHARLES O. III AWARDED THE AIR MEDAL FOR HEROISM

Awarded: Air medal with "V" Device Date action: 24 February 1967 Theater: Republic of Vietnam Reason:

For heroisem while engaged in aerial flight in connection with military operations against a jpsto; e frrce: First Lieutenant Reed distinguisted himself by exceptionaly valorous actions on 24 February 1967 in th Republic of Vietnam. On this day, an urgent message was monitored by First Lieutenat Reed's aircraft requesting an immediate dust off for the 4th Battalion who had two seriously wounded troops. First Lieutenant Reed answered the call and volunteered to attempt the dust off, although low on fuel. After picking up the battalion commander and surgeon, First Lieutenant Reed's aircraft proceeded to the LZ area but had to orbit until friendly forces could reach the LZ. When the ground unit reached the LZ and smoke was identified, it was reported that the area was not secured and parts of the friendly unit were in contact with the enemy. A long shallow approch was made to the area and heavy automatic weapond fire was immediately received. As the bottom canopy was reached, the rotor blades had to cut a clear area from the trees. Once on the ground, the patients were loaded and a straight up hovering take off was executed to utilize the hole cut in the canopy and once again the aircraft was taken under heavy hostile automatic weapons fire. After having delivered the patients to the Soui Da medical facitity it was determined that the aircraft had less than ten minutes of juel remaining and that a twenty minute delay could have resulted in the death of both patients due to loss of blood. First Lieutenant Reed's heroic actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

Stockholders of the Seminole Co-op Gin have been called to meet at 6:30 p.m.April 22, 1967 at the Seminole High School Cafeteria, according to Board President Robert Jameson. The gin has completed its third year of operation with a total for the season of some 6305 bales ginned and 2854 tons of seed marketed.

The Association's audit report which will be presented at the meeting shows that the gin made net savings of some \$80,000.00 for the 132 producers who own it. This figures a net saving of over \$12.00 per bale.

This home-owned business paid out \$42,290.32 in wages and salaries to people in the community, reports manager Gary Weaver. An additional \$34,819.95 was spent locally for taxes, insurance, utilities, repairs and supplies and advertising. The total cash released in the community by the gin amounts to \$114,110.27, including the \$37,000.00 cash refund which will be paid to the stockholders at the meeting.

During the past three years, this cooperative has ginned a total of 18,703 bales and has returned to the producer some \$83,500.00 in savings. The Association's plant has been steadily improved and it is now one of the best in the area.



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



4 Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble. Keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.

5 Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger.

Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot.

/ Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored safely beyond reach of children and careless adults.

8 Never climb a tree or a fence with a loaded gun.

9 Never shoot at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water.

10 Do not mix gunpowder and alcohol.


