# 24 MEN STRONG AND A WAITING LIST TO SERVE


"You have to love to be a fireman to be a fireman," as quoted by a previous Fire Chief and seems to be absolutely right in talking to other volunteer fire fighters of the Seminole Department. It could not be the retirement plan under which they work. To draw retirement in the amount of twenty-five dollars per month a man must have served twenty years and be fifty-five years old.

If it could not be the retirement for which the firemen work, it surely could not be the salary. Each fireman is allowed ten dollars per month for cleaning, water bills, shoe replacement and clothing replacement. Each fireman receives three dollars per practice, each first and third Thursday of each month plus two dollars per fire--for a grand total of about twenty five dollar average per month. Some make more and some make less because of the times they have been out. If it is not the retirement and not the salary it might be the real good hours. They are only on call twenty-four hours of each day. They receive the same pay for a thirty minute grass fire as they do for a six hour alarm fire. Yes, "You have to love to be a fireman to be a fireman." "We've had the best luck in the world, we have never lost a lot yet. We have left some in a terrible mess but we have never lost one." "One time we had three gins on fire at the same time." "Another time we were on one at the Lockergin, the wind was blowing fifty miles per hour, and we had a call saying the Tower Theater was on fire." "We were lucky again. A huge fire had burned in the floor but the wind had never reached it and we got it put out fairly easily." (con't on Page 11)





# THE ART SECTION:


(Q) When I use turpentine as my oil medium for oil painting, the result is a flat or matte finish. Can you tell me if any harm is caused which may result in later cracking or peeling?

(A) In the first place, turpentine is NOT a medium in the technical sense of the term. It is a thinner or dilute, to clean brushes with. It does not contribute anyting toward binding the colors or adhering them to the ground (which a real medium does). The proper method of working with oil colors employ one fourth trupentine and three fourth linseed oil, or mineral spirits as a thinner to reduce paint thickness so that it can be more easily applied to the canvas. If you spray or paint your pictures with a good glaze it will keep them from cracking and peeling later on.



# TEEN SCENE

Boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 19 interested in the fascinating world of insects can gain valuable information on the subject by joining a 4-H Club and enrolling in the 4-H entomology project.

In addition to being a lot of fun, County Agent, Paul W. Henderson, says members also gain new knowledge about both beneficial and destructive insects. Entomology is a project, he adds, which can be conducted by urban as well as rural youth.

Young members can take a basic first-year project which includes making insect collections and mounting equipment. They collect 15 insects in three orders.

The second-year project is designed for the intermediate age groups. Members collect 25 insects from at least 7 orders, learn about insecticides, how to control insect pests and to giv demonstrations. Exhibiting collections is often a highlight of the year for entomology members, explains the assistant County Agent.

More advanced projects for the older members are included in the third-year program. In addition to collecting 30 insects in 7 orders, members rear insects through the life cycle, collect immature stages of development, give demonstrations, and participate in the entomology contest in preparation for future membership on the county team. District winning teams are eligible to participate in the state contest held each year at Texas A & M University, explains the Ass't county Agent.

Older members who have completed the first three years are encouraged to move on into special projects which include studies in depth of all insects commonly found in the area, Henderson says.

Boys and girls interested in more information on the 4-H entomology projects are invited to visit the county Extension Service office located in the Courthouse.



Sunday the medical profes sion received "the roses" from the family and relatives of 9 year old Teddy Duff, son of Mr. and Mrs. A.L. Duff, Jr. of Albuquerque, New Mexico, grandson of Mrs. A.L. Duff of Seminole, Mr. and Mrs. Jim L. Brown of Seagraves, and nephew of the C.T. Bensons and the Glenn W. Browns.

The Duffs of Albuquerque came to Seminole to attend the Duff family reunion in the party house at Gaines County Park on Saturday. Sunday morning, at granddaddy and grandmother Brown's home, young Teddy was popping red ants with rubber bands when one popped in his mouth and he swallowed it. Within minutes he was experiencing pain and shortness of breath.

Dr. Bill McCullough, of Seagraves could not see an ant through fluoroscope but was concerned about his breathing and referred them to Lubbock as an emergency, calling ahead for emergency preparation at the Methodist Hospital.

A very fast ride to Lubbock (in 45 minutes with a police escort), resulted in the verification, young Teddy had swallowed a red ant indeed as the doctors removed one from the esophagus.

The ant stung on the way down ejecting poison, causing the swelling and anxiety of shutting off his breath. Daddy and Mother Duff are "passing-out-the-roses" for the medical profession today, and so will 9 year old Teddy when he is older. He is fine and had an interview aired by Lubbock radio.





# FIRE DEPARTMENT Con't page 1

The following men have served as chief for the department here, Amos Turnbow, Rex Long, Charlie Benson, Jack Spruill, R.C. Mc-Gilvery, Sammy Webb, and the present chief, Timmie Pierson.

The Fire Department owns four main fire fighting pieces of equipment:

One 1965 Chevrolet pump truck with an 800 gallon water capacity.

One 1962 Chevrolet emergency station wagon.

One 1957 Ford pump truck with a 500 gallon water capacity.

One 1937 model 500 pumper that the city of Loop has borrowed.

It cost money each time this equipment has to be called out on a fire. Besides the use of the equipment, the \$2.00 per fireman each man gets, it also cost each man or his employer their time while he is off on a fire call. If it cost \$40.00 to \$50.00 to roll the equipment, if it cost \$40.00 for twenty men at \$2.00 per call, plus the \$40.00 to \$100.00 it cost the firemen and their employers for them to be called out; let us be careful how we burn trash, how we light fires, and where we lay that cigarette down.

the one I remember is the one about Rex Long." "We were called southwest of town where a Hoffman unit and an oil well was on fire. A pop-off valve was on fire on a 150-200 gallon butane tank. It was not a very big fire there. Rex had just walked by it when the whole stem blew out sending a blue flame about 30 to 40 feet long and about three feet wide. It would have burned him in half had it hit him."

"And then there was the time that a chemical truck ran into Miles Warlick Cafe. We thought when we arrived it was loaded with butane. The fire was going pretty good and we were thinking about that butane when two driver tires on the truck blew out. I was a block away when I realized I was not hurt. It took some of the firemen longer to get back than it did me. Yes, I was scared! We though the butane had exploded. We have had a lot of fun laughing about it during the years."

In 1944 the city records show the first official list of fire fighters. They were: Rex Long, Robert McReynolds, Ray Anderson, J.E. Woodward, Amos Turnbow, Ellis Sweat, Doyle Mc-Adoo, E.L. Hester, Allison Gainey, and E.P. Taylor. It was difficult to find out about an

earlier group but one was in existance. In 1938 or 1939. "I served with Dale Daniels, Paul Combs, Rex Long, Earl Caulkins and probably others that I have forgotten," said Johnny Patton. "We had a chief, assistant chief, and secretary but I don't remember their names." Another list that was found included, Amos Turnbow, Paul Combs, Rex Long, Hyle Doss, Lovelle Stell, and Charlie Gregory.

Amos Turnbow said one time that his station caught on fire and he just called Charlie Gregory and told him to bring the fire truck. "What For?" was the answer. "My station is on fire". "He brought the truck and we put it out, never did call in an alarm." "We have had some pretty bad fires, but the one that hurt me most was the Post Office fire when it was on the north side of the square. I got my lungs smoked real badly. Had to spend thirty-one days in the hospital." "No, I paid my own bill."

Rex Long said, "They nearly dragged me to death one time, I was dreading when they came to the end of the pavement and I knew I would start hitting the rocks, but they finally noticed me and slowed down so I could get back on. Only my shoes were dragging hard and I did not get a scratch between the station and the school."

Because of the equipment and the good performance of our firemen each owner of buildings "A lot of firemen have had narrow escapes but and houses have a better insurance rate. In comparison, some area towns have as much as 41¢ for a key fire rate where as Seminole is 33¢. But another important factor is the 25% fire record credit which has been built up over the years because of the reputation of the Fire Department and the history of our losses. Some towns have to pay as much as 15% penalty and do not receive the 25% credit.

# SUMMER HOMEMAKING CLASS MEETS

The Summer Homemaking class met Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, May 30, 31, and June 1, from ten to twelve a.m. in the Homemaking Department of Seminole High School. Eleven girls are enrolled in the course. They are Misses Paulette Barger, Peggy Barger, Marlene Droigk, Beverly Forbis, Lynn Gray, Julia Martinez, Marilyn Moore, Oralia Ramirez, Loretta Richardson, Phyllis Sharp, and Kathy White.

Any girl who has one full credit in Homemaking may enrol in the course which is offered each summer free of charge, as a part of the Vocational Homemaking program. The purposes of t he course are to learn additional things for which there is no time in the regular school term, and for each girl to get more practice in doing things in her own home, under the supervision of her Homemaking teacher and her parents. Each girl must complete approximately one hundred hours of work, including the time spent at school the first part of June. She then has the remainder of the summer to complete the work in her own home Plans for work to be done at home were made pre-

vious to the group meetings, and approved by the teacher and parents of the girl. The group work at school is made up of approximately six meetings of two or three hours each. The subject for the group work is chosen by the girls who are currently enrolled in the course, and planned to meet the needs of the specific group. Each girl receives one-half credit for the course

The class chose "Learning to Shop Wisely" as its unit of study, and the specific areas.of buying foods and buying fabrics. Wednesday, each girl did reference work on how to buy foods and reported her findings to the class. Different size food containers were demonstrated to the class by Miss Ellen Massengill, Homemaking teacher, and plans were made as to how to go about comparing foods in different size containers. Thursday, after assignments were made for research on how to buy fabrics, the girls made a field trip to town. The remainder of Thursday and Friday, girls compared food prices of different brands of food, and different size containers of the same brand food, such as: canned fruits, canned vegetables, canned meats, canned juices, frozen fruits, frozen vegetables, milk, and ice cream. Friday, at the end of the class, each girl reported her conclusion as to which brand and size container is most economical, of the ones she studied.



SEMINOLE TELEPHONES Copies of the 1967 Seminole telephone directory have been mailed to customers here, according to Harry Sawyer, manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. Sawyer said customers will notice a change in the directories when they see them since the old familiar two letter and five digit tele-phone numbers are gone. In their place are the new seven digit numbers which will go into effect when the new books are received. the new books are received.

According to Sawyer, though, the change is not really a change at all. "The new prefix of 758 is the same position on the dial as the old PL 8," the manager said, "so customers can continue to dial their calls in the same way that they have done in the past.

Sawyer said the change is being made because the telephone company is running out of suitable letter and number combinations on a nation-wide basis. "This is a program which will eventually cover all of the United States," he said. "Within a few years, all telephone numbers will be seven digits instead of a combination of letters and numbers."

Sawyer also said the new directories will carry information on how to dial calls direct. He reminded customers, though, that the will not be able to dial their own out of town calls until 1:01 a.m. on June 18 when DDD goes into service here. "Work on our home in Dallas. "All of the equipment has been installed and we are now in the process of making the necessary tests which must be done before the changeover is made."

# Law Is Discussed

The new driver safety laws enacted by the legislature will necessitate a change in the local school program. Driver education for local ninth grade students has been required for several years, but the new law which raises the age for a restriced license to fifteen and to sixteen for an unrestricted license, provided the student has completed an approved driver education course, will require that the driver education course be moved to later in the school program. The restricted license requires that a licensed adult driver ride in the front seat with the student.


Seminole High School will move the required health and driver education courses to the tenth grade, but due to problems of teacher placement driver education will be offered to a limited number of ninth grade students in 1967-68. Ninth grade students who are fifteen years of age before the second semester starts will be permitted to take driver education the second semester. These students will take health the first semester. The remainder of the students in this year's ninth grade will take driver education and health in their sophomore year. After the 1967-68 school year driver education will be offered to sophomore students only. All ninth grade students who will be fifteen years of age after January 14, 1968 should contact the high school principal and let him know what subject they want in place of driver education and health for 1967-68. Call PLaza 8-3663, Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. Students should call at earliest possible time to be assigned to their first choice subject.



The purpose of this clinic is to help each chapter strengthen its project work.


