OF INTEREST TO AREA FARMERS' SOYBEANS by CALVIN HOLCOMB, COUNTY AGENT

Soybeans are the fourth largest use of crop land acreage in the South Plains. Approximately 46,000 acres are grown in this area. Yields range from 20 to 65 bushels per acre. The 1966 national average loan price was \$2.50 per bushel, but the market price grims, Western, A Go-go exceeds this by 30 cents per bushel according to Calvin Holcomb, County Agent.

Oil contests of soybeans varies inversely with pro- Hand and Johnny Clanton tein content. Over 80% of the soybean oil consumed domestically is used for food purposes (shortening, margarine, cooking and salad oils and other edibles). Non-food uses include paint and varnish, resins and plastics, linoleum and oil cloth. More than 553,000 tons of soybean oil have been exported from the United States annually since 1961. Domestic consumption of soybean cake and meal has annually exceeded 9 million tons since 1961. Exports have exceeded 1 million tons during this same period.

Where adequate water resources are available, the County Agent says, soybean acreage can increase, particularly with the continued trend of increased quantities being exported. This increased demand should create higher prices for soybeans which will provide the basis for greater production incentives, as long as cost of production is consistent with yield expectations.

Cotton acreage which has been "hailed-out" in midto-late June is sometimes planted to soybeans. 





(Q) Do you know anything about a peice of sculpture called "Salome" and could you explain it?

(A) Robert Laurents, carved this peice of sculpture from alabaster in 1944. It measured about seventeen inches in height. It shows Salome with the head of John the Baptist in her lap as she embraces the head with tender care. The carving is said to be the artist's finest work.


John the Baptist was not the only man to loose his head to a beautiful woman. Happily, in most cases it is only a figure of speech. But for Salome, it was the real thing, gruesome and tragic.

In spite of its grisly overtones, Salome, with the head of John the Baptist has been the dual subject of innumerable renderings by painters and sculptors since the Renaissance. Where paint and color are concerned, the results have often been distasteful; but for some strange reason, when the subject has been carved in stone. or its modeling cast in bronze, the effect has been more art than life, more a composition of form than a concentration on death.

This sculpture is now on exihibit at the National Museum of Arts.



• Drive, or run at right angles to the storm.

•Go to storm shelter or southwest corner of home basement. •Shut off electricity and fuel lines if time.

Average tornado path is 16 miles long, less than 1/4 mile wide. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles an hour.

Normal direction is from the southwest to the northeast.







increase net returns to South Plains soybean producers: Plant the variety of seed that will mature within the growing season. Inoculate seed prior to planting. Use row spacings of less than 40 inches to increase per acre yields of solid plantings. Rotate soybeans with cotton and grain sorghum to increase cotton and grain sorghum yields. Reduce labor and cultivation costs through weed control by chemicals. Apply irrigation water at the time and in the amount when most needed by the plant. Adjust combine speed to eliminate harvesting losses. Maintain records of cost of production for pinpointing areas where costs canbe reduced or eliminated. Thoroughly understanding the legislative programs affecting soybeans. Consider temporary leasing or renting of expensive equipment.

Varieties that may be planted in this area are Lee, which is a medium-to-late variety; Hill, which is a medium-to-early variety; Hinn, which is an intermediate maturing variety similar to Hill; and, Patterson, an early maturing variety recently released.

The optimum date of planting in the High Plains of Texas ranges from June 1 in the northern areas to June 15 in the southern region. One should plant around 60 pounds per acre of good seed for 40-inch row plantings with the specific rhizobia for soybeans.

Fertilization--repeated trials with varying ratios. and amounts of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium under different levels of irrigation have failed to increase soybean yields significantly according to the County Agent. Soybeans are good to grow in rotation with cotton and grain sorghum. In a research plot at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center is Lubbock from 1961 to 1963, continuous cotton productions were 689 pounds of lint per acre, while cotton following one year of soybean production produced 784 pounds of lint, and after two years of soybean production, yeilded 821 pounds of lint.

Application of 10 tons of manure increased the yield of soybeans about 3 bushels per acre. With the use of 80 pounds of nitrogen, the yield did not increase for soybeans, but did increase the yield for cotton and grain sorghum.

The County Agent says that adequate soil moisture from bloom initiation until seed is fully developed is of utmost importance in producting optimum yields of soybeans on the High Plains. For maximum yields irrigation water should be applied just prior to blogm initiation and at 10- to 20-day intervals until the pods are well filled. On the other hand most effecient use of total water, rainfall and irrigation has been obtained by preplant, plus two summer applications (bloom stage and one additional irrigation, 20 days later). An additional irrigation may be necessary if the soil begins to dry out before the seed pods are filled.

Insects--Soybeans have suffered no serious losses from insects. In some areas where the cotton boll worm has high populations, some soybeans crops have been attacked. For insect control recommendations, see your County Agent.







Walt Pierce, a native of Roswell, New Mexico, makes his living by performing aerobatics in airplaines. Pierce is one of 21 aeroba tic pilots remaining in the United States.

Walt was born in Bell, California, and moved to Roswell in 1946. He became interested in flying at an air show in 1947 in Roswell.

At the age of 13, Walt began skipping classes and could usually be found at the airport. In 1955 he began taking lessons. When his parents found out, they ordered his instructor to discontinue the lessons. Walt then began changing instructors until he ran out of instructors.

Pierce's training in aerobatics came by accident. It all began one day when his instructor stated, "What's the matter, boy? Haven't you spun this airplane yet?" From then on spins and loops were a part of his everyday training. He has advanced and remained current with aerobatics ever since.


At the age of 17, Walt enlisted in the Air Force for a four year hitch and entered pilot training two years later. By the time he had a lmost finished his pilot training, the AirForce began transfering most of the graduates to desk jobs. Walt didn't like this idea, so he got out of the Air Force.



RAVELING FOLK OF SEMINOLE

TO: SEMINOLE NEWS FROM: ROVING REPORTER (w.w.) SUBJECT: TRAVEL

We're 3993 miles from our destination at 4:00 a.m Farm Bureau, has annou-No wonder I can't sleep! We got away in record time at 4:35 a.m. and had traveled ten miles before one boy and one mother was asleep. In 35 miles I had it alone and lacked only 3958 miles.

We had cold orange juice and cereal for breakfast at White City. The Guadalupe Range was as pretty as ever. We wished for field glasses to look at the pine trees or elk on top of the mountains. The sign still reads, Elevation 5695'.

It is 10:40 a.m. and we're in New Mexico for the second time today. Our cameraman, Larry, had us make two unnecessary stops for him to shoot pictures. Old Mexico still looks poor, high and dry from our side. Times must be a lot better. The state of New Mexico has sure improved their roads in the past 10 years.

Our co-pilot, Frances, is at the wheel. Naptime for me and I awoke to the beautiful rock formations just past Lordsburg. Another state and another picture.

Hurrah for all the motels in Phoenix, only \$8.00 plus 40 cents in tax for four, with good beds and a heated pool. (An early stop helps to get an early start.) Saturday - 4:15 a.m. and we are only 3293 miles from Hawaii. Our co-pilot is fast asleep at 4:45 a.m. We had a good pre-breakfast run, hot cakes and ham at Blythe, California. Indio is 13 miles away - Los Angeles, 140. Our speedometer just turned past the 1000 miles since leaving Seminole. We've gained 2 hours of time. It is now 8:30 a.m. and talk about a sand storm - white blowing glass sand has cut our vision to near zero. The brown showing on the front of the old buggy is not dirt. We see snow on the mountains near Palm Springs.

Santa Ana, California, our destination for Saturday was achieved at 1:00 p.m. ^Even a policeman could not find the street we were looking for after being lost on the maze of freeways. We spent the night with brother Paul and family. We were surrounded by orange trees, eucalyptus trees and beautiful avacados. There was a little Texas '42 thrown in. The Boys picked strawberries and oranges.

Just think, avacados were selling for only 5¢ each. Sunday and the freeways brought us through Santa ana, Long Beach, San Pedro, Signal Hill, Hawthorne (where our no. 1 was born), Inglewood, Culver City and Hollywood and the ocean drive north. Just think 70 miles and we're out of the City and not one stop!





Los Angeles and San Francisco being connected a part way by a two lane highway. On Sunday, it was crowded.

We approached San Francisco by Candlestick Park, home of the baseball Giants, on through the City over the Golden Gate Bridge. 

MOTHER OF DR.H.D. DOW Last Rites Held Friday

Mrs. James L. Dow 82, widow of a pioneer Lubbock and West Texas publisher, died at 6 p.m. Wednesday in West Texas Hospital following an illness of some six years.

Funeral was at 10:30 a.m. Friday in Bowman Chapel of the First Methodist Church. Dr. J. O. Haymes associate pastor officiated. Burial was in City of Lubbock Cemetery.

She and the late Dow were married May 1, 1904, in Colorado City. A year later, they moved to Lubbock where he joined The Lubbock Avalanche. In January, 1906, Dow purchased the newspaper which he published until 1926, when it was sold to The Lubbock Evening Journal.

Her husband was an early and ardent supporter of locating Texas Technological College here and is pictured in the West Texas Museum Rotunda mural, posed before the original quarters of The Avalanche.

Following the sale of The Avalanche, the Dows purchased The Wink Times-Telegram. In 1936, they moved to Kermit where he published the Winkler County News.

Three years later, they moved to Levelland, where he became manager of the Phillips-Dupre Hospital. In 1946, the moved to Seminole and Dow became manager of the Gaines County Clinic Hospital, a position which he held until his death in 1958.

Mrs. Dow then moved to the home of her daughter, Mrs. Jay Gordon, 2411 29th.

Survivors, in addition to Mrs. Gordon, include two sons, Dr. Harold D. Dow and Melvin N. Dow of Wink; five sisters, Mrs. Tom Coffee of Loraine, and Mrs. Una Richardson, Mrs. W. J. Chesney, Mrs. Rube Harte, and Mrs. Emma Thrailkill, all of Colorado City; nine grandchildren and six great grandchildren.






