

IRRIGATING LATE-PLANTED COTTON ON THE TEXAS SOUTH PLAINS

Most farmers will be making decisions on irrigating cotton in the next few days or weeks. Although the crop is irregular with respect to stage of growth, the early planted cotton is making good progress to date. However, decisions on when to irrigate or whether to even apply water to some late planted cotton will be critical in view of increased emphasis on fiber quality and recent rains this season.

County Agent Calvin D. Holcomb says we must remember that cotton has a low water demand until the first blooms appear. Thereafter water use increases rapidly through the peak fruiting period.

Generally cotton planted during the latter part of April and May will be blooming at the present time (the middle of July) and will be in the peak fruiting period in late July or early August. Soil moisture must be adequate during this period or yields will be reduced. If recent rains have not provided sufficient moisture for cotton which in now blooming, the first summer irrigation should be applied at this time.

Holcomb says some wilting will be observed during mid-afternoons. This is normal and does not always indicate a need for irrigation. Temporary wilting is due to moisture being lost faster through the leaves (transpiration) taken up by the roots and not due to lack of soil moisture. The plants recover and look normal during the evening and morning hours. Decisions on whether to irrigate should be made by checking soil moisture and not on wilting of plants during the afternoon. However, wilting during mornings hours usually indicate low soil moisture levels and a need for irrigation.

Generally late May and June planted cotton has sufficient moisture at the present time. In most cases this cotton has sufficient moisture to make a crop. It is extremely important not to irrigate June planted cotton until it blooms. Because of current emphasis and the need for producing mature fiber of good quality, we need to get late-planted cotton fruiting as early as possible. Water applied prior to blooming will delay fruiting and further shorten the period left for maturing the crop before frost. Unfortunately, we cannot 'catch up' or make up time lost to replanting or late planting by such practices as early watering or putting on additional water. In fact, the opposite effect is the usual result, that of delay fruiting and production of a large vegative plant. Low quality lint (especially low mike) in our state as well as other states has been traced to cotton receiving improper irrigation (applied either too early or too late) along with late application of nitrogen.

Therefore, we should avoid any practice that tends to delay maturity. Such pracitces as the prudent use of irrigation water applied at the proper time will go a long way in producing quality fiber from late-planted cotton on the South Plains.

### Q & A

ART SECTION

(Q) I have tried to paint with watercolors and the colors aways turn out looking muddy. Can you tell me me what I am doing wrong?


(A) You are trying to paint to fast and not letting the paper and color dry. Paint in your light colors first let them dry. Second paint in your final accents in dark tones here and there, as your taste dictates. Never try to paint a light color over a darker color.

A few points to remember in painting with water color: (1) Let the painting dry between each step.

Otherwise, you are apt to get an unfortunate blending of colors along edges, or worse, the paint will run. A situation with which it is extremely difficult to cope with. (2) Do not strive for a photographic effect, but leave the apinting rather sketchy, underdone, rather than overdone.

(Q) I have trouble mixing color to paint a talisman rose. Can you tell me the colors to use?

(A) Use Cadmium Red light and Alizarin Crimson with yellow for the dark part of the flower. For the lights use Cadmium Red light with Titanium white.





# This ... that ... and the other

LETTER HOME FROM THE
TRAVELING FOLK OF SEMINOLE .....

Dear 'NEWS' Bunch,

The paper was Monday getting here. But the 'NEWS' was sure worth waiting for.

I must tell you about one of our trips.'

There are two directions you can go from Hilo, toward the volcanoes, and the other direction. This trip was the other direction. We saw a lot of sugar cane. It grows up to 1500 feet on the side of the mountains and is worked by crawler type tractors. As all highways go around the island, every few minutes one gets a new view of the 'Blue Pacific', and to see the sun rise over the horizon is a new awakening. Out of the sugar cane, into a few miles of timber, and then to the fry side of the island; 100-200 inches of rainfall here and forty on the dry side.

Here is the ranching country. Today the Parker ranch, owns and leases some 200, 000 acres. (Only the King ranch in Texas is bigger, so they say), I have heard there are 25,000 to 40,000 white face head of cattle. John Parker was a New England sea:man who got his start on this island shooting wild cattle for King Kamehameha. But he was smart; he married the King's granddaughter. Then their children and children's children used sound judgment and continued to build a cattle empire. Round steak is one of the few things on the island that is a good price, 45¢ per pound. No wonder they did well, cheap land, wonderful grass and water, and not one predaceous menace on the ranch. (One day four years ago I lost two live calves to the coyetes when rabbits were in short supply).

The cattle were 'Mud fat'. There were several small ranches in the area. It was a beautiful drive. Next, we came to the Mauna Kea Beach Hotel.

I have seen cattle crossings, pedistrian crossings, railroad Crossings, deer crossings, and now, Golf Cart Crossings. Where? The Mauna Kea Beach. The \$20 million luxury hotel was built here by Laurance Rockefeller two years ago. The golf course was a pretty one.

Visiting on the island and in the hotel for 10 days are the Nelson Rockefeller's from New York. We did not get to see Nelson or his last wife -- in fact we did not get to see many people. It was 9 a.m. and the people were not up and around. You would not have been up either if you had paid \$65.00 for a room. But who could sleep thinking about it? (\$65.00 is for two people.

The beach there and nearby were the only beaches on theisland that we have seen that would do for a swim. They were so nice. The picture is for you to see the giant size trees they hauled in and transplanted. Some were planted in an inter court. It was the only hotel I have ever seen where one could gather coconuts from the third story balcony.

Just \$65.00 per day. Yes, we can get you reservations in late September or October. Full now. I checked the parking lot and I guess they were full, too.

Anyway, the beach was nice.

We drove on further and saw the 'coffee bean trees'.

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

- Q. -- I am 32 and have a wife and three small girls.

  My earnings have averaged about \$4800 annually for the past several years. What would my family get from social security if I died?
- A. -- Your wife would receive a lump sum death payment of \$255. In addition, monthly family payments would total about \$306 per month. As each child reached maturity, their social security benefits would terminate. The monthly amount would be reduced when two of the three children reached age 18 (or age 22 if they stay in school and remain unmarried).
- Q. -- If my average earnings were about \$460 per month, what would my surviving wife and two children receive per month?
- A. -- About \$330 per month or about \$4,000 yearly. By the time your oldest child reached age 18, your family could have received over \$50,000 from social security.
- Q. -- Would social security also help my children through college or assist my widow in her old age?
- A. -- Yes, on both accounts. Even after your children reached age 18, they would continue to receive monthly benefits until they reach the age of 22 if they continue their education and remain single.
- Q. --I requested a statement of earnings from the Social Security Administration. I do not believe that all of my earnings have been properly credited. What should I do?
- A. -- See you social security representative and take your statement of earnings with you together with any evidence you may have of your earnings not properly credited. The Social Security Administration will correct your record to reflect the proper amount of earnings after a thorough investigations.
- Q. -- Last year I was 62 during the month of October.

  My employer is no longer deducting the social security tax from my wages. He states that it is not necessary. Is this correct?
- A. -- No. He should continue to deduct the social security tax. There is no age limit on payment of social security taxes. As long as you work under employment covered by social security, the tax must be paid. The additional earnings may increase your social security benefit.
- Q. -- I was 65 in March but did not sign up for Medicare. Is it too late?
- A. -- For the hospital insurance part of Medicare, no. For the medical insurance part of Medicare yes, You will be given another opportunity in 4th qtr. 1967 to sign up, and your coverage will begin July 1968.






