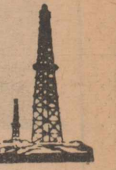

Holds Special Called Meeting

At a special called meeting of the City Council the waterfield contract with Glen Martin was terminated effective as of Tuesday. It was decided also to hire A. A. (Whitey) Vickers to fill the vacancy created in the Sanitation Department of the late Jack Humphrey.

Attending Tuesday's meeting were Councilmen Karl Don Hughes, Bill Webb, Raymond Patton, Bart Walden and Mayor Clarence Wright. Councilman Ed Pullam was out of town.

Glen Martin said, "I do not know exactly what happened. My contract was terminated in an Administrative session as of October 1967.

Health Office Sets Clinic

Mrs. Ann Foster, Public Health Nurse, has announced an Immunization Clinic that is to be held, The Clinic will be at the Public Health Office on Thursday, August 17, from 1:30 p. m. to 5:00 p. m. The Public Health Office is located in the basement at the Court House. Dr Evelyn Smiley of Lamesa, Director of the South Plains Health Unit will be at the Clinic.

Vaccinations for smallpox, polio and 3 in 1 (Tetanus, Diphtheria, and whooping cough) will be given and the vaccine for measles will also be given (this is the first time that the measles vaccine has been given at the Clinic).

These immunizations are for persons who are unable to afford them from their family physicians.

REGISTRATION TO BEGIN IN THE SEMINOLE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Registration procedures for Seminole pupils will begin on Thursday, August 17 with pre-enrollment at the F. J. Young Elementary, the Seminole Primary, and the Seminole Elementary Schools. Hours for registration will be from 9:00 a. m. until 3:00 p. m. at all three schools. Workers will be on duty during the noon hour also in order to assist working mothers wishing to enroll children their lunch hour.

Pupils entering the first grade should bring birth certificates and immunization records. All other pupils should bring their last year's report cards. Parents at this time will be given an opportunity to pay workbook fees and buy lunch tickets.

Children who will enroll at the Young Elementary are all pupils in grades one through five and all sixth grade pupils will enroll at the central campus.

Registration for pupils in grades seven and eight who did not attend school here last year will be Tuesday, August 22 at 9:00 a. m. and it is important that all pupils be there promptly at that time as reading placement tests will begin then. These pupils should bring pencils and report cards from the last school attended. Pupils in these grades who attended the Seminole schools last year will register on Monday, August 28, the first day of school.

The schedule for high school registration finds seniors enrolling on Monday morning, August 21, juniors the afternoon of the 21, sophomores the morning of Tuesday, August 22, and freshmen the afternoon of the 22.

Farm hand

Ranchers in the Gaines-Andrews Soil and Water Conservation District should expect good production from their rangelands following the recent rains. Proper range management practices can pay big dividends in increased production when applied during periods of adequate moisture. One that is especially applicable at this time of the year is Deferred Grazing.

Range deferment is important because this rest allows the plant a chance to increase in vigor and produce seed. To be beneficial, a deferment program should allow for a minimum of three months rest for short grasses. A longer deferment should be worked in for the taller grasses. On many grasses in this area, the fall produced seed crop is usually the most productive. This makes the remaining months of the growing season an excellent time to work in a deferment.

In order for a deferment program to accomplish its objective, good range management practices must be applied. Care should be taken to not overgraze the grass. When overgrazing occurs, a grass plant is robbed of most of its ability to manufacture food since this process is carried out in the leaves. If the leaves are grazed off, the plant food stored in the roots must be used to put out new leaves. If this is repeated too often the stored food will be used up, and the plant may die. Overuse of stored food will also hinder proper root development and growth. Plants will be shallow rooted causing them to be less drouth resistant.

Start today in developing a sound program for range improvement. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Gaines-Andrews Soil and Water Conservation District will be glad to help you in developing an improvement program for your rangeland.

ATTENDS READING CONFERENCE

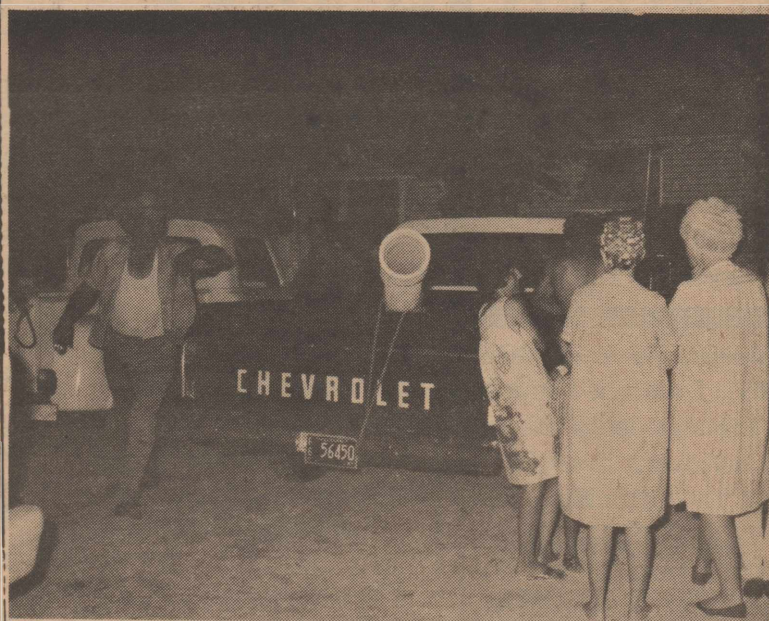
Mr. John Golman attended a reading conference in Alpine recently. Dr. Bill Martin, of Kansas is considered one of America's outstanding story tellers.

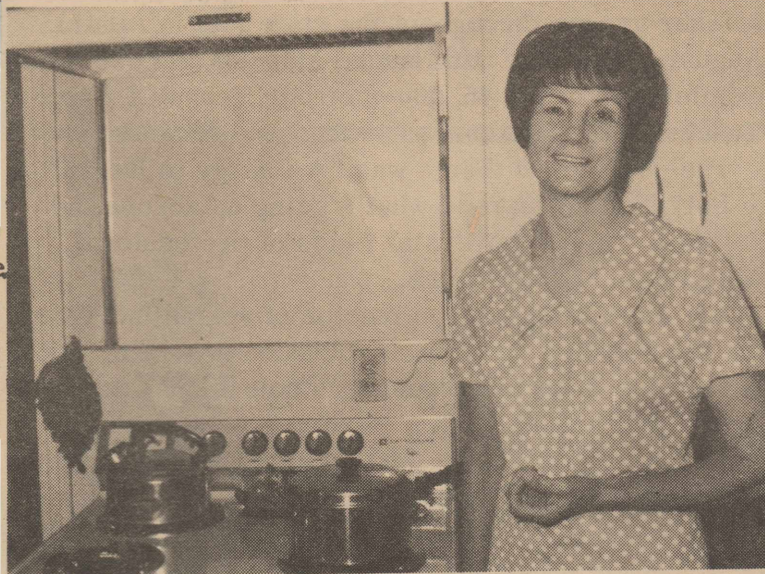

CHOCOLATE CHIP CAKE

Melt together one cup of oleo (2 sticks), one large package chocolate chips - while this is melting - mix in bowl, 2½ cups flour, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup butter-milk, ½ teaspoon soda, 2 teaspoon vanilla, 5 eggs - mix with the oleo and chocolate chips and beat 2 minutes - add cup of nuts. (If you use shortening, use ½ teaspoon salt.)
Bake in tube pan for one hour at 350°.

All clubs have not made their donations. Christmas in August was a most enjoyable community affair.

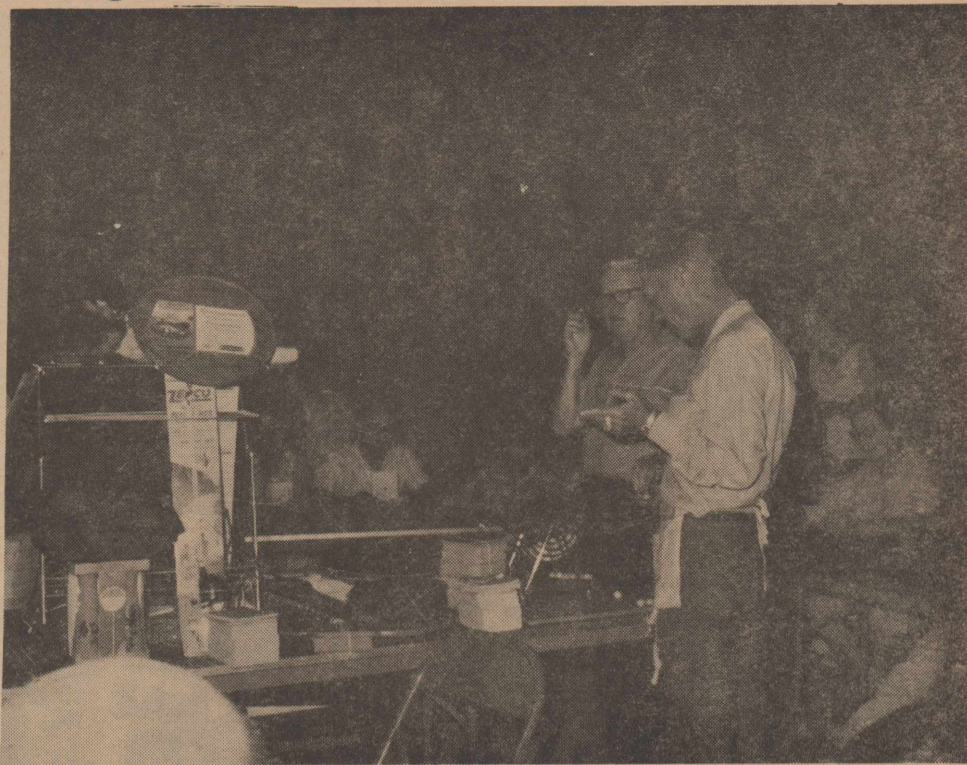

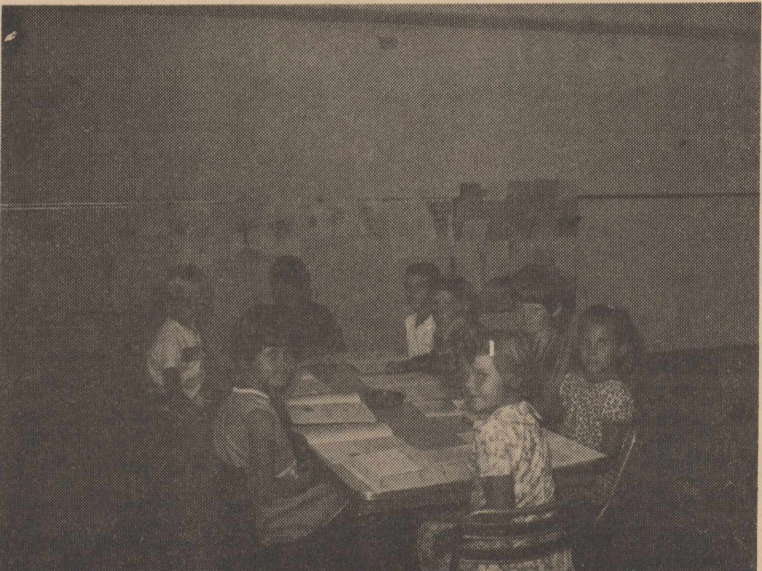
