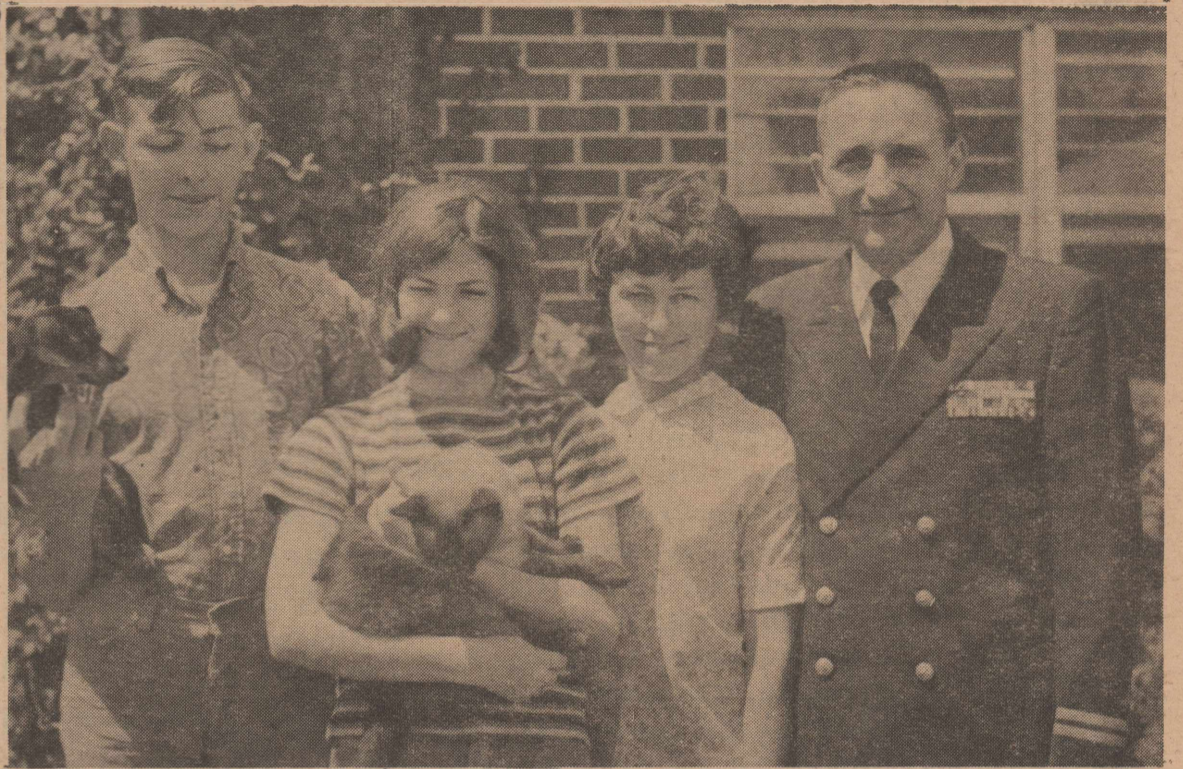

MIDGE SHOWING UP IN SOUTH PLAINS

County Agent, Calvin D. Holcomb says that increased sorghum midge activity is now occurring in many of the South Plains Counties. Based upon survey records this is probably the third generation produced from sorghum.

It is very likely that all grain sorghum which blooms from now on will suffer some degree of midge damage. In view of the critical timing involved in midge control and the severe yield loss which can result from midge infestation. The County Agent suggests that producers who have late planted sorghum be advised as follows:

I. In area where midge are active follow an automatic spray program starting when approximately 70% of the heads have emerged from the boot. A second application should be made 3 to 4 days after the first application. If midge actively continues in the field a third application may be necessary.

II. If the producer feels that his potential yield does not justify an automatic program, or if midge are very light in the general area, the County Agent suggests a second approach. The field should be checked carefully every day for approximately 10 days after heads begin to emerge. Treatment should be applied if midge are found among the newly emerged heads. An average of one midge per head will probably result in an economical loss.

However midge can migrate into a field and complete their egg laying in 24 hours or less. Therefore, an automatic program is the safest method if the expected yield is great enough to justify the cost.

In any case good control cannot be expected unless the application is timed properly and at least two applications made.

The midge population will vary between different areas and decisions will have to be made depending upon the local situation. For material to be used and control methods, call County Agent. We have a bulletin "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Grain and Forage Crops" MP 339, which will give the information.

(Q) Is it possible to paint on the reverse side of a discarded painting?

(A) Yes, However, it depends on the type of material that the discarded painting is painted on. In most cases you can treat it first with an acrylic primer, such as Liquitex Gesso or out side white after you have taken off the oil.

(Q) Is it possible to remove a fatty substance from an old watercolor painting?

(A) Yes, a spray can of spot remover may be used. Do not rub the area that has the fatty substance. In some cases a dried stain can be treated with acetone and talcum powder, however, the results are not always satisfactory.

(Q) Could you please tell me what is meant by Spirit Varnishes?

(A) Spirit Varnishes are varnishes that are dissolved in turpentine or alcohol. One of the best that I know of is Damar Varnishes.

PIPE INSTALLED IN GAINES COUNTY FOR WATER SUPPLY

Over 13,000 Miles of pipe has been installed through financing of the Farmers Home Administration to provide rural areas of Texas with an adequate and sanitary water supply.

There are 369 such facilities in operation in Texas serving more than 36,900 rural families.

\$63,334,910 had been loaned for such water supply corporations since 1960. In fiscal year 1967, the Farmers Home Administration in Texas financed 139 of these facilities for \$17,086,250.

The Gaines County Office of the Farmers Home Administration had financed Loop Water Supply Corporation in providing sanitary water for 50 rural residents in the Loop Community with 70 water meters.

Dwight Smith, Loop, Texas, is president of Corporation and reports water supply system is approved by Texas Dept. of Health.

With 50,000 gallon elevated storage tank, fire hydrants with adequate water pressure and use of fire truck, Standard Fire Insurance rates are in process of being reduced for Loop rural residents.

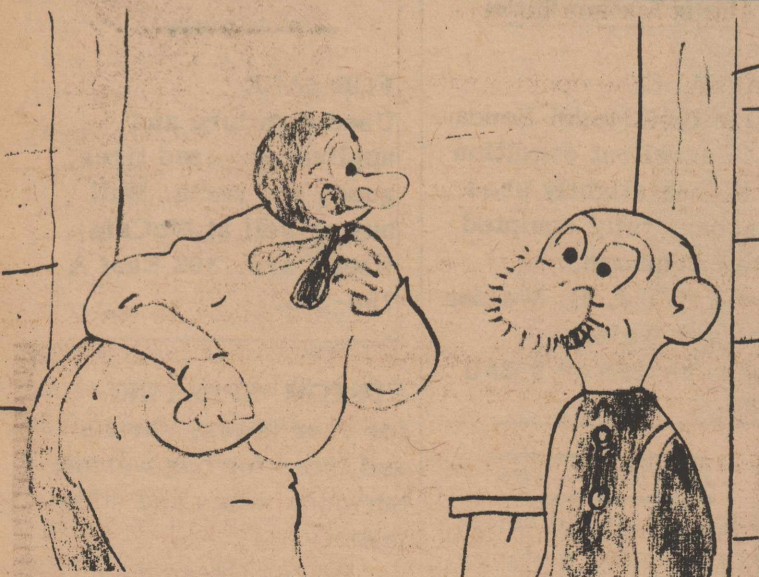

New Library Books



LIBRARY NEWS

In browsing through the reference section of the Gaines County Library, you will find many helpful aides that you may not need every day, but are very important when you do have a need for them.

The Interpreter's Bible is a complete commentary in 12 volumes. A wealth of background material can be found on the entire Bible. It provides the preacher or teacher with practical stimulus and help in interpreting its truth to those who depend upon Him for guidance.

The Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible is an illustrated encyclopedia, identifying and explaining all proper names and significant terms and subjects in the Holy Scriptures. It is scholarly and comprehensive.

March's Thesaurus-Dictionary. Not only regarded as a linguistic aide, but intended to fulfill the classical meaning of 'thesaurus' as a treasure house; a repository of words or knowledge. It is a dictionary and thesaurus in a single volume.

The Encyclopedia of Mental Health is six volumes of useful, authoritative information for the general public. Or maybe you are looking for such a book as the "Handbook of Chemistry and Physics", Machinery handbook, Audel's pumps, hydraulics and air compressors, Mechanical engineers handbooks, "Van Nostrand's Scientific encyclopedia", Congress and the nation" which is a review of Government and politics, or Glenn's Auto Repair Manual".

These are only a few of the many reference books that may be found in the Gaines County Library located in the court house.

Some of the summer activities of the County Library have come to a close, now that it is time for school to start again.

The Story Hour which was held on Friday-morning for the small children

was well attended. The children seemed to enjoy the stories told with the aid of the flannel board, puppets, and the Show and Tell phone-viewer, and are looking forward to next summer with more stories.

The theme for the Reading Club this summer was "Let's take a trip to the Castle". There were one hundred and seventy-seven boys and girls who joined the club, in Seminole. Eighty-eight certificates were earned in Seminole, and 32 in Seagraves, making 120 certificates given in Gaines County. In Seminole, 67 reached the castle by reading 20 books. In a sand box with a castle, a pond of water and with trees surrounding it, a miniature character doll was placed, as each child reached the castle by reading 20 books. Their name on an embossed label was placed on the character doll which represented them.

Juanita McLemore, a second grader, read the most books during the summer.

Now that the program is over, each child who received a certificate is asked to pick up their certificate and their character doll at the Gaines County Library.

"I was an officer on the U.S.S. Oriskany about a year ago when we lost a number of aircraft by fire, Backlund was quoted as saying.

Lt. Backlund was awarded a Navy Commendation Medal for his efforts on board the Forrestal when the devastating fire took place.

Just moments before the fire broke out, Backlund had been talking with two former shipmates on the flight deck. As Ordnance Officer for Oriskany's embarked Carrier Air Wing 16, Backlund had gone to Forrestal to discuss an ordnance matter. This unexpected meeting with former shipmates provided an opportunity for him to reminisce about old times he thought.

"I had just started taking a series of pictures on the flight deck when the pilots began to man their aircraft for the next launch." Lacking the proper flight deck gear, Backlund went below to the Forrestal's CAG office to continue his business.

"Ironically, there were only two men down in the office and they asked me if I had been in last year's fire aboard Oriskany. I told them 'yes' and, in the discussion, asked whether they knew how to get out in case of fire and if they had flashlights--things I recalled about the fire last year. Their answer was 'No'," Backlund recalled.

"About that time the fire call came. Their GQ (General Quarters) station was right in the office and I ran around the corner to the Air Operations Office--where I watched the fire on the PLAT television. (Pilot Landing Aid Television which gives pilots an 'instant' replay of their landing aboard an aircraft carrier).

"I saw airplanes disappear as they blew up and saw the fire advancing up the flight deck. As each airplane would blow it would advance further up the flight deck.

"I saw Zuni rockets and missiles shooting across the deck like a Chinese crossword puzzle," Backlund added.

While he was still in the Air Operations Office, Backlund felt "at least three more bombs go off, which shook the ship from stem to stern."

"I know now that they were 750-pound 'general purpose' bombs," said Backlund, a weapons specialist with 24 years in the Navy, "but at the time I thought they were 'fat bombs'." --(WWII-type 1000 pound bombs.)

Being in a strange ship and not quite sure where he was, Backlund also "felt naked without my flashlight." Ever since last year's fire aboard Oriskany he has almost always kept a survival-type flashlight with him but in the rush to catch a ride to the Forrestal he left it in his stateroom.

Backlund "grabbed onto a group of pilots" (with flashlights and together they made their way to the foc-sle in the forward section of the ship. At the time, he figured he could always escape through the hawse pipe--where the anchor chain travels.

"About that time they were setting up a first aid station on the foc-sle and we all pitched in setting up mattresses, sheets and pillows for the casualties," said Backlund, who has received awards for his work as a Boy Scout First Aid instructor.

Backlund and Hospital Corpsman Alvin D. Singleton started giving first aid. One of their first casualties they treated was a man with his feet blown off above the ankles. They also treated crewman suffering from severe shock and burns

"For a while, they started calling me "Doc", said Backlund.

Soon, medical assistance from Oriskany arrived on the scene. That group included Drs. A. J. Adeeb, Richard C. Fahrenbruch and Blair Edwards, from the Medical Department, and Dr. Gary Cooley from the Dental Department.

Drs. Fahrenbruch and Edwards took charge of the more seriously injured patients at the first aid station, even performing tracheotomy by the light of battle lanterns on crewmen suffering from severe

smoke inhalation.

After spending some three hours on the scene, Backlund returned to Oriskany.

"If nothing else," said Backlund, "last year's fire made me cooler; I was able to stand the blood." (Editor's Note)

We wish you well, Lt. and Mrs. Backlund and family, and we are glad you like Seminole.



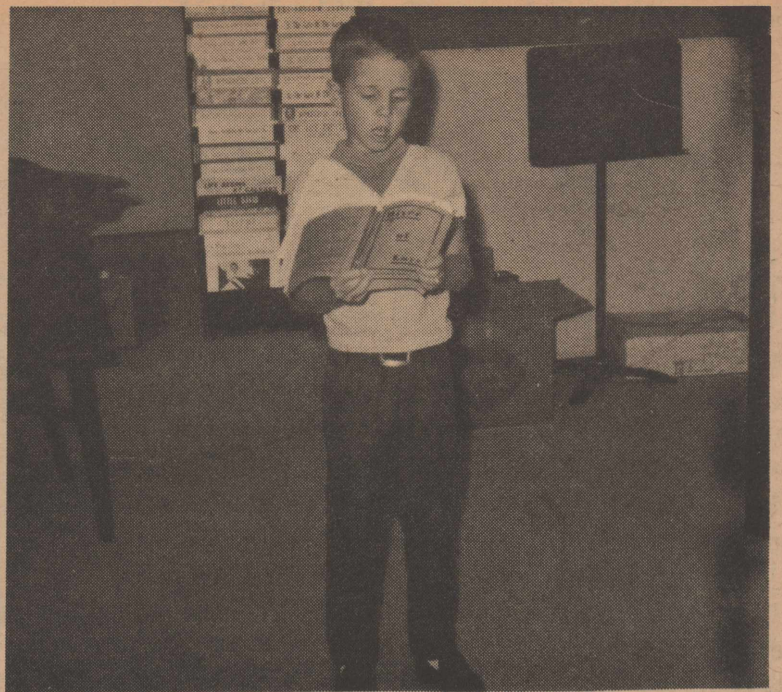
DR. ROBERT METZER, AREA AGRONOMIST SPEAKS TO 4-H GROUP

Brighten Scene

Meeting and knowing the Belgian people, one gets an insight of a hundred years of history. Many Belgs are originally from France, Holland, or Germany, and each brings his customs to the varied land of Belguim.

Wanda, a Polish girl who with her family had escaped from a Polish concentration camp, spent the night with us several times. The first night that she came, I let her wear a white gown of mine. On every return trip she delighted in wearing my little white gown because she did not have one like that. The first time that she said the prayer before breakfast, she said it in her small, quiet way, but in French (although she speaks English fluently). She excited in eating a frito that an American family had given to us from the P-X. But her favorite and most delightful pastime was crunching on some American popcorn. "Corn is only for chickens and cows here," she would tell me. At Wanda's home in the country, she would be speaking 3 different languages within 5 minutes. With her father, they always spoke Polish, but if her mother and she were alone, they spoke French. Since we had come for a visit she would speak her rushed English to us. "Soon," she would say, "I hope to learn German and Flemish."

Languages are really stressed in Europe because the countries are so close together. Almost all the store clerks in Frankfurt, Germany could speak English to us. Also in Brussels in the Grand Place, I listened to one store clerk switch directly from English to German back to French. I asked her how she learned so many languages and she replied, "I speak 7 languages fluently and this helps my business here."

The junk man of Brussels was a sight to behold and much more to hear. The men strode up and down street with a little tin horn and a small, rickety cart. Then they bellow in thier French, "Oreand!" One time I met one coming around the corner, and he bellowed out in high monotone and I jumped two feet. Finally after recooperating, his wife came along and her mouth seemed twice as big as his because she yelled for junk while he tooted his horn.

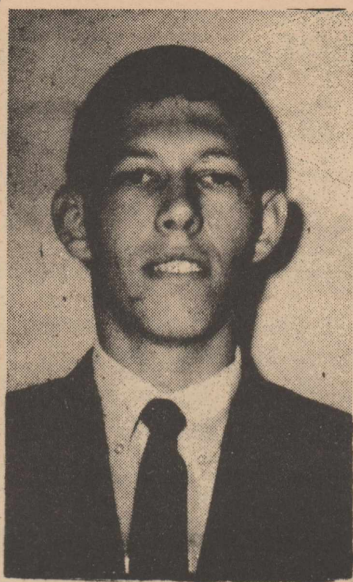
Another kind of working man, was the chimney sweep, who was black from head to toe. He reminded me of 'Dick Van Dyke' in "Mary Poppins". Working with coal and coal products is an improtant industry for Belguim and a good but dirty way to make a living for the chimney sweep.

Going to the old market and dealing and bargaining with the sellers is a great task, but a challenging one. The best day to go is when it is rainy and cold because the venders want some food and they will sell very easily. Every seller has his goods displayed on a blanket on the ground for people to see and buy. The game is to bargain back and forth until a middle price can be reached. One little lady asked me (as I was walking off) how much I would give for this little pitcher. (She had earlier ask for 20 francs), I said 15 francs and she gladly sold it. One big fat lady said in French, "Combien, Combien-----no, no--Vous, American"----which means "You Americans". All you can ask is how much, how much, no--no.

With the electricians, plumbers, telephone men, and water heater workers, and painters, one must always make a rendezvous or a set meeting to talk about the work that must be done. Then another meeting is made and maybe if one is lucky, the next week the workmen will begin his pre-planned duties.

The teenagers don't mature as fast in Belgium as they do here in America. They family is much closer and adolescence are contented to stay at home.

One family that I stayed with, lived in the country and had one or two aunts living with them at all

U.S. Department of HEALTH, EDUCATION, and WELFARE

Persons receiving social security benefits are required to report any event which may affect their benefits, H. P. Thomas, social security district manager in Odessa, reminded beneficiaries this week.

Failure to report an event promptly might cause inconvenience to the beneficiary and may delay his benefit checks.

One event which should be reported by those receiving social security checks is change of address. It is simple to report and should be done before a person moves to a new address.

Another event which must be reported promptly is change in work status. Any beneficiary who works and expects to earn more than \$1500 during a year must report this fact. Often some benefits are still payable even though a person earns more than \$1500.

Some other events which a woman receiving benefits as a wife must report are a divorce from her husband or the death of her husband. A widow must report remarriage if her benefits are being paid on her deceased husband's account.

Any person receiving checks for a child must also advise the Social Security Administration if the child marries, dies, or leaves his custody.

If benefits are being paid to an individual because of a disability, a prompt report must be made if the disabled person engages in any work, or if his condition improves enough so he could return to work.

Anyone who has a question as to whether or not a particular event must be reported should write, phone, or come into the local social security office at 516 First National Bank building.
