How long has it been since you started around a corner and had to stop suddenly because you could not see? Have you ever eased around a corner and found children playing in the street? We will call the corners blind for the sake of this editorial. I hope that the pictures will point out to the people of our town and it will have the same effect as the clean up pictures (several people called in appreciation) in last weeks issue.

Would each of you ask yourself the following questions:

- 1. Do I have a fence running out to the intersection that drivers cannot see over?
- 2. Do I have hedges that are growing out to intersections that need trimming?
- 3. Do I have trees that need underbranches trimmed off on my corner?
- 4. Do I or a member of my family park our vehicles too close to the corner that makes it difficult for a driver to see approaching traffic?

These are not intended to embarrass anyone, but in hopes to avoid accidents and save someone's life.




A two car collision, 19.1 miles on the Hobbs highway early Sunday morning, claimed two lives and injured five. Willie D. Holmes, 23, of Seminole and Lionel Conrad Cox, 61, 1316 North Houston, Hobbs, New Mexico, were both pronounced dead at the scene of the accident. Injured was Miss Laura Sue Mc-Cain, 19, who was driving Holmes' 1963 Ford. The second car involved, a 1962 Chrysler, was driven by Earnest Branam, 47, 2206 Breckon, Hobbs, New Mexico. Mr. Branam is listed in critical condition with head and facial injuries. Mr. Cox, principal of Highland High School, was in the car driven by Branam. Other occupants of the Chrysler were Mrs. Vera Branam, 41, who is listed in critical condition suffering from head and facial cuts, a concussion and a broken left leg. Roy Lee Wheeler, 18, of Monument, New Mexico, and his wife, Shirley Ann, 19, both suffered minor cuts and bruises but are considered in good condition. All of the injured were admitted to Lea General Hospital in Hobbs. Miss McCain has been taken off the critical list, but is still in serious condition. She is suffering from a crushed knee cap, head lacerations and broken ribs.

W. E. Cox, Jr., Seminole Justice of the Peace, who went to the scene, reported that the 1963 Ford veered into the West bound traffic in what seemed to be a blow-out. "We measured a distance of 112 feet where the car suddenly started for the North ditch, just like a person had had a blow out," said Cox.

At approximately 12:50 A. M., a 1963 Ford driven by Laura Sue McCain, suddenly veered into the approaching lane of West bound traffic and hit a 1962 Chrysler, driven by Earnest Branam. The front right half of both automobiles were demolished. There was such an impact that it dug the highway out into the cliche. Both passengers that were killed were sitting on the right hand front seat. SEAT BELTS WERE IN EVIDENCE, BUT NOT IN USE.

The accident happened 19.1 miles West of Seminole at the Livestock Feeders Grain Storage Co., Hobbs Highway.

Susie McCain said in the only time she has been coherent, "Mother, we had a blow out, I could not hold it and fell into the other lane.'



Q & A

(Q) What is a wood cut?

(A) Wood cuts are used in Printmaking. Printmaking is a very old art. One of the earliest European wood cuts dated back to 1423. This carving was of St. Christopher. Other early ways of utilizing the wood cut medium included playing cards, block books, and before the invention of movable type, pattern prints.

Most of the earlier etchings were done on wood. In our modern times we use linoleum cut and the silk screen printing process. The method of screen printing was first widely used in the United States, especially in the field of industry, where it was an ideal printing technique for textiles.



The Commissioners Court of Gaines County at their regular session,

3eptember 11, 1967 approved the budget for 1968. This budget calls for
total expenditures for 1968 for the operation of the county (excluding
lebt retirement and interest) of \$1,146,754.06 as compared with \$1,197,702.82

for 1967. The reduction is made possible by several non-recurring expenditures
in 1967, such as the purchase of land for water rights at the park, purchase
of additional land for the cemeteries, reworking of the Sheriff's radio

The 1968 budget provides for the expenditure of \$303,826.25 for interest and retiring principal of the debt of the county. This would retire \$154,000.00 indebtedness in 1968 which is not due until later years. This is possible because of the delaying of future paving projects, and will result in the annual saving of \$4,482.50 in interest on this \$154,000.00.

The practice in the past has been to set aside revenue from 30¢ of the tax levy for paving, and spending these funds each third or fourth year. In 1965-66 \$543,998.92 was pent for the construction of approximately 75 miles of paved roads. This policy will be reviewed by the Commissioners Coureach year, and if, in their judgment, need for future pavement is not too great, the entire debt of the County can be retired by 1971.

As of January 1, 1968, the debt of the County will be as follows:

Road Bonds issued in 1949 for various county roads, \$8,000.00; Road Bonds
issued in 1951, principally for the Seminole Lovington Road \$252,000.00;

Courthouse Bonds issued in 1955 \$440,000.00; Park Bonds issued in 1956
\$156,000.00; and Seminole Livestock Show Barn and Seagraves Library Bonds
issued in 1961 \$30,000.00. Total paid on the principal of bonds in 1967
was \$126,000.00 with \$29,613.13 being paid on interest.

The Commissioners Court also approved the 1967 tax roll on September 11, 1967. Valuation, for County purposes, is \$71,657,845 wa compared with the 1966 valuation of \$71,340,400.00. The county rate remains at 95¢ on all properties, with an additional 30¢ levy applying to all properties except homesteads.

GROUNDBREAKING CEREMONIES

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the new Assembly of God Church, which will be located at the corner of 2nd. and Ave. "G" S. W., were held Sunday, September 17, 1967, at 2:30 P. M. The Rev. H. H. Rogers, District Superintendent of The Assemblies of God, with headquarters in Lubbock, C. J. Earl and V. M. Briggs, Trustees, assisted Rev. L. A. Harper, Pastor. A large number of the church members and officials attended the ground breaking.

The new church will be of brick and Haydite block construction. Plans call for 4700 square feet of floor space. The sanctuary will seat approximately 235 people, with additional facilities to accommodate an overflow of 250.

The new complex will also consist of the Sunday School annex and a fellowship hall complete with kitchen. Footing was poured Tuesday, September 19th. The building will require 120 days to complete. John Martin, Denton, is the contractor.



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
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FRESHMEN VICTORIOUS OVER BROWNFIELD IN 13-0 WIN

The postmaster urges all residents to use the postal cards contained in the kits to obtain the ZIP Codes needed for addresses in their mailing lists.

Each household will receive eight cards with spaces for the addresses to be "zipped" by the post office and for the return address. No postage is needed.

In addition to the kit, which is folded like a closed accordian, a separate card is being delivered to remind residents of the local "ZIP" Code number.

"ZIP" Code is necessary all year round to increase the efficiency of the postal service," Mrs. Cobb said, "but it is more important than ever around the holiday season. This year, the Post Office Department expects to handle well over nine billion pieces of mail during the Christmas rush. ZIP Code will be a great help in delivering that mail accurately and on time."

The postal official reminded ZIP-A-LIST users to print clearly and to include their return address so that the post office will know where to deliver the completed form.

Extra kits are available at the post office or just ask your letter carrier.





IMPRESSIONS OF JAPAN
By Dorothy Hargrove

My first impression of Japan was the classic natural beauty. Its country-side is a great green garden and from the air it seemed to be surrounded by mountains and they have many lakes and rivers and the water is a mysterious green.

As we landed at Tokyo International Airport our thought was "How and where do we go from here?" Two young teenagers introduced themselves as representatives of Pan American World Airways. This young boy and girl spoke fluent English and were very helpful piloting us through Customs, calling a red cap and guiding the way to a Taxi stand just outside through the gate of Customs. Soon we were at the Hotel Okura where we had reservations.

The following morning about five o'clock we were suddenly awakened by an earth quake which shook down town Tokyo. It was felt as a sharp window rattling jolt and we heard the steel roof of the Okrua shake. It was a frightening experience tho it lasted only a few seconds. I would not like to live where there were earth tremors!

In the afternoon we found that we had only one reservation instead of two for our flight to Hachinohe where my daughter and her husband were to meet us. So we had to wait another day for the next flight.

Immediately we arranged to take a three hour tour of Toyko which included; The Imperial Palace, The Parliament, (Called the Diet) its two chambers, called the House of Representives and the House of Councillors similar to our United States Congress: and last Yasukuni Shrine----one of the most sacred spots in the country. The Palace is never open to the public but you can see the Imperial Family twice a year when they appear on a balcony January 2nd and April 29th.

Tokyo is a some what mysterious place. The press reports are full of talks about the city's two faces, ancient and modern. Yes there were traffic jams, the hectic rush of business life, monorails, express highways, and super-express railway lines and they wonder how this kind of progress can be matched with the geisha parties, tea ceremonies, flower arranging classes for foreign ladies, and devotion to the classic theater-Kabuki. Tokyo is the largest city in the world having over 10, 000, 000 population and has been the capital only since 1868.

An excellent way to begin to enjoy Tokyo is to take a stroll down Ginza-(Fifth Avenue-New York). You find an ever-increasing flow of shoppers, students, and pretty girls strolling through the district. When darkness falls Ginza is transformed with the flashy neon lights, brighter than Times Square and you wonder "what on earth, do all those signs say?"

Denver City then moved the ball well for a sustained drive of 65 yards for their only score of the




