Monday at 3:45 p. m. in Seagraves, Texas, Julius Wagon was injured in a car-truck accident and died at approximately 5:00 p. m. in the Seagraves hospital. Mr. Wagon, 66, whose address was Route 1, had been a resident of Seagraves 15 or 16 years. He was a passenger in a car driven by Marvin Harvey Harris.

A GMC transport truck driven by Joseph Lea Marchlewski, whose terminal is in Floydada, Texas, and was being driven for United out of Oklahoma City hit the 1952 Plymouth driven by Mr. Harris. Also involved in the accident was Troy Travis Ware, from Seagraves, driving a 1960 Chevrolet.

Mr. Harris was traveling south on the Seagraves-Seminole highway and made a left-hand turn at the Custom Farm Service Terminal, evidently not seeing the truck. Mr. Ware was coming into the highway from the east. The truck hit the Plymouth broadside on its right forcing it into the Ware vehicle. The Plymouth was a total loss. The 1960 Chevrolet received extensive damage but was drivable.

The body of Mr. Wagon is being flown to Westfield, Oklahoma, for burial.

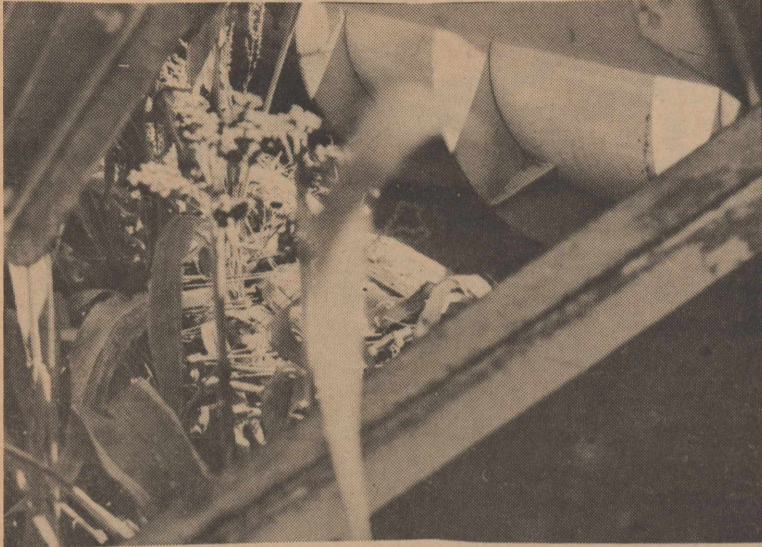

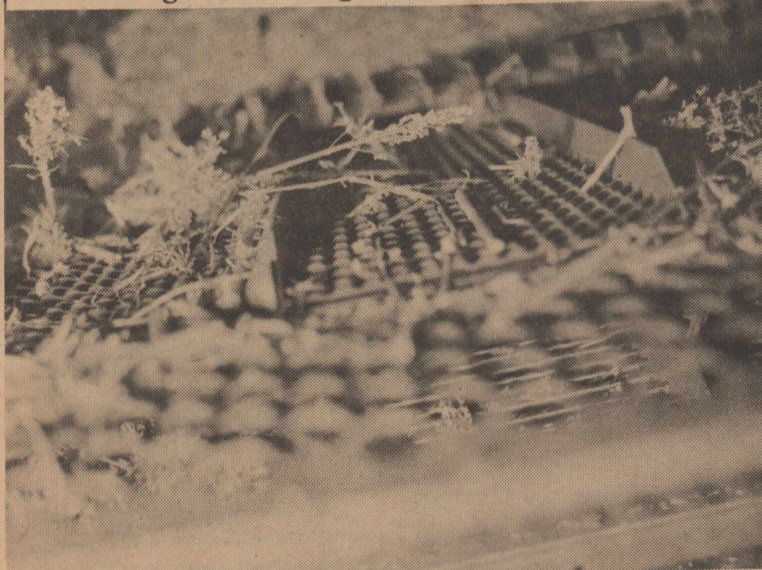

THE INSIDE STORY OF THE GRAIN HARVEST



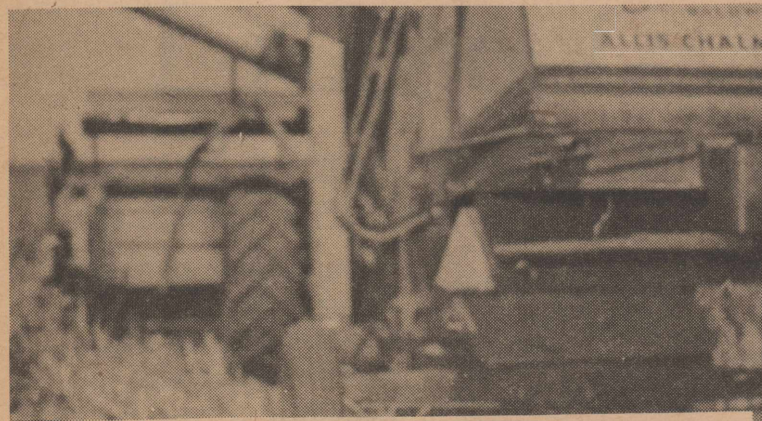
The grain starts through the machine-- notice the cutting bar and auger.

PEACH PRODUCTION DISCUSSED

Roy Wylie from Co-op Marketing, California, explained 'the marketing of peaches last week in the County's meeting room.' The whole tune of his talk concerned as he said, 'You people have reached the point of no return!'

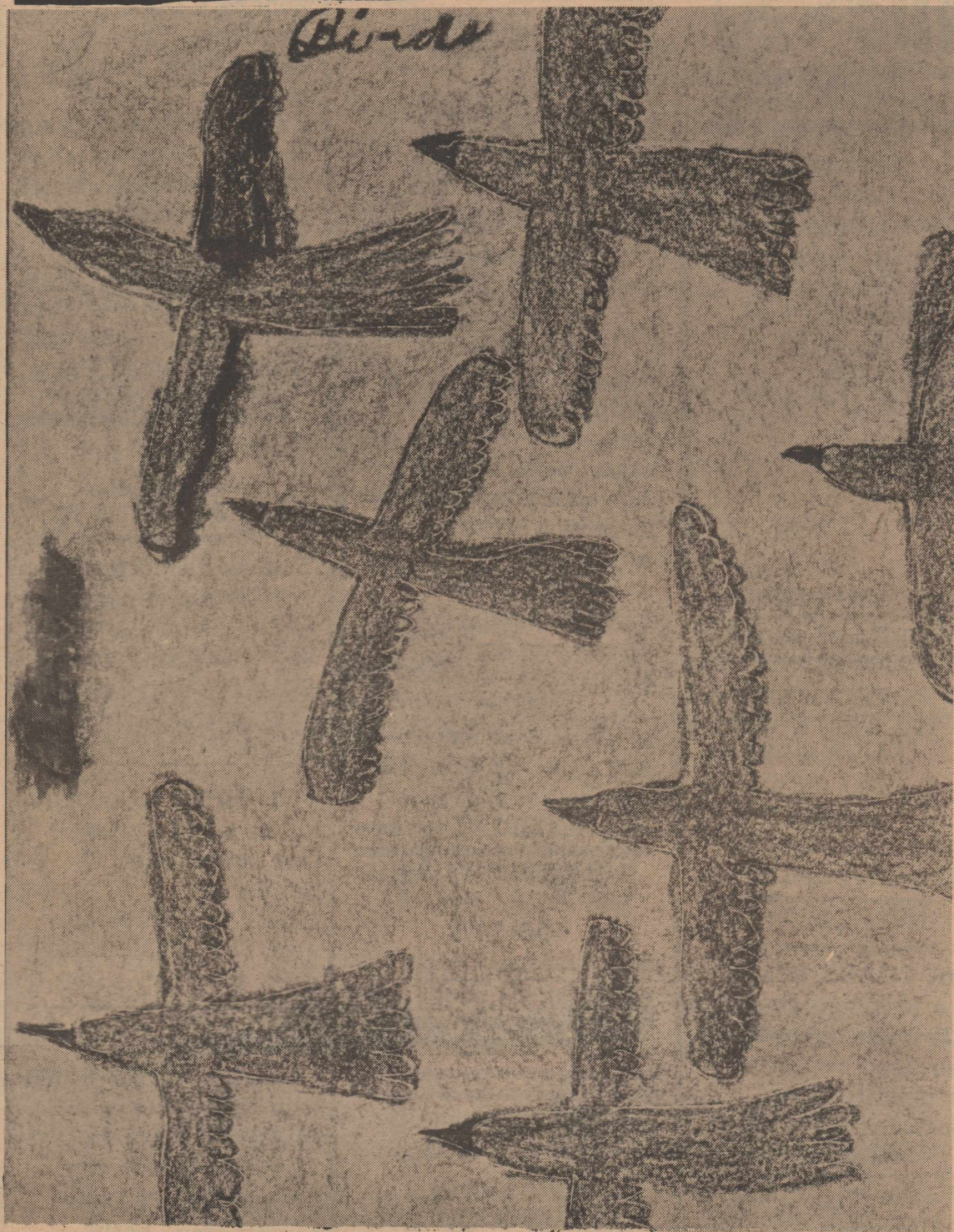
'With 4,000 acres planted; 90 to 100 trees per acre and with 600 boxes or lugs of peaches per acre, you must get ready now to market your peaches.' Mr. Wylie went on to explain that with a new product; new label and new market, it will not be very easy. 'The color of your package; the color of your product and its location in the market will have much to do with the housewives' buying. Every housewife not only wants a peach to look good but wants to pick it up and feel of it so Your peaches must have a good shelf life, or they will not market easily.'

'Your peach tree should last about 20 years after they begin bearing or a life expectancy of 25 yrs. Also remember that any distributor handling your product is handling your bank account. You must make up your mind whether you will build a co-op packing house or build them individually. Any kind of Pack House will represent \$250 to \$200,000 investment. In California it costs \$3 per lug to grow them and \$2 per lug to process and deliver them Mr. Wylie could not emphasize enough on the importance of marketing.'

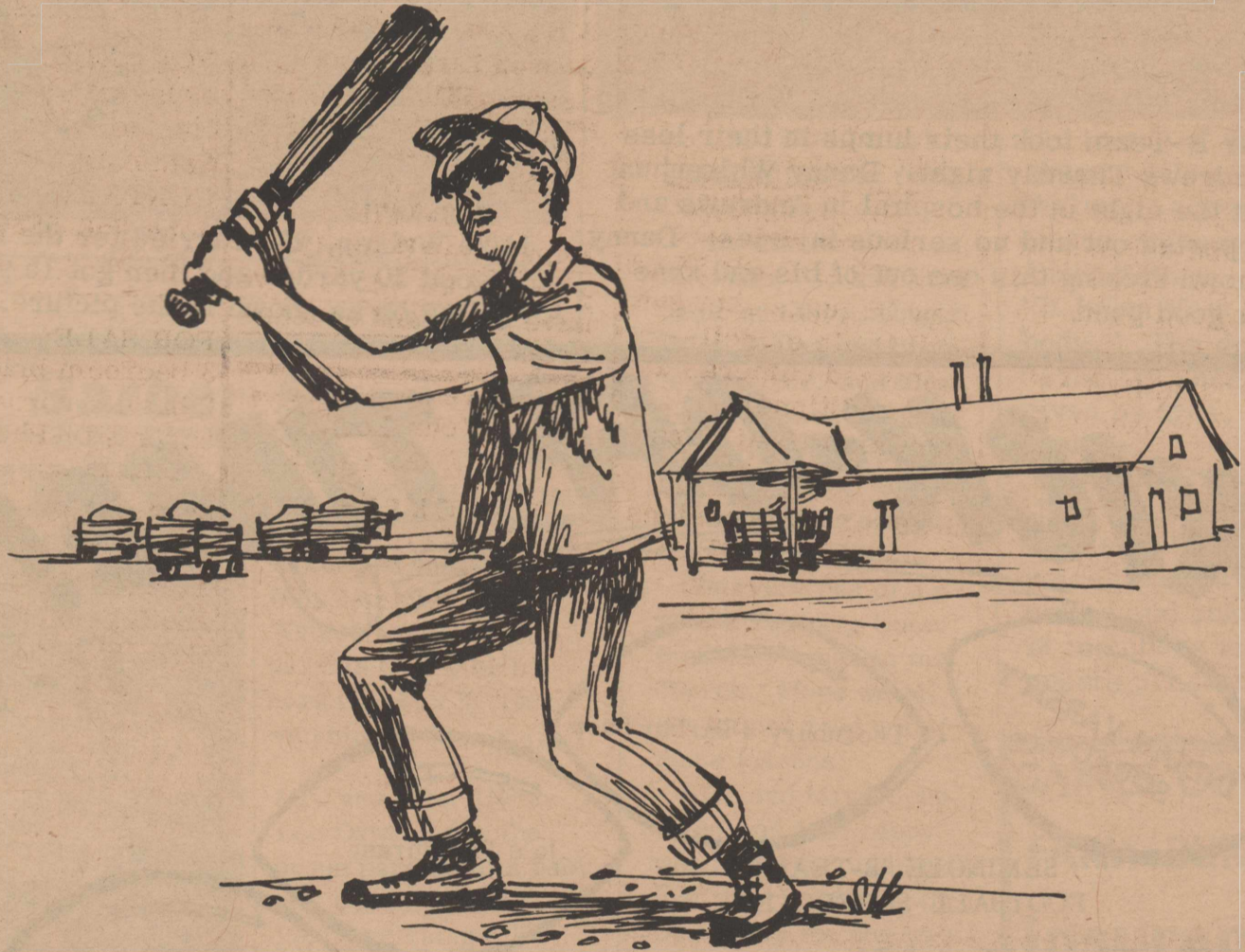

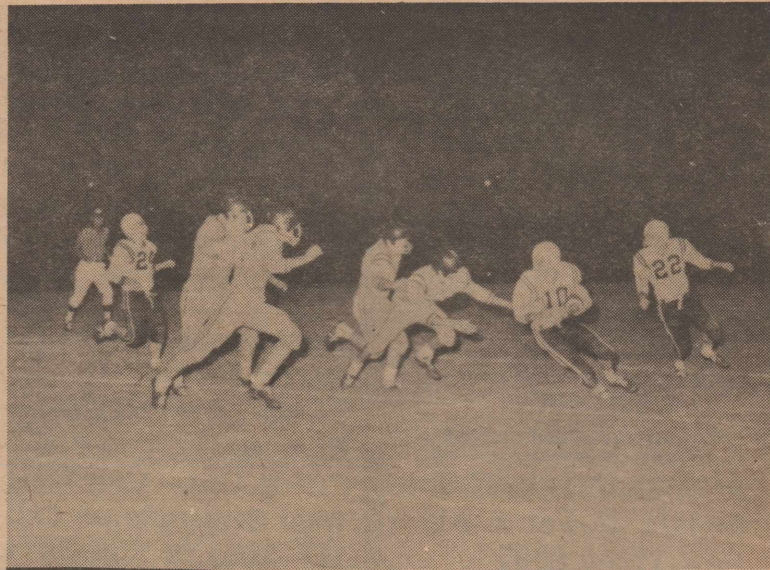

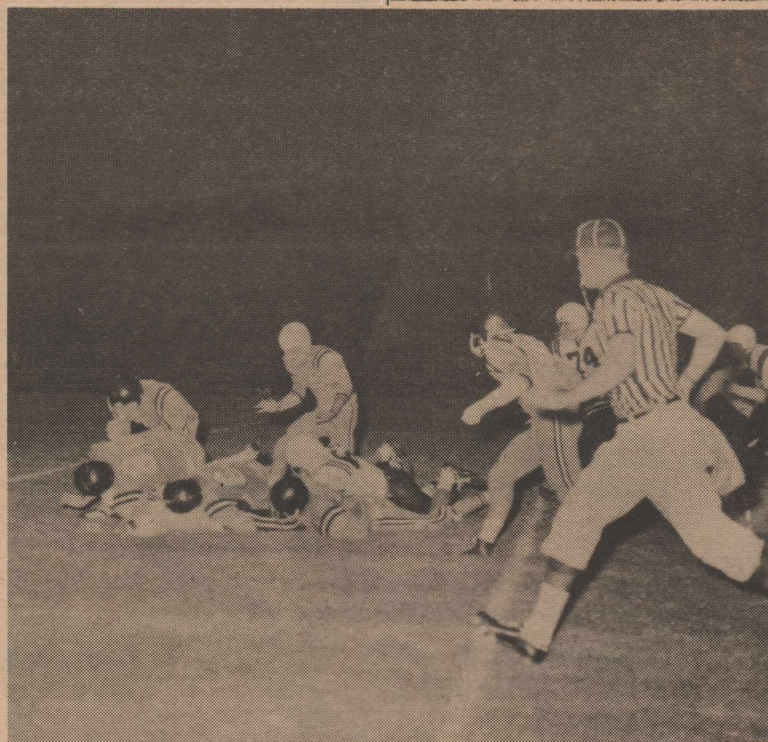


Quarterback Whisenhunt carries for a first and ten. Other Seminole players shown are Ron Dunn and Mike Walker.

The difference in the insurance as explained by Mr. Moore was that Replacement Cost replaced the building or contents lost. The Actual Cash Value Policy only replaced that part that had not been depreciated out or the actual cash value of the building. The board decided on a Replacement Cost Policy which included \$4,909,600 on buildings and \$516,218 on contents or total policy of \$5,426,818 plus the farm buildings of \$21,000 or total three year premium of \$36,472 plus the farm buildings.

A. We are doing better now. We have more to write about, and our students have a better opportunity to talk with teachers. We can help where help is needed worst.

Q. In the three years we have had phasing has the percent held true in each phase as per the amount of students?

A. No, it varies with

students. We believe we are holding students we might have lost without phasing. We feel like students are pushed to their limit. "Our duty is to carry them as far as possible."

Q. Concerning distasteful literature in our library, "we hope that such literature has such overwhelming literary quality that other distasteful things might be overcome and forgotten."

A. When 800 books are selected from selected reading lists it is near impossible not to make any mistakes.

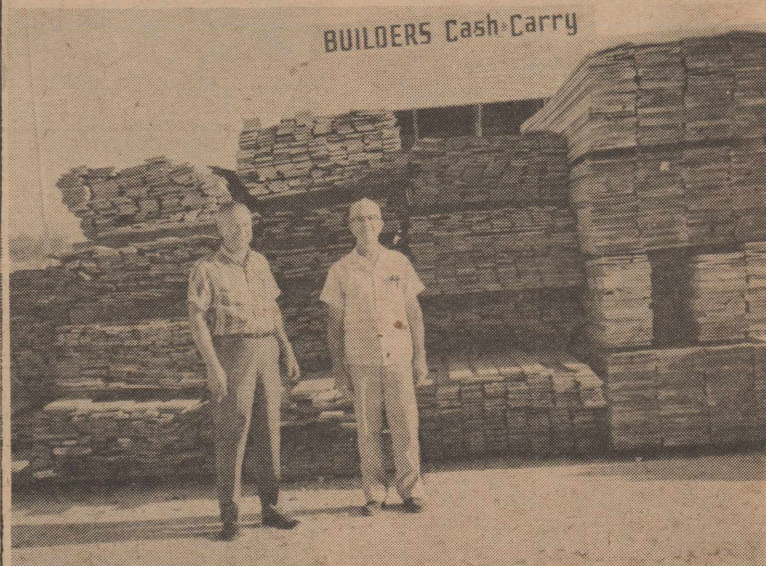

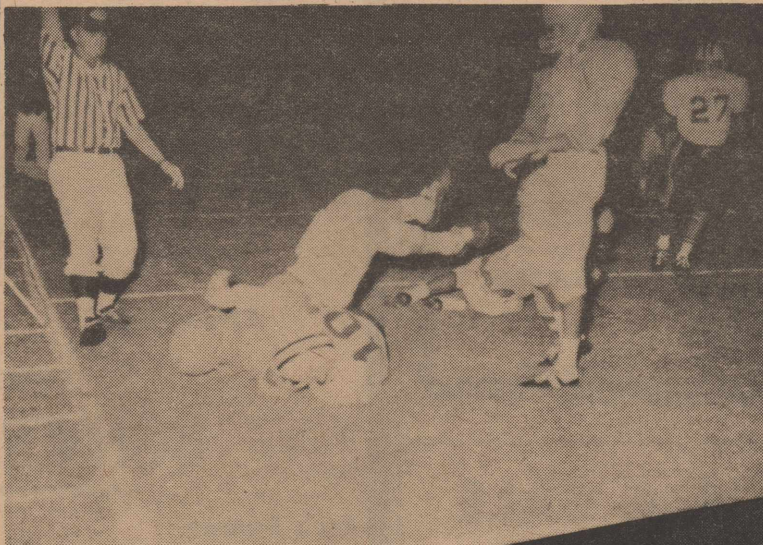
Spencer rolled up near 2/3 of their total yards rushing and passed for another 150 yards. Ector scored first in the beginning of the second quarter.

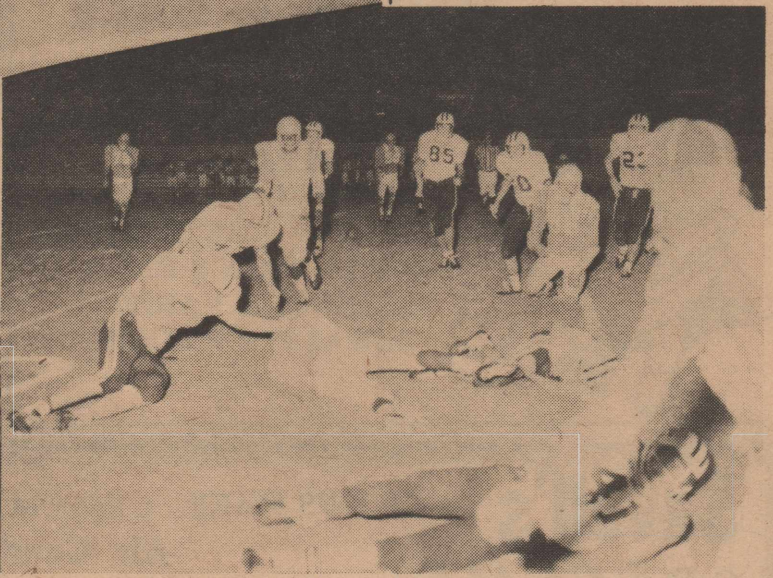

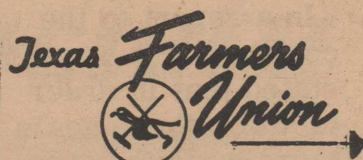



The Sunday School teachers and officers of the First Baptist Church in their regular Wednesday evening meeting, October 4, 1967, voted to recommend to the church some goals for attendance and enlistment extending to January 1, 1970. The recommendation was made in the form of a motion during the regular church conference and the church unanimously approved it. In the action the goals were set as follows: January 1, 1968, attendance-425, enrollment-850; January 1, 1969, attendance-500, enrollment-1,000; January 1, 1970, attendance-600, enrollment-1,200.

In a report to the conference it was stated that in order to attain these goals there would have to be a stepped up effort in the areas of visitation and prospect enrollment. To attain the January 1968 goal over twelve new Sunday School members must be enrolled weekly for a total of 163 by the first of the year. To attain the January 1969 goal, five new members must be enlisted each week for a total of 323 by that date. The 1970 goal presents a challenge of over four new members each week for the entire 117 weeks for a total of 533 new members in the Sunday School. Present attendance in the Sunday School is approximately 400.

PIPELINE COMPLETED

The pipeline which came through Seminole several weeks ago from a southwest to a northeast direction held a brief ceremony about 11 miles north of Plainview which marked the completion of one of the longest pipelines ever constructed by one contractor.

The Northern Natural Gas Company's 369-mile, \$30 million line from Kermit to Beaver, Okla., has been under construction four months by crews totaling around 1,000 workers, working on two sections of the line, one headed southward from Beaver, the other northward from Kermit.

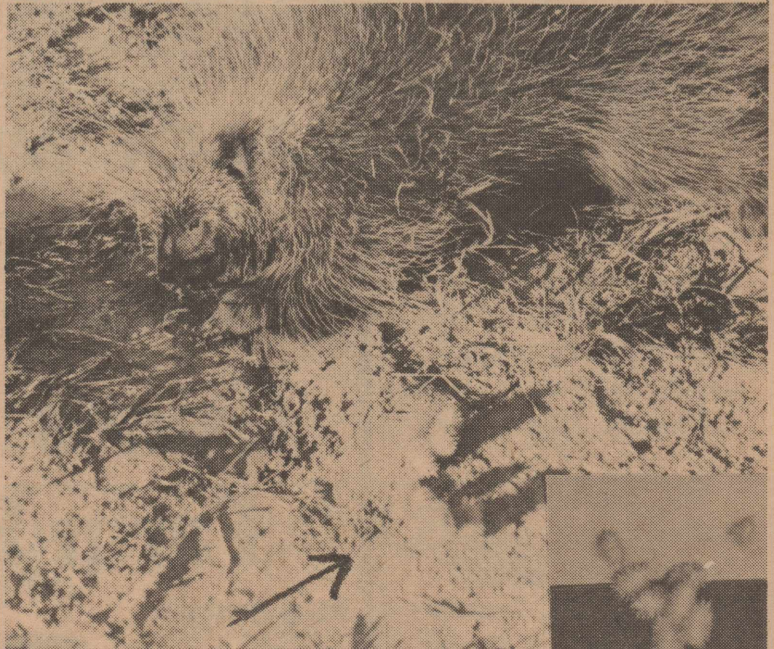

FRESHMEN DEFEATED BY ANDREWS

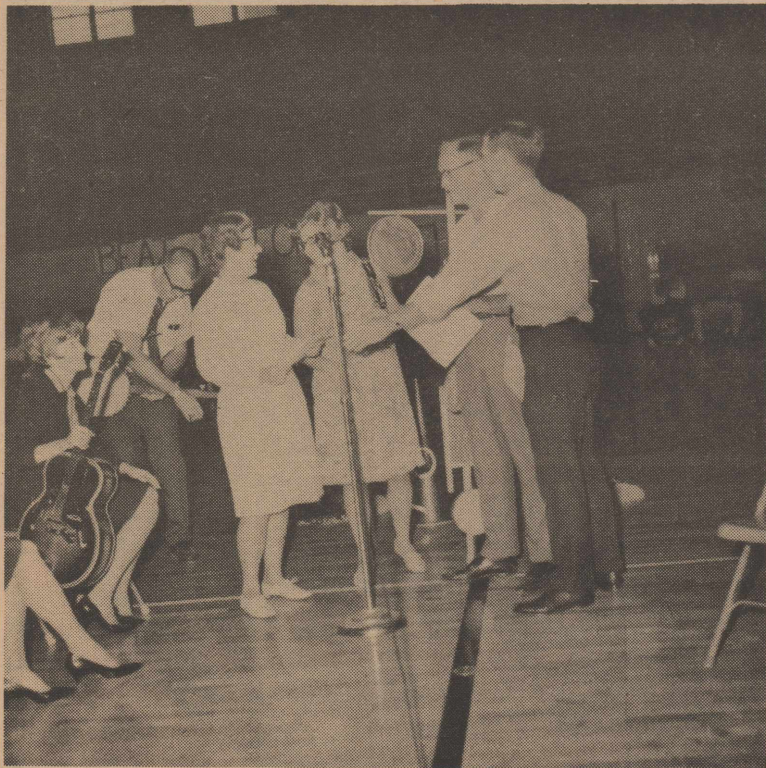

The Seminole Young Homemakers met Thursday, October 5, in the Homemaking Cottage at Seminole High School at 8:30 a. m. The new officers for the year assumed their duties.

A garage sale was planned to take place November 9-10 at 208 S. W. 17th. Street.

The program was presented by Marshall Cooper, Manager, Girlstown, U.S.A. The Young Homemakers chapter will have as its project the year the sponsoring of a girl from there.

Mr. Cooper showed slides of facilities in Girlstown and of some of the residents. He told the history of Girlstown which had its beginning in a huge two-story house at Buffalo Gap, Texas, in March 1949. Here girls who were neglected, unloved or unwanted could find a home. In July, Girlstown moved to its present site near Whiteface, Texas. The late Tom Duggan of Lubbock gave 1,425.6 acres of ranch land and soon 9 girls were settled in the old ranch house. Through the years, the number of residents has grown as facilities have been made available. Currently, some 70 girls call Girlstown "home" and during its 18-year history, more than 500 girls have made their home there. There is a need for additional facilities. Some 15 girls are turned away weekly because of limited funds.

The girls attend public schools and churches in the community, and are treated as family members with all privileges and responsibilities of the home.

They raise Angus cattle, horses, chickens, geese, pigs and one sheep which belongs to one of the girls. The sheep was donated to Girlstown after a stock show and the girl wouldn't let them butcher the sheep. Now he is very much a "part of the family" and would run in and out of the house like a dog if allowed to do so.

The home takes girls from ages 5-16 and keeps them until they are 19.

It takes 1 beef, 100 chickens, and 2 pigs per month to feed everyone at Girlstown, U.S.A. They grow and can or freeze many things.

On closing his presentation, Mr. Cooper stated, "We're the lucky people who get to work there and it's people like you who make it possible."

The chapter plans a trip to Girlstown on Thursday, October 12 at which time the selection of the girl which they will sponsor will be made.

The next meeting will be November 2. The chapter Adviser, Miss Ellen Massengill will direct a workshop in candlemaking.

COMPARISON
