

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

Open house will begin at 7 pm Monday and all teachers will be on duty in their rooms at that time to visit with parents and other interested citizens. Refreshments will be served in the central cafeteria in the Primary Building and at the F. J. Young Cafeteria beginning at 8 pm. Activities for the evening will end at 9:00 pm.

In addition to the special night for visitation, administrators and teachers urge parents to visit during the day and observe the classroom instruction. They point out that visitors during the day need not worry about disturbing the class but should come in and take a seat in the rear of the room.




The boy's debate team of Nicky Lily and Mark Thompson won one and lost two while the mixed team of Luke Alexander and Laren Holler lost three.



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



8. Mrs. Betty Davis was employed as lunch room program manager when Mrs. Webb's retirement becomes effective.

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



So far as I know I have never met any of the editorial staff of the Seminole News. However, I do remember a trip to Peacock in the late 1930's where I visited one of the publishers of your good paper; so I can but assume that the Peacock marble champion is, or was, Mr. Woods.

I still have some, if not all, of my marbles that I used in the roaring twenties and on into the thirties and none of them, even the middle ring man, is as large as l_2^1 inches. I wonder if a trip to your local optometrist might make it possible for Mr. Woods to see smaller marbles. Really I doubt that my thumb could push even a good taw with enough steam to move a l_2^1 inch crock very far now.

The set of crock marbles I have are more than 45 years old and have been in my possession that long. The large one is 1 inch and the other eight are 7/8 of an inch in diameter. I also have a full set of clear glass ones that have colored candy stripes in the center, they are all the same size, 1 inch. There are only five of them and they are not perfectly round. They are still in the original handmade calico sack that they were presented in, in 1882. They were a farewell gift to my father when he, with his family, left Tennessee to arrive in Texas two years later.

The fact that there are only five of them indicated that some 90 to 100 years ago it only took five marbles to make a set. The other set acquired in the early 1920's has nine. Is this an indication of progress or just what?

So far I have not seen a date for the contest nor have I learned what milage allowance you are going to give. I would also like to know what the purse will be.


