Following a trip through the Sonora Caverns Sunday, the local entrants returned home late that evening.

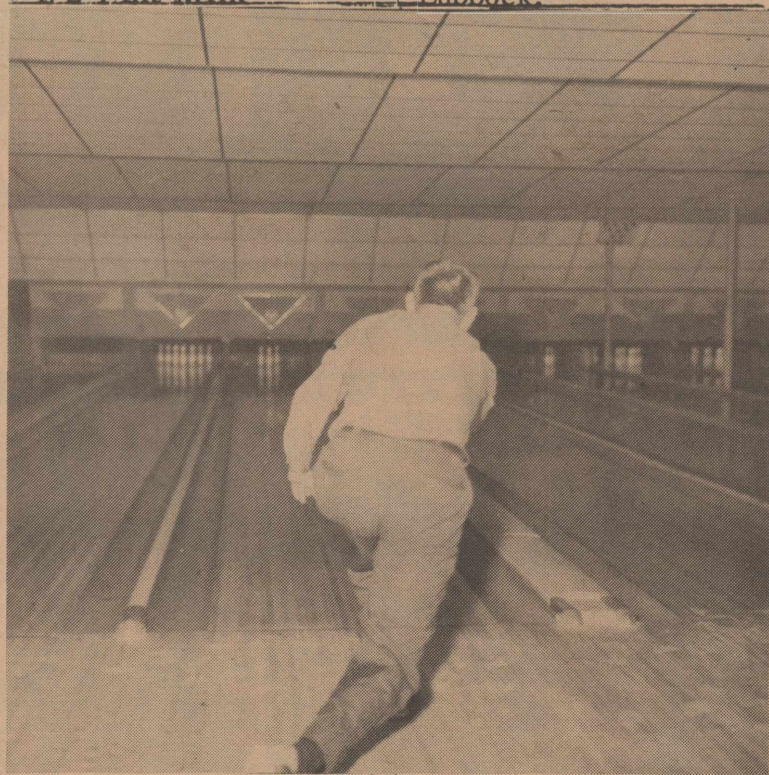

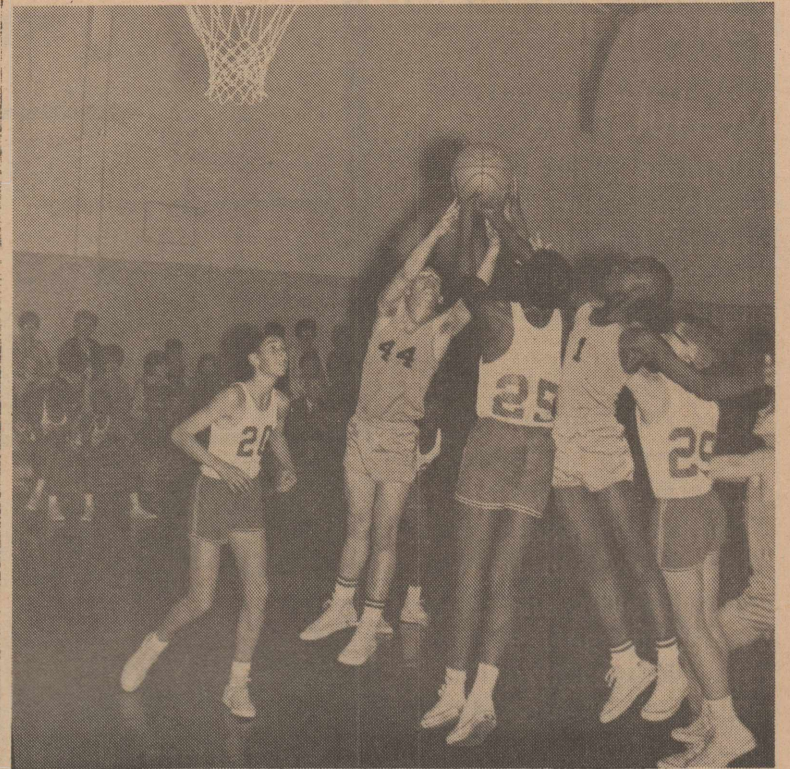

3. The National School Board Associational meeting is scheduled for March 29- April 2 in Detroit. Board members Jones and Mabry indicated they could not go.

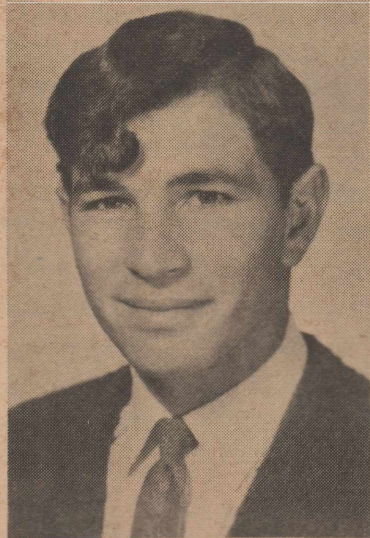
4. The school farm, or the dry-land portion of the school farm was rented to H.B. Patterson, Jr.

In the final game against Morton, it was much easier as Seminole lead by 11 at the half and by 11 at the end of the third quarter; and won by going away with 16 points, 54-38.

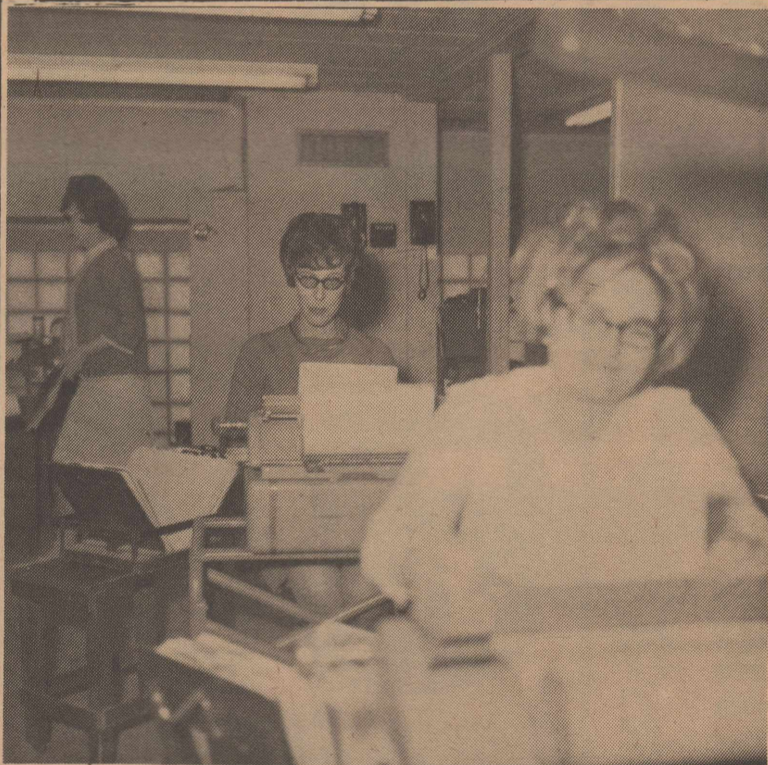

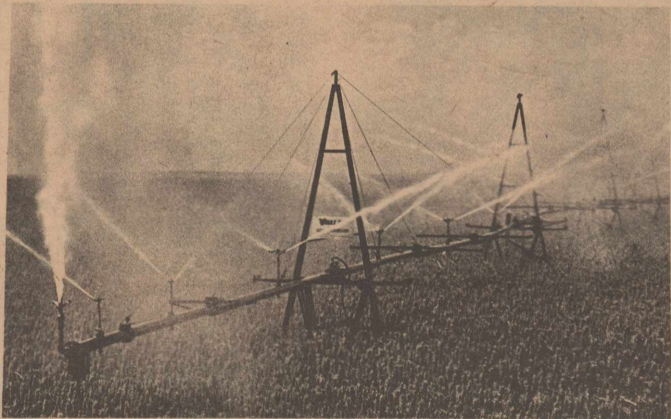

So far as I know I have never met any of the editorial staff of the Seminole News. However, I do remember a trip to Peacock in the late 1930's where I visited one of the publishers of your good paper; so I can but assume that the Peacock marble champion is, or was, Mr. Woods.

I still have some, if not all, of my marbles that I used in the roaring twenties and on into the thirties and none of them, even the middle ring man, is as large as 1 1/2 inches. I wonder if a trip to your local optometrist might make it possible for Mr. Woods to see smaller marbles. Really I doubt that my thumb could push even a good taw with enough steam to move a 1 1/2 inch crock very far now.

The set of crock marbles I have are more than 45 years old and have been in my possession that long. The large one is 1 inch and the other eight are 7/8 of an inch in diameter. I also have a full set of clear glass ones that have colored candy stripes in the center, they are all the same size, 1 inch. There are only five of them and they are not perfectly round. They are still in the original handmade calico sack that they were presented in, in 1882. They were a farewell gift to my father when he, with his family, left Tennessee to arrive in Texas two years later.

The fact that there are only five of them indicated that some 90 to 100 years ago it only took five marbles to make a set. The other set acquired in the early 1920's has nine. Is this an indication of progress or just what?

So far I have not seen a date for the contest nor have I learned what milage allowance you are going to give. I would also like to know what the purse will be.

Their next district game will be Thursday night, in Andrews.

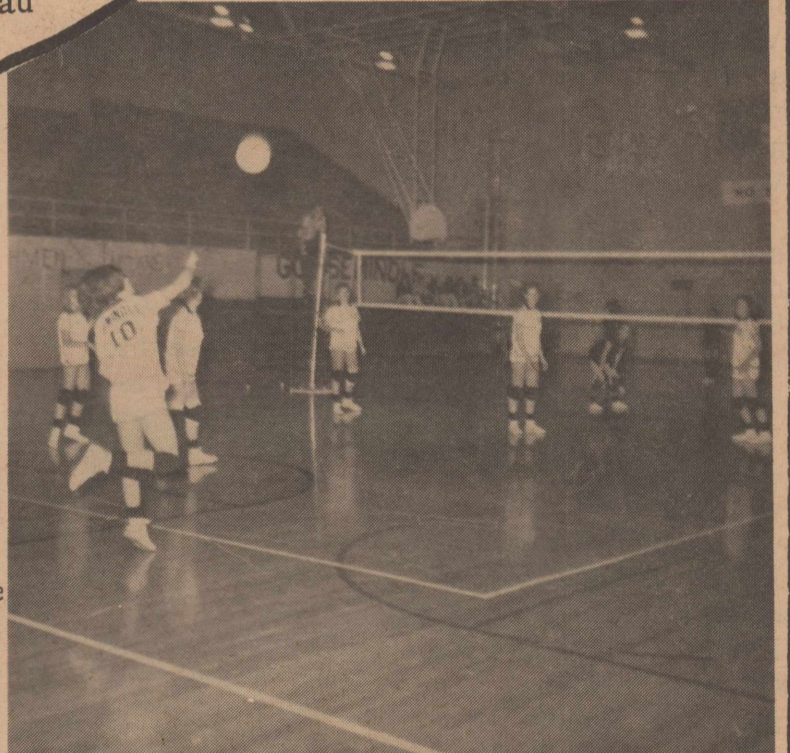

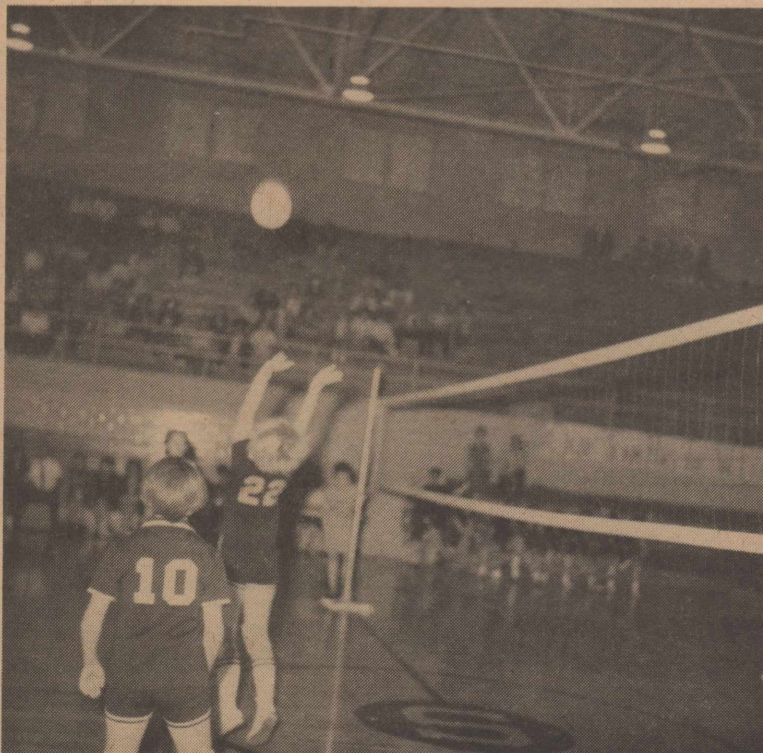
