being called upon to furnish 2, 378 men for the Army and Marines in April, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Friday.

This compares to a quota of 1, 948 for the Army in March and is the largest monthly call for the draft boards since October 1966, when the share was 2, 845.

The draft boards will forward 8, 500 men to the armed forces examining and entrance stations in April for the pre-induction physical and mental examinations in preparation to fill future quotas.

This compares to 7, 200 being forwarded for this purpose in March, 4, 590 sent in February, and 5,455 in January. The March pre-induction examination quota originally was 4, 200, but was increased later because of higher induction quotas.

The April induction and pre-induction quotas were mailed to local boards by state Selective Service headquarters March 13.

The April call of 2, 378 men for Texas is the state share of a national quota of 48, 000, the Army to get 44, 000 of this number, and the Marine Corps 4, 000.

The order of selection to fill the April and March induction calls may be from among examined and acceptable men who are:

(1) delinquents 19 years old and older, (2) volunteers under age 26, and (3) nonvolunteers 19 through 25 years old, single and married, with those married after August 26, 1965, being selected ahead of those married on or before that date.

AGRICULTURAL DEMONSTRATION PROGRAM

Another year of hard work and effort has been put into the completion of actual result demonstrations on farms in Gaines County, reports County Agricultural Agent Calvin D. Holcomb. And the findings of these demonstrations are now complete and have been compiled into a handbook available at the County Extension Office.

The overall agricultural demonstration program is sponsored by the County Program Building Committee, points out Holcomb. Chairman of this committee is M. M. 'Red) Hand. In charge of the overall Crops Committee is Leon Foote.

"We feel that our result demonstration program has progressed especially well over the past year, ' says Holcomb. "Last year was a good crop year and a number of significant findings came out of our demonstration program."



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

Seminole News - March 27, 1968 -Effective April 1 City Sales Tax

The 1% Sales Tax will become effective April 1 or next Monday. In passing the tax the City Council announced that they hoped Advalorem Taxes would not have to be raised after the City Sales Tax was passed. The items to be taxed by the city will be only those that have previously, or presently come under the 2% State Sales Tax Law. The following is a table showing the tax schedule including the City and State Sales Tax.

Amt. of sale	Tax
.01 to .16	No tax
.17 to.49	.01
.50 to .83	.02
.84 to 1.16	.03
1.17 to 1.49	.04
1.50 to 1.83	.05

For successive brackets the tax shall be computed by multiplying three percent times the amount of sale.



The above work was being done on the draw --the James Stanley's home place. The year was 1917. The dump being built was for the old Midland and Northwest ern Railroad. In 1917 the Midland and Northwestern Railroad was built. The above spike has stenciled on it M & NW. It was touched up here so it could be photographed. After the railroad was moved, a many a driver of truck and cars' complained bitterly when hitting one of the above spikes. The old telephone road that goes to Midland is the dump where the railroad ran. A story is told about a young man that walked the roadway after the track was moved and pitched the spikes off the road. Someone asked him if he walked 12 miles into town throwing the spikes off the road and then walked on the way back home without anything to do. His answer, "Heck, no, I walked the ditch going back and threw them up in the road." Some Where-Viet Nam

I am still here and in good shape, I think. I was wondering for a while last night. We got hit pretty hard about 1:00 a.m. I would guess about 100 rounds of mortar and rockets hit the base. They hit the flight line pretty hard and a couple hit within 400 yards of our hut. I have heard we lost six planes. It is a guess, that they were trying to get the General's quarters. The chapel was hit and burned to the ground. We go to the base theater for services now.

It is 12:30 now and they just gave us another one. It must have been a mortar as we didn't hear anything coming, and one can hear the rockets before they blow. One hit up the street by 7th Air Force Headquarters. It appears they will keep it up all day, so we can stay nervous. I maybe, shouldn't be writing you what is happening, but it keeps me thinking and from getting on edge. I have about ten fellows here, so scared they can't think and I don't want them to know the 'ole man' is too. It helps them to think I'm under full control, though I'll admit to you, I'm scared. Anyone in his right mind would be. I am glad it is me rather than Jon or Steve that's here though and I surely hope they never have to go through a thing like this.

I finally got in some weapons; two . 38 pistols and a M-16 rifle. During the noon attack they hit the old PX building and nearly tore it apart. Luckily no one was near, as it blew debris all over a one block area.

I sure could use a leaning post right now. All the young fellows keep looking to me for advice, I hope I advise right. I know I have four little ones at home, but here, I feel I have at least 100 of them.

I hope this so called offensive by the V.C. has made people aware, there is a real war going on. I hope those guys that burned their draft cards are happy now. One of my boys that just got back from the States told me he was in a California College town and was treated like trash. It just isn't right, when we are trying to save a land we love. I'm not a great patriot, but I'm afraid I couldn't go around with anyone that degraded these kids, my flag, or any of the other items that represent America to me.

Tell Steve I'd like him to have his B-B gun here. I know I could kill at least 25 mice and rats every night.

While I was in Japan The N. C. O. Club was turned into a hospital. Our hospital went from its original size of 200 beds to over 1000 in 12 hours. You asked why it was necessary for the 82nd to have to come back. The army and marines are spread so thin they can't take men off guard duty to fight. I would estimate 2/3 of the personnel are Air Force. They have no actual fighting practice, at all. We do have to keep the planes up, so we can't spare mechanics to fire guns. Besides, there aren't enough guns to go around. Over here, one has to go to the army and beg, if they can spare a gun.


