CLEAN UP - FIX UP WEEK UNDERWAY

Police Report



The above picture shows the pick up, tool boxes and jacks recovered early Tuesday morning.

Through the cooperation of every segment of the police system \$1800 worth of tools, 23 new tires and \$650 worth of weed killer have been recovered. Monday night the city police, sheriff, and highway patrol converged on a house located on SW Ave. F and 8th St., the residence of Rex Austin, and found 23 new tires that had been stolen from the Richard Heinkel Warehouse, a Chevron Wholesale/Retail Distributorship, 12 miles south of Midland. There were 29 tires originally taken.

In other action 2 tool boxes with tools, one tool cabinet, and jacks were recovered that had been stolen from Stewart & Stevenson. One tool box still had the name of Marvel Quarrels, an employee, on it.

A pickup that had been borrowed from Jayroe Car Lot was used to transport the tools. Charles Sims, age 36, from Seminole, along with Donald Colvett, age 19, and Rex Austin were in custody of the Midland Police Tuesday morning. \$5000 bond had been set for 2 of the 3 men.

Bill Ellyson, of Red Barn Chemical reported a burglary of weed killer on May 7, 1969, valued at \$2350.00 stolen from the Loop store. Eleven 5 gallon containers of Fumazone were recovered when children playing in an empty house in Lubbock reported the material to the police. Eight cases of Atrozine, valued at \$1710 were not recovered.

Ready for a vacation? Rayford Bates? Local Businessman??? H&D Food??? Last Wednesday at 4:20 P.M. the Seminole Volunteer Fire Department was called to the Seminole School's bus barn. It seems that a weed burning crew from the school was using a butane rig, burning around the fences and the building. Sponge rubber, used for high jump pits and pole vault pits, was stored in the corner of the building and caught fire. Tar and sealer from the roof caught fire and dripped through on buses, causing an estimated \$15,000 to \$16,000 damage.

Damage to one bus was estimated at \$600, another at \$1,000 and another at \$1500, plus \$3,000 damage to the band instrument truck. The estimated damage to the building, given by Ross Moore, was \$9,000.

I protest when people go dirty and stay dirty if they have an opportunity to clean themselves up and will not. I want to protest when people will bring children into the world and will not love them, take care of them and a lot of the time refuse to let anyone else have them to see that they get the proper care. I protest those who gripe about taxes but will not vote. They gripe about our doctors but would not give 10¢ or attend one meeting to get more. They fuss about our schools but would not go to see their child's teacher. They stay mad at their home town and refuse to pave the street in front of their house.

Along with this I join Mr. W. Edwards: "In recent years we have heard and read a lot about protests. My reaction has been, count me out on all this protest business. But I have changed my mind.

(1) I protest the employment of teachers in tax-supported schools who advocate the precepts of Karl Marx, V. I. Lenin and Fidel Castro (2) I object to a tax structure that takes up to 50 per cent of the income of some families through direct and indirect taxes and allows millionaires to pay little or no income taxes. (3) I object to paying taxes for the support of people who are able to work, but refuse to work. (4) I disapprove of our country giving financial assistance to other countries that support avowed enemies of the United States. (5) I protest efforts to secure more tax funds for church schools. While the Supreme Court denies religious exercises in public schools, it permits public funds to be used in schools that major on religion. (6) I protest the protester who (under the pretext of protesting) resorts to abusive language, destruction of property, theft, and injury to innocent people. I protest all protesters who merely protest for the sake of protesting. Some people have found it easier to protest than work; easier to protest than attend classes."





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
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HIGH SCHOOL CONCERT AND SYMPHONIC BAND TO PERFORM

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
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TO THE 1969 HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES

THE CHRISTMAS SEAL MOBILE DETECTION UNIT IS SCHEDULED TO BE HERE MAY 23

The Christmas Seal Mobile Detection Unit of the West Texas Tuberculosis Association will be in Seminole on May 23. The x-ray unit is being sponsor Lydia; a brother, Ed of Seminole; ed by the Tau Upslum Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi, Pink Ladies and the Evening Lions Club as a community health project.

Many other abnormalities besides TB are detected by this means. On the last trip to Seminole, a total of 540 x-rays were taken. 2 cardio-vascular abnormalities, 5 TB suspects and 12 other chest problems were pin-pointed. The \$1.50 pays for the film and the developing. The West Texas Tuberculosis Association bears the cost of having the film read and reported to each one in the survey.

A post card is mailed to those having a normal chest film. The ones who have an abnormal reading are notified by a first-class letter which urges them to contact their private physician or the local health officer for further examination.

Everyone is urged to keep the card with the number of their x-ray film and the date taken. These films are stored at the office of the Association, and can be made available to physicians on request. An old film can be valuable for comparison purposes if some trouble develops in later year. Children under 12 years of age are too small to be x-rayed on this type unit, but every adult is urged to take advantage of this opportunity.

The Unit will be located at the Courthouse Square from 9:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. and 2:00 P.M. to 6:00 P. M.

They use a long bamboo pole with a hook to collect it. The commercial fishermen place rows of poles, up right. When the tide comes in it carries the kelp in, as the tide goes out the seaweed remains wrapped on the poles. Leaving it a simple matter to collect. Lots of farmers fish for a bit of extra money in the winter season.



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

Information From Social Security Office

BY DOROTHY FEAZELL

An estimated 4 million young people in the country will be going to work for the first time this year. Many of them, H. P. Thomas, Odessa Social Security District Manager, said, will be trying out their wings in summer jobs. He reminded young people to apply for a social security card before they go job hunting. "You'll need the card to show to your employer, " he pointed out, "so that your earnings can be reported to your individual social security account."

Your earnings during your whole working lifetime will be credited to the account set up for you under that number and will be the basis for figuring the benefits payable to you and the family you will someday have.

Over 2. 2 million disabled workers under 65 are now receiving monthly payments, along with more than 1 million of their dependents. Many of them are under 30 and some are still in their teens.

He cited the case of 19-year old Bob Heffernan. Less than a year after his graduation from high school in 1967, Bob had both legs broken in an accident. He underwent four operations in the more than five months he spent in the hospital.

Last November, his doctor suggested that he get in touch with the social security office to see whether he might qualify for social security disability benefits.

His part-time work after school and during summer vacations had given him enough social security credit to qualify for payments. A person disabled before he is 24 needs credit for only $1\frac{1}{2}$ years out of the 3 years before he became disabled.

The monthly checks will come, to Bob Heffernan for as long as he is unable to work. In the meantime, he is eligible for job training and counseling.

To get a social security card, stop by the social security office at 516 First National Bank Building in Sdessa. Beginning April 21, office hours will be from

We stripped the shirt from the young man. No bullet holes. He was bleeding from the mouth. We looked in the back of his head and his neck but could not find a bullet hole. We removed his pants. 




