The program is a musical romance of Panhandle history, with a cast and workers of over 100 people. The story concerns a land baron, Uncle Henry, who does not want his spread divided with a railroad or dirt farmers. The outdoor theater is complimented by a center stage with an elevated wing stage on the right and on the left, with the center stage extending to the creek and to the mountains.

The cast takes in players bringing the railroad through, the Indians appearing on the mountainside and an honest-to-goodness West Texas thunderstorm and an electrical storm. If the natural setting is not enough to make the evening worthwhile, the riders carrying the six flags, symbolizing the rich heritage of Texas, will, especially when Old Glory passes up the mountainside being carried on a speedy horse.

The fiddling and the square dancing sounds and looks authentic; also a burial scene.

This is the fourth season for the play which opened June 27 and will play through September 1. The show plays every night except Sunday and is approximately three hours in length.

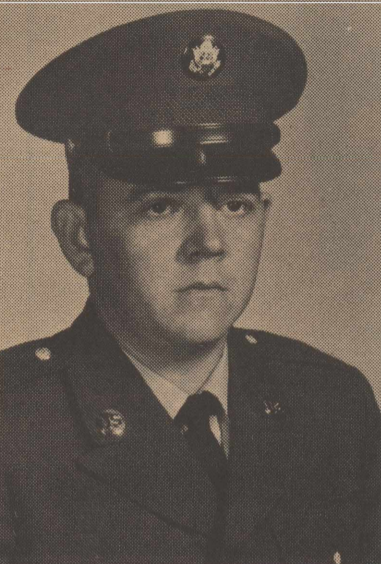

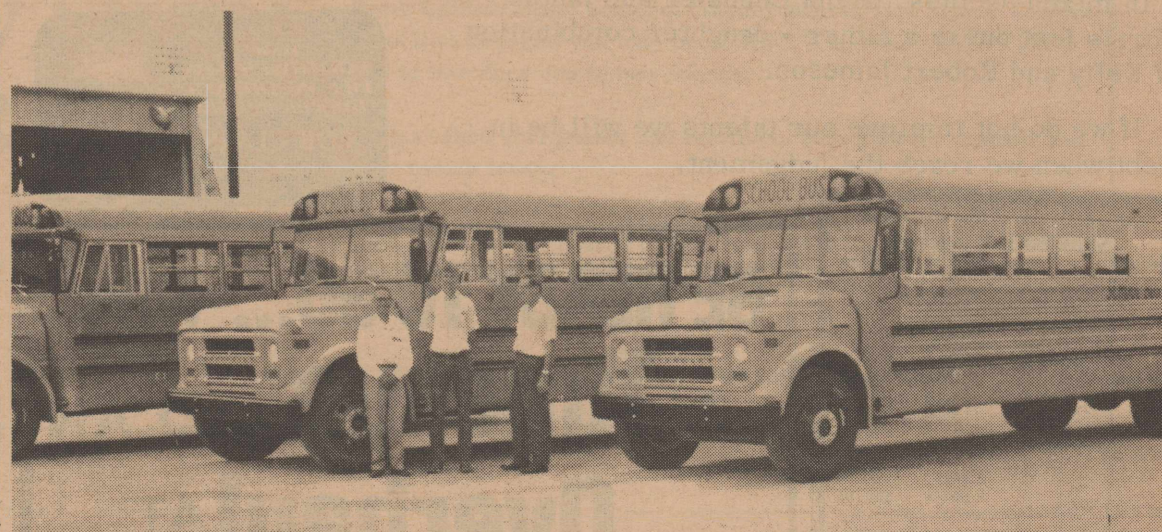
Mrs. Hamilton Bell Injured

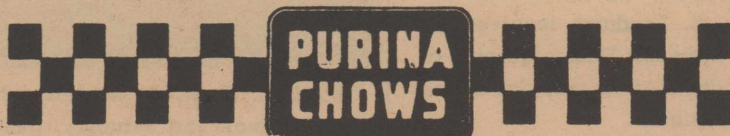

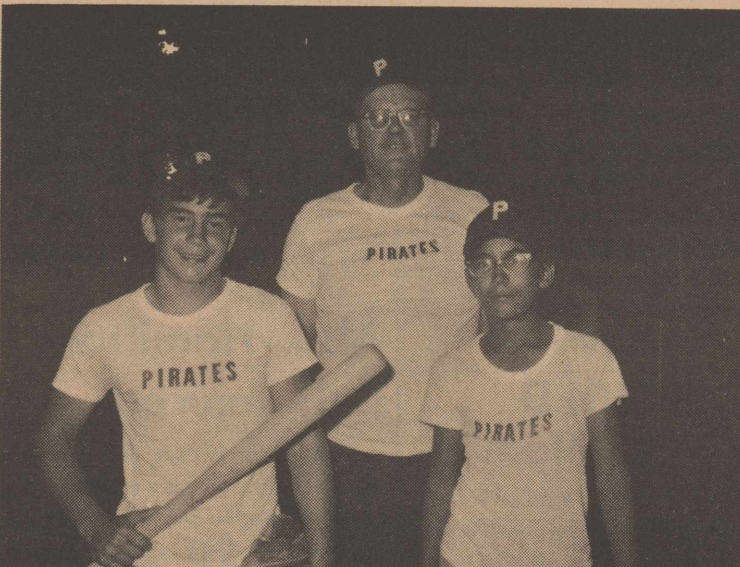

Mr. and Mrs. Harber are parents of two married daughters, Sandra of Odessa and Debra of Lubbock. They have four grandsons.



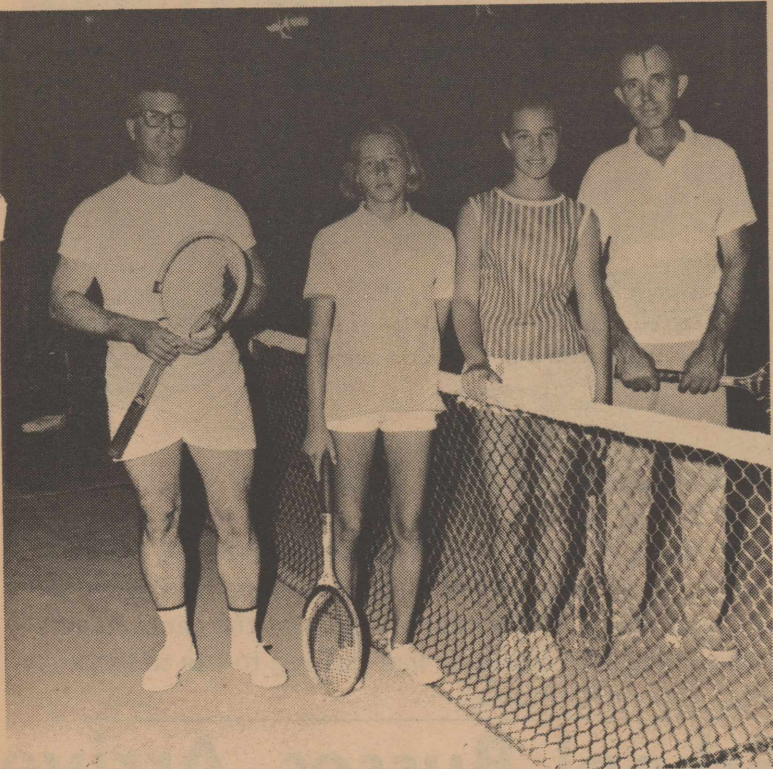

1969-1970 SCHOOL CALENDAR FOR SEMINOLE PUBLIC SCHOOLS


The 1969-70 school calendar for the Seminole Public School is as follows. The first full day of school will be September 2 with orientation day August 27; general faculty meeting and workday August 28 and in-service workshop August 29.

Holidays for the school year are Thanksgiving November 27-November 30, inclusive; Christmas holidays December 20, 1969 through January 4, 1970; TSTA holiday March 6; Easter holidays, March 27-March 30, inclusive.


The total number of school days included in the calendar are 175. The six weeks periods are divided as follows: first six weeks September 2-October 10; second six weeks October 13-November 21, 1969 - January 16, 1970; fourth six weeks January 19-February 27; fifth six weeks March 2-April 10 and the sixth six weeks April 13-May 27.



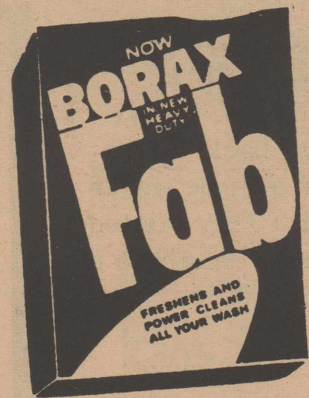

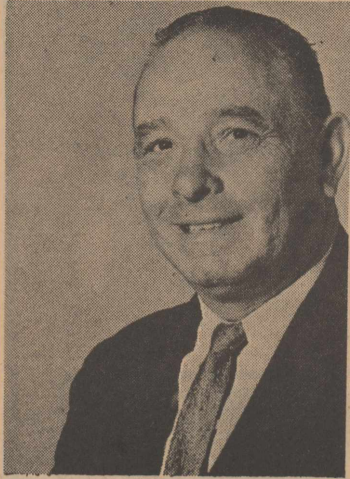

SCHOOL PRE REGISTRATION

Activities for the new school year begin on the local scene Thursday, August 21, with pre-registration for students in the first six grades. High school students also begin registering on that date. Only students new to the system in grades seven and eight pre-register and this is scheduled for Wednesday, August 27. Other junior high students register the first day of school, Tuesday, September 2.

Students who will attend the F. J. Young Elementary School will register between the hours of 9:00 a. m. and 3:00 p. m. on the 21st. All students in grades 1-5 who live west of 11th street, south of the Hobbs Highway, and west of Cemetery Road will attend the Young school. In addition students in these grades who will ride buses driven last year by McDougal, Hughes, Christian, Bennett, McGehee, Grayson, and Patterson will enroll at this school.

Students in grades 1-3 who live east of 11th street or who ride other buses will enroll at the Primary school on the central campus. Registration here will also be between the hours of 9:00 a. m. and 3:00 p. m. on August 21 and will be conducted in the north cafeteria dining room.

The Seminole Elemen-

tary School will also conduct enrollment on the 21st during the same hours. Enrolling in this school will be all sixth graders and pupils in grades 4-5 who live east of 11th or who ride buses which do not go by the Young school. All three buildings will be open during the noon hour for the convenience of working parents who wish to register their children at that time.

High school seniors will pre-register on Thursday, August 21, between the hours of 9:00 a. m. and 12:00 noon. Juniors will enroll that afternoon from 1:00 p. m. to 4:00 p. m. On Friday, August 22, sophomores will enroll in the morning and freshmen in the afternoon with the same hours as on the preceding day.

All seventh and eighth graders new to the system should report at 9:00 a. m. sharp in the junior high library on Wednesday, August 27. Promptness is stressed as tests will be given these pupils and will begin at that time. These students should bring a pencil with them. All other junior high pupils will register on September 2, the first day of school.

Pupils who are on vacation at the time of pre-enrollment will register the first day of school. Parents who have any questions about enrollment should contact their child's principal or the central office in the Administration Building.

Gaines County Crops

The cotton outlook for Gaines County is good this year. Early rains and hot weather has kept growth down and the cotton plants loaded properly. This year there are 111,000 acres allotted with 105,000 acres planted. James Hodge of the local ASCS office gave this information on last year's 83,600 acres harvested crop. On 63,000 acres of irrigated land there was an average made of 576 lint pounds per acre. On 20,600 acres of dry land the average was 332 lint pounds per acre, or an average for the county of 516 pounds per acre for both irrigated and dry land. Calvin Holcomb, county agent, gave these varieties planted: Acala 1517BR; Acala B-3080; Stroman 245 (Acala); and Paymaster 111. These varieties take up 75 - 80% of the total planted crop. The other 20 -25% is made up of Paymaster 202, Dunn 57C, Lockett and Lankard.

Milo maize has an allotted acreage in Gaines County of 273,000 acres with 150,000 acres planted in the program. Outside of the government program another 150,000 acres are planted making a total for the county of 300,000. The county also has 12,000 acres of allotted wheat and much smaller programs of oats, barley and rye.

Castor Bean crops take in approximately 51,000 acres. These are contracted to Baker Castor Oil Company and to the Coop. Two or three varieties generally take in the acreage. They are Hale, Hybrid 33 and Hybrid 44.

Yields on Gaines County peanuts are almost phenomenal. Last year area peanut farmers averaged over a ton per acre with some yields as high as 5000 pounds. Most of the 2200 acres planted are Spanish varieties with a few acres of Valincha Jumbos.

There are 15,100 acres of alfalfa in Gaines County. Guar takes in approximately 12,000 acres. (The hull of of guar is used to make cake for cow feed with the inside being used for a multitude of products: paints, wax, polish, etc.)

Approximately 4000 acres are planted for the fall crop of potatoes. Del Monte has contracted in the county 2400 acres of green beans and 500-600 acres of pea beans (used in pork 'n beans). In black eyed peas, and field peas for land improvement and gathering it is estimated 4000-6000 acres are planted.

Peach trees take in another 3000 acres.

Besides the row crops and the alfalfa and potatoes, there are many acres of improved pastures, grasses and sudan. Two area farmers are grazing approximately 27,000 sheep.

The acreage that has been mentioned take in slightly over one half million acres, or 518,300. This does not include grazing land or the 600 acres diverted on the cotton program or the 123,000 diverted acres in the milo farm program.

Gaines County is looking forward to a bountiful harvest.

My job of coordinating the delivery of the Ground Support Simulation Computer program was a small part in the total undertaking of the flight of Apollo 11, however, I like to think that it was an important part. We in simulations did have the pleasure of being the first to land on the moon, then later we had the thrill of developing the programming capability that allowed the Flight Control team working with the crew of Armstrong, Aldrin and Collins to perform the first simulated landing on the Moon. Things were looking rather dim in those early simulations before we were able to achieve a simulated landing. Two times, after flying for about four hours, the crew was forced to abort just before they could land. Finally they were able to land about the middle of June. After that the long hours of training and simulations did not seem so long and the actual landing of men on the moon seemed to be only a matter of time. However, do not let this letter or the astounding success of Apollo 11 mislead you into believing that a lunar landing is simple. At the present time in history the landing of a manned spacecraft on the lunar surface is not an easy task. Perhaps in years to come this feat will become much simpler as have many other endeavors that were accomplished earlier.

My job could have been done by many others. Other jobs in the Apollo 11 mission were more essential, but I still feel a sense of pride in having had the chance to be a part of the team effort. Other men could have been the Astronauts and others will follow. But all of us working together have done something that none of us working separately could have accomplished. Perhaps there is a basic truth in this undertaking that can be applied on other tasks and larger projects like the social problems in this country and the unrest between nations on the world wide scale.

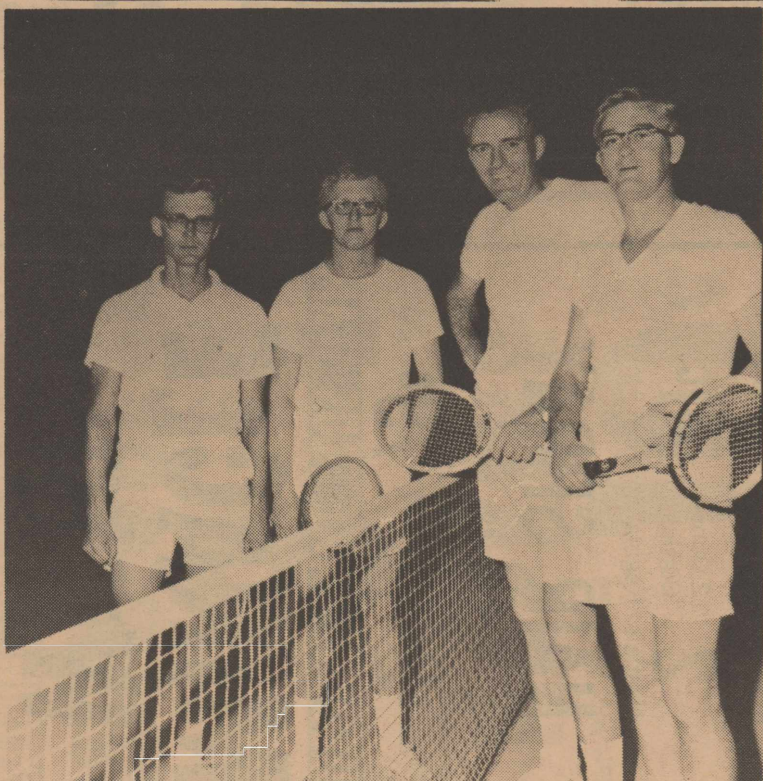
Someone remarked that you (each person) will always remember where he was on the day of July 20 at 3:20 in the afternoon. I will always remember that I stood in the Mission Control Center and watched the displays as the Astronauts descended the last few miles, then feet, toward a landing in the Sea of Tranquility at approximately .73 degrees North Latitude and 23.64 degrees East Longitude. I will long remember the comment from Neil Armstrong that they were coming down in the center of a rock filled crater about the size of a football field. Then he took manual control of the Lunar Module and over flew the crater to find a smooth landing site. This was a long tense moment because the LM should have between 5 and 7 percent of the descent fuel left when it lands. We had run simulated cases that required the Astronauts to abort the landing phase when they reached a level of 2 percent descent fuel remaining. When they landed they had about 3 percent of fuel left, so you can see why we were anxious about the landing.

Now that they are on the way home part of our prayers have been answered. Ahead lies the successful recovery of the Astronauts --- then other flights.

EDITORIAL

Ha! To Virgil Keyes and many other associates who laughingly said, "So cows have a social place in the herd!" To all of you good people who thought the article in the Woodenfoote a few months ago on cows and the milking of cows was so ridiculous, I point you to an article of July 10, 1969 in Hoard's Dairyman, founded in 1885, page 781. This article was written by Susan L. Donaldson and J. L. Albright.

"It has long been recognized that many herds of cows are led and dominated by a 'boss' cow. The descriptive studies of the past years further indicate that not only is there a boss cow, but each animal in the herd has a rank and each 'knows her place.'"

"When a new animal is introduced into an established herd, there usually is chaos for a few days to several weeks. One researcher showed (Hoard's Dairyman, September 10, 1955) a 5 percent average decline in milk yield after introducing unfamiliar animals into a herd. Production falls off and injuries may occur.

"The social order affects production because low-ranking animals do not get their share of feed, water, and rest. A low-ranking animal must always wait in line, and give up its spot at the feed bunk or waterer if a more dominant animal wants it."

As I said in the beginning - Ha! (My thanks to Rayford Bates for furnishing the article. Evidently he heard some of the ribbing.)

First Graders Need Proof of Birth

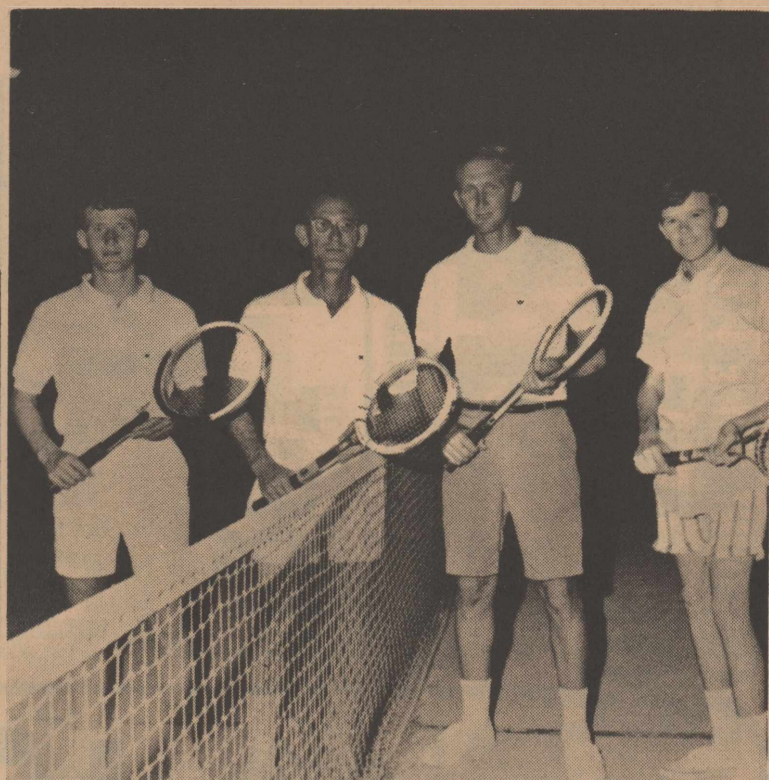

Parents of children who will enter the first grade this year were reminded by school administrators that they will need a certified copy of the child's birth certificate and a copy of the immunization records to present upon enrollment.

Certified copies of birth certificates may be obtained from the county clerk of the county in which the child was born or from the Bureau of Vital Statistics in the state capitol. Regulations of the local Board of Trustees state that a pupil must be six years of age on or before September 1, 1969 in order to be eligible to attend school this year.

Board regulations call for first grade pupils to have had immunization for smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, and polio. All other pupils must have immunization for smallpox. A scar is satisfactory evidence of smallpox immunization.

There has been clouds, lightning and thunder around Loop for a couple of days but only a few sprinkles of rain.

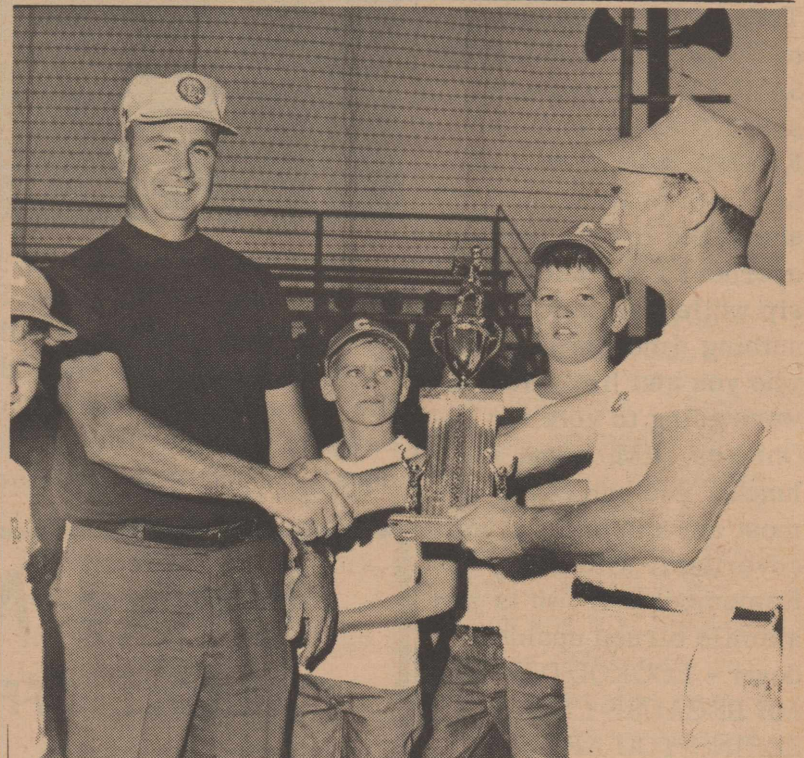
