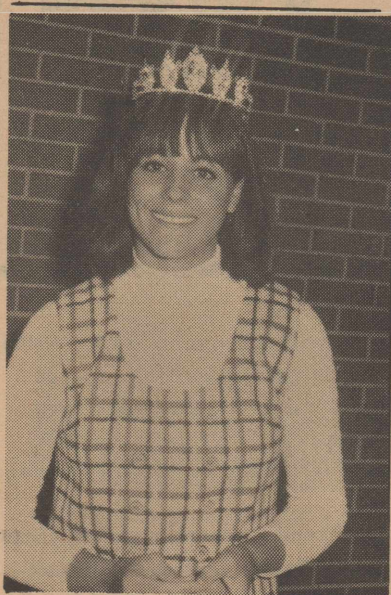

"My plans are to go to college when I finish high school," she said.



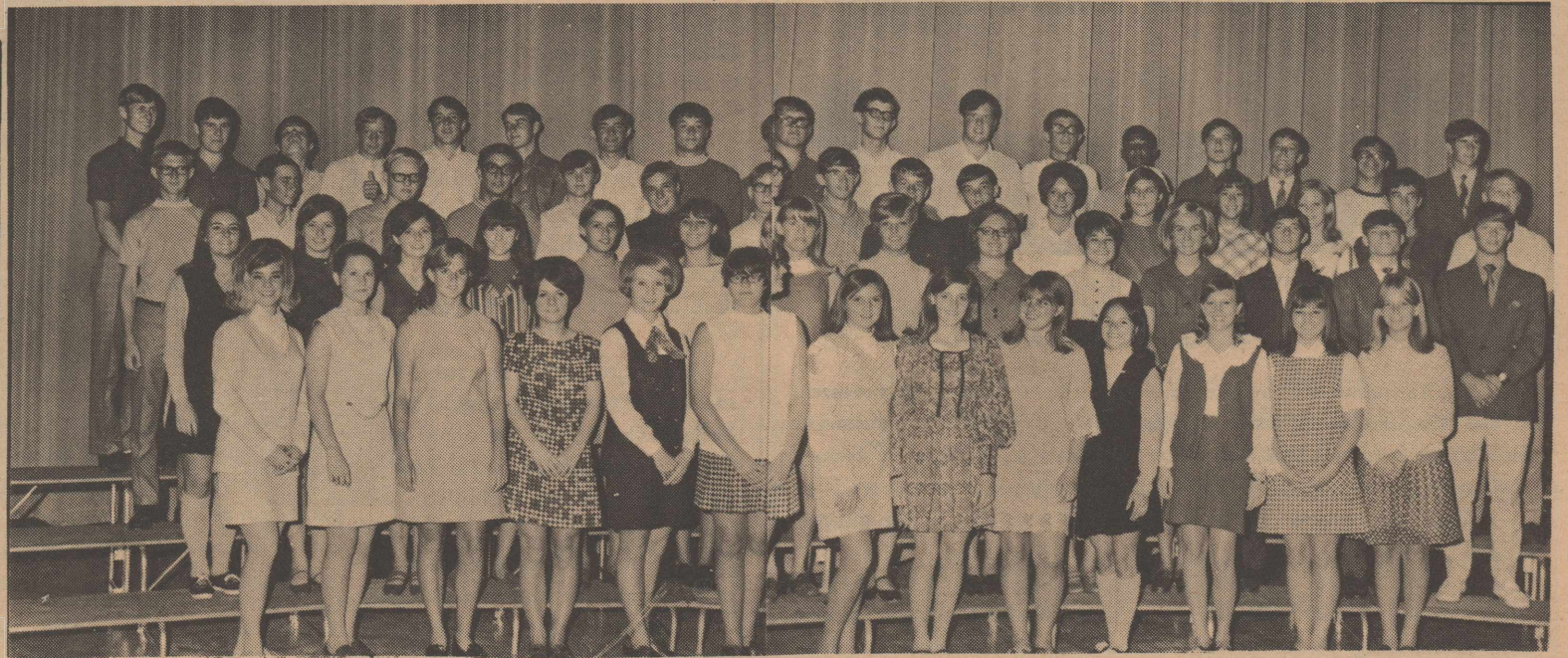
My big problem started a number of years ago. I thought they were mild heart attacks. A slight pain in the chest grew worse over a period of two or three years until I began to pass out. Over a period of a year and a half I saw at least four doctors. All of them found the problem, telling me that the lower valve on my esophagus did not work properly. Everyone of them asked the question whether I could burp or not.

Now, to all of you people who burped out loud I apologize. I always thought it ill mannered and on the ridiculous side to make the loud noises when belching. (I never burped in my life. I never vomited but twice and it nearly killed me. Gelusil and Melanta tablets I've bought by the 100's.) At least one doctor said, "If your condition does not improve, you're going to have to have the valve replaced with an artificial one," and I was further told they were not the most successful operations in the world.

At times the pressure would build up on the upper diaphragm and chest until I passed out just like a heart attack victim. Dr. Gordon said, "Mr. Woods, you don't have heart trouble, but you're going to develop a heart condition if you do not get this corrected," and I could just see myself with a plastic valve (I had been told many times that they did not work too good) and having to tie a string onto it to 'beep', 'beep', and 'burp', 'burp', to get the proper relief.

Then, about the nicest thing in the world happened to me. My Aunt Alice,

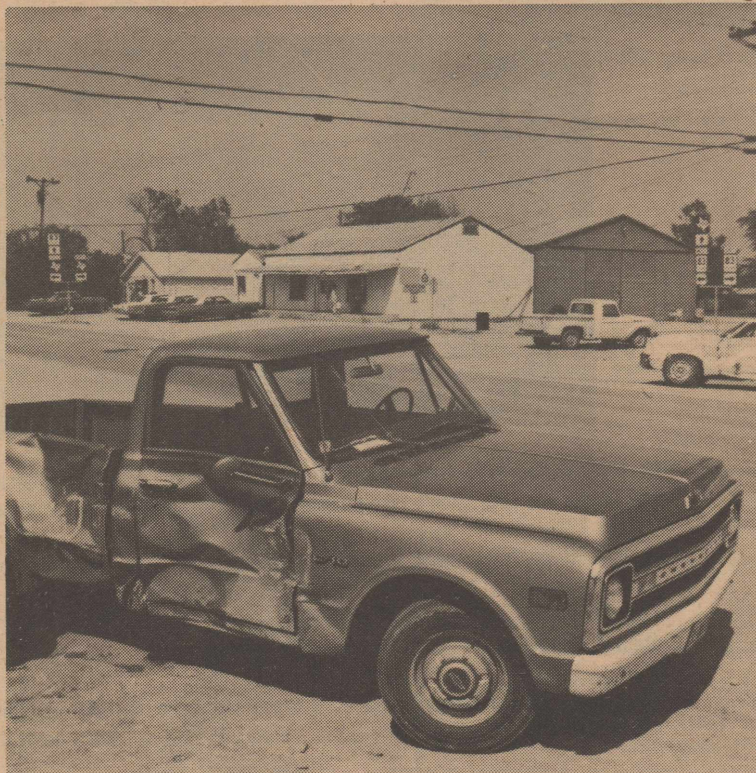

CITY COUNCIL MONDAY NIGHT

Ray Miller, representing Blue Cross-Blue Shield insurance, that the city employees have, met with the City Council Monday night to discuss coverage and availability of the insurance contract with the city. The council voted to make insurance effective on the date of employment (probably November 15, 1969).

2. Other leave-out units were discussed in the paving program.
3. The council agreed to furnish 310 yards of caliche at 70¢ per yard to surface N.W. 6th Street from the new football parking lot south to the Denver City Highway. It was reported that Robert Matthews, commissioner, would spread the caliche and work the street.
4. The council voted to begin proceedings to take in approximately 9 blocks on the east side of Seminole, between S.W. Ave. E. and S.E. Ave. B., between E. 5th Street and 8th Street. This would square up the city limits on both sides of the Lamesa Highway.
5. The council discussed the demolition of old houses and old buildings and agreed to get the program moving faster.
6. The council agreed for another trailer house to be moved in at 306 S.W. 16th Street.
7. It was decided to enter into a survey and an inventory agree-

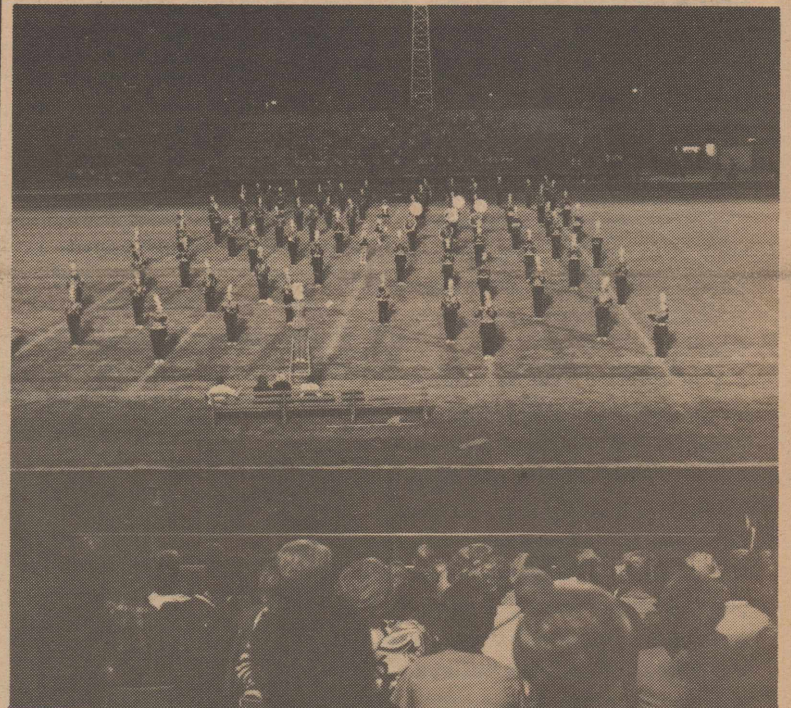


Leon Davis, age 59, minister of the Church of Christ in Loop, Texas, died at 12:05 p.m. last Saturday in route to a Lubbock hospital. Davis was involved earlier in a wreck as he crossed over Highway 83, going north, when his car, a 1967 Rambler, was struck by a 1969 Chevrolet pickup driven by 17-year-old Jimmy Dale McKibben of Lamesa.

The two vehicles slapped sides after the drivers tried to avoid a head-on at 11:20 a.m. at the only intersection in Loop. The driver of the pickup was not injured. He applied his brakes and skidded 156 feet. A spare tire ricocheted off another car and traveled another 828 feet up the highway. The car was hit on the driver's side, the pickup on the opposite side. Davis' wife rode in the ambulance to Seagraves and both she and Dr. Bill McCullough were present in the ambulance in route to Lubbock at the time of Davis' death.

Services were held Tuesday at 3 p.m. in the Ackerly High School Auditorium with Jack L. Mackey of Amarillo, officiating.

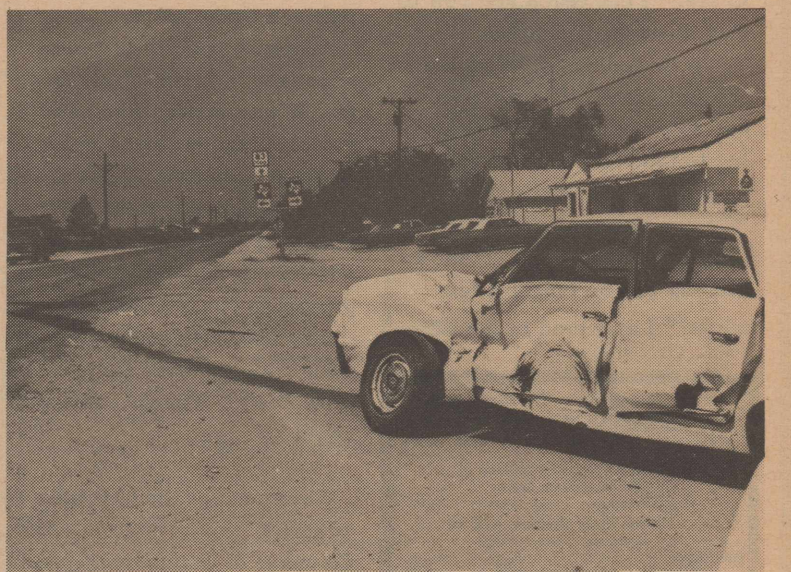

ANNUAL FARM TOUR

A free barbecue will be served on the annual farm tour tomorrow by the Higginbotham Cattle Company. The tour will be sponsored by the Gaines-Andrews Soil and Water Conservation District in cooperation with the extension crop's sub-committee. The tour will leave by private automobiles at 9 a. m. from the west side of the courthouse.

Representatives of the Soil Conservation Service and members of the Extension Service will be present at each stop to answer questions. The Outstanding Conservationist of the Year will be presented at one of the stops.

The tour will stop at the Marion Bowers farm west of Seminole where castor bean variety tests will be shown and explained. A cotton test will also be shown at this stop. A demonstration of broadcast cotton will be shown at the Willie Easter farm, and at the Higginbotham Cattle Company a brush control of destroyed mesquite will be shown.

Charles Mickelson, head of the local U. S. Soil Conservation Service Office, urges everyone interested in farming to attend.

GSPA TO SPONSOR REFERENDUM

Export sales and local market prices moved up simultaneously during July, reaching peaks for both since February of 1968. Elbert Harp, executive director of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, reported, "18,167,000 bushels were sold into the world trade last month which helped to strengthen the overall demand and local prices, with some elevators paying as high as \$1.95 per hundred this week."

The major part of the July sales were to Japan, Israel, and India. These sales are equal to the total production of Farmer County Texas, the nation's largest producer of grain sorghum or the combined total production of Sherman, Hansford, and Oldham counties. It would also take the total production of Yoakum, Terry, Gaines, and Dawson counties to fill these shipments.

Harp said, "The more demand that can be developed either locally or over-seas, the better the prices will be to our producers." GSPA is sponsoring a referendum in early October in which the grain farmers of the high plains and panhandle

will decide if they want to expand their sales and market prices through an extensive local and overseas sales promotion program. Upon passage, farmers will invest $\frac{1}{4}$ cent per 100 pounds to finance this market development and research program.

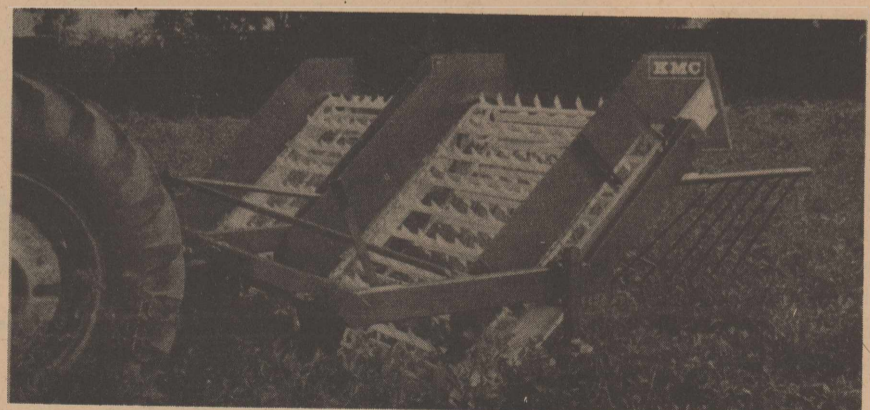

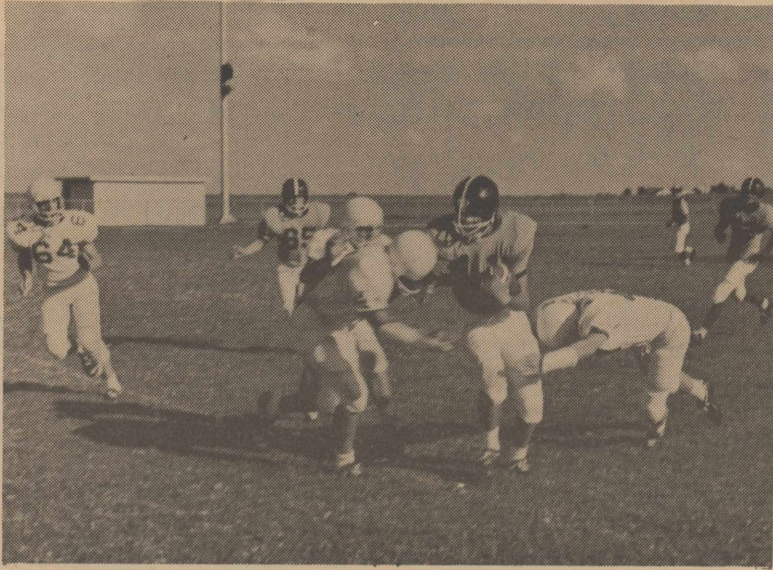

FRESHMAN WIN OVER BROWNFIELD 16 - 8

The Seminole Freshmen took the opening kick-off on their 30 yard line and drove the ball down the field 70 yards in 15 plays to score. Richard Mansell took the ball in from two yards out on a dive over the middle. The try for conversion was fumbled but Bert Bennett picked the ball up and passed to Mel Nelson for a 2 point conversion and the score was 8-0.

Brownfield came right back and 5 plays later they had moved the ball down to the Seminole 5 yard line. On the next play they tossed a sideline pass to score and then converted on an end sweep to the right to make the score 8-8.

The second half Seminole kicked off to Brownfield and then played tough defense for five plays and regained the football on about their own 30 yard line. From there they clipped off three and four yards a play and kept the ball for the rest of the 3rd quarter.

On the first play of the 4th quarter Donald Roberts carried over from the one and Ron Bartley converted the two pointer and the scoring ended 16-8 with the Seminole Freshmen out in front. At the game's end Seminole was on the Brownfield 18 yard line.

The coaches were real pleased with the boys. "Every boy played and played well", said Coach Hicks, "and we awarded the Head Hunter award to Ron Bartley, back; and Lineman to Tim Overbeck and Stanley Caffey. Actually they all should have gotten one."

Seminole had 17 first downs, 268 yards rushing, 3 yards passing, 15 yards penalized and 3 fumbles. Brownfield had 6 first downs, 153 yards rushing, 9 yards passing, 25 yards penalized and 2 fumbles.

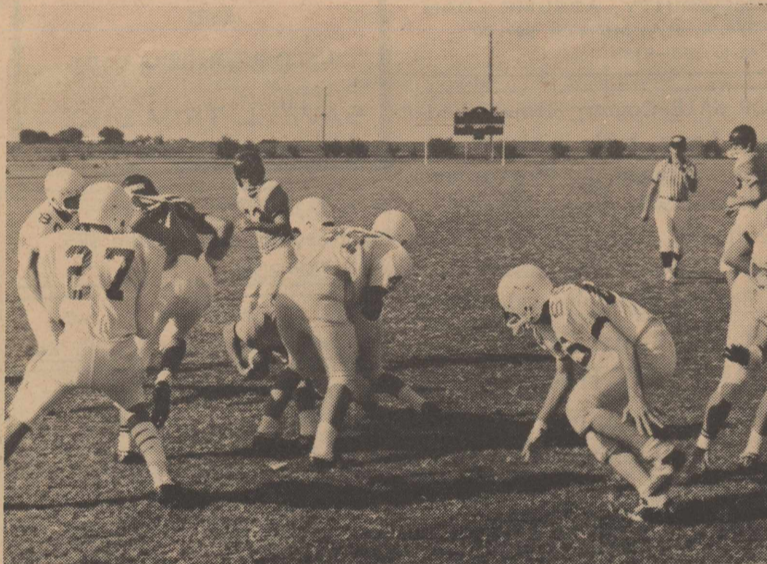

The stars on offense were Terry Ivy and Kregg Pierson. Defensive standouts were Robert Hitch, Renne Williams and Tommy Shuler.

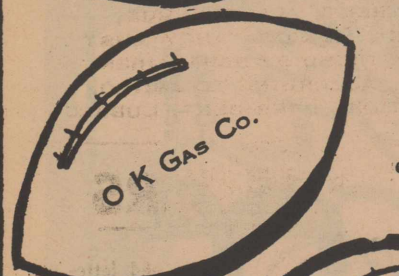
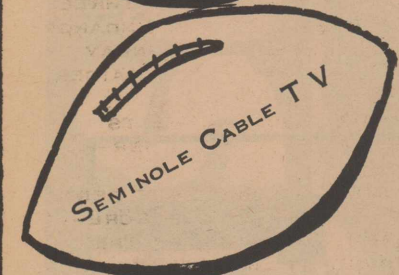
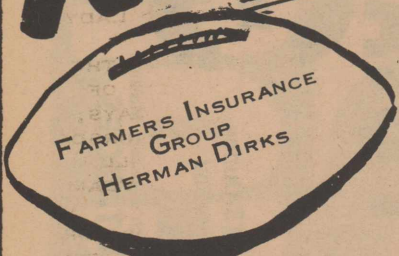

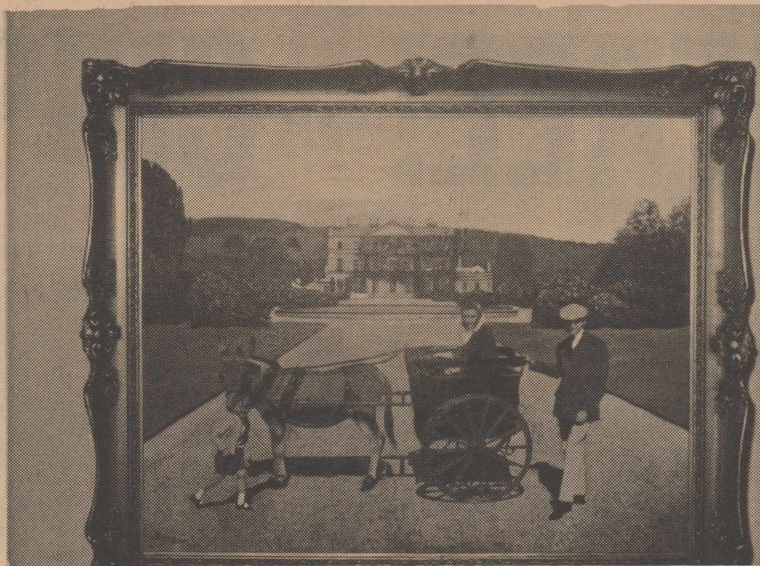

Small children are very curious about their surroundings. When riding in cars, they like to see what's going on. To obtain better vantage points, they often stand or place themselves in other dangerous positions.

You should not grant this temporary favor to your child, however, as a sudden stop, or a skid on an icy pavement could cause a serious permanent injury, even death.

The Insurance Information Institute reports that more children in the age group of one through four die from motor vehicle accidents than from either pneumonia or congenital malformations. Many could have been prevented with proper safety precautions.
