

Editorial

Appeals are being made for people of the school district, the city and the county to respect and take care of public property. (1) People with old cars in their yard and trash around their houses are being asked to care enough for their neighbors to clean up. You can receive help by calling 758-3621 or 758-3622. (2) If you have children playing on top of the Community Building, if you have children playing inside of the football field, if you have children carrying BB guns or pellet guns inside the City limits, please be considerate of neighbors and other tax payers. (3) If you use the city dump, please be considerate of the men who work there and dump in the area where the signs ask you to dump. More farmers have begun to use the city dump. If you use it, please do not dump on the roadway in, but go to where the signs direct you. Also do not set fire in the dump ground. Larger items like tires, old car bodies, and old trees are not covered up each night so you are asked not set fire to these. (4) If you attend public meetings at the Community Building, County Park Building, or other public meeting rooms, please use ash trays and not grind a burning cigarette or cigar into the floor. Somebody has to clean up. Besides it ruins the wax on the floor and many times leaves a scar. (It also costs money.) I doubt if the people who practice the above four things would appreciate people treating their floors, their homes, their property, or their rights the same way. Last week the question came up of how you could tell if an egg had a live chick, turkey, guinea, etc., in it. Also a few people said that a guinea egg was shaped just like a hen egg, but it's not. A guinea egg is sharper on one end than a hen egg and has a more pronounced largeness on the other end. Also it takes a week longer for them to hatch.

"Please, Mother, what makes my banty hen reach under her and make out like she's gonna peck the eggs?" "Son," a mother of wisdom said, "the eggs have to be turned each day, she's not pecking them, she's simply turning them over." Twenty-one days is a long time for a little boy of 8 or 9 years to wait for his pet banty hen to hatch her chicks.

I guess nicer mamas of the feathered flock were never made than a pet banty hen. Oh, she would fuss at me some and she would peck at me some, but she was as proud of that nest full of eggs as I was of her. She was a little brown hen with a few red feathers around her neck and she hatched many nests full of 10 to 14 eggs and raised nearly every one of them. She was a good mama. When she called her chicklets at feeding time or pulled a worm out of the ground they came bounding like expectant offsprings do when they have good parents.

She was one of the smaller mothers in the barnyard, but she was fierce to fight when the White Leghorns and the Rhode Island Reds made contest for her family's rations. It seems to me that her chicks grew the fastest, crowed the quickest and got bigger faster than any of the poultry around the farm.

"Mother," I said, "tell me how I can find out if the other half of her eggs is going to hatch. She had 7 little chicks

All Incumbents TWO SHOT - 2 KILLED Returned

Voting last Saturday in the city election and the school board election was light. One hundred ninety voted in the school board election when Rayford Bates, incumbent president of the school board, and Horace Jones, secretary, were returned unopposed with 177 votes and 175 votes respectively. In the city race the mayor and two aldermen drew more interest because the aldermen were opposed. A write-in vote for T. W. Alexander for mayor

fell short when he received only 30 votes of the 239 cast. C. O. Wright, incumbent, was returned as mayor with 209 votes for another term. Bill Webb outdistanced the field of four candidates for aldermen with 202 votes. His counterpart, another incumbent, J. B. Walden, received 169 votes. Running a distant third was Dick Kephart with 108 votes and W. D. Bennett with 92 votes. The total votes cast in the city election was 291.

Acie Huffman, 39, was pronounced dead at the scene Sunday morning at 9 a. m. after a blast from a shotgun in the stomach felled him. Fonzel Hoskins, 39, another Negro, was charged with murder in the shooting on the Weldon Smith farm, 15 miles west of Seminole on the Hobbs Highway. It seems that the shooting occurred after there had been music playing, drinking of beer and playing with the shotgun. Ella Mae and Acie had been picked up on the farm where they live near Payne's Corner earlier in the night and were met by Dorothy Merritt back where Hoskins was living. The party continued until morning. When Acie and Ella Mae got ready to go home it is reported that Hoskins did not want to take them, but Dorothy Merritt offered to carry them in her car. When Hoskins went back into the house to get something that he'd forgotten the shooting occurred. He declared it to be an accident, telling officers that Acie was his best friend. Services are pending.

and 6 eggs left. "Oh, there's a way we can tell," she said. "Go get the 6 eggs but don't keep them too long because we don't want them to get chilled."

I brought the eggs in and my mother had fixed some warm water in a pan, just enough to cover the eggs. She carefully placed the eggs in the water. "Watch the eggs," she said.

Every one of them rocked back and forth, back and forth, back and forth and back and forth. "That's a sign that there's a living chick in them. The moisture will do them good," she said, taking them back to their mother.

That evening two more eggs hatched, that night two more eggs hatched. One of the great mysteries was unfolded for a little boy when he saw the tiny crack come in the egg and he could hear a sound like the chirping of a bird. Pretty soon the crack becomes larger and larger and the baby chick exerts enough energy to split the egg wide open.

"How," I asked my mother, "can a baby chick live for 21 days without being fed with outside help?" "Son, the chick is formed out of the white of the egg and it lives on the yellow after life is started and for a few days after it's hatched. That's the reason they can ship them through the mail."

Two eggs were left unhatched and I tried one of the great experiments of my life. I cracked the eggs for both the chicks. Another sad lesson was learned. The baby chicks were alive. They were nearly ready to come into the world but an 8-year-old boy cannot perform a Caesarean on an egg.

That was one of the first dark days of my life. I had gone against one of Nature's laws and destroyed life. The two died, but little Mrs. Brown Mama raised 11 chicks and it was difficult to see one of them go into the frying pan. She raised the prettiest chicks and another great lesson was learned. God had placed the chickens and other farm animals here for us to eat.

If you want to find out if an egg you're trying to hatch still has life simply use warm water. If the egg moves, there's life inside. If the egg is still, there was no fertility or the mama was off the nest too long or some other problem.

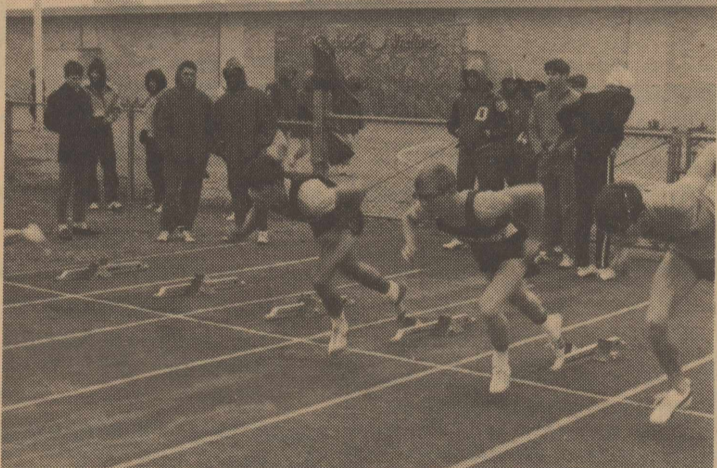

WE LEFT BANGKOK ON MONDAY AFTERNOON FOR KUALA LUMPUR AND SPENT 4 NIGHTS THERE. JUD WHITEFIELD TOOK US TO SEREMBAN ON THURSDAY. WHILE THERE, FRANK SPOKE TO A SPECIAL GATHERING OF THE CONGREGATION WE STARTED BEFORE WE LEFT MALAYSIA. THEY HAVE A MEMBERSHIP OF 80 AND NEARLY ALL WERE IN ATTENDANCE FOR THIS SPECIAL MEETING (WITH ONLY ONE DAY'S NOTICE).

AFTER THE SERVICES IN SEREMBAN ON THURSDAY EVENING, WE RETURNED TO KUALA LUMPUR AND LEFT FOR SINGAPORE ON THE FOLLOWING AFTERNOON. THE AIRLINE PUT US UP AT A HOTEL IN SINGAPORE. BOY WAS IT A FANCY ONE, THEY ALLOWED US \$2 A PIECE FOR 5 FOR DINNER, LUNCH AND \$1.50 FOR BREAKFAST. ALL TOGETHER, IT COST THE AIRLINES (QUANTAS, AN AUSTRALIAN COMPANY) OVER \$50 TO PUT US UP. JUST GLAD THAT IT WAS THEM AND NOT US.

IT WAS OUR IMPRESSION THAT THE FLIGHT FROM SINGAPORE WOULD FLY DIRECTLY TO COLOMBO. NEVERTHELESS, WHEN WE BOARDED AT 6:30 ON SATURDAY EVENING, WE FOUND THAT IT WENT BY WAY OF KUALA LUMPUR, SO WE WERE ABLE TO SEE THE OLD HOME TOWN ONCE MORE. THERE ARE SO MANY NEW BUILDINGS THERE. THEY ARE REALLY COMING TO THE FRONT. THE AIRPORT IS FABULOUS.

OUR FLIGHT ARRIVED AT 9:15 ON SATURDAY NIGHT AND AFTER CLEARANCE WITH THE CUSTOMS AND IMMIGRATION AT THE AIRPORT, WE TRAVELED BY BUS INTO COLOMBO, WHICH IS A JOURNEY OF 22 MILES. ON THIS PARTICULAR SATURDAY NIGHT WE STAYED AT THE GALLE FACE HOTEL AND THEN MOVED INTO THE HOUSE THE NEXT DAY. THE HOUSE AND PROPERTY HAD BEEN WATCHED AFTER BY SOME OF THE LOCAL PEOPLE SINCE THE DEPARTURE OF THE WHEELERS. MUCH TO OUR SURPRISE AND PLEASURE WE DISCOVERED THAT A.L. HARBIN AND HIS WIFE WERE HERE CONDUCTING A SERIES OF LECTURES. IT WAS CERTAINLY GOOD TO BE ASSOCIATED WITH THEM FOR THOSE FEW DAYS, SINCE THE FIRST FEW DAYS IN ANY PLACE ARE ALWAYS THE LONELY ONES. THEY LEFT YESTERDAY FOR MADRAS, INDIA. THEY PLAN ON CONDUCTING THESE SAME LECTURES IN SEVERAL COUNTRIES SO THEY WON'T ACTUALLY RETURN TO THE STATES UNTIL SOMETIME IN NOVEMBER. WE HAVE 3 BEDROOMS, ONE AND A HALF BATHS, A SMALL KITCHEN, NO BUILT IN CABINETS, BUT WE DO HAVE A NICE STOVE AND ICE BOX, BUT NO HOT WATER EXCEPT IN TWO OF THE BATHROOMS (SMALL HEATERS THAT HAVE TO BE LIT EVERY TIME YOU WANT HOT WATER, AND IT IS ONLY CONNECTED TO THE TUB.) OUR FRONT YARD IS THE ONLY YARD THAT WE HAVE. ONE BLESSING AFTER THE DISAPPOINTMENT WAS THE FACT THAT IT IS FURNISHED AND THAT WE HAVE LINENS, DISHES, POTS AND PANS, ETC. IF I HAD REALLY KNOWN JUST HOW MUCH WAS HERE, I WOULDN'T HAVE SENT SO MUCH. THE FURNITURE IS DANISH MODERN AND PRETTY NICE, FOAM RUBBER CUSHIONS. RUBBER IS PLENTIFUL HERE. THERE ARE NO BUILT IN CLOSETS THOUGH, JUST THE OLD TIME WARDROBE CABINETS.

WOULD YOU BELIEVE THAT I HAVE A COOK? THIS WAS ALMOST A NECESSITY. IF ANYTHING, I WAS NOT PREPARED FOR THE GROCERY SITUATION. I KNEW THAT IT WOULDN'T BE AS MODERN AS MALAYSIA BUT DIDN'T EXPECT IT TO BE QUITE SO BAD. THEY EXPORT VERY FEW THINGS. CAN YOU IMAGINE NOT EVEN BEING ABLE TO BUY A CAN OF PORK AND BEANS? YOU USUALLY GET HUNGRY FOR THE THINGS THAT YOU CAN'T GET. WE WENT BY AND OPENED AN ACCOUNT AT ONE OF THE STORES. THEY DON'T HAVE THE GOODS OUT ON THE SHELVES. THEY ONLY HAVE A SAMPLE OF SOME OF THE THINGS AND YOU ORDER FROM A BOOK. SENT A LIST YESTERDAY AND OUT OF EVERYTHING THAT I ORDERED, ALL THEY HAD WAS BUTTER AND ICE CREAM. WENT TO ANOTHER ONE AND THEY HAD MORE OF A SELECTION BUT THAT DOESN'T SAY MUCH. THEY DID HAVE MILK FOR LISA AND THAT IS SOMETHING. WE ARE ABLE TO GET COOKS, FRESH BUTTER AND RINSO WASHING SOAP. NO MILK EXCEPT THE BABY FORMULAS. THEY DO HAVE MILK BUT A SHORTAGE SO WE ARE NOT ABLE TO BUY IT. MOST EVERYTHING HAS TO BE GOTTEN FROM THE MEAT OR VEGETABLE MARKET AND START FROM SCRATCH. MARKETING IS JUST ABOUT AN EVERYDAY'S JOB. THE COOK DOES THE MARKETING, COOKING AND IRONING FOR \$20 A MONTH. HIS NAME IS DAVID. JOHNATHAN FOLLOWS HIM AROUND AND CALLS HIM DAVE. WE HAVE ANOTHER SERVANT THAT DOES THE WASHING, DISHES AND GENERAL CLEANING OF THE HOUSE AND AUDITORIUM. THEN THERE ARE TWO BOYS THAT LIVE UPSTAIRS IN THE SERVANTS QUARTERS. DON'T KNOW IF I'LL EVER GET USED TO HAVING DAVID AND RATNA UNDERFOOT. WE INHERITED THEM FROM THE WHEELERS. VERY LITTLE PRIVACY IN THIS LIFE WE HAVE CHOSEN. I AM GOING TO HAVE TO TEACH DAVID TO COOK SOME AMERICAN DISHES. WE HAVE EATEN SO MUCH CURRY THAT IT'S GOING TO START COMING OUT OUR EARS. 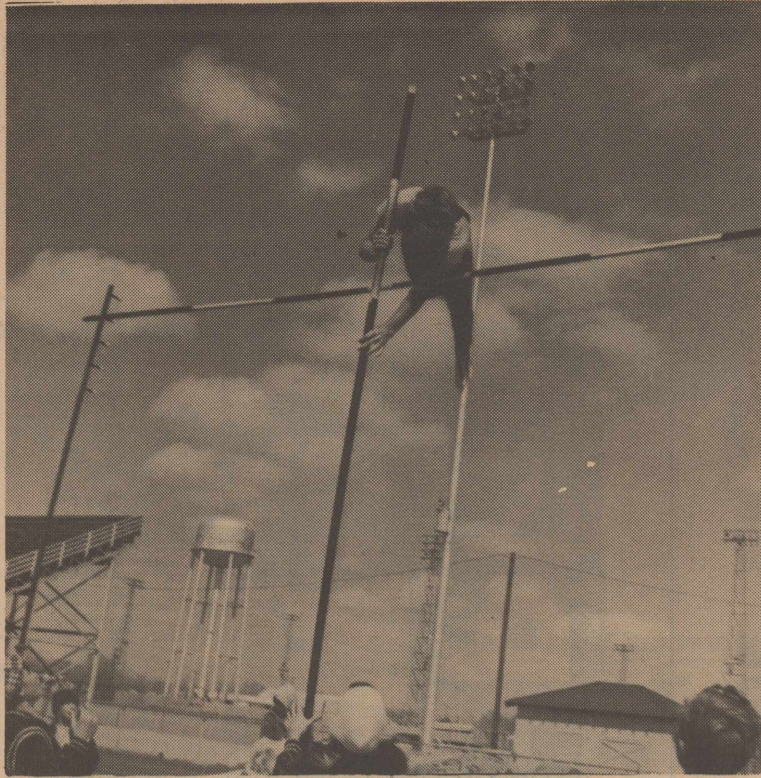

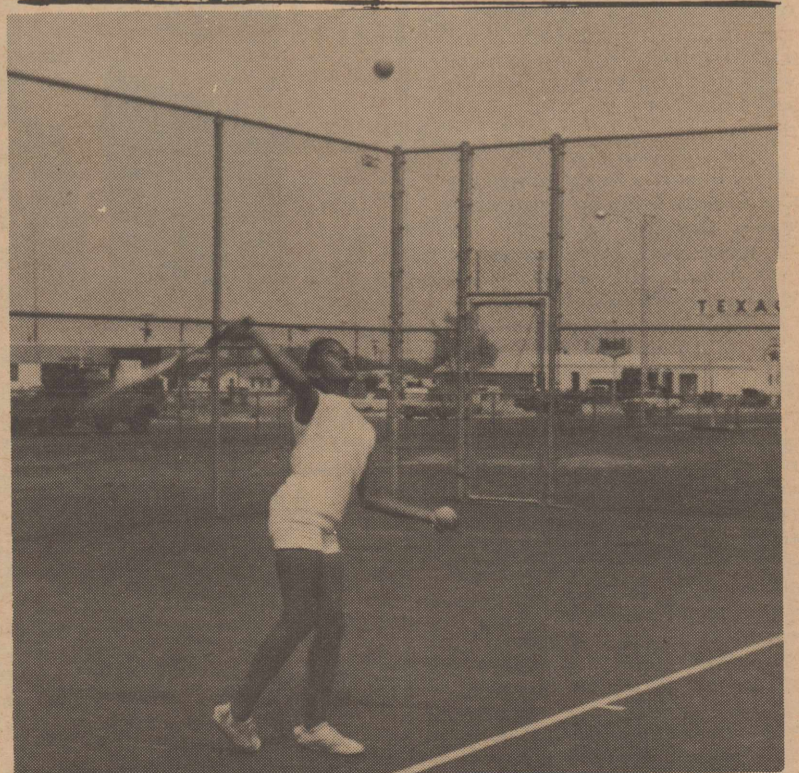
