It was during this time that the, now historic, Six-Day War broke out between Israel and the Arab nations. His first hand observations of this critical period in Israel's history along with a thorough study of the Bible has brought him to certain conclusions about the role of the Nation Israel and God's plan of world redemptions.

While he is still a young man, Mr. Fruchtenbaum's experience and insight has led to his being considered an expert on interpreting current events in the light of the Bible. He has often been asked by the Mission to serve as spokesman on these matters.


