## HEBREW CHRISTIAN TO SPEAK

Arnold G. Fruchtenbaum will be the speaker at South Seminole Baptist Church on April 26-29 at 7:30 p.m. and at 11:00 a.m. on A pril 26. Mr. Fruchtenbaum is a minister with the American Board of Missions to the Jews, and the Beth Sar Shalom Hebrew Christian Fellowship. He was won to Christ through that orginazation in 1957. He received orthodox Jewish training while a young boy and came to New York with his family in 1951.

He studied Hebrew archeology, and ancient history at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, working towards his Master of Arts Degree. It was during this time that the, now historic, Six-Day War broke out between Israel and the Arab nations. His first hand observations of this critical period in Israel's history along with a thorough study of the Bible has brought him to certain conclusions about the role of the Nation Israel and God's plan of world redemptions.
While he is still a young man, Mr. Fruchtenbaum's experience and insight has led to his being considered an expert on interpreting current events in the light of the Bible. He has often been asked by the Mission to serve as spokesman on these matters.
He is the author of the pamphlets entitled "Guitar Strums and Kosher Pickles" and Jewishness and Hebrew Christianity." Recently he was the featured speaker at a Word of Life rally in New York City.
