## 2500 ACRES OF HAY

### Potatoes - Lots Of Acres



The several thousand acres of potatoes in Gaines County have potatoes from very small to near baseball size at the present time. Prospects look good. The two shown here are about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches in diameter. Look carefully and you can see a five gallon grease bucket in the upper right hand corner, behind the potato plant. The plants themselves are about 2 feet high. Harvest will begin between the 4th and the 10th of July.



The 66 dies in this huge press wheel that produce the cubed alfalfa cost \$2500 per set. (Thank goodness they last a long time.) The upper picture shows the die wheel as the machines are going down the field. The lower picture shows the cubes as they push out of the dies and fall into the elevator that transfers them to the truck on the Paul Conditt and Jim Paul farm.

On the farm what can you do with five machines that cost near \$200,000.00? "One thing," says Paul Conditt and Jim Paul, who own the five, "you've got to keep them working."

The five new machines are self propelled John Deere Cubers that operate on farm land 15 miles west and 4 miles south of Seminole. Marvin Hays and Harvey Gatewood are other owners of like machines. Each machine is capable of cubing five tons of alfalfa hay per hour. The machines work something like this. After alfalfa has been cut, crimped and field cured to 10 to 12% moisture it is ready to be cubed. As the Cuber picks up the windrow, spray nozzles moisten the hay. This water releases a natural adhesive on the surface of legume plants to make a "glue" which, along with high pressure, securely bonds cubes. Water flow from the 1000-gallon tank can be easily and quickly adjusted to match ground speed and compensate for varying moisture content of the crop. A reel, auger, and two sets of feed rolls condense the material and deliver it to the cutterhead. A cylinder cutterhead chops and thoroughly mixes the hay and water. Two spiral knives with extremely hard tungsten-carbide cutting edges slice the crop to an average length of 13/8 inches. The cubes measure  $1\frac{1}{4}$ inch with an average length of about  $l_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$  inches.

The next question: Where in the world could anyone find enough material for five machines that could cube up to 10, 000 pounds each per hour? Twenty-five tons is a lot of anything.

It's also a lot of cow feed. Alfalfa hay is grown on land owned by Conditt and Paul on 19 quarter sections of land plus leased land. The hay is grown under Valley overhead irrigation systems that travel automatically under water pressure, circling approximately 130 to 140 acres each. The cost on these is \$16,000 to \$18,000 each, but that is another story.

The men spend from \$8.00 to \$12.00 per acre in fertilizer, with most of that being phosphorus and the balance nitrogen (example 11-48-0). The two men expect to produce 15,000 tons this year. At \$32.00 a ton that's about half a million dollars. "We've loaded as many as five truck loads per day, weighing 40,000 pounds, plus two bob-tail loads. We have run 360, 000 pounds per day through the three machines on this side of the operation."

The seven trailers (carrying upwards of 40, 000 pounds) plus two smaller trucks, have false bottoms in them. They simply back up over a conveyor belt to unload. The unloading takes approximately thirty minutes. The cubed alfalfa pellets are delivered to Hale Center, Cotton Center and Midland, Texas to cattle feed lots. Sometimes a truck can make two loads a day, but usually only one. Men growing alfalfa state that they will cut their crops five times and average about seven tons per acre for the year.

The crop lays on the ground a few days after it's cut, drying out. The machines run and irrigation is started immediately, putting on  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 inches every seven days. Twelve to fourteen feet swathers are used to cut and windrow the hay, running it through a crimper, making ready for the monster machines. With a pickup attachment the machine is fed. The cubes are elevated into a trailer pulled behind the machine that holds upwards of 19 to 20 ton. The trailers then are hydraulically dumped into waiting trucks. It takes sixteen employees to operate the Conditt farm, where three machines work, plus men driving the trucks. The operation is diversified. Besides eleven 4 sections in the Paul Conditt operation, there's 600 acres in cotton, 130 acres in potatoes, 130 in green beans, 85 in peanuts and 500 acres in wheat. The balance is in milo. It's quite an operation, but the automatic cubing machine is fast putting the hay baler out of business. Trucks are loaded automatically and unloaded automatically. The feed is fed to the cattle automatically. As progress marches on farmers in Gaines County are trying to keep step. Paul Conditt, Jim Paul and others have made giant strides.

### City Council

Ten members of the Chamber of Commerce met with the City Council Monday night to discuss the possibility of the City participating in the financial burden of the Chamber's expense. Glen Cavitt, president of the Chamber of Commerce, spoke for the following people: Brom Marchbanks, George Cristy, Bob Clark, Judy Treadaway, Jack Bonner, Robert Jones, Jim Davis, Don Cates and Gene Hawkins.

It was pointed out that a new manager had been employed by the chamber and that approximately \$6000.00 a year was needed by the Seminole Area Chamber of Commerce to do the following things:

- 1. Pay a chamber manager enough salary to encourage him to stay on for a number of years and do a good job.
- 2. To have enough money for travel to check on new industry and encourage businesses to move to Seminole.
- 3. To help the chamber better serve the complete area.

Question by Karl Don Hughes - Is there any other place that the chamber can get the needed funds? Answer - No, we have a better percentage of membership than most of our size towns. We get more per year for membership than most (\$37.50 for individuals and \$75.00 for businesses).

Question by the mayor: Do you have any outlying members? Yes, about 25 farmers, 7 gins and others.

Can the county share in this expense? Answer: We met with them today. We hope they can.

In a statement by Alton Freeman, city attorney, he said, "We can check with the municipal league of attorneys to see if this is feasible. Also I'm sure the county attorney will check with the attorney general. Seminole is a general law city and not a chartered city.

The mayor and several council members voiced their concern in wanting a good chamber and their concern for it doing a better job. The chamber members left with the assurance that the city would check into same and consider possibilities.

- 2. C. A. Tubbs, engineer, was present and recommended the acceptance of all paving units completed.
- 3. The highway department submitted a recommendation to round off the Enco corner at Main and Ave. A., starting 20 feet north and 20 feet west, on a 44 foot radius, removing approximately 9 feet so truckers would not interfere with other traffic lanes when turning.
- 4. Also the highway department asked that the two lights be synchronized so that progress to the north and south would not be hindered.
- 5. Amerada Hess advised that the oil well drilled at S.W. 6th St. was being used totally for a water injection well.





AUSTIN--CONTRARY TO A RECENT NATIONAL NEWS SER-VICE STORY, THE ANTIQUITIES CODE OF TEXAS IS NOT SPOILING THE FUN OF AMATEUR TREASURE HUNTERS, COL-LECTORS AND BEACHCOMBERS.

THE WRATH OF SCORES OF HOBBYISTS WAS AROUSED WHEN A NEWS STORY IN EARLY FEBRUARY MISTAKENLY IM-PLIED THAT THE ANTIQUITIES COMMITTEE PLANNED TO REGULATE ALL SUCH ACTIVITIES WHEN CONDUCTED ON PRIVATE LAND.

DR. FRED WENDROF, CHAIRMAN OF THE ANTIQUITIES COMMITTEE, ISSUED A CLARIFYING STATEMENT MARCH 17, IN WHICH HE SAID, "INFORMAL COLLECTING INVOLVING NO EXCAVATION DOES RELATIVELY LITTLE DAMAGE TO OUR ARCHEOLOGICAL AND HISTORI CAL RESOURCES, THUS, TO PROHIBIT IT WOULD BE AN UNNECESSARY INFRINGEMENT ON A POPULAR ACTIVITY. IN ADDITION, A REGULATION OF THIS TYPE WOULD PROBABLY BE UNINFORCEABLE.

"WE NEED A BROAD BASE OF PUBLIC SUPPORT AND CON-FIDENCE IF WE ARE TO BE SUCCESSFUL IN OUR PRIMARY GOAL TO PROTECT THE FAST-DWINDLING HISTORICAL RE-SOURCES OF THE STATE FROM NEEDLESS LOSS. I BELIEVE THAT THE MAIN SOURCE FOR THIS SUPPORT LIES WITH THE COLLECTORS AND AMATEURS, MANY OF WHOM ARE ALREADY WELL AWARE OF THE NEED FOR PERSERVATION."

HE EMPHASIZED, HOWEVER, THAT THE ANTIQUITIES CODE REGULATES ALL TYPES OF EXCAVATION OR DIGGING ON STATE PROPERTY AND ON PROPERTY OWNED BY POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OF THE STATE.

IT ALSO REGULATES SUCH ACTIVITIES ON PRIVATE LANDS WHICH HAVE BEEN DECLARED STATE ARCHEOLOGICAL LAND-MARKS, BUT AT PRESENT NONE HAVE BEEN SO DESIGNATED.

B. C. Norton, commissioner, advised the News that besides the county tax, state tax and the school tax, that 40¢ per 100 should have been added for a county equalization tax and 30¢ should have been added for county paving tax. This would be 70¢ per 100 added to the present tax schedule. (We hang our heads in shame.)

This does not include city tax. Also the school board has not set a tax rate. The above chart figured \$2 per \$100 of the value used for tax purposes. In figuring your approximate tax use the value given as set by the apprasial company, multiply by 16%, then that total by the \$1 per \$100 county tax, the \$.37 per \$100 state tax and the \$2 per \$100 (will probably be changed) school tax, plus the additional 70¢ paving and equalization tax.






