MAN SHOT

DALE WAYNE WEIR, AGE 20, A DENVER CITY BOY, HAS BEEN TRANSFERRED BACK TO SEMINOLE BY SHERIFF ED WELCH AFTER SPENDING ONE NIGHT IN THE DENVER CITY HOSPITAL AFTER HE WAS SHOT BY SHERIFF'S DEPUTY TONY SIMMONS IN SEAGRAVES LAST SATURDAY. BROWNFIELD POLICE WERE HOLDING YOUNG WEIR AND HAD ADVISED THE SHERIFF OF GAINES COUNTY TO PICK HIM UP. HE HAD GOTTEN AWAY FROM DEPUTIES THE DAY BEFORE ONLY TO BE RECAPTURED. DEPUTY SIMMONS HAD BEEN WARNED TO KEEP WEIR HANDCUFFED. HE ASKED TO GO TO THE REST ROOM WHERE HE COULD TAKE SOME MEDICINE. HE WAS OBLIGED BY STOPPING IN SEAGRAVES AT THE SINGLETON SERVICE STATION. COMING OUT OF THE SERVICE STATION, HE RAN AROUND THE BUILDING, HEADING NORTH-NORTHWEST--STILL HANDCUFFED. SIMMONS DROVE HIS CAR ABOUT 3 BLOCKS STOPPING IN A WHEAT FIELD. HE ORDERED WEIR TO STOP ON THREE OCCASIONS, SHOT OVER HIS HEAD TWICE--WARNING SHOTS, AND SHOT HIM ONE TIME IN THE UPPER FLESHY PART OF THE LEFT LEG. HE THEN CARRIED HIM BACK TO HIS CAR AND THEN ON TO THE SEAGRAVES HOSPITAL ONLY TO FIND DR. BILL MCCULLOUGH WAS NOT AVAILABLE. WEIR WAS SENT ON TO THE DENVER CITY HOSPITAL.

SIMMONS HAD TO BE BROUGHT TO THE HOSPITAL IN SEMINOLE AFTER RUNNING WEIR AND CARRYING HIM BACK TO THE DEPUTY CAR WHEN HE WAS AFFECTED BY HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE. HE WAS OUT OF THE LOCAL HOSPITAL ON SUNDAY.

WEIR WAS PICKED UP BY THE BROWNFIELD POLICE AFTER VIOLATING PROBATION.

Bicka Bass Dies

Little miss Bicka Bass, age 10, died Thursday enroute to a Lubbock hospital after being injured at 2:45 p. m. Wednesday in a pickup-car accident. The accident occurred between Autry's Cafe and Memorial Hospital on the Hobbs Highway when Isidro A. Castillo attempted a left hand turn into the cafe, evidently not seeing a 1967 Ford, being driven by Leta King in which Bicka was

a passenger. The death vehicle was headed east in the south bound traffic. The 1968 Ford pickup driven by Castillo was headed west. He turned into the cafe to pick up his employer Bob Moffat from Lamesa.

The near headon collision caused head injuries and lacerations to Bicka, the 10 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth

Ranch Properties, Inc. are owners of some 8500 acres of land with approximately half of it lying in Gaines and Yoakum Counties. Their 2080 acres of land in Gaines County is located 21 miles west and 4 miles south of the Hobbs Highway. Probably the best crop of wheat that's ever been raised in this area is located on one section of land. The four quarters of land were grazed earlier in the year by sheep and were irrigated by four circular automatic Valley sprinkler systems. They made a complete circle seven times in the last seven weeks, putting on approximately 17 inches of water.

Some of the stools of wheat are producing from 14 to 16 rise zones, with mashes of 4 to 5 seeds. The wheat will soon be ready for harvest and two quarters of Del Monte beans will be planted. The other half section will be made ready and probably be planted in alfalfa.

FARM PROGRAMS HAVE PROVISION FOR CROP LOSSES

IF WEATHER PREVENTED PLANTING OF COTTON, WHEAT, OR FEED GRAINS BY PRODUCERS SIGNED UP IN THESE 1970 FARM PROGRAMS, THEY NEED NOT LOSE PROGRAM BENEFITS, REPORTED TROY MARTIN, CHAIRMAN OF THE GAINES COUNTY ASCS COMMITTEE.

HE SAID THAT IF THE COUNTY ASC COMMITTEE DETERMINES AN ACREAGE OF COTTON, WHEAT, OR FEED GRAIN COULD NOT BE PLANTED DURING THE NORMAL PLANTING SEASON BECAUSE OF FLOOD, DROUGHT, OR OTHER NATURAL DISASTER, THE PRODUCER STILL CAN EARN PROGRAM PAYMENTS. THE SAME IS TRUE FOR FARM PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS WHOSE CROPS ARE DESTROYED BY NATURAL FORCES.

IN SUCH CASES, PRODUCERS MUST FILE REQUESTS FOR ACREAGE CREDIT CERTIFYING THEY HAVE BEEN PREVENTED FROM CARRYING OUT NORMAL OPERATIONS.

THE FIRST THING A FARMER SHOULD DO, TROY SAID, IS GET IN TOUCH WITH HIS COUNTY ASCS OFFICE AND REPORT THE SITUATION. HE WILL RECEIVE A FULL EXPLANATION ON "PREVENTED ACREAGE" PROVISIONS IN THE 1970 FARM PROGRAMS. APPROVAL OF PROGRAM BENEFITS IN THESE CASES RESTS WITH THE COUNTY ASC COMMITTEE. PRODUCERS FILING REQUESTS FOR ACREAGE CREDIT MUST HAVE MADE A GENUINE EFFORT TO PLANT AND GROW THE CROP IN A WORKMANLIKE MANNER. THE ASC COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN REMINDED FARMERS THAT THE PROVISIONS APPLY ONLY TO FARMERS WHO SIGNED UP IN THE 1970 FEED GRAIN, WHEAT, AND COTTON PROGRAMS AND THEN WERE UNABLE TO PLANT OR GROW THE PROGRAM CROPS BECAUSE OF NATURAL DISASTER.

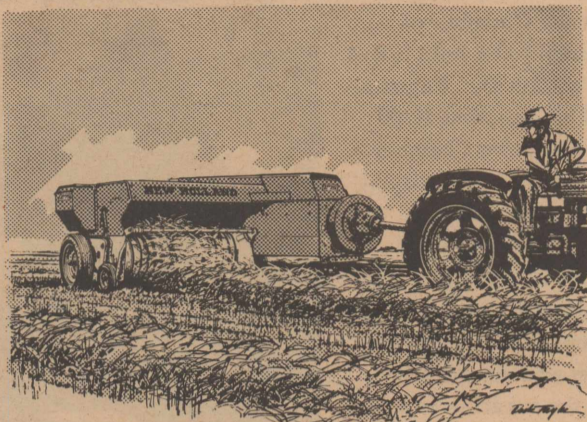

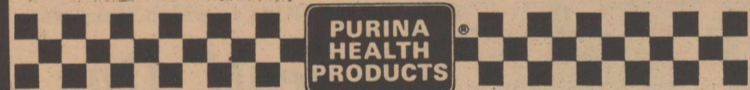

Information From Social Security Office

THIS IS AN IMPORTANT REMINDER TO EVERYONE FROM THE SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE!

MONTHLY PREMIUMS FOR THE DOCTOR BILL PART OF MEDICARE WILL GO UP ON JULY 1, 1970. THE NEW PREMIUM FOR MOST PEOPLE WILL BE \$5.30 MONTHLY, AN INCREASE OF \$1.30 OVER THE CURRENT PREMIUM.

THE DOCTOR BILL PART OF MEDICARE IS FINANCED BY THE PREMIUMS BENEFICIARIES PAY, MATCHED DOLLAR FOR DOLLAR BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.

THE PREMIUM INCREASE IS NECESSARY BECAUSE OF RISING MEDICAL COSTS. EACH YEAR THE FINANCING IS EVALUATED BY THE SECRETARY OF HEALTH, EDUCATION AND WELFARE.

THE LAW REQUIRES THAT PREMIUMS BE RAISED EACH YEAR THE COST OF THE PROGRAM INDICATES A NEED. THE LAST PREMIUM INCREASE WAS IN JANUARY, 1968 WHEN PREMIUMS WERE RAISED TO \$4.00 MONTHLY.

SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFICIARIES RECEIVING CASH PAYMENTS WILL HAVE THE ADDITIONAL PREMIUMS HELD OUT OF THEIR CHECKS BEGINNING WITH THE CHECK DELIVERED ABOUT AUGUST 3, 1970. Lee Lynn Clardy was one of my cousins. He was more like a town cousin. He didn't live in town but at Woodland Heights and he didn't have to work much. And then he was sick a good bit and they kinda petted him.

When he was 12 or 13 years old he was the one who got after his little brother, John, for cussing so much and John said, "Well, I don't know why you gripe at me for cussing, you cuss yourself." "Why, sure I cuss," he said, but you're young and I'm old and hard."

Lynn is the cousin that caused me to get a few whippings. For some reason he wasn't one of my favorite people. He always wanted to play hooky but ended up not going, so he could tell 'em where we went. He's the one that wasn't a very good marble player and told on me for playing "keeps". He's the one that agitated the fight, but would never fight and told on the ones who did the fighting. He always told his mama and his mama told the teachers or told my mama or my old maid aunt. He caused me a lot of problems.

His mother called my mother one time (when we were about 10 or 11) and said, "Are Walter and Leonard going to go to the birthday party?" "Yes," she was told. "Can Lynn go with them?" "Yes," was the reply.

Well, when Mama informed us that we were taking Lynn we told her "We can't take him, we're both riding the same horse."

The party was at Truitt Polk's house near Club Lake, about 4 miles away. She said, "It won't hurt for all three of you to ride the same horse." My little brother and I were mad. He was always telling on us. It was out of our way and we just wasn't gonna

take him. "You can either take him or stay at home. Remember he's your cousin."

We took him, but we framed up on him. He made fun of us 'cause he made us come and get him. My little brother was a smart kid. He said, "I tell you what let's do. We trotted that poor horse four miles. That was the roughest four miles that any kid ever rode. He thought it was powerful funny at first. (He didn't ride much.) By the time we were half way he was asking us to slow down. At the 3/4 mark he was pleading for us to slow down. By the time we got there he was making us some future promises.

It must have been a good party, I don't remember, but me and Leonard was looking forward to the ride home. The other one drove home. If you think that ride over there was rough it was a picnic compared to the ride home.

We never got to see the scabs on his sitting down place. I don't remember till yet whether we was punished over it or not but his mother told my mother that Lee Lynn had to eat standing up for days and days. My grandma shamed us. My old maid aunt shamed us and I dread seeing my mother till this good day, just talking about it.

Leonard, have you been able to work up any sympathy for him and do you remember about a week later when you said you forgot and kicked him? You've never been able to make me believe that.

Well, you win a few and you lose a few but I'll tell you, Bud, we won that one.
