Ranch Properties, Inc. are owners of some 8500 acres of land with approximately half of it lying in Gaines and Yoakum Counties. Their 2080 acres of land in Gaines County is located 21 miles west and 4 miles south of the Hobbs Highway. Probably the best crop of wheat that's ever been raised in this area is located on one section of land. The four quarters of land were grazed earlier in the year by sheep and were irrigated by four circular automatic Valley sprinkler systems. They made a complete circle seven times in the last seven weeks, putting on approximately 17 inches of water.

Some of the stools of wheat are producing from 14 to 16 rise zones, with mashes of 4 to 5 seeds. The wheat will soon be ready for harvest and two quarters of Del Monte beans will be planted. The other half section will be made ready and probably be planted in alfalfa.

Lee Lynn Clardy was one of my cousins. He was more like a town cousin. He didn't live in town but at Woodland Heights and he didn't have to work much. And then he was sick a good bit and they kinda petted him.

When he was 12 or 13 years old he was the one who got after his little brother, John, for cussing so much and John said, "Well, I don't know why you gripe at me for cussing, you cuss yourself."
"Why, sure I cuss," he said, but you're young and I'm old and hard."

Lynn is the cousin that caused me to get a few whippings. For some reason he wasn't one of my favorite people. He always wanted to play hooky but ended up not going, so he could tell 'em where we went. He's the one that wasn't a very good marble player and told on me for playing "keeps". He's the one that agitated the fight, but would never fight and told on the ones who did the fighting. He always told his mama and his mama told the teachers or told my mama or my old maid aunt. He caused me a lot of problems.

His mother called my mother one time (when we were about 10 or 11) and said, "Are Walter and Leonard going to go to the birthday party?" "Yes," she was told. "Can Lynn go with them?" "Yes," was the reply.

Well, when Mama informed us that we were taking Lynn we told her "We can't take him, we're both riding the same horse."

The party was at Truitt Polk's house near Club Lake, about 4 miles away. She said, "It won't hurt for all three of you to ride the same horse." My little brother and I were mad. He was always telling on us. It was out of our way and we just wasn't gonna

take him. "You can either take him or stay at home. Remember he's your cousin."

We took him, but we framed up on him. He made fun of us 'cause he made us come and get him. My little brother was a smart kid. He said, "I tell you what let's do. Let's make him ride right behind the saddle and one of us will ride behind him and we'll trot the horse at the roughest gait and the one sitting behind him will hold on tight to him and he'll get the roughest ride he ever got."

We trotted that poor horse four miles. That was the roughest four miles that any kid ever rode. He thought it was powerful funny at at first. (He didn't ride much.) By the time we were half way he was asking us to slow down. At the 3/4 mark he was pleading for us to slow down. By the time we got there he was making us some future promises.

It must have been a good party, I don't remember, but me and Leonard was looking forward to the ride home. The other one drove home. If you think that ride over there was rough it was a picnic compared to the ride home.

We never got to see the scabs on his sitting down place. I don't remember till yet whether we was punished over it or not but his mother told my mother that Lee Lynn had to eat standing up for days and days. My grandma shamed us. My old maid aunt shamed us and I dread seeing my mother till this good day, just talking about it.

Leonard, have you been able to work up any sympathy for him and do you remember about a week later when you said you forgot and kicked him? You've never been able to make me believe that.

Well, you win a few and you lose a few but I'll tell you, Bud, we won that one.
