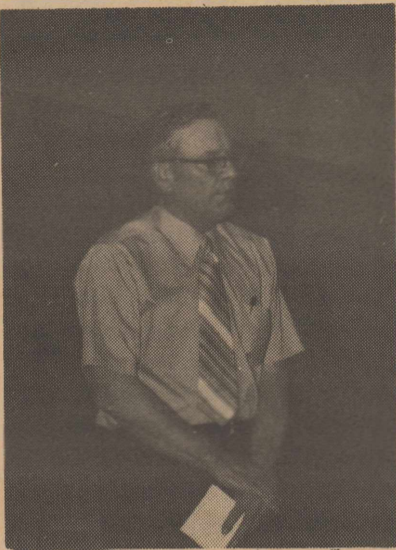

Funeral services for Mrs. Menerva Jane Wescott, 86, were held Saturday, August 1, 1970, at 3:00 p. m. in the First Methodist Church. Dr. Tilden B. Armstrong, pastor officiated, assisted by Rev. Preston Florence, retired Methodist minister and Rev. Emmett Roberts, pastor of the Fairview Baptist Church. Burial was in Seminole Cemetery under the direction of Seminole Memorial Funeral Home.

Mrs. Wescott was preceded in death by her husband, Claude Hale Wescott, on May 18, 1938 and an infant son, Claude Hale, Jr. The Wescotts moved to Gaines County in 1905. In 1907 they returned to Dunn, Texas, moving back to Gaines County and Seminole in 1921. She died Thursday in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital after an extended illness.

Survivors include four sons, C. T., Ivory and Bill, all of Seminole, and J. V. of Hart; three daughters, Velma Wescott and Mrs. Dave Ridens, both of Seminole and Anna Lee Wescott of Odessa; a sister, Mrs. Gertie Wescott of Big Spring; twenty grandchildren and twenty-eight great-grandchildren.

\$20,000 Pledged

Today is Wednesday and after the public meeting last Thursday night I am proud of my hometown. From the July 22, issue of the News, "Whatever it takes (within reason) to secure doctors is what we must do. If it takes the price of a clinic, if it takes free rent for a year, let's do it. If it takes something else, let's obtain it."

Two hundred, twenty-four people, including doctors, lawyers, merchants, business people, farmers, teachers, housewives and politicians accomplished what many people said would be impossible. After 1½ hours discussion a good time was had by all. Lowell Moore stood up and stood tall and really got things moving when he said, "I'll give a thousand dollars." Tommie Roberts said, "I'll give five hundred dollars." "Robert Jameson gives five hundred dollars," by wife. And then, probably what was the highlight of the evening, Hyle Doss announced in hushed tones that Dayton Elam was giving \$500 and he was matching it. Near \$20,000 was pledged in a matter of 20 minutes to lease and/or purchase the clinic facilities owned by Dr. Dow and Mrs. Hilde Koberg.

Glen Cavitt acted as Master of Ceremonies. The meeting was sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. The fund contributed to will be known as the Seminole Clinic Fund. Bill Curry, local attorney will work with the hospital board to set up a tax exempt organization and also to distribute funds.

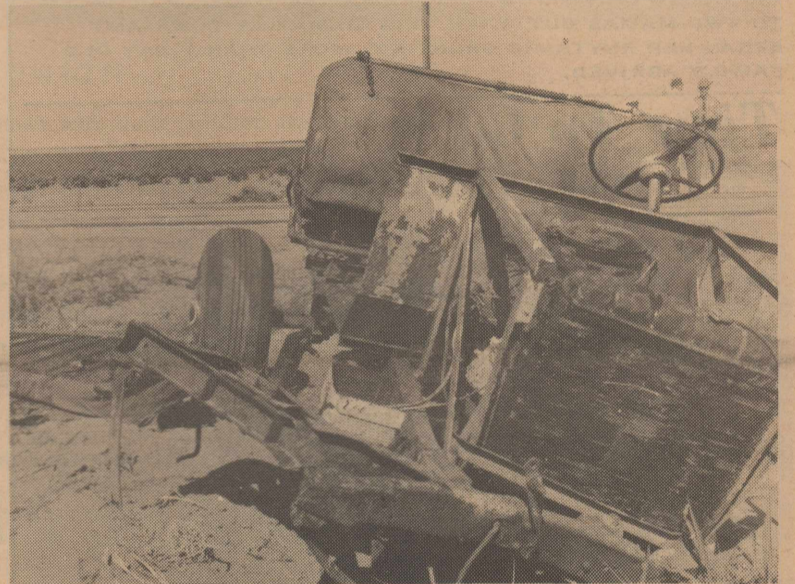

Ed Rodgers reported on Tuesday that he hopes to hear from two doctors by this coming weekend, concerning their plans of whether or not they will move to Seminole. Also Bill Curry reported that he doubted seriously, because of the nature of the Seminole Clinic Fund, that money donated would be tax deductible. More will be reported later. In discussing the legality of the county buying a facility such as a clinic he said, "I feel it would be near impossible to draft legislation to authorize purchase by the county and include in that legislation where all lawyers, including attorney general, would consider constitutional."

Last Friday at 5:15 p. m. Stanley Allen, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Allen, hit a 1970 Ford Maverick on Farm to Market Road 6 miles east and 2 miles north of Seminole. Mike Ray Presley was a passenger in the sand buggy driven by Allen when the accident occurred. Enrino Romon Davila, age 20, from Seagraves, Texas was headed north on the FM Road when his auto was struck on the right side by the sand buggy, headed west. Young Allen received a broken right leg and a cracked vertebra. Davila's wife, Raquel, and one month old baby received cuts and abrasions and were treated at Memorial Hospital, where Mrs. Davila remains. Presley was uninjured.

The 1970 Ford Maverick was a total loss. The front wheels off the stripped down were carried 300 feet north from the point of impact. The complete front frame of the Allen vehicle was left at a right angle to the rest of the frame. Kenneth Selman, TDPS, worked the accident.

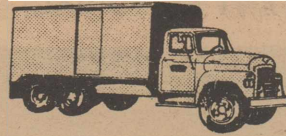
SEMINOLE HEALTH AND HUMANITY, INC. FORMED ON JULY 20

On July 20 a group was formed under the name of Seminole Health and Humanity, Inc., with a purpose in mind of loaning money to medical students and / or new doctors to encourage them to locate in Seminole. The first meeting of the non-profit corporation was held on Monday, August 3.

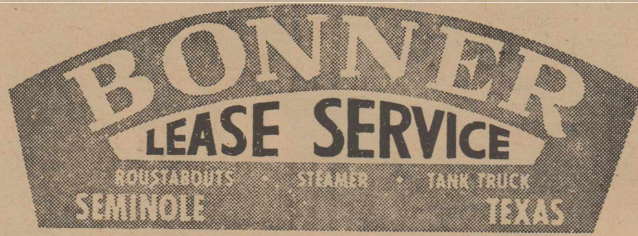
Richard Watts was elected president, D. G. Hoffman 1st vice president, Jameil Aryain 2nd vice president, Helen Bass secretary, and Dwayne Herman treasurer. Also an application was signed Monday to the Internal Revenue Service, declaring it a tax exempt corporation. Exhibits proving such will be sent within a few days. It is hoped by the group that clearance with the IRS will take place within 60 days. If it is so declared then all contributions made to "Seminole Health and Humanity, Inc." and all contributions made to it in the future will get same tax treatment as church contributions.

A senior medical student from Galveston, Wyatt Howell, will receive the first money loaned by this non-profit corporation. (Editor's note: This is a different group altogether than the Seminole Clinic group and is another way that a doctor may be obtained. When the money is repaid it, in turn, will be loaned to another worthy student.)

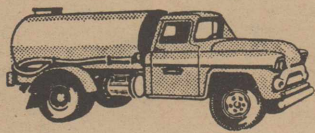

AMARILLO, TEXAS... July 27,
Consolidated net income of Pioneer Natural Gas Company and subsidiaries for the quarter ending June 30, 1970, amounted to \$1,523,980 according to figures released today by Burton P. Smith, President. This compares with \$1,352,919 for the second quarter of 1969, restated to reflect acquisitions made in 1969 on a pooling of interests basis.
For the first six months of 1970, the consolidated net income amounted to \$4,114,507 compared to \$3,640,121.

Earnings per share for the second quarter of 1970 amounted to 21 cents on 7,416,007 average shares outstanding during this period. This compares with 18 cents per share on the 7,396,934 average shares outstanding during the same period last year adjusted to reflect acquisitions made in 1969, on a pooling of interests basis. Earnings per share for the same period in 1969, as restated.

The report for the second quarter will be mailed to the stockholders about August 15.

PUBLIC NOTICE

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.

"B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

ance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

For some reason or other I never did consider hully-gully a form of gambling. I can still get real excited thinking about the game, the great enjoyment I used to get out of winning.

To understand the game of hully-gully at its best, you really need to have lived down on Pecan Bayou or on the Jim Ned River or maybe even Willis Creek.

Hully-gully could be played with from 2 to 8 or 10 boys. When it came your time to hully-gully, you enclosed your hands, leaving an open space, and each of the opposing players guessed how many pecans you had in the cup of your two hands. If there were several players, they put down in front of them how many pecans they thought you had. They paid in the amount they missed the guess. Then each opponent had his turn before it comes back to you.

Now the reason that Brown County was such a good hully-gully country was that there were many different size pecans. A smart opponent kept his paying pecans piled up or in a container in front of him, but his hully-gully ones he kept in his pockets. An expert moved his little pecans from one side to the other occasionally or to a back pocket. When your opponent (if he was a good player) began to hully-gully or rattle the pecans together in his hands, you observed

Get Ready For School

Pre-registration for Seminole students in the first six grades will be held August 12, 13 and 14, school administrators announced today. Pupils in these grades may register on any one of these days in the office of the building principal between the hours of 9:00 a. m. to 12 noon, or from 1:00 to 4:00 p. m.

Pupils in the first five grades who live west of the center of 11th Street, south of the Hobbs Highway, and west of Cemetery Road will attend the F. J. Young Elementary School. Also bus pupils who rode buses last year driven by Bennett, Sooter, McGehee, Hutchins, Robertson, Patterson, and Hughes will enroll at the Young School.

All other pupils in the first three grades will register at the Primary School on the central campus.

All fourth and fifth grade pupils not in the Young district and all sixth grade pupils will enroll at the Elementary School, also at the central campus.

There will be no general pre-registration for seventh and eighth grade pupils if they attended school here last year as they will enroll on August 24, the opening day of school. Pupils in these grades who did not attend school in Seminole last year should report to the Junior High Library at 9:00 a. m. on Wednesday, August 19. These pupils should bring pencils and report promptly by 9:00 o'clock as placement tests will begin at that time.

Registration for high school students will begin on Monday, August 17, with seniors enrolling from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon and juniors in the afternoon from 1:00 - 4:00 p. m. Sophomores will register on the morning of the 18th and freshmen in the afternoon, with the same hours as on the previous day.

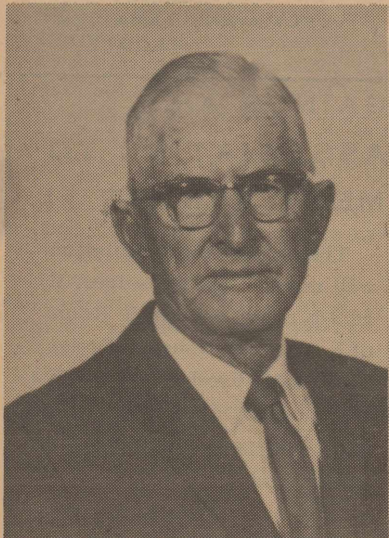
Pupils in all grades who are unable to pre-register may register on the opening day of school, Monday, August 24.

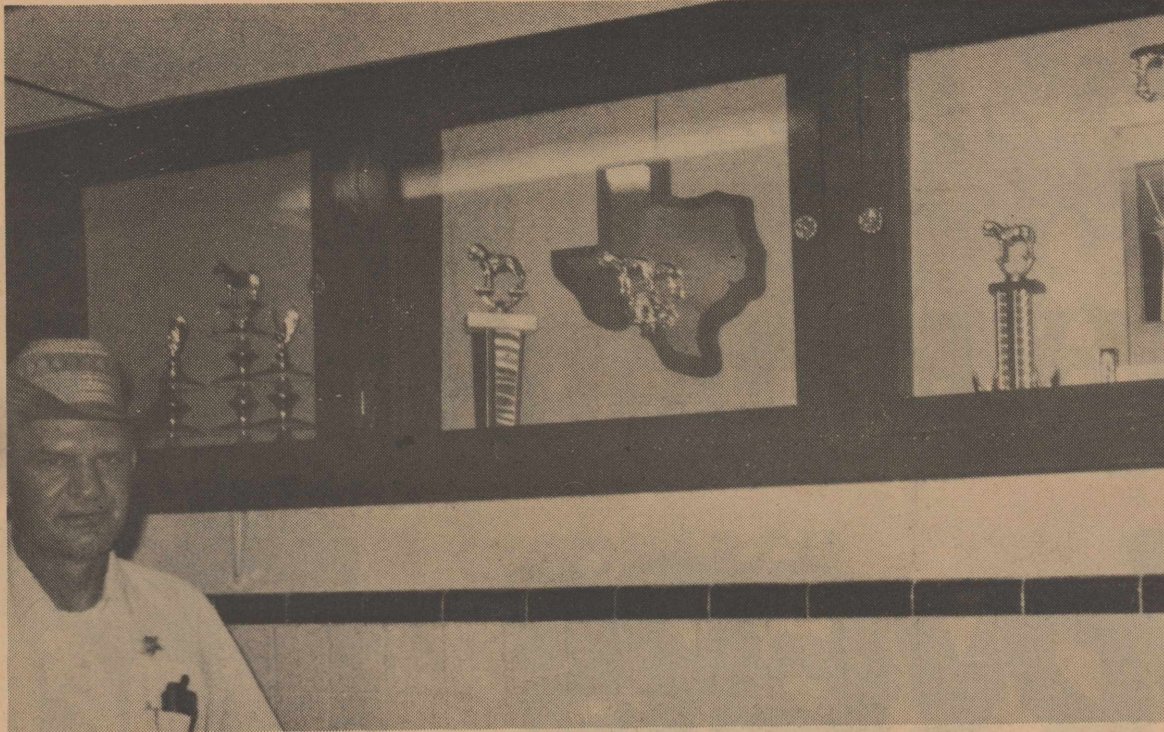
