tops on them. They're the tight legged kind. I wore them to the peach orchard this morning and it was a successful trip. Any trip's a success when you're with pleasant people, like the Mrs. and Uncle Ward Collier, Sr. and Aunt Alice. (He's the Ft. Worth kin that I get most of my stories from.
But we started on the yellow boots. If they could talk, they could probably tell you some history that should not be told. There's some blood on them that either came from cutting a goat's throat or an operation, making a gender calf. There's a mark still left where I was cutting brush with an ax and liked to got a toe. There's a mark where ol' General (my horse) got me too close to a barb wire fence. (His real name was Major but I'd given him a few promotions through the years The previous owner had got him up to Major.)

The story that's outstanding in my mind is when we were working cattle a few years ago and I said to the Mrs., "We'll be working about 200 calves this morning, why don't you come out and watch the rodeo?" Well, that was a mistake. She did.
Now, I never was too good a cowboy anyway. We never did rope calves and drag them in. got up early and went to the farm. I took ol' Skip, the collie dog, and headed for the back side, a mile away. Ol' Skip was delighted. I put him out and he started his bark and by sun up every animal was in the corral. Help arrived and mamas were cut off from their offsprings All the calves were thrown in the lower alley and by $80^{\circ}$ clock we were ready to begin our work.
Assignments were made. One man caught the head in the squeeze chute. One man squirted raw oil in each of their ears. One man marked their ears. One man ran the branding iron and another man the knife. This left one other important job - hazing the calves in.
Things started moving pretty rapidly then, with the mamas begging for their calves and the calves begging to be with their mothers. The butane fire, keeping the branding irons hot,was roaring and everyone was bent on getting his job done so the squeeze chute gate could be opened and another calf out of the way.
Things were going good. Mrs. Woods and a few others were sitting in the cars right outside the fence, watching the operatio The work went fast and by 11:00 o'clock we only had about 15 or 20 left. But the man hazing had troubles. The calves that were unworked were all of the larger ones, Black Angus, and determined not to get in that chute. Some of them weighed 150 to 200 pounds.
In disgust, I finally went back to help him. "I'll show you how to get them cattle in that chute, I said. I got one up close. The man hazing grabbed him by the head, I got him by the tail. And I'm here to testify I made two or three mistakes and the first

Bob Clark and his wife Vickie take care of the office located in the east portion of the old Dr. Hood clinic, the commodity distribution center for needy families of Seminole. The commodity program was chosen by the Commissioners Court rather than the food stamp program. In a talk last week Clark state that 524 people participate in th program at the present time. These pre-packaged surplus agricultural products are furnished by the federal government for distribution in each county. Thos that qualify are old age groups, disabled wage earners, aid for dependent children and where one person does not make as much as $\$ 125.00$ per month or graduated incomes up to a family of ten, not making over $\$ 330.00$ per month.
When a person or a family qualifies for the program a family of ten would receive 20 lbs . of dry beans, 10 lbs . of butter, 20 lbs. cheese, 25 lbs . flour, 25 lbs . corn meal, 10 lbs . shortening, 10 cans of \#303 chopped meat, dry milk, rolled wheat, $2 \frac{1}{2}$ lbs. peanut butter, 10 cans of turkey or pork, 10 containers of 12 oz. egg mix, 20 cans of milk, 10 cans fruit or fruit juices, 10 cans 16 oz . corn syrup, 20 lbs . grits, 10 cans beans or corn, 10 boxes macaroni, plus other items, if in stock.
The largest family receiving commodity products is a family of 15 .
