My yellow boots have 14 inch tops on them. They're the tight legged kind. I wore them to the peach orchard this morning and it was a successful trip. Any trip's a success when you're with pleasant people, like the Mrs. and Uncle Ward Collier, Sr. and Aunt Alice. (He's the Ft. Worth kin that I get most of my stories from.)

But we started on the yellow boots. If they could talk, they could probably tell you some history that should not be told. There's some blood on them that either came from cutting a goat's throat or an operation, making a gender calf. There's a mark still left where I was cutting brush with an ax and liked to got a toe. There's a mark where ol'General (my horse) got me too close to a barb wire fence. (His real name was Major but I'd given him a few promotions through the years. The previous owner had got him up to Major.)

The story that's outstanding in my mind is when we were working cattle a few years ago and I said to the Mrs., "We'll be working about 200 calves this morning, why don't you come out and watch the rodeo?" Well, that was a mistake. She did.

Now, I never was too good a cowboy anyway. We never did rope calves and drag them in. I got up early and went to the farm. I took ol' Skip, the collie dog, and headed for the back side, a mile away. Ol' Skip was delighted. I put him out and he started his bark and by sun up every animal was in the corral. Help arrived and mamas were cut off from their offsprings. All the calves were thrown in the lower alley and by 8 o'clock we were ready to begin our work.

Assignments were made. One, man caught the head in the squeeze chute. One man squirted raw oil in each of their ears. One man marked their ears. One man ran the branding iron and another man the knife. This left one other important job - hazing the calves in.

Things started moving pretty rapidly then, with the mamas begging for their calves and the calves begging to be with their mothers. The butane fire, keeping the branding irons hot, was roaring and everyone was bent on getting his job done so the squeeze chute gate could be opened and another calf out of the way.

Safe Taken For Dope



NAMED IN THE SUIT FILED BY THE THREE OIL FIRMS AS DEFENDENTS ARE THE COMMISSIONERS COURT, MADE UP OF THE JUDGE, 4 COMMISSIONERS PLUS THE TAX ASSES-SOR. 
It was thought that the hold-up man left in a pick-up that was parked in the area. He did not drive it to the station on Wednesday.



one was wearing those tight legged yellow boots. I'll never know how it happened but that black calf tucked my pant leg down in my boot real firmly. You see, his left hind foot got down in my boot with my left foot. I don't believe any two men could have caught that calf, tied him and got his foot down in that boot as far as that calf did.

I had no choice but to hold onto his tail. That calf bawled. He bellowed and he stepped on me where it was hurting the worst - on the inside of my heel. Now, if you think that was bad, his right foot was loose and he liked to kicked me to death with it. I had no choice but to hold on, stand as close as possible and beg for help. Everybody came to my aid. Five or six men held him and when it was hurting the worst, I looked over at the Mrs. and she was laughing like a crazy person. I'll tell you, that's one of the few times I've ever wanted to kill her. Well, maybe not plumb dead, but she didn't know how I was suffering. The calf was finally removed but the smell remained. What happened to me ought not to have happened to that collie dog. The yellow boots remain and the small broken blood vessels still attest to the terrible treatment that calf gave me. I enjoyed making him a steer. without sedation. The calf is long gone. The years have passed. Mama still laughs and I finally can work up a weak smile.

NEW WATER WELL COMPLETED FOR CITY

Last week the city completed another new water well. This brings back to number 12 the producing water wells that the city is using. (They had lost one.)

The new well is located approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ mile south of the runway at the airport, south of the Hobbs Highway. Last Saturday the new well was being test pumped by Anderson Welding and Machine Service at the rate of 800 to 1,000 gallons per minute. At 3:30 p.m. on Monday it


was still producing some sand after four days of testing. An 8 inch main will connect the l2th well with 3 other wells adjacent to the runway at the airport. The 8 other wells are those that are located on S. W. Ave. G. Extension, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles west of the city limits.

E.B. Baker Drilling Co. drilled the well for the city. Bart Walden, councilman, was over joyed with the new well and its potential worth to the city of Seminole. The new water well was 252 feet deep. It will be cased and gravel packed before being tied into the new system.



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



PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30) **General Election Nov. 3, 1970**

read as follows: "(5). The Commission may

hold, its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall de-termine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It tin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quo-rum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those pres-ent, except that recommenda-tions for retirement, censure, or removal of any person hold-ing an office named in Paraing an office named in Para-graph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by af-

firmative vote of at least five (5) members. "(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Ju-venile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or pre-siding officer of any special court created by the Legisla-ture as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other pro-visions hereof he removed visions hereof, be removed from office for willful or per-sistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person hold-ing such office may be cen-sured, in lieu of removal from office under procedures prooffice, under procedures pro-vided for by the Legislature.

"B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligi-ble for retirement benefits under the laws of this state pro-viding for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retire-ment benefits under such laws may be removed from oflaws may be removed from of-fice, for disability seriously in-terfering with the perform-

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE 'LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: ance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature. "(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testi-mony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by con-tempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) After such investiga-tion as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission de-termines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held be-fore it expressing the removal fore it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion recent the in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to re-port thereon to the Commisport thereon to the Commis-sion. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and re-port of a Master, the Commis-sion finds good cause there-for, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall rec-ommend to the Supreme Court the removal or mitrement as the removal, or retirement, as the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the per-son in question holding an of-fice named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record be-fore the Commission. "(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may.

facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order pub-

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his re-tirement had been voluntary." "(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the

procedure before the Commis-sion, Masters and the Su-preme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a pro-ceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is enadjudicatory proceeding is en-titled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is consid-ered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other in-cidents of due process as are ordinarily available in pro-ceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding in-volving his own retirement or removal

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Sub-section (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."





COMMODITY DISTRIBUTION CENTER

IN SEMINOLE

Bob Clark and his wife Vickie take care of the office located in the east portion of the old Dr. Hood clinic, the commodity distribution center for needy families of Seminole. The commodity program was chosen by the Commissioners Court rather than the food stamp program.

In a talk last week Clark stated that 524 people participate in the program at the present time. These pre-packaged surplus agricultural products are furnished by the federal government for distribution in each county. Those that qualify are old age groups, disabled wage earners, aid for dependent children and where one person does not make as much as \$125.00 per month or graduated incomes up to a family of ten, not making over \$330,00 per month. When a person or a family qualifies for the program a family of ten would receive 20 lbs. of dry beans, 10 lbs. of butter, 20 lbs. cheese, 25 lbs. flour, 25 lbs. com meal, 10 lbs. shortening, 10 cans of #303 chopped meat, dry milk, rolled wheat, $2\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. peanut butter, 10 cans of turkey or pork, 10 containers of 12 oz. egg mix, 20 cans of milk, 10 cans fruit or fruit juices, 10 cans 16 oz. corn syrup, 20 lbs. grits, 10 cans beans or corn, 10 boxes macaroni, plus other items, if in stock.






