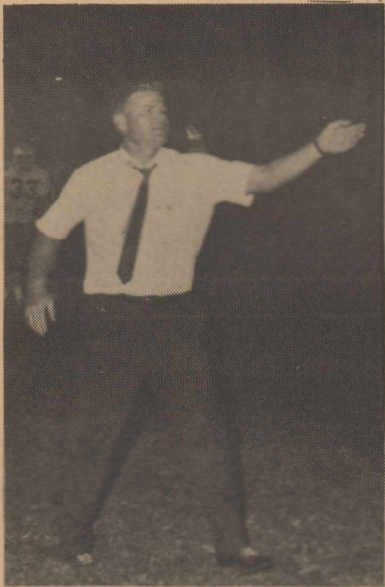

A few weeks ago when I told somebody about seeing Bert Cochran's tombstone resting out in the yard beside his house, they said, "I don't believe it."

They said he still had his coffin but I never saw it. Ask Jim Rash; he played with the Cochran kids in their yard and he said he's seen the tombstone many times. Ask Joe Anderson; he's seen the open grave there at Johnson Chapel. Also his brother was county judge in Stonewall County. Ask Delmon Ellison who farms between Seminole and Seagraves. His daddy, Brooks, was sheriff of Stonewall County.

When I saw Ellison in Seagraves the other day he wanted to know if I went to the funeral. He told me there were a lot more people at Bert Cochran's second funeral than there were at his first funeral. "Why," he said, "I had to drive down the bar ditch to get there."

It seems that back in the 1920's Bert Cochran died and was buried. He was seen awhile later over at Sterling City and they tried to get the law to do something about it. And somebody went out to Johnson Chapel Graveyard and unearthed a casket. It was not empty; it had some mesquite stumps in it.

Indians Roll, 13-6

Seminole Rally Downs Mustangs

Head coach Claude Chappell said, "We'll take 'em like we can win 'em." The Seminole Indians did just that last Friday night in Denver City. They saddled the Mustangs and rode to a 13 to 6 victory in the 4th quarter.

The breaks were against the Indians in the 1st quarter. Major penalties stymied drives in the 2nd quarter. Seminole failed to score in the 3rd quarter. The bright spots in the game thus far for the Indians were good defense, hustle and desire and the great KICKING of sophomore Donald Roberts, including one 58 yarder.

With time running out in the 1st quarter, Jimmy Carson (one time Seminole resident) dropped back to pass, ran into his own man, went to his left, went to his right and passed for 6 points on a busted play. The P. A. T. was no good when Indian defender Terry Ivy blocked the attempt. Score - 6 to 0, Denver City.

The Indians had a hard time moving against a heavy Denver City line, but loosened them up with short passes. It was 4th quarter; time remaining 7:32. Coach Hicks said, "I'll call this play." He was 100% right. The Ponies fumbled on the 31 yard line and recovery was made by Everett Haller and the Indians got their first big break. Gary Don Ray, Seminole quarterback, took his licks, but he dumped the ball just over the rushing defense on a screen play to Lloyd Barker and he waltzed into the end zone and tied up the score. Donald Roberts proved he was not only a punter, but a point after man when he split the uprights, Ray holding. For all practical purposes this was the ball game. Denver City stormed back only to be intercepted by Gregg Pierson. The Indians made long counts, first down; Calderon hit the line for 4 yards. Bill Hearne got 2 the rough way - up the middle. On 3rd down and 4 to go the official was ready to throw the flag on the long count. Denver City was not ready. Calderon skirted right end and added another layer on top of the icing. Final score: Indians 13, Denver City 6.

The point after was good, but the Indians were off sides and failed on the next try. The Indians not only displayed their new coach and their thin ranks, but were found ready and strong in the final 4th and cashed in on their first and only big breaks.

District Judge Rules For Gaines County

Last Thursday Truett Smith, District Judge for the 106th Judicial District of Texas, ruled in favor of the defendants, the Commissioners Court, County Judge Chester Browne and Tax Assessor-Collector Mary Baldwin.

"There is a conflict of evidence concerning the values of the minerals as well as the surface estates in this case. It is my opinion that the evidence preponderates in favor of the Board of Equalization and other defendants and that they acted legally, and that Plaintiffs' Application for Injunction should be refused and denied," said Truett Smith.

Plaintiffs in the case were Atlantic Richfield Co., Amerada division of Amerada Hess Corporation and Mobil Oil Co.

Further Mr. Smith said, "I do not agree with the witness who testified from the Dallas appraisal company that cotton and peanut allotments, as of January 1, 1970, should not be considered in connection with the value of the surface of the land, but as I understand the law, I cannot substitute my idea of property value for valuations made by the Board of Equalization."

One of the attorneys representing the defendants was asked to draw an order, mailing a copy to Mr. Browder (oil company lawyer) and to Judge Smith. He stated that he would hold the original three or four days, seeing if there would be any changes necessary before signing it and mailing it to the clerk at Seminole.

If Atlantic Richfield Company and other oil companies want to carry the case further they must give notice of appeal to the Court of Civil Appeals for the 8th Supreme Judicial District of Texas at El Paso, Texas.

First Bale Of Cotton

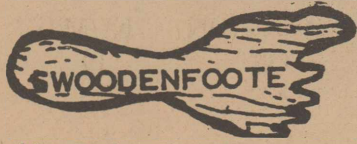

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ANNUAL GAINES COUNTY FARM TOUR SCHEDULED

The annual Gaines County Farm Tour has been scheduled for Thursday, September 24. The tour will enable interested persons in the area to take a look at some of the conservation practices, crops, farming techniques, equipment and farm diversification being used in the county.

Everyone is invited and urged to attend this year's tour with a special invitation going out to the ladies and to the businessmen in the area. The tour will again be sponsored by the Gaines-Andrews Soil and Water Conservation District and the Extension Crops Subcommittee. The tour will assemble in front of the Gaines County Courthouse and leave about 9:00 a. m.

The north and eastern portion of Gaines County will be visited on the tour. Some of the planned stops include a 4-H Grain Sorghum Variety Demonstration on the Harlan Miller farm. Also scheduled for the Miller farm will be an irrigated pecan orchard and a look at Miller's registered sheep operation.

A stop at the Roy Wicker farm will stress the use of a conservation cropping system including the use of guar as a cash crop and as a soil building crop. Also on tap at the Wicker farm will be his livestock operation and how it has worked into his overall farming operations.

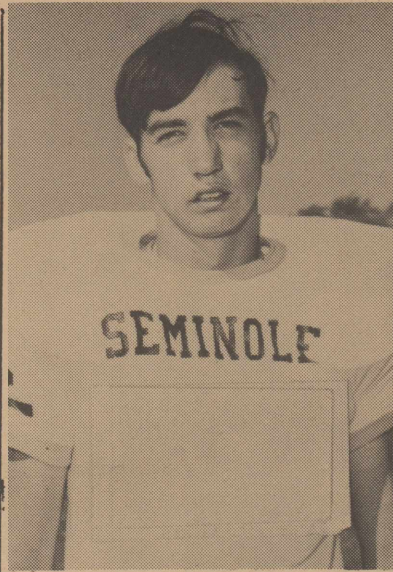
A broadcast planting of irrigated cotton will be on the agenda when the tour stops at the Weyland Mullins farm south of Seagraves. There will also be on display, a cotton stripper with the broadcast header to be used in harvesting the crop.

Some of the recent concepts of sprinkler irrigation systems will be shown when the tour visits the Sam Oliver farm at Seagraves.

The tour will end at the Gaines County Park where everyone will be served the noon meal furnished by the Gaines-Andrews Soil and Water Conservation District. The menu will feature beef barbecue which will be cooked by the Seminole Chiefs of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce.

One of the highlights of the tour will be the presentation of the Outstanding Conservationist of the Year Award to a Gaines County Farmer or rancher. The winner of this award will receive a plaque donated by the Seminole Lions Club.

The High Plains Cotton Growers Association will also hold a directors election after the tour has reached the County Park.

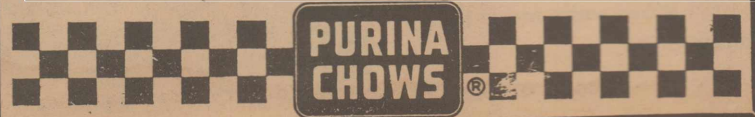

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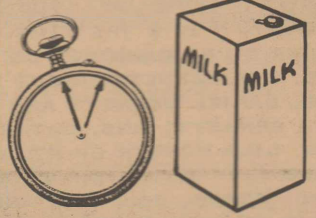

"COOPERATION" TOPIC

FOR LIBRARIANS

WORKSHOP

Librarians from public, school, academic, and special libraries will turn their attention to "Cooperation" at a one-day workshop sponsored by the Field Services Division of the Texas State Library at 9:30 a.m. on September 17, 1970 at the Lubbock County Library in Lubbock.

Workshop participants will discuss ways in which libraries can strengthen their services through cooperative ventures with other libraries. The most familiar form of sharing to many of those who will be attending is through the Texas State Library Communications Network. Last year thousands of Texas obtained answers to reference questions and materials through this statewide network. Austin Hoover, field consultant for the Texas State Library, will conduct the session at Amarillo, one of a series of workshops conducted by field consultants throughout the state during September.

City Council Has Meeting

The City Council met Monday night and spent most of the meeting in discussion with Mr. Stoney Wall, chairman of the board of Pioneer Natural Gas Company, concerning an increase of 16.4%. He pointed out that this was less than the raise granted by the railroad commission in the recent gate rate price where they were allowed a raise from 28¢ to 32¢ to cover transmission costs. The average cost per household per month would be \$1.15 raise for domestic use. A domestic household last year spent an average of \$84.00 per year. It was pointed out during the course of the meeting that the company has a twenty year supply available for future use, with their source coming from the West Panhandle Field, Buffalo Field and the Delaware Basin. Their total revenue in 1969 in Seminole was \$179,243.00. Seagraves was the first of the more than fifty cities serviced by Pioneer to accept the new rate. "The tradition of our company has been to have the same rate in Seminole as in every other community. You can be assured that you will not get a raise unless it is company wide," said Mr. Wall.

The council voted not to join other municipalities in their fight against Pioneer raising the rate. In other action they voted to buy 300 feet of 2 1/2 inch five hose and 300 feet of 1 1/2 inch five hose for the fire department.

I HAVE NOW HAD AN OPPORTUNITY TO READ THE RECENT LETTER FROM YOU AND WALTER. I REGRET TO HEAR OF THE DELAY IN THE MAIL SERVICE IN SEMINOLE. I HAVE RECEIVED HUNDREDS OF PROTESTS WITH REGARD TO THE DAMAGING PROCEDURES FOR THE HANDLING OF MAIL WHICH HAVE RECENTLY BEEN PLACED IN OPERATION BY THE POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT. I HAVE ADVISED POSTAL OFFICIALS OF THE CONTENT OF THESE PROTESTS.

I HAVE REGISTERED A VIGOROUS PROTEST TO POSTAL OFFICIALS IN THE DEPARTMENT IN WASHINGTON AND IN THE REGIONAL OFFICE IN DALLAS EXPRESSING MY UNALTERABLE OPPOSITION TO THE CHANGES WHICH HAVE BEEN PLACED INTO EFFECT.

Here is a copy of an article from the Dallas Morning News that I found in a book that I borrowed from my sister. It is one of the most fascinating articles that I have read and I feel sure that neither Mr. Gooding nor the Dallas Morning News would care if you wanted to pass it on to your readers.

(Editor's note: This is the third time this article has been called to my attention. I want to thank Mr. Womack and others who have mentioned it.)

Without completely recreating the article "The Missing Day" Bob Gooding, in his program Contact 8 on Channel 8 News, thanked newspapers in Duncanville, Plainview, Longview and Post. It seems that Harold Hill, president of Curtis Engine Company in Baltimore, Maryland and a consultant in the space program, stated that he thought one of the most amazing things that God has for us today happened to our astronauts and space scientists at Green Belt, Maryland. They were trying to determine the position of the sun, moon and planets 100 years and 1000 years from now. In order to do this they had to plot the orbits through past centuries.

Twenty-three hours and twenty minutes in Joshua, plus forty minutes in 2nd Kings make the missing twenty-four hours the space travelers had to log in the logbook as being the missing day in the universe.

We should be especially careful in publishing such stories without investigation. Using the leads in the story from the Spencer newspaper, I wrote to the gentleman in Maryland who started the story. His response was courteous, but unfortunately he had misplaced the authentication and documentation. He promised to send it to me when he found it. But though I wrote him again, and apparently others have written, he has not been able to find it. Not only so, but NASA officials deny knowing this man. So for the moment at least this seems like the unfortunate conclusion of a promising story.

(Editor's note: Fortunately the space program has been fruitful in spite of all expectations by unbelievers in the Bible, but the News feels like in all fairness that the article starting in Maryland has not been documented. The article has appeared in thousands of church bulletins, newspapers and on TV and radio.)


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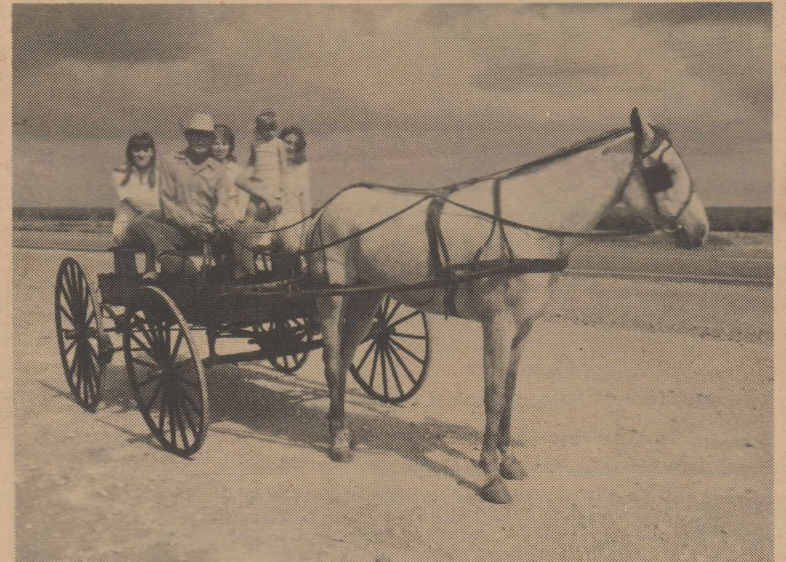

Kenneth Selman, TDPS, said, "We want to thank those people that drove back from the ballgame last Friday night in Denver City. People generally were driving 55 miles per hour, maintaining a safe distance and generally behaving themselves." He went on to point out that although the legal speed limit is 65 MPH it does not mean safe driving.

"If a driver is involved in an accident he could be cited for unsafe speed although driving within the legal limit. Example: (1) Driving 70 MPH on a slick highway where the speed limit says 70 MPH. (2) Driving 65 MPH on a crowded two lane or two-way highway." One eye witness, getting away from the ballgame fairly early, pointed out that they were passed four times between Seminole and Denver City, three of these in a no passing zone, adding to the danger of passing three and four cars at one time.

The football season is here and with it comes the fall. In a light shower like the fall brings, the danger is worse than driving in a heavy rain. Motorists are being asked to watch for farm trailers that are slow moving, farm trucks loaded with hands, combines being hauled and commercial cotton pickers traveling down the highways.

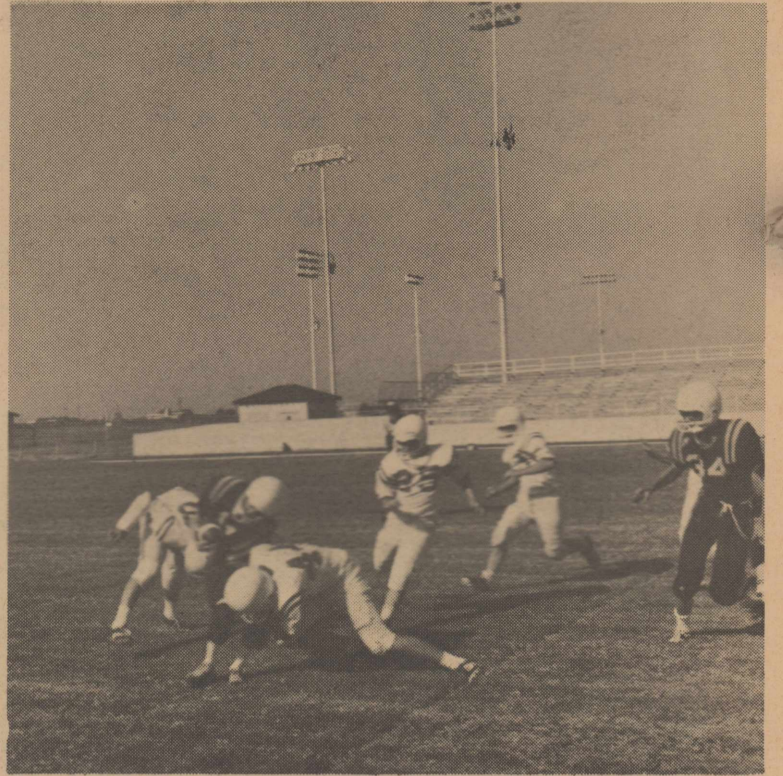
SEMINOLE 8TH GRADE WARRIORS 26 - DENVER CITY 0

4. Frank Nix volunteered to repaint the road signs coming into the city and is doing an excellent job.

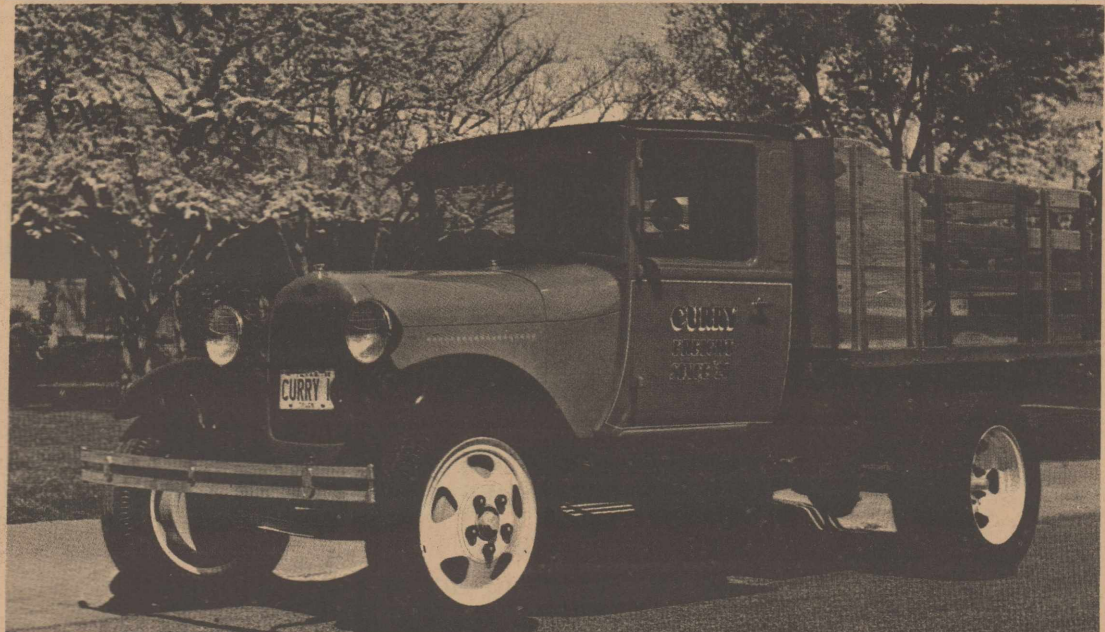
5. The Farm Tour was set for September 24, Thursday. The Seminole Chiefs will cook the barbecue for the occasion.

Leaving the beauty of the island and returning home to good ol' West Texas, the Jordans feel they have had a vacation to remember.

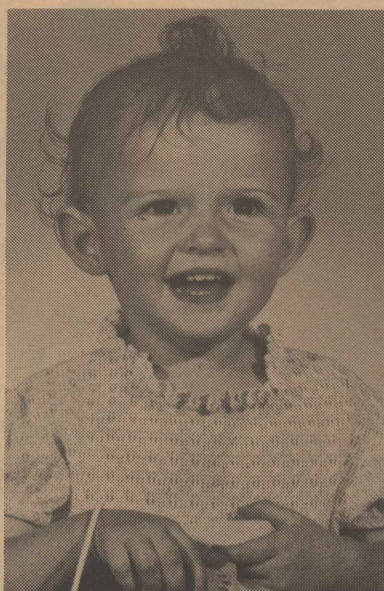
