SWOODENFOOTE

Let's do something about the weather; let's talk about it. On September 22, 1970 the Loop area, Sawyer Flat and other parts of the county had a light frost. Mr. Harris doesn't think so, but I declare I can smell frost. There's nothing, no nothing, that smells like cotton leaves except cotton leaves that's had a frost. It's as distinct a smell as asafetida, bacon frying, beans cooking, or the hair and hide burning under the branding iron.

Gaines County received a killing frost last Thursday night with the temperatures hovering between 27 and 30 degrees. Our average frosting date is November 10 but it may start moving the other way after the last three years.

Since we're entering that season of the year I just might mention that Seminole still holds the record, along with Tulia, for recording the lowest temperature in Texas on February 8, 1933. Tulia recorded the same February 12, 1899. "It's about time for another one of those bad spells," so an old timer said.

Some can even remember January 10, 1918. The storm hit in the late afternoon with winds about 40-45 MPH. The Plains lost thousands of head of cattle. And then there was the storm of February 8, 1931, with the temperatures dipping to from 20 to 25 degrees below zero. The temperature fell further but old timers said that cattle and people did not suffer as much because of very little wind.

And then there was the storm of 1960 where ice and snow lingered the longest that people in this area can remember. People on the North Plains and South Plains still refer to some of these storms as those 'Blue Northerners'.

"It's a terrible thing to see cattle frozen standing straight up, leaning against a fence or against each other."

The property loss recorded in high line breakeage and telephone lines was much higher in the 1960 storm than in other years because of the freezing rain and the extended days. But cattle and other livestock came through in pretty good shape.

Get ready. We may have another 1918 blow, a 1931 low temperature, a freak low like was in Seminole in 1933 or an ice storm of 1960. I've laid in another rick of green wood to go with that dry wood that's on hand.

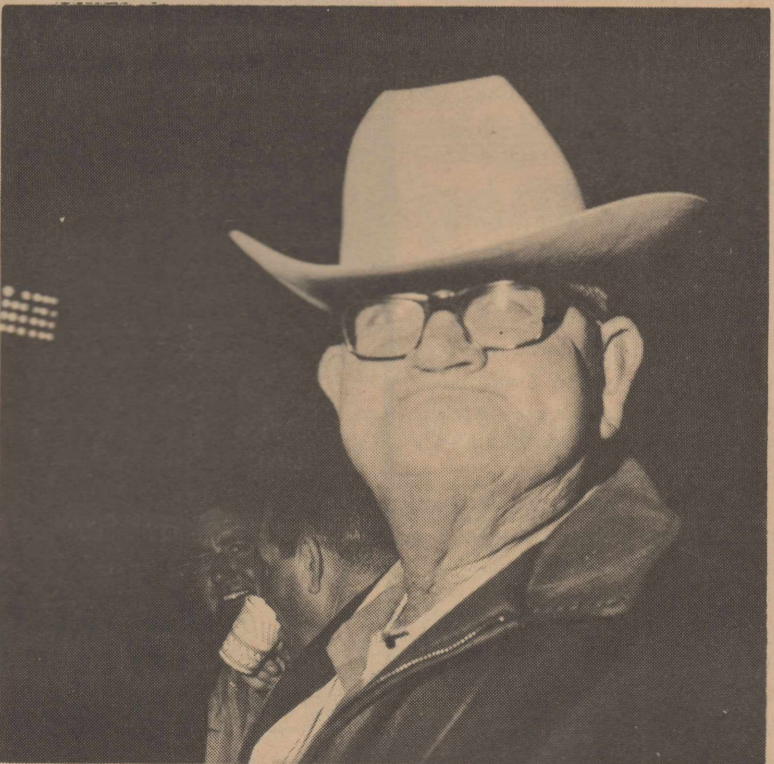

HOSPITAL DISCUSSED

Last week the directors of the Seminole Area Chamber of Commerce in a voiced vote voted to support the survey and recommendations that the Commissioners Court paid \$3500.00 for. Following is that recommendation, May 21, 1970, revised July 21, 1970:

1. One Facility. We recommend to the Court that a single adequate hospital facility for serving the medical requirements of citizens of Gaines County be established. It is a well known fact that the

Firemen's Meeting

The Permian Basin district fireman's convention will have their fall convention in Seminole next Saturday, October 17. The Seminole Volunteer Fire Department will welcome participating teams of firemen from the following Permian Basin towns: Pecos, Monahans, Alpine, Brownfield, Crane, Denver City, Ft. Stockton, Grandfalls, Imperial, Kermit, Lamesa, Marfa, McCamey, Meadow, Midland, Odessa, Sea and Wink.

About 400 firemen and wives are expected. At press time approximately 300 had declared their intentions.

The program will kick off with a business meeting at the Community Building at 10:30 a.m. Registration will begin at 8 a.m. at the Fire Hut at the City Park. Coffee and donuts will be served at the Fire Hut Saturday morning. C. T. Benson, Seminole Fire Department Chief, will call the meeting to order. Joe Harber, minister of the West Side Church of Christ, will give the invocation, followed by the welcome address by Stephen L. Haley,

Sheriff Ed Welch surprised two mercury thieves last Saturday night about 10:30 when he shot the right front tire out of a 1960 Pontiac station wagon they were driving and also the handle off the right hand front door. The thieves returned the fire, shooting five times with a .22 rifle and a .38 caliber pistol.

The station wagon proceeded 1 1/2 miles west on the Nadine Road, getting within one-half mile of the State Line. After firing the two shots, Welch retreated to where his car was parked about 150-175 yards away, so that he could pursue. The station wagon finally went over an embankment and stopped.

A 36-year-old Mexican male was near the car when the sheriff arrived. On Monday a 49-year-old white male was picked up in Lovington, New Mexico. He is charged with mercury theft and attempted murder, no bond. The one picked up at the scene is still in jail with a \$25,000.00 bond placed on him. One man leaving the scene was thought to have walked on to Hobbs, about seven miles, later going to Lovington.

Sheriff Welch said, "This will clear up several mercury thefts." The mercury is in liquid form.

supply of health career personnel is very limited. Combining the two small units into a single unit would allow the same number of personnel to care for a greater number of patients. Conversely, a smaller number of staff could care for the same number of patients presently being hospitalized. A single facility would eliminate a duplication of building, equipment, and supplies. It would provide a more efficient use of space. And finally, it should provide better patient care to the public by attracting the young and new health career professionals.

2. Location We recommend that a new facility be constructed in Seminole and located on the highway leading to Seagraves. Seminole is near the geographic center of the county. The majority of the population is in Seminole and thence to the north and east. This we believe would be the most convenient location for the majority of the people of Gaines County. We have considered the suggestion of a location near the county park approximately half-way between Seagraves and Seminole and cannot find justification for locating the facility in an isolated area. If the remodeling and expansion program is considered by the Court to be the best solution to the problem, then the site should be Memorial Hospital in Seminole with the acquisition of additional land.

The board further discussed the immediate need of a better facility.

The Commissioners Court invited Joe W. Smith, Assistant Vice President of the First Southwest Company, an investment bankers firm from Lubbock, to meet with them and explain the necessary steps to build a new hospital. He pointed out the necessity of employing a bonding attorney, that the court had always used McCall, Parkhurst and Horton of Dallas, Texas. He also said that it would be necessary for 10% of the registered voters and who own property to petition the court for an election concerning the building.

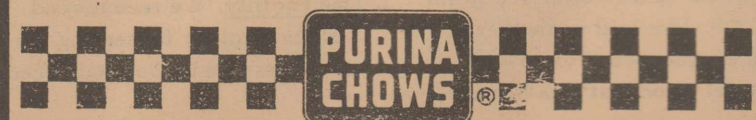

"My mother has a little trouble with the press," the governor said. When asked January 21, 1969 at the inauguration by the press, "Aren't you proud of your son?" she simply stated "Which one?"

He told, in seeking the governorship for the second time, "I was the sixth child in my family either way you looked at it; number six from the top or the bottom. There were eleven children."

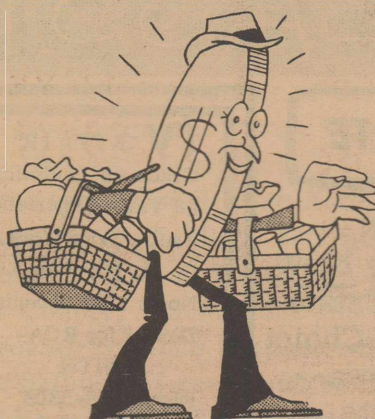
He told a standing party room at Turner's Cafe in Lamesa last Monday, "There is no substitute for the vote. Texas only votes about 40% of her qualified voters in an off year election. I need your help. This is your office. This is your governor. Vote for the kind of governor you want. The problems we're looking at now and in the next few years - taxes, reapportionment, health, and the use of drugs, and I believe the penalties will have to be made worse before drug abuse will slow down. It is directly or indirectly involved in other forms of lawlessness."

He went on to mention other needed programs of water development and what is being done, stating that Texas was number one in industrial growth last year, 42% ahead of California. He gave this outstanding statement concerning his Houston walkout at the university. "Honestly, I thought they were chanting frijole (some kind of beans) and they were actually chanting, I was told, 'Free Lee Otis' (a convicted seller of dope). I stood at the podium for approximately two minutes. They would not heed my pleadings or others. Someone said that someone hit at me with mops and brooms. I did not see them. I walked out."

School Board

The Board of Education met Monday morning for a breakfast meeting at the Raymond Restaurant and discussed at length students' attendance. It was pointed out by the superintendent James Bramlett that the state law reads that children from 7 years of age to 17 are required to attend school 165 days out of the year. Raymon Asebedo was present and reported on five teenage boys that were not in school, a family of seven with none of them in school, and a family of five that had been reported as not being in school. He said that many are living out of town and it will be hard to work with them. (If you know of children that are not attending school, call Raymond Asebedo, 758-2236, or the school administration office, 758-3662.)

2. Mr. Bob Wilton, a Certified Public Accountant, reported to the board on an audit of the books. "Your books are in good shape and are being kept by good bookkeeping principles." He pointed out what a great advantage that the Seminole Common School District had over other schools, that the debt services only included \$212, 229. in interest, compared to a payout of \$1, 434, 000. 00. All school bonds will be paid off in 1978.

3. The board voted to administer the tuberculosis test on a voluntary basis to first and seventh graders as recommended by State Health Department. (All students were tested last year.)

4. The resignation of Mrs. Margaret Lain Baird, a third grade teacher, was accepted.

5. William Yount was hired as a bus driver and the resignation of Emmitt Roberts was accepted as he has moved out of the area.

6. Christmas cards will be sent to all school personnel.

7. A request was granted for the use of the Carter G. Woodson school building as a location for a Satellite school for pre-school educable mentally retarded and trainable mentally retarded children of all ages. Also the board agreed to pay the utilities.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

1. The superintendent told the board the plumbers from Midland arrived October 7 and began work October 8 on the junior high heating system on which the board let bids on September 15. They say they will complete the job in one week.

2. Net receipts from the Seminole - Denver City game were \$1, 498. 38 and Seminole - Lamesa game \$1, 213. 85.

3. Seventy-two students are receiving free lunch tickets.

4. Enrollment on October 8, 1970 was 2076 compared with 2099 on October 9, 1969.

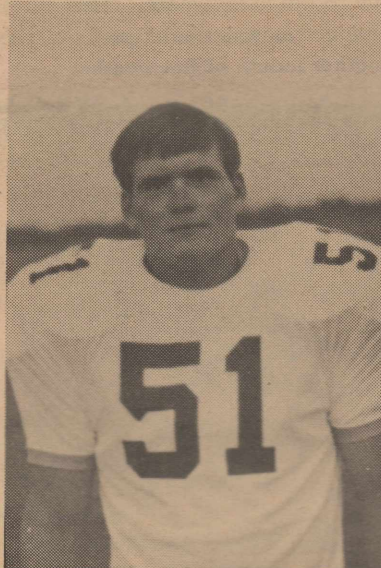

And then came the third quarter. The Indians played outstanding ball for the first 2 quarters against Andrews last Friday night but there were not enough Indians to ride all the horses that appeared in Wigwam Stadium. If last year's game was a battle of defense when Seminole won on a field goal, this year's game was a grinding out of yardage on the ground by the Mustangs from the south.

The 3rd quarter included a 60 yard run by Browning and a 56 yard punt return by speedy Matthews to tromp the Indians into submission. For the last three years Andrews had hopes of scalping the Indians and were successful last Friday night, 31-13, for a district opener for both teams. Seminole is 3-2 for the season.

It was the passing and running of Donald Roberts and a defensive effort by Everett Haller that got the Indians back in the ballgame. Seminole could not move in on their first big break after Haller had pounced on an Andrews fumble. Roberts dropped back and pumped the ball to Gene Sims that was good for 33 yards, but could not take the ball in for a touchdown.

Andrews scored first and the extra point was good with 7 minutes remaining in the first quarter.

In the 2nd quarter the Indians recovered another fumble with Roger Allen recovering. Roberts made a fine run of 20 yards and on 4th down, 1 to go, Gary Don Ray carried the ball in with 6:50 remaining in the half. Roberts split the uprights and the score was 7-7. The Mustangs jumped off for their next touchdown when Andrews intercepted off the hands of an arial pass to Sims. Lunsford, one time Seminole boy, showed his worth on a 4th down situation and carried in to make the score 14-7.

Then came the disastrous 3rd period. Seminole did get to score again when Sims made a diving catch of a Roberts pass to complete a drive that covered 60 yards. But it was too late to bail out the big hearted and lighter Indians. Andrews scored a field goal in the last quarter but Seminole could not overcome the 56 yard punt return and the 60 yard run by Hoss Browning. When Lloyd Barker went out of the game by injury it hurt the Indians defense and down field tackling.

The Indians try to get on the winning side again next week against Pecos in Pecos.
