## GARNERS FOUND GUILTY

A jury made up of W. M. Wicker, foreman, J. B. Thornbury, Jr., Elvis Williams, Eugene Davis, A. G. Meadows and Mrs. Eugenia Glass found Charley Garner guilty of assault and battery and Rachel Garner guilty of assault in court action last Thursday in assaulting and striking Melvin Clark, a school teacher. Justice of the Peace W.E. Cox, Jr. heard the case. The judge moved the proceedings to the 106th District Courtroom so there would be room available for the 49 people present.
Fines of $\$ 65$ were set for Mrs. Garner and $\$ 105$ for her husband. Their attorney, Tom Reeves of Colorado City, declared their intentions of appealing the jury decision at the end of the trial. In his final agrument to the jury he said "They (referrring to Mr. and Mrs. Garner) will take your decision as a final word" and immediately thereafter declared intentions to a ppeal.
The case grew out of a May 4 incident in which the teacher,

Clark, had given the Garner's son, Charley, three licks with a paddle. According to testimony, the paddling followed a game called 'the hypnotism game." Two students would face one another in chairs and one would follow the leader. Both students stood up, both students sat down. Both stood up and one sat down, the other much harder on the floor as the chair was moved.
Little Charley Garner testified "Yes, I moved the chair. " His helper also received a spanking. Mr. Clark, the teacher, testified as to threats, $a b u s i v e$ language, being pushed by Mrs. Garner and struck with a doubled up fish by Mr. Garner, in their two visits to see the principal, the teacher and then the teacher again.

Another teacher, Tommy Joe Woodard, testified that he saw Mrs. Garner .push Clark and further testified that he saw Garner strike Clark. Tommy Matthews testified that he fainted when he hit the floor when CONT. P. 2

Let's talk hospital. Some of the marks of distinction for early western settlements were these: Do you have a church in this town? Do you have a school in this town? Do you have a doctor in this town? As West Texas towns progressed, other churches sprang up, one room schools developed into multi-building schools, doctors stopped using the horse and buggies and hospital care became a way of life. A conversation with a stranger in our town could go something like this. "No, we closed down the churches last week; no one's interested in religion anymore in this town. What do you have the school windows boarded up for? We decided this community doesn't need school any longer. What's wrong over at the hospital? Nothing's wrong, we just decided that people of this county would be better off going to Lubbock, Hobbs, A ndrews and Lamesa. You see, we've let our medical facilities run down in this town to the point that other doctors were not interested in coming here."

This editorial is not intended to scare anyone into voting FOR the two propositions on June 19th, to create a hospital district and to fund it. This is intended to point out to voters of this district that to maintain an overall community spirit, to maintain company employees and to justify our living in Seminole, we need more doctors, we need hospital facilities in the future, so we can take care of our own. Certainly $\$ 2.75$ million is a lot of money to spend. I am led to believe that the people that had so much to say about Andrews County building a $\$ 2$ million structure a few years ago are the same people that would complain about the $\$ 2.75$ million cost. It has been pointed out that a $\$ 10,000$ house assessed at $16 \%$ would cost $\$ 4.80$ for tax per year for bonds and $\$ 7.20$ per year for bonds and upkeep, that a $\$ 20,000$ house would cost $\$ 14.40$ per year. This amount would not pay for gasoline, oil, and depreciation on an automobile for one trip to Lubbock. It has been pointed out that $\frac{1}{4}$ section of dry land worth $\$ 50$ an acre would cost $\$ 5.76$ per year in taxes and that irrigation land valued at $\$ 150$ an acre would cost $\$ 17.28$ per year. Advocating more taxes has never been a popular thing but where would Seminole be today if someone had never been intersted in street pavement, in sewage extensions, in schools, in courthouses or in the care of the sick if someone had not advocated bonds to build them with. How do you think Mr. Woodard and other school board members felt in 1931 when they spent the great amount of $\$ 60,000$ building the junior high building and the question was asked "Do you think that you'll ever use all of it?" Someone has to do some dreaming, some planning, some voting and some paying. Hospital board members will be fair. They will be honest and do the very best job they can. They serve without pay and many times are paid off in criticism. VOTE your convictions JUNE 19th and keep in mind responsibilities to the people of tomorrow and be glad that someone dug a water well, someone paved a street and someone built a building for our convenience and what we do on that date will affect this community in 1971, 1981 and 1991.

the chair was pulled out from under him. He further testified to injury to his tail bone from a previous accident.
