The donor, Mrs. Willa Mae Vandergriff from Pasadena, Tex. learned last January that her brother had Brite's Desease, his kidneys had collapsed and would have to have a transplant. She willingly signed and was quoted as saying, "I'm glad I was the one chosen".

When Ben arrived in Galveston he was in a deep coma and was doubtful that he would recover enough for the operation.

Mrs. White reported last night that he was doing fine and would probably be in intensive care for only a couple of days.

He would allow you to pick his foot up but he would snort enough to make you be careful. He never got real big and fat but he was never real poor either When he got sick he pushed down the gate of the corral, he pushed down the corral, he pushed down the gate at the yard, walked up on the front porch for the lst time in his life and walked back and forth, demanding and receiving attention. He took his medicine like a person who knew he had no other alternative.

COUNTY JUDGE RESIGNS
June 18, 1871

Commissioner's Court of Gaines County Seminole, Texas 79360

Gentlemen:

It is with regret that it becomes necessary for me to present this, my letter of resignation as County Judge of Gaines County, Texas. This move is necessary as a result of the demands of my personal affairs and for medical reasons. I request that this resignation be effective Monday, June 21, 1971.

I take this opportunity to express to you my appreciation for having worked with and for you for the past two (2) years and for having had the opportunity to represent the people of Gaines County for many years.

(P. S. In an oral opinion given by J. C. Davis, Jr., Head of the State and County Division of the Attorney General's office, he stated that the Commissioner's Court could not officially accept the resignation until a new appointee is made. Information by Joe McGill and Woodson Jones.)

In the February 17, 1971 issue of the News a story appeared on the front page concerning the county judge and a deficiency or shortage in the judge's office. The story went like this:

There's a shortage in the county judge's office. There's no truth to this. "The story came about because of old charge accounts left over that had not been collected from the time that I served in the clerk's office," said County Judge and one time County Clerk of Gaines County, Chester Browne. HOSPITAL PASSES 3 To 1



BALLOTS ARE PASSED TO PROSPECTIVE VOTERS IN LAST SATURDAY'S HOSPITAL ELECTION WHEN THE HOSPITAL CARRIED.

Residents of the newly created hospital district flocked to the poles last Saturday and voted almost 3-1 in favor of the new district and for bond issuance of 2.75 million dollars in bonds to build a new hospital. The spirited voting represented almost 50% of registered voters in the Seminole Consolidated School District, which makes up the new Hospital District. The ballot called for one proposition creating a hospital district with 745 property owners voting for and 322 against. Non property owners voted 56 for and 9 against. The second proposition on the ballot voting for bonds to issue 2.75 million dollars carried by a margin of 693 for and 346 against (property owners). The non property owners voted 56 for and 9 against. The vote Saturday ended a struggle that started last year when County voters denied the building of new hospitals in Seminole and Seagraves.

There was little organized efforts to defeat the hospital district.

The State Legislature had recently approved the proposed district in making ready for the Saturday vote.

Brom Marchbanks, President of the Hospital Board, reported that the election of permenant officers for the district would take place next Tuesday night. He said the Hospital Board directors were trying to acquire 18 acres of land accross the street from the present clinic and hospital. We hope to use a 15 year schedule to pay out the bonds, he said.

Present hospital facilities, that are free of debt, will become a part without cost to the new hospital district.

a clerk is responsible for any and all accounts and it becomes a cash account as far as the county is concerned when it is made."

It seems that when Chester Browne was county clerk that the audit of 1969 showed a balance of \$7,427.95 had been charged to oil companies, businessmen, individuals and lawyers. Of this amount, approximately \$1700 is still outstanding. Woodson Jones, County Auditor, said, "This will all be cleared up by March 1, 1971. If not, the cash will have to be dug up. "County Attorney Joe McGill said, "Yes, I know about it. I am concerned and have been told that it would be cleared up during the month of February of this year."

These account charges came about when the clerk's office charged court costs, recording fees and certified copies to aforementioned accounts. This money was always carried as a debt that the clerk owes to the county and is so stated in the year in audit, but must be paid.

In Mr. Browne's reasons for resigning he mentions personal affairs. Stories being circulated that there are shortages in the County Judge's office or in other areas are simply not so at this time. No doubt poor business judgement has been used which is not marks of a good business man nor a public official.

in the field and if I cut out to the house, he cut out to the house, daring the driver to keep him on the row or to start another round. When he thought 12 noon came, he struck out for his noon-day snack.

I'll never forget his feat. The man of the house finally said, "take Charlie in and unhook him." I was fond of that horse. I liked his spirit and I liked his fortitude but the day had come when Charlie had to learn. "Leave the harness on him, " I was told. He was tied securely to a tree in the corral area and was beat with a trace chain that was covered with a bicycle tire. I'd never seen an animal whipped before and gladly put him back to the plow to escape further punishment.

That was the day he learned to turn a plow so fast and get it back on a row.

Charlie died after I went off to college, after having eaten too many and too much shinnery buds. I'm glad I wasn't there to see him die, but these great lessons I remember to work was a distinction and an honor, to work a little bit harder than a peer was rewarding, to serve had its merits, the best time of a day was a rest after fruitful hours spent in labor and finally, to be forcibly put back on the row, hurt, but to be put back on the row and never forgetting the lessons learned was of great



Trash, Flies, they go together. It seems that all people want to do about them is for the city or someone to spray.

The problem is that after flies hatch out, it is impossible to kill all of them with spray.

To control them, we have to start where they hatch out, in trash, rubbish, and other waste.

A recent trip through the alleys of Seminole revealed an ideal place for flies to feed and hatch.

A large portion of the cans were without lids, turned over because there was no rack for the cans or the trash was not in the can to start with.

The City is spraying the inside of the cans and leaving the tops off to kill flies.

What can you do to help?
Get a can with a good lid and a rack to keep it from being turned over, tie your lid to the rack so it will not be misplaced. Put your lid on when there is trash in the can, and don't gripe until you have done these things.

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
