She had a great ritual when it came to hunting for her glasses. She wore the kind of glasses that set on your nose without any ear pieces and they clamped on. They were pretty glasses and they were unusual but she had trouble locating them. They were on a little gold chain that pulled out from a retractable container. Sometimes she had them fixed to her hairpiece, sometimes they were on her left shoulder, sometimes on her right shoulder, sometimes on the center of her blouse. When something happened that she couldn't see, she bounded to her feet and started the search.

"Mr. Vaughn," she would say when finally locating her glasses, (He was the one with the ringworm on the back of his head), "did you see what happened?" "No mam," he would say. "Mr. Woods," she would say, "did you see what happened?" "Not exactly," I would say. How could you see something when you did it?

But on with the history class. Miss Perry had a few favorite jokes she told and if there was anything my brother Paul taught me it was to laugh at teachers' joles. One time Miss Perry told me "Mr. Woods, I want to see you after class." Now history was my favorite subject. Iknew it couldn't be my grade because I had an "A". But I stayed and she told me the following story.

"Mr. Woods," she said, (she's the first teacher—ever had to call me mister) "I knew your brother Paul well. He always laughed at my stories, but you're too much like him. I want you to answer this one question. Are you laughing with me or at me?" I couldn't afford to tell her the whole

She would look like a Catholic saying her prayers when looking for her glasses except that those glasses were hung in many more places. Anyway, I liked her because my older brother Paul was intelligent, he was smart, and he was good looking (29 in the waist and 43 in the shoulders).

It was delight to go to history class at Brownwood High School.

# WRECKS, WRECKS THIS IS WEST TEXAS

Dessie Marie Dennie, 69, was killed last Saturday morning at 8:15 a.m. in a near headon auto accident 16.7 miles west of Seminole on the Hobbs Highway. Her husband, driver of the 1968 Chevrolet, John Byron Dennie, 71, remains in critical condition in the local hospital with a broken foot and internal injuries.

The accident occurred when Frankie Joe Bailey, 38, of 400 S.W. 14th Street, attempted a left hand turn in a 1971 Dodge pickup while going west and struck the Dennie auto which was traveling east.

Clayton Koonce, TDPS, gave the Dennie address at 4404 Jennifer, Ft. Worth, Texas. The body was taken to Singleton Funeral Home in Seminole and later transferred to Owen Brunley Funeral Home in Ft. Worth. The accident occurred after another fatality earlier in the morning. Both vehicles were damaged beyond repair.

Mrs. Dennie was born December 9, 1901 in McAllister, Okla. She was found on a wagon train in Oklahoma territory and raised by foster parents, Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Davis, who are deceased. She was a resident of Seagraves several years ago.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. today in the Bethel Temple Church in Forth Worth under the direction of Owen-Brumley Funeral Home of Forth Worth. Local arrangements were by Singleton Funeral Home.

Survivors other than her husband include 7 sons, 4 daughters and 56 grandchildren.

# Jury By "Jury Wheel"

"Just as soon as our 'Jury Wheel' comes in I'll call you and you can take a picture of it," said County Judge Marcus Crow. A new state law, effective July 15th, is Senate Bill #369 requiring the use of jury wheels in all counties. The tax collector, sheriff, State of Texas, and the county clerk must meet and reconstitute the jury wheel, using as the sole and mandatory source, ALL NAMES on the voter registration lists from ALL precincts in the county. The jury wheel that will be used is specified and requires two locks, one to be kept by the districk clerk and the other by the sheriff. When men or women are called as jurors, when they are impaneled shall constitute a general jury panel as jurors in county and district court.

The new law authorizes additional names where and if needed and specifies methods of drawing of names. Court shall not excuse any juror for economic reasons unless all parties of record are present and approve such excuse. Qualifications are amended to read "He must be a citizen of the State and of the county in which he is to serve and qualified under the Constitution and laws to vote in said county." All competent jurors are liable to jury service, except the following persons: All persons over 65 years of age, and all females who have legal custody of a child or children under the age of ten (10) years. The new law applies to all counties having over 10,000 population.

# The Semin THE OLD TIMER Seminole, 7 Dear Walter Woods,

After leaving this cool cabin built on the banks of the Rio de Lacasa (House River), that heads high up in the Sangre Di Christo Mountains (Blood of Christ) and air conditioned by God above, I went back to the old home town of 62 years to the old timers homecoming. I was inspired to meet so many of the offsprings of the old pioneers that came to Gaines County in those early days and stood hardships and inconveniences that the younger generations could not believe. We had no public roads, no markets for what they raised. But they could drive cattle to market and sometimes to grass as drouths seemed worse in the early days and sandstorms was almost unbearable to a green horn from Georgia. I first left the farm to attend the Martha Berry School for boys at Rome, Georgia and a merchant came to the depot looking for me, CONT. P. 2

CONT. FROM P. 1 wanting me to go to work for him in a store at the sum of \$8.00 per month and board. After three months hard work, putting together Georgia Stocks, turning plows and wheel barrows, I longed to get back on the farm and pull the old brogan shoes off and follow that furrow behind a mule a few more thousand miles and feel that warm soil between my toes again. I saw I had made a big mistake by quitting school but did not have the nerve to ask Miss Marth Berry to take me back in her wonderful school for mountain boys, and later girls, that she gave her life to educate. Now she has passed on but she left a 30,000 acre campus of pine timber near Rome, Georgia. Gordon Cowan, who I grew up with, that knew timber land, whom she educated, bought all this land and cut timber to pay for it.

Oh, I must not get off my subject. I was made sad that so many of the old pioneers were gone on across the great divide but am so thankful that I was still left and I praise the good lord for being much better to me than I have been to him. I saddled my horse this morning and rode the pasture and viewed the beautiful mountains and canyon sight here near Cleveland, New Mexico. There are few men above eighty years that can swing up on a horse and ride for miles.

On my way to Cleveland I stopped to visit my old friend, Fish Pollard, in Fort Sumner, New Mexico. I met him at Shafter Lake back in 1909. I always made friends with anyone that could excell in anything even if it was playing marbles, but Fish could ride anything that had a hide. He could lock those long legs around a mean horse and sit up there like he was in a rocking chair. He went down to a big ranch in the south part of Midland County in those early days and asked for a job. The foreman said "Yes, if you can ride I can use you" and he gave him an outlaw that had thrown all the other boys and he saddled him and he pitched a few hundred yards with him and he raked him over with the long shank spurs, then rode back to the onlookers who thought he was through for the present and he threw his leg over the neck of the bronc and directly he broke into again and his spur hung in his mane and he couldn't get it loose. He had to ride him sideways. The boss rode up about that time and asked him what happened and Fish told him that his spur got hung in his mane and he had to pitch a while before he could get it loose. The foreman told the cowboys "You can't ride him astride and Slim can ride him sideways." (Continued next week)

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



- 7. Bobby Wicker, secretary-treasurer for the Permian Basin Motorcycle Association, granted permission to use the school's parking lot south of the field house for a motorcycle rodeo on the 15th of August. He pointed out that in 8 events in the rodeo there would be riding skills, and not speed races. Further, there would be no damage to the parking lot and that the courses ridden would be no greater than 15 miles per hour. "It will in no way hurt the surface of the parking lot. - - - All trash and debris will be cleaned away, " he said.

HORSE DISEASE PROBLEMS

Horses and horse diseases are subjects of great interest to Texans currently as a dread disease threatens the half a million horses in our State. And there is some concern accompanying the spread of the disease because the effect the virus could have on humans.

The horse disease is known by the tongue-twisting name of Venezuelan Equine Encephomyolitis, or more commonly by the initials VEE. It spread up from South America -- apparently coming into Texas via flies or mosquitoes which are believed to be carriers.

There is a vaccine available which is being widely used by horse owners. The vaccine is still experimental, but it is the only known means of combatting the disease in horses. Once contracted by horses, the disease is fatal in 85 to 90 percent of the

The vaccine is commonly known as TC83, according to Dr. A. J. Mabry. At press time Dr. Mabry had hoped to have the vaccine available. Horses will need to be given a shot seven to ten days ahead of time for it to do them any good as far as the disease is concerned.

Horses may be hauled in to the veterinarian for shots and then hauled back home. Check with the county agent or Dr. Mabry on vaccine available.

With the shots, horses can be moved 14 days after receiving the vaccine. Owners will be furnished certificates for moving. New Mexico at the present time will not allow a Texas horse to cross the State line regardless of whether he had been vaccinated or not.


