You have three days to register or you cannot vote in 1970. Gaines County, as of 5 p.m. Tuesday, had registered 2965 voters, according to Mary Baldwin, Tax Assessor-Collector. The total potential registered voters runs about 4500 people. The most that have ever registered in the county was 4480 in the 1967 presidential election year.

In some counties registering is lagging to only a small percentage of potential voters. If you have not registered do not wait until the last day - do it today! The tax office will be open through Saturday until 5 p. m. to accomodate late comers.

90 YEARS YOUNG! --- R. L. Smith from Brownfield, who lived in Gaines County most of his life, celebrated his 90th birthday at the Loop Community Building last Sunday. The cake was decorated with frontier designs, a covered wagon and western figures.

"Why", he said, "in Washita, Arkansas in 1897 I worked for one year for a watch, room and board, fifty bushels of corn and \$40 in gold."

In 1901 he moved to Wolfe City, Texas, riding horseback and spent two months picking cotton at fifty cents a hundred. It took $8\frac{1}{2}$ days to ride to Texas and 8 days going back. "I must have got Texas fever."

Mr. Smith was born in Crystal Springs, Arkansas January 29, 1880. In 1905 he married Elizabeth Scrimshire and moved to Oklahoma in 1915. After living in Oklahoma and Arkansas he moved to Gaines County in 1924, then to Quemada and back to Gaines County in 1936 and to Loop in 1946. His wife passed away in 1962 and he moved to Seagraves where he lived till August of 1969, moving to Brownfield where he lives now.

He is the father of five sons and one daughter. All were present except Ollie and his Cont'd on page 8






