
Driving a 1965 Ford heading north on the left hand side of the highway was Lonnie Royce Crisler from Pecos, Texas. Crisler had a slight concussion.



SEMINOLE INDIANS TRACK TEAM WINS FIRST IN ANDREWS

The big story in sports events has to be the outstanding performance of the charges of Jake Collins' 1970 track team. It was a bad day for all entrants at the Mustang relays in Andrews last Friday but it was a good day for the Indians as they racked up a cool and wind-blown 100 points to outdistance arch rival Andrews by 25. Andrews ended up the day's efforts: with 75. Estacado had 65, Monahans 45, Brownfield 43, Kermit 32, Pecos 24, Littlefield 24, Tulia 23, Colorado City 21, Levelland 16, Slaton 12, Dunbar 10 and Ft. Stockton 1.

The brochure on the Andrews track team read something like this: 'The Andrews Mustang track team is one with a lot of history and tradition behind it. Having built such a fine record in the past necessitates good athletes, good facilities, and hard work. In the past Andrews has won five State Championships, three Regional Titles, and twelve District Titles. 64 places have been won in the State Meet since 1952. Andrews, because of the presence of some outstanding individuals has a set of school records which would be the envy of a number of colleges." The Indians neglected to read the press notices.


