The General, who just returned from Korea a few weeks ago, spoke on the world situation and urged the cadets to continue their training to better equip themselves in the event of a future conflict.

# Major General Charles P. Cabell **Principal Speaker At Graduation Ceremonies For Class 50-G Saturday**

More than 400 airmen, aviation cadets, and members of their families heard Maj. Gen. Charles P. Cabell, Director of Intelligence for the Air Force speak to the members of class 50-G who were graduated from training, Saturday, December 16 in ceremonies held in the

He was introduced to the audience by Colonel Thomas J. Barrett,

General Cabell, basing his remarks on the world situation today, stated "We have seen the United Nations oppose aggression in Korea and only the United Nations can achieve lasting peace.'

"When the Korean conflict opened the United States had one light B-26 bomb group, one F-80 fighter-bomber group, and twothirds of a B-29 bomb group available for immediate action in Korea."

"Willingly or unwillingly, the United States has assumed leadership in the world struggle for peace. How does the present situation affect you? The Army, Air Force, and Navy offer excellent career opportunities but they are not offered on gold platters. If one is willing to work his future in a service career is unlimited."

Concluding, he stated, "Your career is in your hands. Make of it what you will but your future is in your own hands. I wish all of you success in your future careers.

Following the general's speech Colonel Barrett, introduced the members of his staff and then the graduating cadets and student officers stepped forward to receive their wings and their diplomas

The answer may be found in the example set for us by all who have made this first Christmas possible. Offer yourself completely, soul and body, without reservation to God and ask Him to use you as His tool for the salvation of the world. Your desire to become completely subservient to God's Will and to serve Him will be a perfect act of love. And God Who is love will return your love with the many blessings and gifts that He offers to His good and faithful servants.

Q. When may the blue shade 84 shirt wool flannel be worn (Ref Ltr. AlPMP-12-C, Hq. USAF, 9 Nov 50)?

A. The wool flannel shirt is now authorized as an optional item for Air Force authorized by Congress. wear with the blue winter service uniform, as follows:

V, VI and VII (described in T/A normal procurement procedures. 21) may the wool shirt be worn under the coat or jacket as an optional item in lieu of the poplin shirt, blue, shade 120.

(2) In all temperature zones when the blue winter service uniform is authorized for wear on a base or installation only.

Q. Airmen's chevrons of grade are worn on what garments (Ref AF Regulations 35-14, 15 Nov 50)?

A. Chevrons of grade are worn on all outer garments, except the raincoat; on coats, jackets and shirts when worn as outer garments, centered between the elbow and shoulder seam.

Q. What organizational insignia may be worn on the blue service uniform (Ref AF Regulation 35-14, 15 Nov 50)?

A. For the service and dress uniforms, the only authorized organizational insignia are the shoulder emblems denoting oversea service with a unit in a theater of operations during World War II. The wearing of this shoulder emblem is optional.

Q. When may the dress uniform be worn?

A. The white shirt and black bow tie are worn with the men's service uniforms. Jackets are not authorized for wear with dress uniform. The dress uniform is optional for wear by all enlisted personnel, when appropriate after 1700 daily. It is required for all officers attending official functions as a duty or on social occasions when civilian evening dress (tuxedo) is appropriate. Formal evening dress uniform wear is prescribed in AF Regulation 35-

# Officers Attend TA&D Conference At Scott

"We have a great potential in the Air Training Command at a time when we need it," Maj. Gen. Robert W. Harper, commanding general of Air Training Command, said in closing remarks to a conference of Training Analysis and Development representatives last week at Scott AFB. Illinois.

General Harper's talk to the conferees concluded a two day meet-

ing between field representatives of the extensive TA&D program and civilian educators at Training Command headquarters. Representatives, including Lieut. Col. Maurice A. Gaskin and Capt. Edward H. Patterson from Reese, of the Training Analysis and Development branch from the 19 fully operating bases in the Training Command were here to coor-

dinate ideas and report on progress for 1950.

In his closing remarks, General Harper stated, "I can see things which have been presented during this conference that I have not seen before. In some of our systems, we are going to necessarily relax the complete rigidity. On some issues, such as the location of organizations at group or base level, we will have to have flexible rules.

"Lets evaluate the location under consideration and put the organization where it belongs. We are here to accomplish a mission, and the manner in which we can best expediete that mission is the manner in which we will want to operate."

The Training Analysis and Development program constantly examines training programs in the Training Command, anticipating new needs and recommending additions, changes, and eliminations in the training schools of the Air Force.

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
