

Report From Washington

The Army is seeking to re-enlist World War II veterans of the old 10th Mountain Division, a ski trooper outfit. A training program is expected to be developed at Camp Carson, Colo.

Princeton University has announced plans for a \$3 million aeronautical research center as a memorial to the late Defense Secretary James V. Forrestal. It will undertake Government-sponsored research programs.

The Army Chemical School will be relocated at Fort McClellan, Ala., next summer. The World War I fort is scheduled for immediate reactivation, and will also be used as a Chemical Corps Replacement Center.

The Navy has released a list of Naval Reserve Staff Corps officers recommended for promotion. Nine were nominated for lieutenant commander and 2,532 were recommended for the grade of lieutenant.

Rear Adm. H. Lamont Pugh is the Navy's new Surgeon General. He succeeds Rear Adm. Clifford A. Swanson.

Among the Naval vessels scheduled for early return to duty is the veteran 27,000-ton aircraft carrier Essex, known during World War II as "the fightingest ship in the Navy." Another large carrier, the Bon Homme Richard,

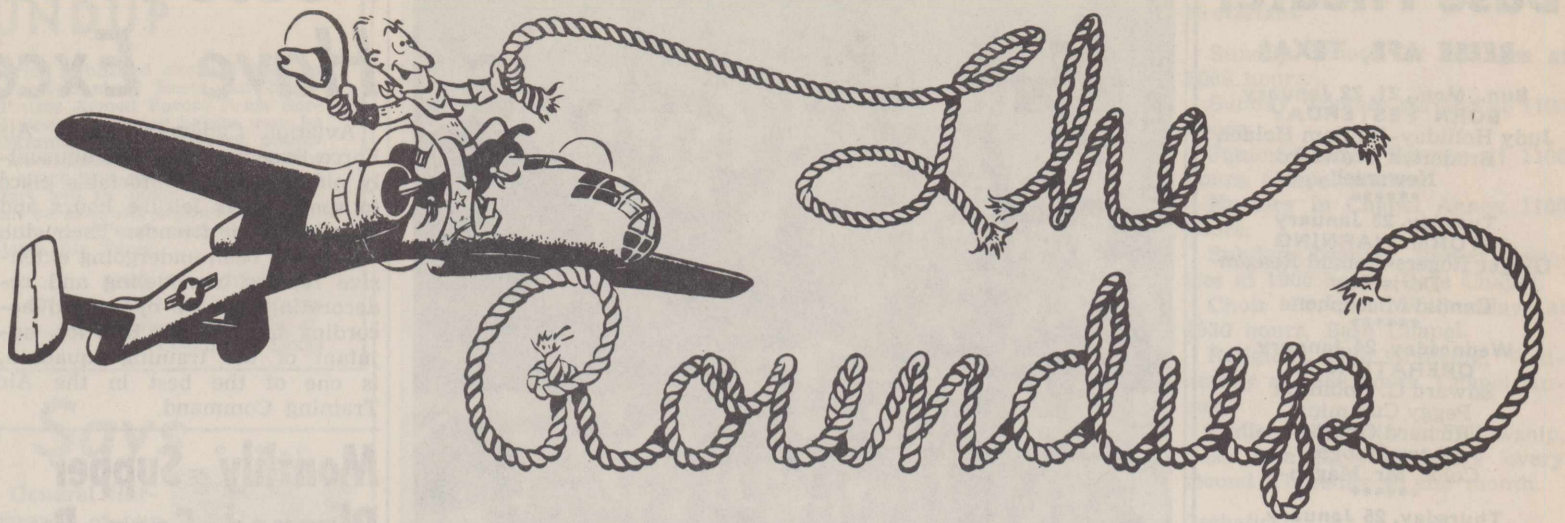

AF Board Meets Here To Consider Top Cadets From Vance, Williams

A regular Air Force selection board, convening at Reese this week, interviewed 13 aviation cadets of Class 51-A from Vance AFB, Oklahoma, Monday in the opening session of a three-day

series to determine those qualified for commissions in the regular Air Force.

Eighteen men from Williams AFB, Arizona, were interviewed Tuesday and eight from Reese met the board Wednesday.

The men were recommended to receive commissions because of their outstanding records of leadership, academic rating, and flying proficiency. They are all now in the advanced stage of their training and are scheduled to graduate on Feb. 9, 1951.

Col. John T. Sprague, commanding officer of Lowry Air Force Base, Colorado, is president of the board.

Board members include Col. John H. Davies, headquarters ATRC; Col. D'Ross Ellis, Sheppard AFB, Texas; Col. Douglas M. Cairns, Connally AFB, Texas; Col. James N. Johnson, Ellington AFB, Texas; and Col. Hartwin, surgeon, ATRC. Capt. Barton F. Walker, ATRC, is the board recorder.

A Christmas Present The Air Force Way

The darkness of Christmas Day for needy children in foreign nations was lighted somewhat by members of the Air Training Command. According to a report received from Command headquarters Monday, ATRC personnel sent them \$11,843.87 worth of cheer in the form of food for Christmas.

Col. J. G. Witherspoon, chaplain for Headquarters of ATRC, listed this sum as the result of one Sunday when collections over the Command were allocated to the CARE Food Package program in addition to contributions from organizations in the Command. The food packages purchased with the money were distributed in foreign areas approved by the Children's Commission of the United Nations organization. Col. Witherspoon observed that this gift gave "direct and tangible evidence of the benefits associated with the American way of life in the field of human brotherhood."

Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas, made the largest individual contribution, \$2,500.

Reese Fire Marshal Lists Suggestions On Fire Prevention

The following information has been listed by the Base Fire Marshal, Lt. Col. Charles V. Eld, to help keep fire losses down to a minimum at Reese Air Force Base.

Don't smoke in areas where inflammable liquids and/or materials are handled or stored and don't use grinding machines where explosives or inflammable liquids and/or materials are stored or used. You should keep electrical and wired equipment in good repair. Also check for fire hazards BEFORE you start cutting or welding operations, check heating devices and insure that combustibles are not obstructed by stock piles. One of the most important things you can remember is don't block doorways or fire exits and assure that sprinklers are not obstructed by stock piles. The fire appliances should be inspected regularly and kept easily available and you should also know what to do when the fire alarm sounds. Be proud of your installation and report obvious fire hazards.

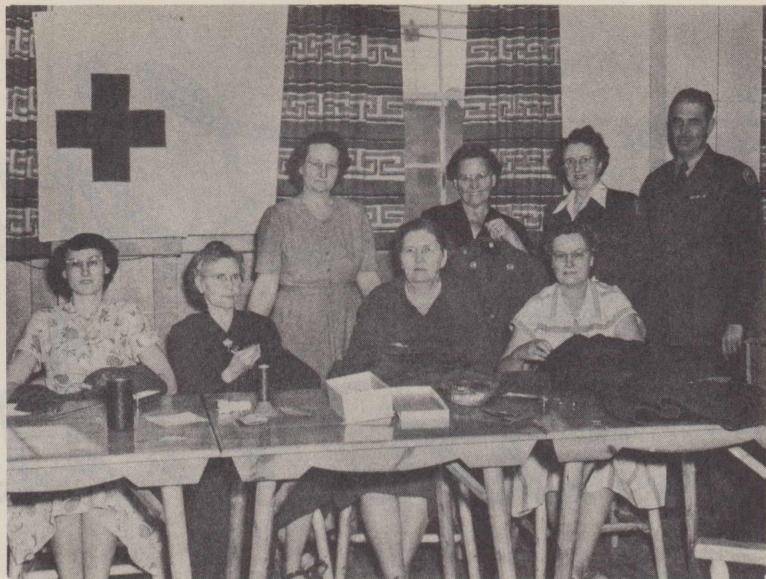

Duties of Comptroller Explained In Articles

(Editor's note . . . This is the first in a series of articles on the functions of the Wing Comptroller's Section. The other three articles will appear in the following issues of the Roundup.)

We've probably all heard of the word "comptroller," but what does it mean? What does he do to earn his pay and how does it affect the personnel of the Air Force. First, let's get the pronunciation right. It is "kawmtroller," not "kompntroller" or "controller."

The comptroller is a member of the commanding officer's staff at each level of command. At Wing level he is called "Wing Comptroller;" at major organizations he is on the same level with Personnel, Materiel, and Operations and Training Staff officers. He has no operational responsibility; that is, he has no activities performing duties directly contributing to the mission of the base.

Each staff section of the Wing has a duty to assist the commanding officer in executing his command responsibilities. This assistance usually takes the form of (1) providing information by which to plan, (2) doing future planning, (3) translating decisions of the commanding officer into orders, (4) and exercising such supervision as is necessary to insure carrying out the intentions and policies of the commanding officer.

The chief duty of the Comptroller is to assist the commanding officer in accomplishing his mission with the most economic and efficient use of the Air Force Dollar. The application, Air Force wide, of proven basic principles of American big business results in the best use of our nation's resources—men, money and materials. "Best use" doesn't mean skimping—it does mean getting a full dollar's worth out of every dollar spent. The dollar is a recognized convenient measurement for resource expenditure. By analyzing the expenditure of dollars, Comptrollers, both civilian and military, attempt to find areas where efficiency may be increased.

The several sections assigned the Comptroller to perform his duties are Reports, Management Analysis and Accounting and Disbursing. (The next three articles will go into detail on each of these three sections).

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Reese Aviation Cadets Have Excellent Club

Aviation Cadets at Reese Air Force Base now have an unusually pleasing and comfortable place to spend their leisure hours and entertain their friends. Their club which has been undergoing extensive repairs, remodeling and re-decorating is now open, and according to Capt. R. E. Pace, adjutant of the training squadron, is one of the best in the Air Training Command.

Approximately \$10,000 has been spent in the renovation. No appropriated funds were used, \$3,000 of the sum coming from the Air Force welfare fund and the balance from three years of the club's operation at Barksdale AFB, La., and at Reese.

The building, T-935, which originally housed the club at Reese, was enlarged by moving another building and combining them. There is now a cocktail lounge, a reading or study section and a ball room. Dark green and claret upholstery and drapery are used throughout, except in the ball room, which is not yet completed. Capt. Pace states that probably a different color scheme will be used there.

The club originally opened at Reese in November, 1949, with the arrival of the first cadet classes. The remodeling started in August, 1950, and was completed 12 December. It is available for the use of cadets and their guests from 4:30 p.m. until 10 p.m. Monday through Friday. Saturdays it opens at noon and closes when the last cadet and guest leave. On Sundays it is open during the afternoon and until 10 o'clock at night.

Capt. Pace is assisted in the operation of the club by S/Sgt. Jerome P. Hotten.

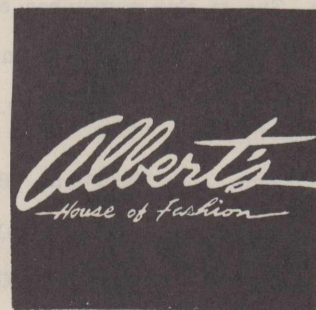

Clean-up campaigns have their place in city and rural areas, especially in the spring, but are unnecessary (or should be) on an Air Force Base where upkeep is a day-to-day procedure. I realize that, on a windy day, bits of paper and other debris have a tendency to become elusive and may later form a part of an unsightly mass in some out-of-the-way corner. Constant vigilance will insure that the appearance of our base always will merit commendation.

With spring just around the corner, high winds soon will become more frequent and, in this part of Texas, that usually means accompanying dust.

Experience has shown that the best way to control dust in any given area is a plentiful supply of grass. A large quantity of grass seed has been planted here at Reese. Given a chance to grow, this should lessen the dust nuisance a great deal, especially in the quarters area and around administrative and school buildings.

"Cutting across" areas and vehicle parking or driving on road shoulders are very destructive to grass areas and should be stopped immediately. When it rains, areas so abused will be mud—and later—when the mud dries—DUST.

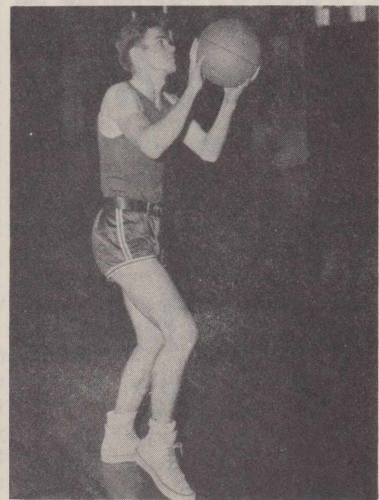
