It's been cold this week. Sunny Texas has betrayed us with low temperatures and high winds.

I am aware that it has been chilly in the quarters here at Reese. I know that the heating units are inadequate in the face of a winter like we are experiencing here this year. Air Installations have attempted to obtain permission to purchase bathroom heaters, but the request was not granted by higher headquarters because of a lack of funds for that

They are now planning to replace the present 35,000 BTU heating units in the quarters with 45,000

BTU units as rapidly as possible, but this work will require some time to accomplish and it is likely that for most of the quarters the situation will not be relieved this winter. Meanwhile a project for weather stripping windows, sealing cracks, and otherwise making the quarters cold resistant is underway and is proceeding as fast as available materials and manpower will permit.

I have mentioned before the increase in military personnel on the base. Along with this there has been a gradual increase in the number of civilians employed. The Air Force policy is to use civilians to the maximum extent on jobs not requiring military command positions. Civilian workers are invaluable to the military since they do not transfer as often as do military personnel, thereby stabilizing the working force by bridging the gaps caused by the necessary transfer of military personnel. As more civilian workers are hired, more military personnel are released for strictly military duties.

The fire department and the base shops are excellent examples of functions which are now predominately civilian and their employees have gained much praise for the smooth operation of these sections. The work of the fire department during the J. C. Penney fire in Lubbock was especially commended.

We are open to suggestions from civilian personnel for the betterment of working conditions here or for better ways of accomplishing their work. For some of these suggestions which result in savings to the government, cash awards can be paid.

Here is another superb novel which blends excitement and adventure with intellectual stimulation. Like the unforgettable, THE WHITE TOWER, mit midevelops man philosophy of living against a background of hazardous experi-

On the physical plane, RIVER OF THE SUN tells the story of Mark Allison, ex-Army pilot, who, for intimate reasons, plunged into the green hell of the Amazon valley. This expedition developed unexpectedly into a breath-taking search for Dr. Nils Barna, a scientist who had disappeared into the enveloping wildernes. As the story mounts in tension to a tingling elimax, there is a palpable evocation of the jungles, the nameless rivers, the mood and effect of unknown and exotic places, and man's magnificent struggle against

nature and himself. But RIVER OF THE SUN is more than mere surface excitement. For in his quest of inner peace, Mark Allison discovered that even amid the volcanic eruptions of this twentieth century there are still horizons beyond which lies the stuff the dreams are made of.

In his strange encounters with Christine Barna, wife of Dr. Barna, with an extraordinary American Negro fugitive, and with the decaying white men of the tropics, the Indians and the natives, Mark found that his long search through the jungles of the world and of the mind had freed him to go on into life.

RIVER OF THE SUN is thus a gripping novel of the deepest human emotions and of ideas which lead men into inspired action, set against the background of a savage, primeval wilderness. It is an impressive successor to THE WHITE TOWER.

Overseas Shipment Chaplain J. Walker Ban On Dependents Leaves Reese For Lifted By Services San Marcos AFB

The Department of Defense announced this week that it will continue to send dependents of military and civilian personnel to Germany. However, the shortage of housing in certain sections of Germany has made it necessary to slow down the movements of dependent people to that area.

On and after February 15, 1951 no applications for concurrent travel of qualified personnel and their dependents to Germany will be approved before February 15 will be permitted to have their families accompany them.

The overseas movement of the families of personnel who are assigned to stations in Germany will be by a priority waiting list which wil be established by the overseas comander. These families will receive overseas movement orders as soon as housing is available.



It's a small world and that fact was vividly brought to light the other day when S-Sgt. Armand Beliveau of the 3500th Medical Sq. received a letter from an old buddy, Sgt. Gene D. Wolfgram, who worked in the legal section here before being transferred to the Far East.

Sergeant Wolfgram wrote: 'Say, the other night I was reading the "Stars and Stripes", our overseas newspaper, when I came across an article on a guy who I think is your brother. At least it seems as though I remember you saying something about a brother in service. I'm enclosing the article for you."

It read: "WITH UN ON CENTRAL FRONT (UP)-Maybe it doesn't mean anything, but Sgt. Roland Beliveau of Lawrence, Mass., has a healthy prospect for Number 13.

"It started when he was born, Friday, Nov. 13, 1930. The number popped up again last month when his outfit fought its way out of the Kotori pocket in northeast Korea. His unit, an engineer combat battalion, left Kotori on Dec. 13. He was in truck No. 13 with a 13man squad. At the time, he was also the 13th man on the company payroll."

Now, Sergeant Beliveau says, he'll send the tattered news clipping home to his folks and they in turn will break the news to his brother in Korea.
