

SHADY OAKS GOLF PRO AND WIFE KILLED IN CAR ACCIDENT

BAIRD — John M. Wright, Jr., 54, and his wife, Thelma, 50, were killed in a two car accident about 8 a. m. Wednesday morning, about 18 miles west of Breckenridge on U. S. Highway 180.

Also injured in the accident were Mrs. Jean Jordan, 41, and her two children, Tara 8 and Billy 9 years old. Mrs. Jordan was listed in critical condition in Stephens Memorial Hospital in Breckenridge. She suffered severe facial lacerations and possible internal injuries.

Funeral services for Mr. and Mrs. Wright were held at 2 p. m. Thursday in Godfrey Funeral Chapel in Baird, with Rev. Albert Cooper, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Rotan, officiating.

A second service will be held at 11 a. m. Saturday in Jacksonville, Fla. Burial will be at Jacksonville.

Mr. Wright was born in Augusta, Ga., July 17, 1916. He was a retired Air Force Chief Master Sergeant and had served 23 years in the USAF. He had been golf pro at Shady Oaks Recreation Center at Baird since February, 1970.

He had just retired as pro, as of Wednesday of this week. He and his wife, Thelma, had moved to Tanglewood Island at Hubbard Lake, Monday.

He was a member of the Catholic Church, Masonic Lodge, and the Eugene Bell Post, American Legion.

Mrs. Wright was born in Savannah, Ga., on Sept. 7, 1920, the former Thelma Claire Clements. The couple was married in St. Augustine, Fla., on April 6, 1941. She was a member of the Episcopal Church.

The couple's survivors include a son, John Wright III, a golf pro at Elm Oaks Country Club in Abilene; a granddaughter, Charlie of Abilene;

Mr. Wright's survivors include his mother, Mrs. Pearl Wright of Jacksonville, Fla.; three sisters, Mrs. Margaret McElmoll of Jacksonville, Mrs. Ruby Eilan of Miami, Fla., and Mrs. Bridgett Jhioto of Alabama; two brothers, Matt of Atlanta, Ga., and Willie of Waycross, Ga.

Mrs. Wright's survivors include two brothers, Bill Clements of Jacksonville, Fla., and Frank Clements; a sister, Mrs. Mary Clark of Long Beach, Calif.

Callahan County Immunization Requirements For Public Schools

CLYDE — School officials have received from the State Department of Health the following regulations regarding compulsory immunization for Texas school students.

The law provides all students entering Texas elementary or secondary schools or institutions of higher learning must be immunized against six diseases.

Evidence of immunizations must be presented, as follows:

Polio - 3 doses required with last dose since age 4.

Diphtheria-Tetanus - 3 doses required with last dose since age 4 or within 10 years.

Measles - 1 dose or history of illness through age 12. No vaccination required for students age 13 and above.

Rubella - 1 dose through age 12. No vaccination required for age 13 or above.

Smallpox - 1 dose required within 10 years.

Since many types of personal immunization records are in current use, any document listing each immunization received and date received will be acceptable during the 1971-72 school year.

Further information will be published as it is received by the school district.

Burleson Announces \$355,000 Loan

WASHINGTON — Congressman Omar Burleson announced the approval of \$355,000 Rural Electrification Administration loan to the Taylor Electric Cooperative, Inc., at Merkel, serving Taylor, Callahan, Coke, Eastland, Fisher, Jones, Nolan and Shackelford counties.

This loan, together with \$310,581 of the borrower's general funds and supplemental financing from the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation which the cooperative proposes to obtain is for the following purposes: To finance 119 miles of distribution line to serve 870 new customers and to finance extensive system improvements including 3 miles of new line and conversion of 20 miles of existing line to a higher capacity.

Another essential of Christianity is observed in the second passage in the Bible where the name "Christian" is used - Acts 26:28. Here King Agrippa is found saying to the Apostle Paul, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian."

From this we observe that one of the essentials of Christianity is obedience to the things which the Apostle Paul taught. This was obvious to King Agrippa. We do Christianity a gross injustice when we refer to people as "Christians" who have not obeyed the teachings of Paul. We find Paul saying to the Roman Christians, "... but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you." (Rom. 6:17) People may exhibit some Christian attributes; they may live good moral lives; they may do good deeds - but if they have never "been buried with Him by baptism into death" (Rom. 6:3), they are not in fact Christians. This "burial in baptism" is one of the essentials of Christianity, without which Christianity does not exist.

An essential of Christianity is "glorifying God in this name." (1 Pet. 4:16) Peter said, "Yet if any man suffer as a Christian let him not be ashamed." It does not glorify God to exalt human denominational names. If we suffer it should be as Christians only, and only as Christians. No denominational name is essential to Christianity. Truly, the addition of denominational names negates Christianity. Why should any insist of abusing Christianity by the addition of denominational names that can in no fashion enhance nor beautify real Christianity? Why not be content to call Bible things by Bible names, and do Bible things in Bible ways?

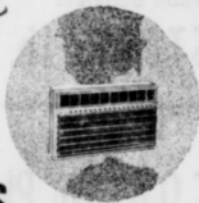
