

## Report From Washington

The Veterans Administration has mailed out the first of the National Service Life Insurance special dividend checks, warning that Veterans in general should not expect to receive their checks until several months after the policy anniversary date. A year will be required to complete the disbursement.

The Air Force has activated its first Air Resupply and Communications Wing, with Headquarters at Mountain Home AFB, Mountain Home, Idaho. This is one of several Wings being organized and trained by the Military Air Transport Service for later deployment overseas for service under the operational control of theatre commanders. They will have a dual mission: preparation, reproduction and dissemination of psychological warfare materials, and aerial resupply of military units.

The Army has announced plans for the immediate reacquisition and reactivation of the Baton Rouge, La., Engineer Depot. It will provide 770,000 square feet of warehouse space and two and a half million square feet of open storage.

\* \* \*

Fort Hancock, Sandy Hook, N.J., will be reactivated by the Army as part of the air defense system of the New York area. This historical Army post will be used as a training area and permanent station for anti-aircraft batteries. The State of New Jersey will be permitted to lease several hundred acres on the mainland end of the Sandy Hook peninsula for public recreational purposes.

A new 18-month graduate course in Industrial Administration has been added to the graduate program of the U.S. Air Force Institute of Technology. The course, covering advanced management and economics, will begin next September. Regular and Reserve Air Force officers under 37, who can meet academic requirements, are eligible.

The Air Force will open its fourth civilian contract basic pilot training school at the Bartow, Fla., airfield on May 29, with a class of 130 aviation cadets. Other such schools have been or are being established at Greenville AFB, Miss.; Columbus AFB, Miss., and Spence Field, Moultrie, Ga.

## Class In German To Be Held At Tech During The Summer

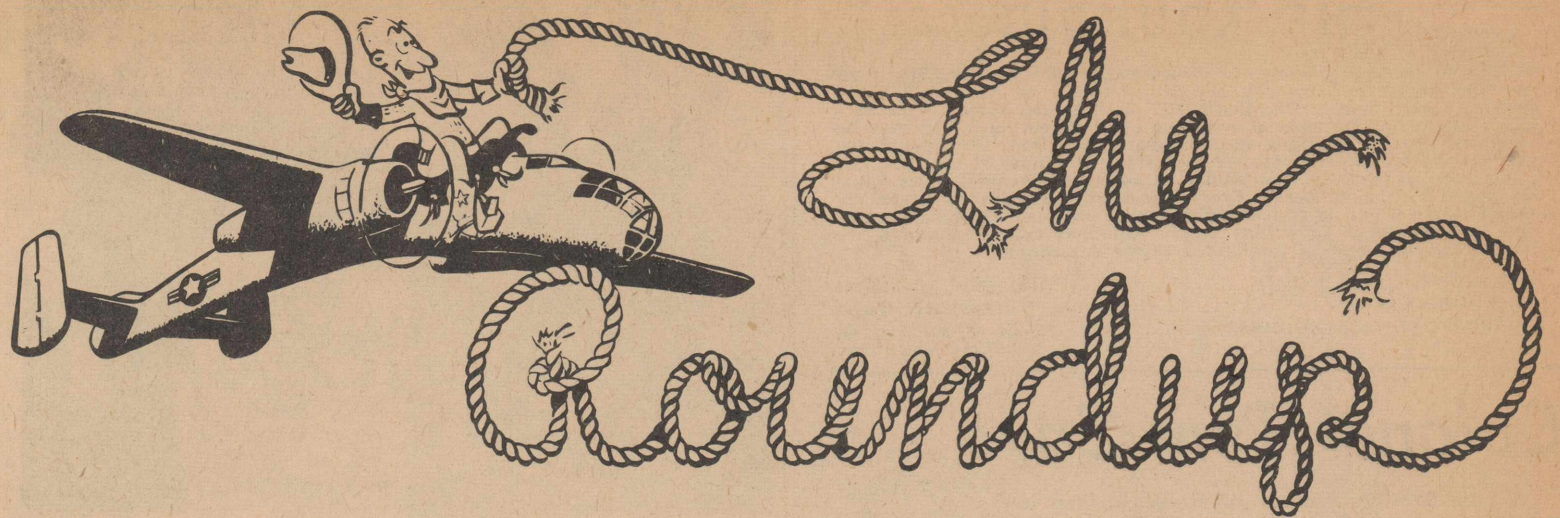
A combination of German 132 and 231 with a total of six semester hours extension credit will be offered to Reese Personnel this summer by Texas Tech.

The class, starting May 23, and lasting six weeks, will meet three times a week for four hours each evening. There will be a two hour lab meeting each week with individual instruction with a tape recorder.

Prerequisites for the course are: one year of high school German, or three semester hours of college German, or a course in German offered by a branch of the Armed Forces, or a first hand knowledge of German, resulting from a tour of duty in Germany.

Twelve students are needed before the Director of Extension of Texas Tech will authorize this class, which is being created especially for Reese personnel. The course will cost the student \$10.50, or, one-fourth of the tuition. The Air Force will pay the remaining three-fourths tuition.

All persons interested in this class are urged to contact the Information and Education Office in Building 421, or to call 574 as soon as possible in order that plans can be formulated on this German class.

## Woody Herman Band To Play At NCO Club

Woody Herman, one of the all-time favorites in musical entertainment, and his famous "Woodchoppers" will appear here at Reese next Wednesday, May 9th, and the Non-Commissioned Officers Club.

Woody has this to say about the music he and his orchestra is playing today. "We're striving to be progressive and play the music that is accepted as great, but we still try our best to make it understandable."



Herman, who is currently fronting one of the greatest musical aggregations of the age, is truly qualified to speak on the subject in as much as he has been playing before the public since he was nine years old. In an ex-

clusive long-distance interview, Woody said, "So many of the great musicians of today have suddenly become so ultra-modern that even they themselves don't understand what they are playing. While we like to be just as modern as the next one, we still haven't forgotten that we're playing for John Q. Public and we try to please him as much as possible."

Going on the stage at the age of nine, Woody was called the "Boy Prodigy of the Saxophone," and astounded the music world of that day with his superb technique. After being in vaudeville for many years, Herman yielded to the temptation of joining a name band. There his future lay. He formed his own band in 1938 with the nucleus of the Isham Jones band, of which he was a member, and has built it into the top band in the nation. The Herman outfit is one of the very few ever to make a clean sweep of all the popularity polls in one year.

## "Defenders Of Freedom" To Be Slogan, Reese To Hold Open House

### Cost Of GI Laundry Is Up, New Prices Effective May 1st

Effective May 1st, prices on GI laundry bundles for enlisted men rose from one dollar per bundle, to four dollars per month, according to Capt. Alva T. Adams Jr., OIC Quartermaster laundry.

Under the new "cash and carry" system for Air Force and Army laundry patrons, a one dollar fee will be charged for each 26 piece (or less) bundle sent to the laundry. The laundry bag counts as one piece in the new procedure. Should more than 26 pieces be included in the bundle, it will be returned unlaundered and the money refunded, except where piece rates are requested.

However, under the new arrangement, there is no limit to the number of bundles a man may send to the laundry each week, although the charge will be a buck per bundle. Only one bundle per week was allowed each man under the old system.

As was previously, the price of the laundry will be deducted from the airman's pay each month.

For officers and other authorized personnel, the new piece rate schedule includes a minimum price of 50 cents per bundle, if only one or two small items are included. The charge for hand finishing of wearing apparel will be doubled, and the home delivery charge will add 25 per cent to the total bundle cost.

"Defenders Of Freedom" is the slogan for the second annual Armed Forces Day which will be observed at Reese on May 19, Lt. Col. K. A. Gaskin, base project officer, announced this week. Last year's program was held in Lubbock with Reese personnel and noted military figures participating in the program.

The "Open House" at Reese will begin at 1100 hours and continue through the day until 1700 with aerial demonstrations, a band concert by the 514th, static displays of equipment used by the armed services, and a demonstration of the use of liaison planes in controlling ground firepower, scheduled.

The aerial demonstrations will include speedruns along the flight line, pull-ups, slow and formation flying by jets and P-51 aircraft, and a simulated rescue mission by helicopter. During the program formations of T-28 and B-25 trainers will fly over the base and over towns in the area that have requested to have the planes pass over their districts.

Women from the Officer Wives Club and NCO Ladies Auxiliary will operate refreshment booths along the ramp for the convenience of visitors attending the open house.

Maj. Roy A. Thompson, air police project officer for Armed Forces Day, stated that plans to handle the large volume of traffic that is expected are being rushed to completion. Visitors arriving at the main gate will be guided to a roped-off parking area on the ramp and when the day's activities are over, traffic will be routed so as to avoid all unnecessary delay.

A considerable number of Reese airmen are sewing on their first stripes this week. The promotion to privates first class marks the first step up the ladder of an Air Force career. My congratulations.

You men all have equal opportunity for success in the Air Force, but there is no doubt in my mind that a few years from now, some of you will be well on the way up the career ladder while others still will remain near the bottom.

Stop and ask yourselves—and this does not apply to the private first class only but to each airman at Reese regardless of his rank—are you as far up the steps of the career ladder as you should be in proportion to your years of service? If the answer is "no," ask yourself some further questions. Search for the reason why you have been left behind.

One airman may be a most efficient worker while on the job, doing everything that is asked of him and doing it well, yet when the promotion list is out, his name is omitted. Why? Perhaps he is a "sloppy Joe" in the squadron—careless about his personal appearance and the neatness of his area. This man is not ready for the added responsibility of additional rank.

Another airman may be neat, cooperative in the squadron, be doing good work in his assigned duty but is making no effort to learn the details of the job next above him. His name also must be omitted from the promotion lists—he is not ready.

It has been said that if a group of men were put out on an island and each given the same amount of supplies and tools, a year later some would be living in mansions and others would be beggars—according to their individual initiative and ability.

It is the individual that makes the difference—not the degree of opportunity.

If the man on the first rung of the ladder is careful to complete all the work which is in his reach, he is ready to climb, going higher and higher until the structure is completed—and the view at the top is much more interesting!

Men from various squadrons on the base under the direction of Personnel Services began clearing the brush, levelling the beach, hauling sand, and digging pits and ditches on April 1.

Air Installation workers began prefabricating the trusses and framework for the buildings on April 23 and put up the first pavillion on April 28. Using five to twenty-five men daily, they expect to complete the project not later than May 20, providing there are no material shortages.

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# Courtsmartial Manual To Be Effective May 31

As you probably know, effective the 31st of May 1951, all three branches of the Armed Forces; the Army, the Navy, and the Air Force, will be governed by a single Uniform Code of Military Justice. This code, on that date, will replace the currently effective Manual for Courts-Martial of 1949 which pertains only to the Air Force.

The purpose of these articles will be to acquaint you with a few of the major changes to be found in this code. It will be impossible to cover all points at this time and it is strongly recommended that all officers and airmen obtain copies of this new code as soon as they become available, and study it as thoroughly as practicable for their own in-

formation and benefit.

Perhaps, the first noticeable major change to catch your eye will be the new physical set up for the court room itself. The law member who is now designated the law officer no longer seats himself with the court but separate and apart and he also does not vote with the court as to the guilt of the accused as he has done in the past. Further, if a member of the court desires to question a witness or the accused, he must first secure permission to do so from the law officer and he is subject to the same rules of evidence as the counsels, formerly this action was the responsibility of the president of the court.

This has been introduced so that the law officer can rule more readily and easily as to whether or not the question to be asked by the member of the court is pertinent to the case and not injurious to the rights of the accused. The trial judge advocate, who prosecutes the accused in the name of the United States, has been re-designated as the trial counsel. This changing of name will undoubtedly relieve some of the confusion evidenced by personnel in an attempt to associate the trial judge advocate with his duties. In the appointing of counsel, both trial and defense, for General Courts-Martial, counsel must be qualified lawyers certified competent by the Judge Advocate General's Department. For a special courts-martial, if a certified lawyer is appointed as trial counsel; then the counsel for defense, so appointed by the convening authority, must also be a certified lawyer. Prior to the proceedings, both counsels are now sworn under oath as are other members of the court.

General Harper, a command pilot, heads the largest command in the Air Force. He arrived here from Scott Air Force Base, headquarters for ATRC to conduct this first official visit.

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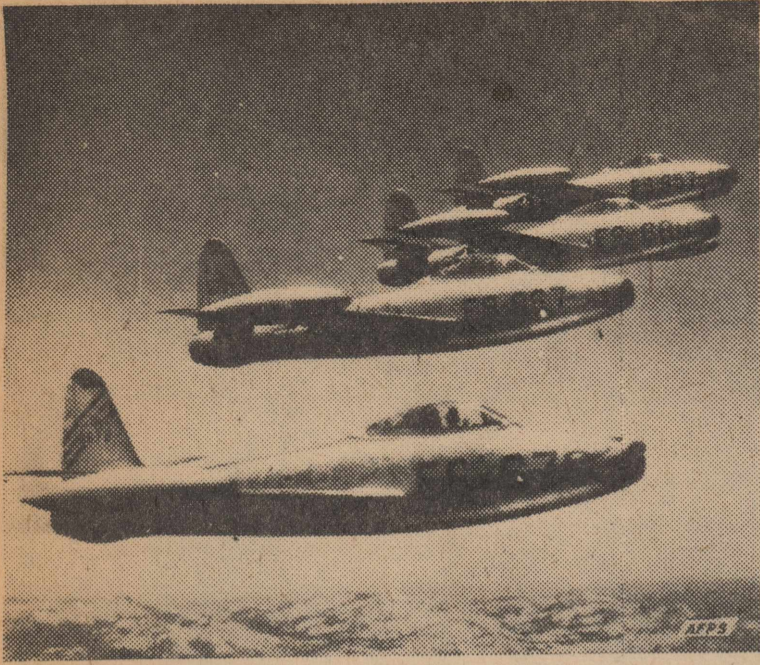

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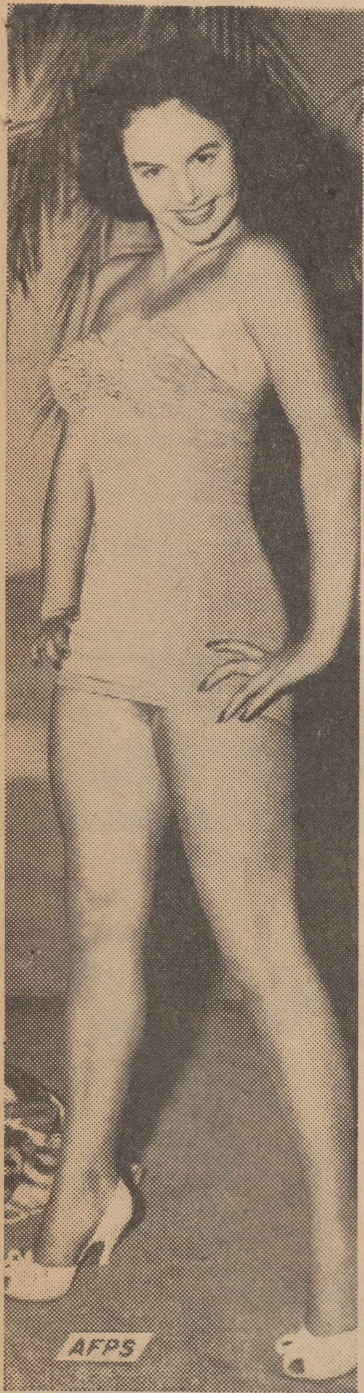

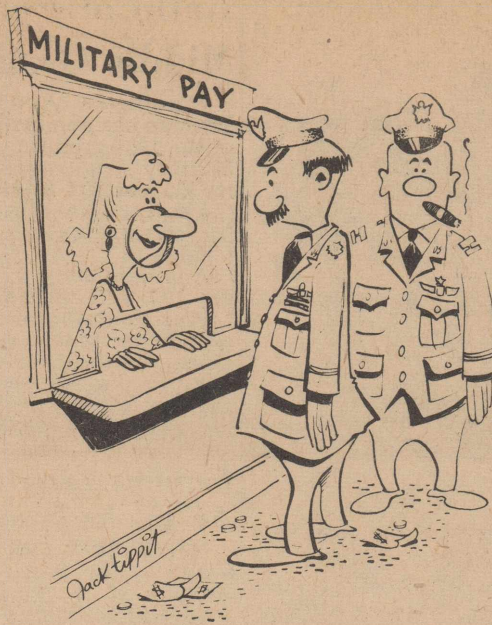
## Mosquito Oil Proves Worth;

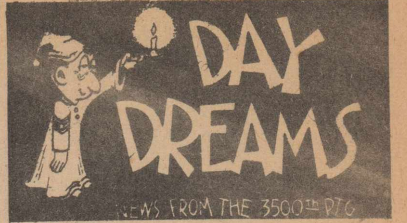

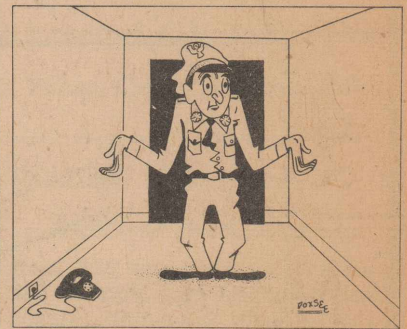

Much congratulations to Ira Collins, Keith Stiles for gaining their first stripes in the Air Force.

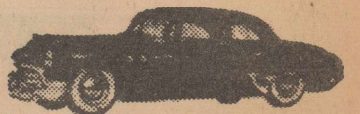
Also, Richard Hall, Robert Keibler, John Marquess, Richard O'Dell, and Martin Congleton, having been promoted to Corporal.

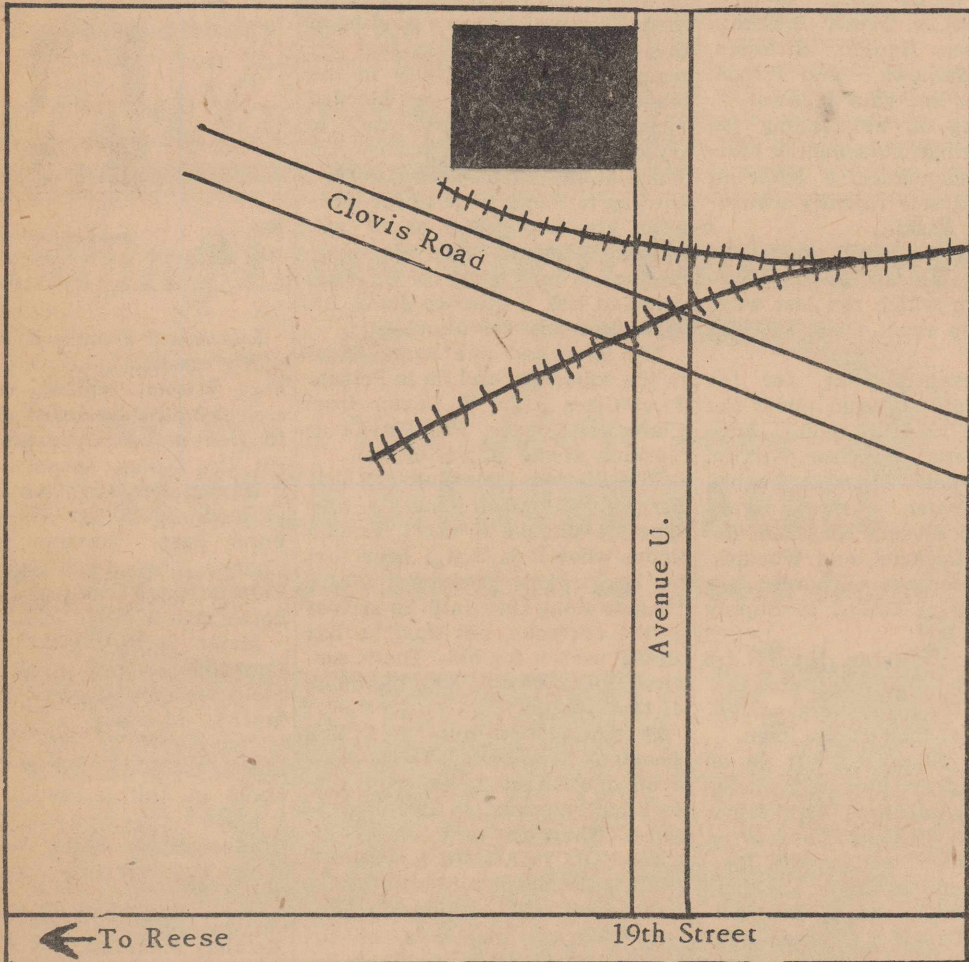

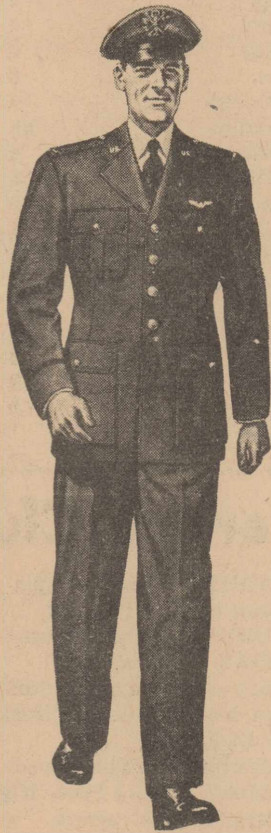

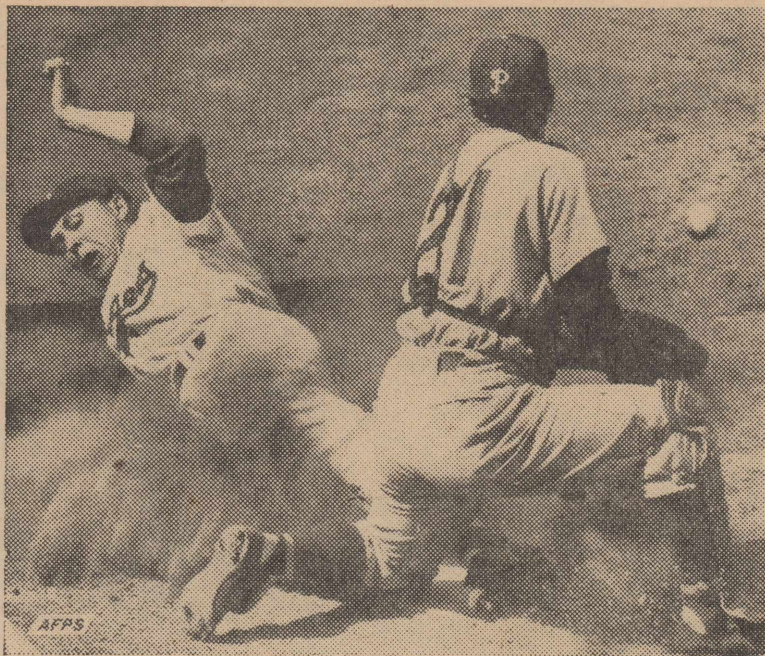
## Four Teams Fight For Bowling Lead
