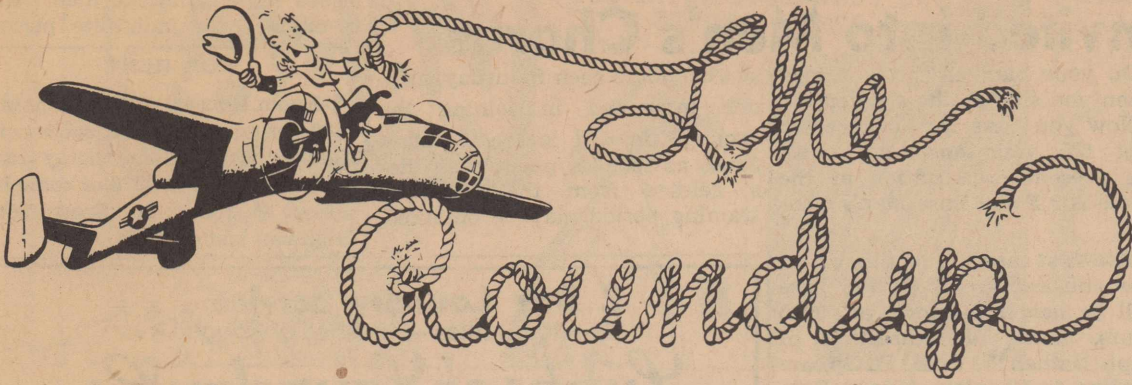

## Girls To Sell DAV Flowers Tomorrow

A Forget-Me-Not sale tomorrow will highlight the annual fund drive of Lubbock Chapter No. 44 of the Disabled American Veterans. Sales will begin at 0700 hours with headquarters at the Lubbock hotel.

Reese will have an opportunity to participate in the drive as a number of Lubbock high school and Texas Tech girls will be on the base from 1000 to 1300 hours to sell the flowers. They will accept contributions to the drive from stations at the NCO Mess, the Officers Mess, the base exchange, the civilian cafeteria and base operations.

Downtown, pretty girls will be on the streets all day giving South Plains citizens the opportunity to buy forget-me-nots.

Proceeds of the drive will be used to help needy veterans and their families and veterans in hospitals.

## Seeking Cash, Signatures to Halt Reds in Europe, Asia

A chance for every American to join the fight against Communism is offered by Radio Free Europe through the 1951 Crusade for Freedom, currently getting underway in this fall's campaign.

Last year, Americans contributed \$1,317,000 to the project with which Radio Free Europe's giant 135,000-watt transmitter was built in Germany to beam the simple charter "Tell the Truth" to Red-infested Europe. Today, hour after hour, the hard-hitting transmitters of Radio Europe pierce the Iron Curtain, sending hope to the

enslaved peoples . . . spiking Communist lies with truth . . . And undermining the influence of the Red rulers.

The 1951 Crusade for Freedom goal has been set at 25 million Crusade members and \$3½ million in contributions. Expansion of the program calls for at least two more powerful transmitters for Europe and the establishment of a freedom-station in Asia to stop the spread of Communism in the Far East.

At Reese, the Crusade is being sponsored by the base information and Education office. Two speakers, as yet unnamed, and a skit will be presented to military personnel Saturday, 20 October, to spark the drive, I&E announced.

### Jaycees Handle Drive

The Lubbock Junior Chamber of Commerce, along with Jaycee organizations throughout Texas, is handling the local drive. The Lubbock goal is \$3,500 and 24,000 signatures, Chauncey Trout, campaign chairman announced. Last week, a Crusade motorcade stopped in Lubbock, demonstrating propaganda techniques and explaining the Radio Free Europe program. The local drive will continue until 1 November, Trout said.

Information gained from a pamphlet published by the Crusade tells the story of Radio Free Europe:

"As an independent, citizen-supported station, Radio Free Europe hits hard. It sows suspicion and confusion among the Communists. It identifies quislings and informers by name. It reports on disappeared persons. It sends messages from escapees. It spikes Red propaganda lies. It spreads news the Soviets try hard to suppress.

"Other broadcasts bring the captive peoples their own music, literature, history and religion—all banned by the Soviet dictators.

### Keeps Hope Alive

Radio Free Europe first began broadcasting 4 July, 1950, from a small short-wave transmitter in the Frankfurt area of Western Germany. On its programs Czech exiles speak to Czechs, Poles speak to Poles, Hungarians to Hungarians, etc. The broadcasts are entirely in terms of the interests of the imprisoned peoples . . . designed to keep alive their hope

## Housing Project Possible; Congress Mulls \$ for Land

Possibility that the Air Force may construct a \$3,500,000 housing project adjoining Reese was announced in Washington this week, it was learned through the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Money to buy land on which to build housing near two Texas Air Force bases is contained in a supplemental appropriation bill taken up this week by the House. Perrin AFB is the other base involved.

Plans have been ready for some time to build a \$3,500,000 development at Lubbock, but work has been held up because

of the land purchase problem, the Avalanche - Journal quoted Repr. George Mahon, a member of the Appropriations committee, as saying.

The construction here would be handled under the Wherry act, it was learned, and should get underway either late this year or early in 1952.

The housing project is available in this area since Reese had been selected as a permanent base several months ago by the Air Force.

One hundred acres would be acquired for the construction.

## Last Chance To Enter in FlyTAF Contest Monday

Monday, 15 October, is the last day . . . and 1200 hours is the last possible minute that the public information office building T-1, will accept entries for the Flying Training Air Force insignia contest.

Base response to the contest, in which a distinctive design will be selected as the official FLYTAF emblem, has been slow, according to Capt. A. P. Mankin, public information officer. The PIO urges all personnel to participate by submitting an original design which exemplifies the purpose and mission of FlyTAF.

First prize in the event is a three-day vacation at one of the five resort hotels on the "strip" at Las Vegas, Nev.

Base military personnel may submit as many entries as they like, but each must be accompanied by the originator's name, rank, serial number and address. Drawings need not necessarily be submitted in "finished form." A sketch of an idea, which can be finished by an artist, may be the twist or idea FlyTAF is seeking.

All Reese entries will be forwarded from the public information office to FTAF headquarters in Waco, Tex., in time to meet the contest deadline.

Although losing out to Lowry, Reese brought home the runner-up trophy and displayed a lot of finesse in dropping Amarillo 8-3 in the first contest, and blasting Lowry 6-1 in the second game of the double-elimination tournament. Lowry took the championship with scores of 5-1 and 8-1.

Smooth-working Dalton Touchette limited the Amarillo men to only three scattered hits in the first game while his mates picked up five base blows. Touchette aided his own cause by smashing a double with Lenartowicz and Alford aboard to put Reese in front to stay. Murphy Lenartowicz was the big gun in the Reese attack with two singles in three excursions to the plate.

Touchette was once again in top form when Reese met Lowry and doled out two hits, both coming in the fourth inning, as he faced only 23 men in the seven frames he toiled. Slamming Roy Ketchum punched out a double and a single in three times to the plate to become the leading Reese sticker. Touchette was another power at the plate with a fifth-inning home run. The Reesers set up an iron-clad defense in the Lowry encounter that proved to be the highlight of the tourney.

Roaring into the finals against Lowry, clearly stamped as the favorites, and needing only a single victory for the crown, the roof fell in. Whatley and Goodwin shared pitching chores for Reese in the first game, giving up seven hits to the Coloradoans and five runs. Only one of the runs was earned. Ketchum scor-

ed the only run of the game for Reese when he homered in the seventh.

Touchette started the second contest and, after giving up five runs on two hits, had to be relieved by Goodwin in the fourth inning because of an ailing arm. Lowry poured across eight runs in the deciding game to take the tourney. Ketchum, as in the first championship get-together, slapped a home run for the only Reese tally.

The Reese contingent left Monday for Lackland AFB where they will participate in the National ATRC tournament. The team is coached by M-Sgt. O. K. Reynolds and captained by Maj. Clyde Bradley. Team members are: Sgts. Lenartowicz, Touchette, Goodwin, Clark, Diggs, Lopez, Walker, Wycoff, Alford, Ketchum, Daily, Coslow and Lt. Whatley.

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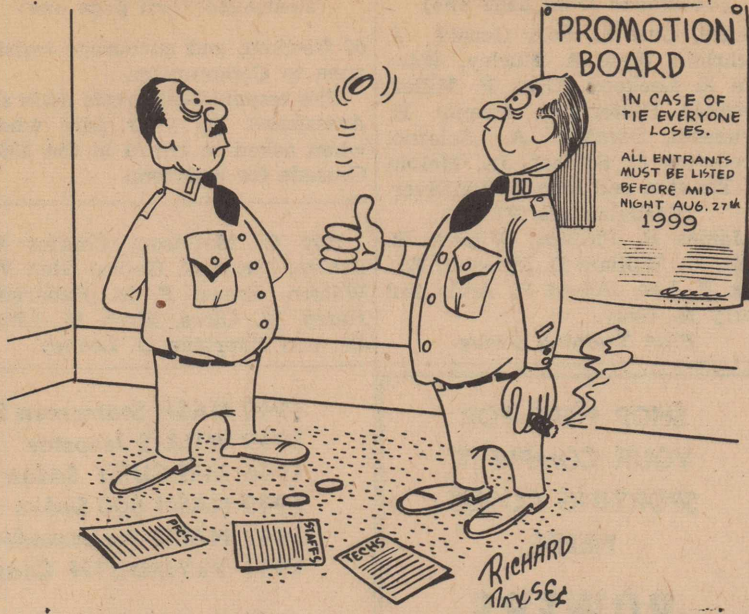
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**Photos Available**

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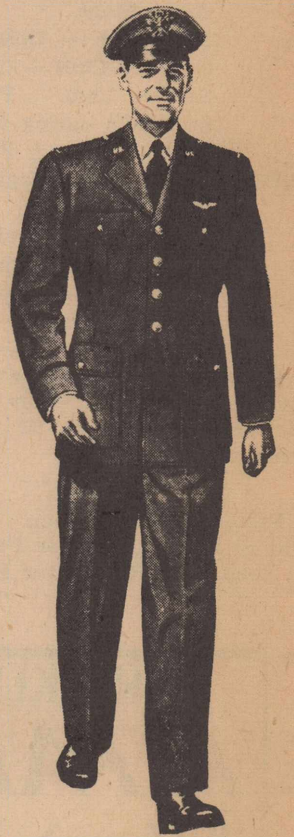
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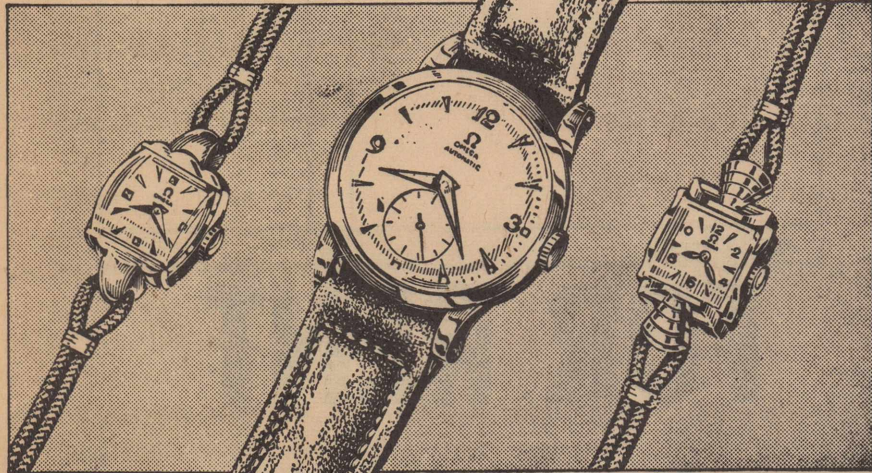

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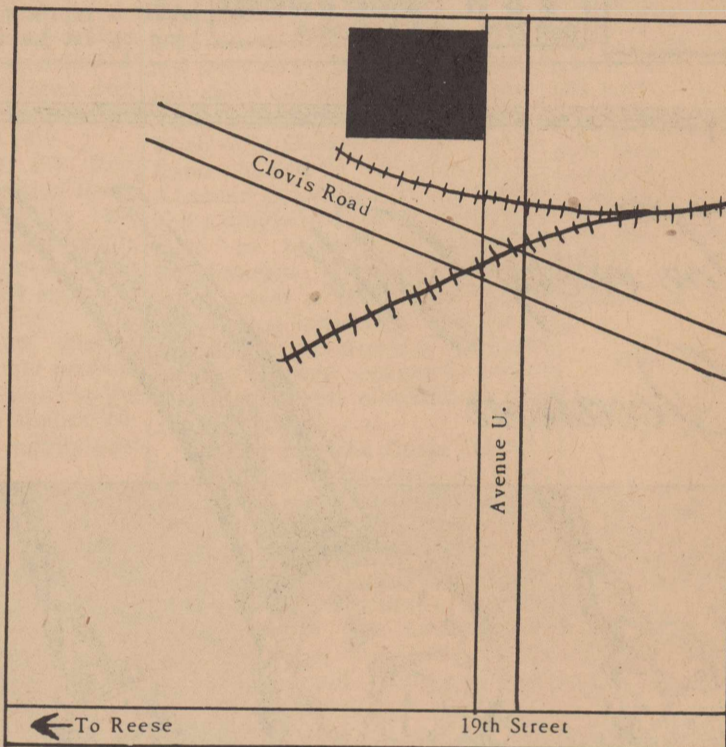
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
