Indians lose battle of the Tribes

The battle of the two Tribes was won by the Tribe from the north—the Quannah Indians. The northern Tribe prevailed over the

southern Tribe—the Haskell Indians, by the score of 0 to 34. Quannah's running back started the scoring for Quannah by running back a

Haskell punt some 88 yards for the six point lead. The two point conversion try was unsuccessful.

The Indians from Quannah

would add to their lead on a two yard run for a touchdown and add the two point conversion for a 14 to 0 lead at intermission.

Getting the pigskin first at the start of the third quarter, Haskell was still in the game. What looked like the start of a successful drive at the third quarter's beginning was halted by a Haskell turnover at the 24 yard line. Quannah came right back and used a drive of their own to get into the end zone and tack on the extra point kick for a 21 to 0 lead. The north Tribe would get six more points on a 46 yard run, but missed the PAT kick. The score at the third quarter's end was Quannah 27, Haskell 0.

The northern Tribe would add seven more points getting one touchdown and one PAT in the fourth quarter. Final outcome of the battle of Tribes, Haskell 0, Quannah

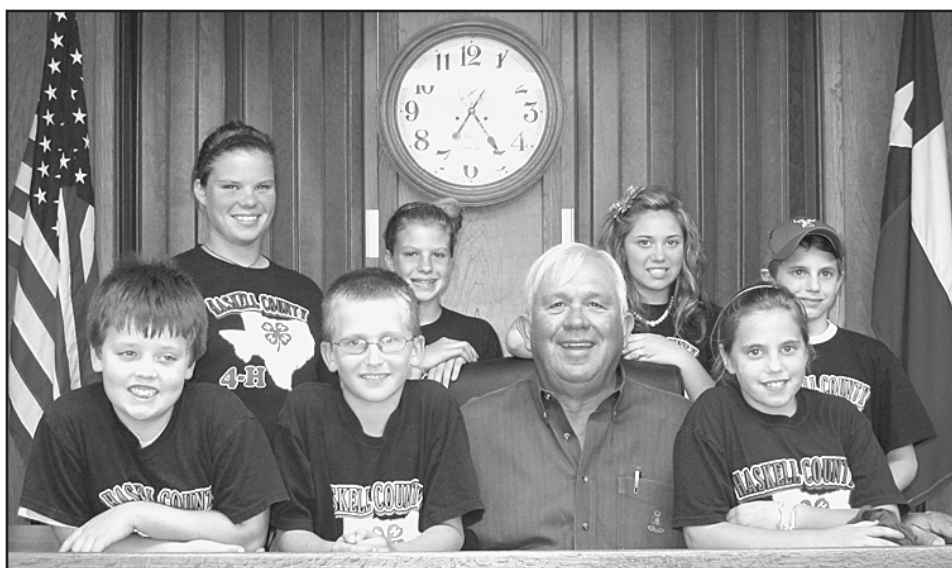
From three of the different 4-H clubs, some of the

On September 17, 2010, Atmos Pipeline – Texas, a division of Atmos Energy Corporation ("APT" or the "Company"), filed a Statement of Intent to change its natural gas transportation rates for firm and interruptible customers and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all transportation customers receiving service under existing Rate Schedules CGS and Rate Schedule PT. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is October 22, 2010. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 4 firm transportation customers and 63 interruptible transportation customers. APT's Other Revenue customer class is not affected by this filing.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$38.9 million. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. In addition, the Company seeks to recover all rate case expenses as allowed by law. The exact amount of rate case expenses will not be known until the case is completed.

Based on the proposed rate design, the meter charge will be eliminated, and the capacity charge and usage rate applicable for each of the customer classes affected by this filing will increase by the amount shown in the table below:

In addition to rate revisions, APT seeks to adopt a Rate Schedule CGS – Mid-Tex to be applicable solely to Atmos Energy Corp., Mid-Tex Division. This Rate Schedule will, consistent with the Commission's Final Order Nunc Pro Tunc in GUD No. 9869, include recovery of ad valorem taxes related to Mid-Tex's working gas in storage, as well as the return and related taxes on Mid-Tex's working gas in storage, the Accumulated Deferred Income Tax for UNICAP Section 263A and the WACOG to FIFO change related to the Mid-Tex working gas in storage. A second Rate Schedule CGS - Other is proposed for all other city gate customers that is identical to the proposed Rate Schedule CGS – Mid-Tex with the exception of the requested changes related to Mid-Tex's working gas in storage. Other proposed tariff changes include a new Rider REV, a new Rider WGIS, and minor wording changes in the other existing Riders applicable to service provided by APT. Specifically, APT seeks to adopt a new, revenue tracking mechanism (Rider REV) that will adjust Rate CGS and Rate PT annually for changes in the level of revenue received from APT's "Other Revenue" customer class in the prior year. APT also proposes to adopt a new Rider WGIS to establish a twelve (12) month surcharge to be applicable to Atmos Energy Corp, Mid-Tex Division to recover the regulatory asset balance in Account 182.3 – Other Regulatory Assets that has accumulated since the entry of the Commission's Final Order Nunc Pro Tunc in GUD No. 9869. APT proposes to adopt minor wording changes to all of its existing Riders, including a change in the title of Rider FF to Rider MF. Additional minor changes to APT's other Riders are proposed that will, for example, delete unnecessary definitions.

championships, two bi-district championships, and were district champs in '47.

The Simmons' dedication and positive influence inspired many, including the educators who followed in their footsteps. The school auditorium was named in their honor in 1989. The Simmons couple was very active and committed to the service of their family, church, school and community.

Bob and Joyce Easterling, who owned and operated the City Grocery, were a vital part of the Rochester community. Born and raised in Avoca, he moved his family to Rochester in 1968, after purchasing the store. He and wife Joyce, raised four children, who all helped out at the grocery and market. He had quite a talent for cooking, and it seems the café part of the store continued to grow, even as the grocery part got smaller. He was well-known for his steaks and burgers, as can be attested to by the many junior and high school students who ate at "Bob's" regularly.

Easterling was an experienced butcher and people came from all over to buy meat from him. Through the years, he also owned a drug store, complete with soda fountain, as well as another café. He spent many years serving on the city council, fire department, and was a member of the Lions Club. Anytime a community project or activity was taking place, the Easterlings could be counted on to be actively involved, especially if it required cooking a meal.

He took pride in his business, and even after the passing of Joyce, he resisted closing as long as he could. He felt the community needed it, and he didn't want to let them down. Perhaps the most important thing about Easterling was that he truly cared for people. He was very friendly, talkative and generous. He always went out of his way to help others.

Cliff Crofford, who became an accomplished songwriter and performer, will also be honored posthumously at this year's homecoming. He was born in

Rochester in 1929. Crofford's family lived and farmed in the community until 1942, when they moved to California to work in a defense plant. After WWII, Crofford moved back to Rochester to finish his education, where he graduated in 1947.

He found his talent in music, when as early as five years old, he won a talent show. His mother bought him his first guitar at age five and he taught himself to play, something he spent a lifetime doing.

Pursuing a degree in music, he left Rochester for Riverside College in California. Throughout his career he toured with greats like Roger Miller and Johnny Cash, wrote numerous songs recorded by many famous singers, appeared in a couple of movies with Clint Eastwood, and had twenty-eight movie songs including "Send Me Down to Tucson," "Bronco Billy," "Smokey and the Bandit II" and "Honky Tonk Man."

Perhaps one of his most memorable songs, at least for folks around Rochester, was "Old Rivers," recorded by Walter Brennan. It tells the story of Crofford, a young boy who followed an old farmer as he used a mule-driven plow to cultivate the fields in the hot sun. Old Rivers, as he was known in Rochester, shared with the boy his vision of a place he one day was going to go, by "climbing that mountain."

Crofford's trumpet, pictures and a book have been donated by his family and will be placed in the Rochester Homecoming museum, located in the Rochester cafeteria.

Immediately following the program, about 3 p.m., a parade will be held downtown. Susan Turner, chairman of the homecoming committee, wants to encourage all classes, individuals and groups to participate. The goal is to have each class represented in this year's parade. There will be a competition for the best parade entries.

Rounding out the weekend of activities, will be a meal served downtown at 5:30, with more visiting and a street dance downtown at 8:30.

Dr. Tamara Olive presented at the International Conference on Interdisciplinary Social Sciences at the University of Cambridge, UK. The conference was held Aug. 2-5. Dr. Olive's presentation was entitled "Desire for Higher Education in First-Generation Hispanic College Students," based on research she conducted at Sul Ross State University, a member of the Texas State University system designated as a Hispanic-serving institution.

The conference addressed interdisciplinary practices across the social sciences, as well as between the social sciences and the natural sciences, applied sciences and the professions.

Dr. Olive's paper has been published in Volume 5, Number 1, 2010 of the The International Journal of Interdisciplinary Social Sciences, a fully refereed academic Journal. Olive also acted as an associate editor for this volume of the journal.

Dr. Olive's study examined the desire to attend college among first-generation Hispanic students enrolled in a post-baccalaureate achievement program designed to increase the attainment of terminal degrees by students from underrepresented segments of society. The descriptive phenomenological research method was employed. The results of this research identify the roles of resilience, previous success, awakened awareness, comfort in the academic environment, a need to contribute to others or to society, a break with tradition, a process of self-discovery, and the influence of valued individuals in facilitating a desire for higher education.

Olive is an assistant professor at Sul Ross State University, where she teaches in the graduate counseling program,

and she maintains a part-time private counseling practice in San Angelo. She is a licensed professional counselor and a nationally certified counselor. She received her B.A. from Angelo State University, her M.Ed. from Sul Ross State, and her Ph.D. in psychology from Saybrook Graduate School in San Francisco, California. Her research has also been published in the Journal of Phenomenological Psychology, and she presented her findings at the International Human Science Research Conference in 2009 in Molde, Norway.

Dr. Olive is a graduate of Stamford High School, and is

the daughter of Ruth Lamed of Haskell, and the late Curtis H. Cox of Stamford.

Dear editor,

This letter is in response to the article in the newspaper that inquired about the Haskell CISD's transportation vehicles, Haskell CISD has only purchased one additional vehicle in the last 22 months since I have been here. The vehicle was a pre-owned 2007

Suburban that was bought with Special Education funds. These funds come to us when we have to transport Special Education students. We had one deaf student last year and we have a different one this year. We earn between .89 cents to \$1.08 per mile for transportation of special children.

We have also replaced one maintenance truck because the old one was really on its last leg. We have replaced one AG-CATE (Career and Technology Education) pickup since the old one had over 140,000 miles on it. We will be purchasing another AG-CATE pickup this week if our Board approves this on Sept. 28. These Ag pickups travel many, many miles per year with our students as they show their stock and compete in the educational events that are offered in the CATE program. One of our event teams competed in Oklahoma City last year at the National level and another team will be going to Kentucky in November, since they qualified for the Nationals also. We are very proud of our kids and we will continue to push them to the top. In regard to the AG-CATE pickups, our revenue funds for the CATE program are outstanding since we have so many students in a program that is very successful and we all support it.

Our numbering system for the HCISD (numbering system) was started many years ago. I suppose it was like drawing numbers out of a hat. We use numbers on vehicles to track fuel purchase. No, we do not have 37 vehicles. Our bus fleet is in pretty good shape but needs a little attention. We have two buses that have 179,729 miles and 134,960 miles on them. We are looking at selling them and replacing them with just one bus. Our fleet of buses has an average of 68,207 miles on them. Our transportation fleet is large and complicated. We use vehicles to transport teachers between Rochester and Haskell since they teach at both places during the day. We also have students engaged in all sports, UIL, and field trips. Our teachers use vehicles since they go to required staff training which is usually in Abilene at our Region 14 Service Center.

I would be glad to sit down with anyone that has a question in regard to our transportation system. My door is always open and it would be a pleasure to visit with you.

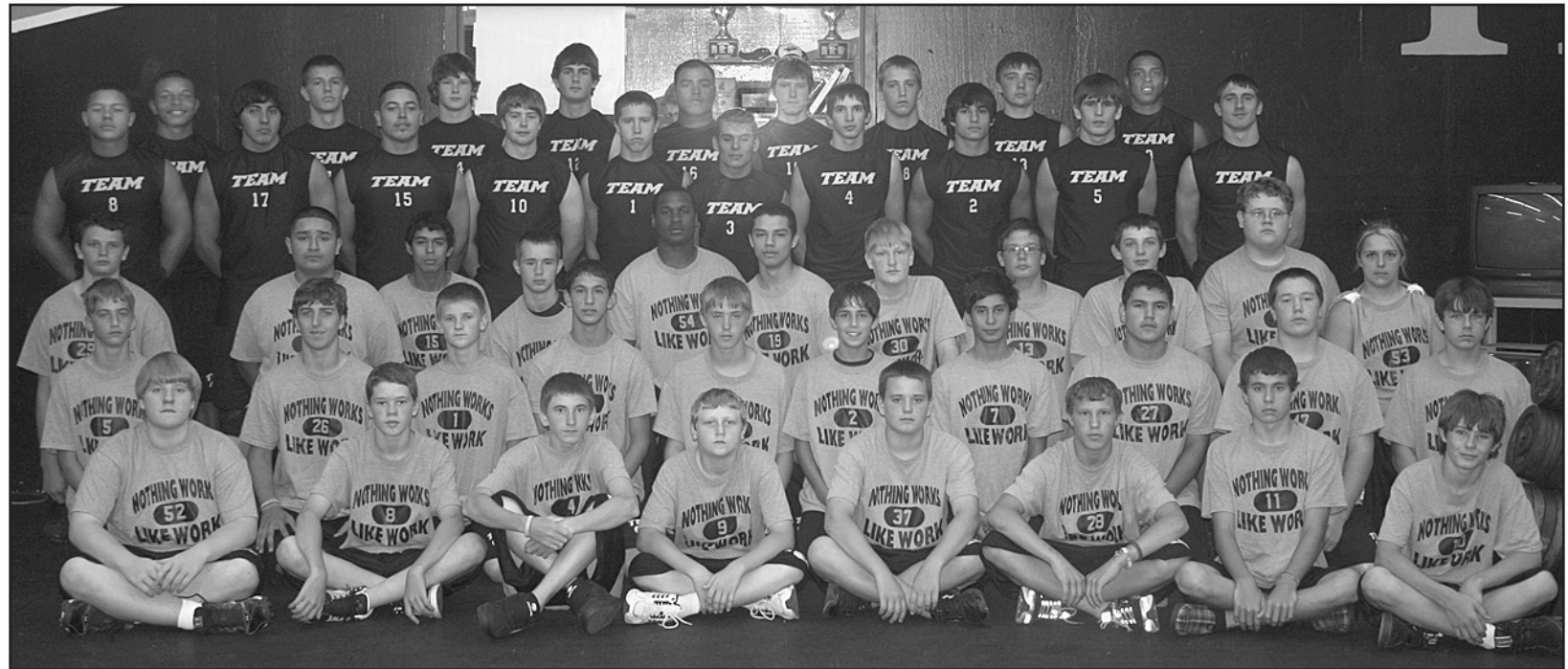

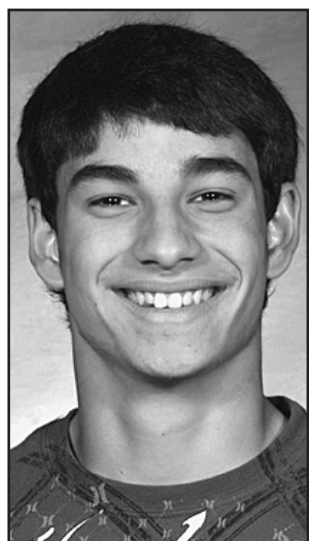

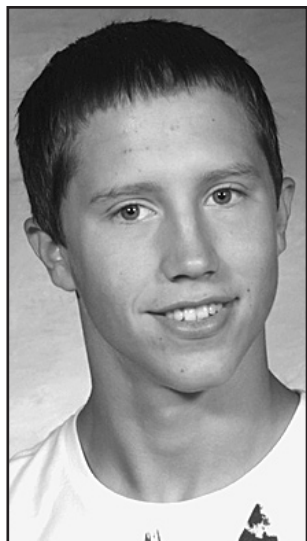

The Haskell Jr./Sr. 4-H Clubs met Sept. 19. Seventeen members, three guests and six club managers were present.

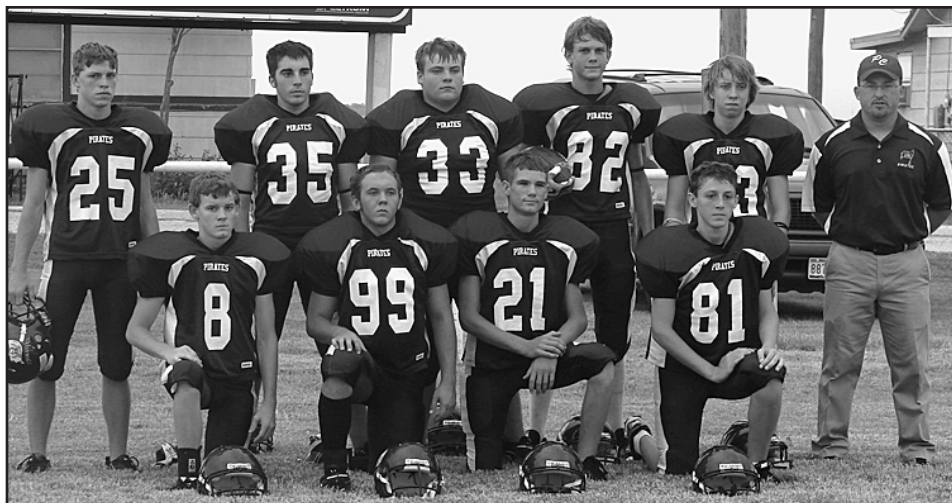
The activities of the meeting included an election of Club officers, reading of new and old 4-H business and refreshments.
