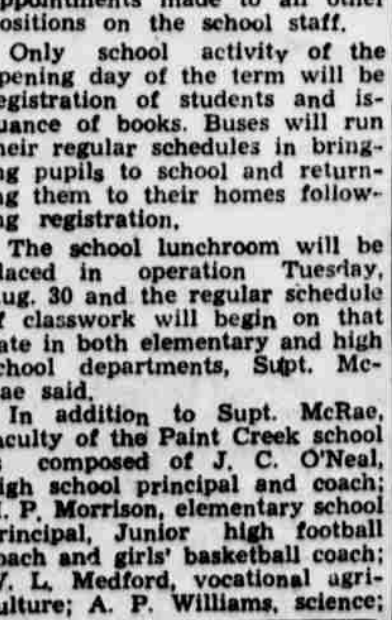

Free Course In Clothes-Making Offered Adults

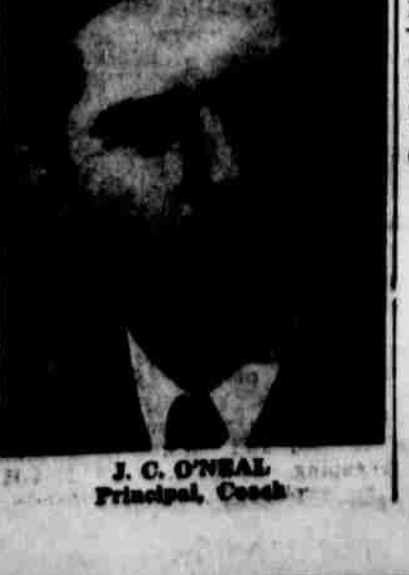

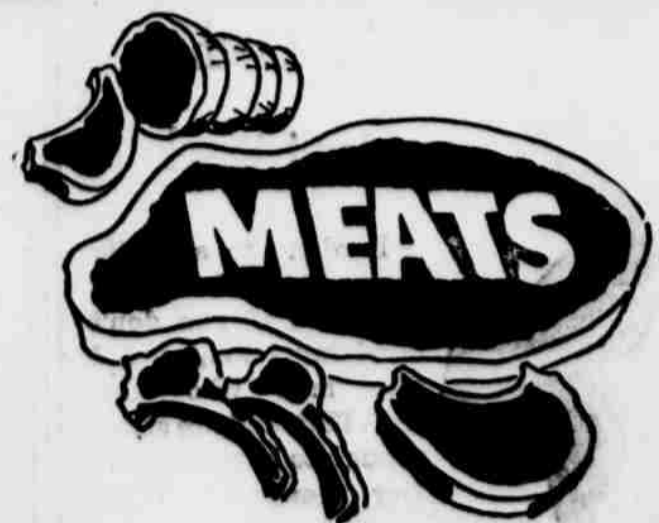

Haskell Woman Tells of Historic Points Visited on Trip to North Carolina

Mrs. B. M. Whiteker of this city has returned from an automobile trip through several Southern States and to Ridgecrest, North Carolina, where she attended the Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly. Some of the interesting highlights of her trip are told in the following account of her tour:

"In company with my daughter, Marjorie, Mrs. Lucy Ann Fuller and son Danny, II, I left Dallas Sunday morning July 23, bound for the Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly, Ridgecrest, N.C. Having been a Sunday School teacher all through the years, this trip had long been a submerged dream of mine. Instead of attending a Sunday School session, however, I found myself headed for a Training Union Assembly.

"We drove to Longview the first morning and attended services in the First Church. We had attended a Sunday School convention in this church two years ago and were glad to visit there again. In the afternoon we drove to Shreveport, La., and after securing our lodgings, we went across the river to the magnificent Broadmoor Baptist Church and heard a splendid sermon by the associate pastor, the pastor being at the World Alliance. We did not find a greater spirit of friendliness and fellowship anywhere than in this good church.

"Monday we drove to Vicksburg, Miss., and had dinner at the famous Tremmelos Kitchen. We decided this was one eating place that lived up to its advertising.

After a visit to the historic old courthouse, now a museum, and a drive through the National Cemetery, we proceeded toward Greenville, Miss., my mother's childhood home. Near the town, she lived on a delta plantation owned by her father when the Northern Army came through in 1862. The home and all buildings were destroyed and even the crops were laid to waste. I've heard my mother relate many times how grandmother gave the colored people their freedom, since there was little left for even the family of four to subsist on, and my grandfather was still in the Army. Greenville was destroyed at the same time but we noticed that some of the old buildings had been restored and it is now a prosperous, thriving city.

"We took the scenic drive up Lookout Mountain and had a good view of the surrounding valley, where at one point seven states come together. The drive through the Cherokee Indian Reservation is indescribable for sheer beauty of nature. We followed the bends of the Ocoee River for many miles where we were fortunate enough to see the lovely rhododendron in bloom and a beautiful waterfall from the side of the mountains. Several interesting points were observed in Atlanta. Among these were the Wren's Nest, where Joel Chandler Harris wrote the Uncle Remus stories for children. To one side of the yard we were shown the original 'briar patch' the habitat of Br'er Rabbit and his friends and back of the house is the cabin occupied by Uncle Remus. We traveled Peachtree Street, made famous by Miss Mitchell in 'Gone With the Wind' and had supper in Manning's Kitchen, famed for its culinary art.

"Wednesday morning we visited Blue Ridge, Ga., where my father lived with his parents until he was 17 years of age. Many years later he returned and held a meeting which was attended by many relatives and old friends. A quaint old town, with few of the sturdier old buildings left, including a red brick hotel that is truly a reminder of the past. Located in the mining and copper district, the small town still has its share in world affairs. Incidentally they were having a convention of the State Welfare Association that day, with many visitors enrolled.

"Driving through some lovely country Thursday morning, we especially enjoyed the view of the Great Smoky Mountains. We had lunch in Asheville, N. C., then drove to Ridgecrest for registration and assignment of rooms. Frankly, I've never seen a more beautiful setting than the one the Assembly occupies. With na-

ture at its best, attractive buildings and well planned programs, one cannot help being happy while there. My first impression was that it was only a place for young people—there were such hordes of them present! However, I found when various groups were formed, there were plenty of older adults in classes. The older ones were from 56 up. A gold badge was mine for perfect attendance. Breakfast was at six, and the song service started at 8:40 o'clock. Two conference periods followed and we were back in the auditorium at 11:40 for regular services, which lasted until 12:45. Recreational programs were from two to five in the afternoon, but it was purely optional whether one attended or not. Supper was served at six, then the same procedure was followed as in the morning, with a sermon and an impressive lakeside service following.

"Dr. Pearce of Baltimore, Md., was the assembly pastor and brought some wonderful messages. Four hundred people were on the kitchen staff, many of them young men and women who were attending one of our Baptist colleges, but helping to carry on the work during their vacation. Through their courteous services and pleasant manners, the mealtime was always an enjoyable occasion. Oftentimes there would be four or five states represented at one table. All young people in attendance were just lovely. One young man from Lueders was on the staff. The report on registration gave 3,007 as the number present and on Sunday there were 3,417 at the morning services.

"We had around 75 in our Texas group, most of them from Dallas. Believe I was the only one from West Texas, but met a woman from LaGrange and one from Kerrville. We had several meetings together, had our pictures made in a group, and enjoyed a watermelon feast on the last evening.

"I thoroughly enjoyed meeting people from other states. They joked about various expressions such as 'come in and set'—one woman said she was invited to come in the hostess remarked 'we are just a sittin' and a visitin'.' Of course, Texas was jibed about 'you all.'

"We left Ridgecrest at 2 p. m. Wednesday afternoon, coming by way of Memphis, Tenn., Little Rock, Ark., Texarkana and Dallas. Since I had visited with the children in Lake Jackson, Austin and Dallas for six weeks before making the main trip, I was glad to turn my face homeward. Do want to say again that Ridgecrest is a wonderful place to be, and I shall always be thankful I could have the trip."
