
7th Grade Integrity **BB** Team takes 3rd

FISD January Board Meeting | About town

The FISD Board of Trustees met for its regular meeting December 13th at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Conference Room.

Educators, Support Staff and Students of the Month were honored with certificates of appreciation.

General Items of Consent were presented, discussed and approved.

The District paid out \$145,000 Fall Incentive payments to employees in November.

Bill Patton of Robison, Johnston, and Patton, LLC out of Lubbock presented the Annual Audit Report of the School District. Patton stated that its was a "Remarkable Report" and that the District's expenditures and revenues were "spot on!" The Board unanimously approved the audit as reported.

Craig Wallace of Styles, Wallace and Associates gave his construction progress report. He presented diagrams and drone photos showing that the basementarea concrete had been poured. Some beams and bar joists had been installed and the backfill against the basement areas would begin in the near future.

Regarding the wall that had fallen during the December 7th wind storm, Wallace stated that the specific wall was not designed to stand alone, having only minimum support for the structure. "It was a timing issue," he explained, as the steel braces from W & W Steel in Lubbock were expected to arrive on Tuesday, December 11th.

As to the assertions of "faulty" practices, Wallace stated that both, Knox Gaily & Meador General Contractors and D&L Masonry of Lubbock are some of the best rated companies in the industry. Their insurance agreed to cover the damage. The construction will push forward, with the intent to make up the days lost to severe weather by working on weekends.

As to the progress of the site, Wallace said that the red, steel beams will begin to move skyward. The concession-stand, located on the northwest corner of the site, is expected to be completed in January. By the end of January, the northernmost building on the site, the Career and Technology Education building, will be up and in use, primarily as construction storage. Next, the auditorium will be finished, then the basement. Work will move to the field house to accommodate space restrictions for equipment. Hellas Construction (Austin) is scheduled to begin work in May/ June, completing the track and field sometime around the first of August. During this time the bleachers are set to begin arriv-

The big question is this: Will Floydada be hosting and playing football on a new field in 2019? Wallace stated, "The plan is 'yes'." That completed Wallace's project report.

The official ratings of the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas (FIRST) were released to school districts in October. FISD received a B rating, primarily because the district had been penalized for paying off the 2017 bond early. The District appealed the rating. On November 9,2018 word was communicated that the appeal had been honored and the rating was changed to an A-Superior rating.

Eric Smith was nominated as FISD Trustee to the Floyd County Central Appraisal District Board of Directors for the 2019 and 2020 terms. The trustees unanimously voted in favor of the appointment.

The school district has obtained the Brown property located at 1209 Ralls Highway. It will be utilized as the district's transportation and maintenance facility. All district vehicles and busses will be housed on the

An open discussion on academics and the efforts being made to improve and align the system has been on-going. Superintendent Trevino stated, "We want to create a district where students are on grade level in each subject area." Reading and English are areas indicating needed improvement. The District hired Monica Smith as Director of Reading and English Instruction to help the staff develop effective methods and teaching practices. Trevino stated that Mrs. Smith had devoted endless hours to building a solid reading foundation for the elementary students.

The next board meeting will take place January 10, 2019.

Lockney City approves Variance, EDC Funding and City Farm Leases

The Lockney City Council met Tuesday, December 18th for its regular monthly meeting.

The first agenda item was to take public comments and to discuss and take action on a variance request to construct a wooden fence at 621 SW 2nd Street. Owner, Ysef Alvarado was present to make that request. After discussion and evaluation, councilmembers moved that the variance request be approved. The approval vote was unanimous.

A request had been made to add the Court System Module to the Tyler Technologies Software package, currently being purchased and implemented by the City of Lockney. Magistrate Judge Ed Marks was present for the discussion. The cost to add and implement that module would be an additional up-front cost of \$10,560, with a yearly maintenance cost of \$1,100.

the Hill Country software package. The company has recently been purchased and rumor is that they will be consolidating with another system. The Hill ing to use at this time. Council members chose to table this decision, requesting that additional information be obtained.

EDC Director, Dan Smith, presented the monthly EDC report to the Council. He stated that the EDC had approved its first application request and asked the council to give the approval to move forward. The application, made by Shannon Shurbet, is for remodel and implementation of the car wash in Lockney. Grant funds approved by the EDC total \$15,000 which will be paid upon receipt of equal expenditures. After discussion, the council unanimously approved the application. A second reading is required by law. That reading will take place at the council meeting scheduled for January 22, 2019. Smith stated that the EDC is eager to review additional applications from current business owners and prospective business owners that are needing funds for remodeling or implementation of a new business in Lockney. The City of Lockney has EDC grant application information for interested parties.

The City Farm lease renewals were discussed. Current les-

Currently the court system uses sors, Jimmy Kemp and Heath Rexrode, agreed to the renewal. City Council members approved unanimously to renew the City Farm leases as required.

City Manager Poling pre-Country software costs noth-sented a list of documentation required by the Community Development Block Grant. If the City is awarded the grant of \$275K, the city will be required to provide matching funds in the amount of \$41K. The City plans to utilize the funds for additional water system improvements.

The Texas Health and Human Services Department notified the City that they are required to designate a local Rabies Control Officer. It was suggested that Brent Poole be designated as this officer. The councilors unanimously approved the action.

Dennis Carter was recommended for appointment to the Appraisal District Board as the City Representative. Councilors unanimously approved this ac-

Councilors attending the meeting were as follows: Councilman Aaron Wilson, Councilman Dart Carthel, Councilman Donny McLaughlin, and Councilman Tyler Dunivan. Also in attendance was Mayor Michael DeLeon, Manager Buster Poling and City Attorney Lanny Voss.

THE FLOYD COUNTY HISTORICAL MUSEUM **MEMORIES 1979**

EDDIE AND MARY MUNIZ

Edward "Eddie" Muniz was born on July 11, 1930, in Pleasanton, Texas. His parents were Tomas and Manuela Muniz.

Eddie's parents moved to Edinburg, Texas in 1942. His Mother died a little after the move and he, his sister, and brother were raised by two aunts.

In 1949, Eddie went to work at the Faysville Gin which was owned by Wallace Bohannan. Mr. Bohannan owned gins in South Texas as well as in West Texas and Mr. W. W. Trapp managed them. In the summer Eddie worked the ginning season in South Texas and in the fall he worked the ginning season in Floydada. At the time, he was single and he traveled back and forth for two years.

Maria "Mary" Govea was born on March 15, 1934, in Edinburg, Texas, the youngest of five children. Her parents were Marcelino and Asencion Govea. Mary's father died when she was five and the oldest brother, who was sixteen, helped to raise the family.

Eddie and Mary were mar-

ried in Edinburg on August 16, 1952. They met at the Edinburg Bus Station where Mary worked.

In September of 1952, Eddie and Mary came to Floydada together for the first time for the fall ginning season.

While Eddie worked at the gin, Mary also had two fall jobs. She worked at King's Variety Store for two years. When the store changed to Perry's, she worked there one year. At the same time she worked for Floyd County Courthouse as an interpreter for the gin's contract workers from Mexico. The job interpreter was limited because she was only needed when the contract workers got into a little trouble. She had this job for three years.

From 1952 to 1956, Eddie and Mary traveled 1,270 miles a year from Edinburg to Floydada and back (to Edinburg) for the ginning seasons. On January 1, 1957, Mr. Trapp asked Eddie to stay in Floydada, which he did. Eddie and Mary and their family still travel to Edinburg every year not to work but to visit their relatives.

Eddie has worked at the Bohannon Gins, Floyd County Co-Op Gin, and now the Floydada Co-Op Gins for a total of twenty-five years. Today he is the foreman of the Floydada Co-Op Gins.

Mary is employed at the Andrews Ward Cafeteria. She has worked there for the past nine years.

Eddie and Mary have four children. Mike was born September 29, 1953, in Edinburg, graduated from Floydada High School, and is employed at Oden Chevrolet. Carmen was born June 14, 1955, in Edinburg. She graduated from Floydada High School and is now employed at Lighthouse Electric. Eddie, Jr. was born November 1,1957 in Floydada, where he graduated from Floydada High School. He is employed at Don Hardy Race Cars. Roy was born September 9, 1959 in Floydada. He is a senior this year and is employed at Buddy's Food through the Decca program at school.







Farm bill signed into law

After a handful of listening sessions, hundreds of comments and weeks of negotiations, the 2018 Farm Bill was officially signed into law today.

Texas Farm Bureau (TFB) Vice President Mark Chamblee of Smith County and Secretary-Treasurer Scott Frazier of Nueces County attended the signing ceremony at the White Housecontinuing the integral role Texans and those involved in agriculture played in the crafting of the bill.

While farmers and ranchers may not have had a direct hand in ironing out the details of the farm, nutrition and conservation legislation, their questions, concerns and stories helped guide the farm bill conference committee's work, according to U.S. Congressman Mike Conaway of Texas.

"Well over 1,000 people came before our groups (at the listening sessions) and poured their hearts out as to why this farm bill's important, what it does for them, the agriculture sector," U.S. what it doesn't do for them Congressman Will Hurd of and those kind of things," Conaway, chair of the House Committee on Agriculture, will continue to fight for told the Texas Farm Bureau (TFB) Radio Network. "It was important. It was good to have that passion and have that emotion you saw there as a motivating factor to say, ens the farm safety net by 'I've got to get this done."

For the first time since 1990, a farm bill was passed in the same year the legislation was written.

"Crafting a bill of this magnitude and importance isn't an easy task. We truly will be used for both 2019 appreciate the hundreds of and 2020. hours the farm bill conference committee, ag committees and their staff put in to ensure the nation's farmers and ranchers have the safety net they need to continue feeding and clothing the world," TFB President Russell Boening said.

Crafting the farm bill wasn't easy, Conaway said, but the needs of farmers and ranchers are greater that they have been in a long time due to an uncertain farm economy and several years of decline in net farm income.

"Our nation's farmers and ranchers are the very best in the world, but they cannot compete alone against a sea of high and rising foreign subsidies, tariffs and non-tariff trade barriers," Conaway, one of the "Big Four" negotiators for the deal, said. "Nor can they survive alone in the face of record droughts, hurricanes, wildfires and other natural disasters. That's why we have a farm bill."

The number one request most farmers had while talking to Conaway was to "do no harm" to federal crop insurance.

The 2018 Farm Bill honors that request.



"Food security is national security and depends on strong agricultural policy that provides certainty and stability for the 3.75 million Texans employed by Texas said. "I am proud- to support the farm bill and the hardworking men and women who put clothes on our backs and food on our

The legislation strengthallowing farmers to choose between Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) on a year-by-year, crop-by-crop basis beginning in 2021.

The decision made in 2019

There will be a nationwide yield update for PLC beginning with the 2020 crop year. Improvements to ARC include increased yield plugs and yield trend adjustments.

"This legislation includes critical changes that allow farmers to have more control over the safety net that provides a helping hand—not a hand out-when times get tough," Boening said.

Individual Farm Service Agency loan limits are increased in the farm bill for the first time in 16 years.

the South Texas economy." The National Animal Disease Preparedness and Response Program addresses the risk of introduction and spread of animal pests and diseases affecting U.S. livestock.

A cattle fever tick program is also included in the bill to combat the deadly livestock pest.

The legislation allocates \$300 million for animal disease prevention and management efforts, including the stockpiling of the foot-andmouth disease vaccine.

The bill also makes industrial hemp production legal nationwide. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will have to develop federal rules and regulations. In the meantime, the Texas Legislature may opt to allow some to grow hemp for research until USDA develops its policy on hemp production.

A feral hog control project and crop insurance for hops are also included in the farm

It extends a federal ban on animal fighting to U.S. territories and provides millions in additional funding to historically black land grant universities, as well.

The farm bill also corrects the former Margin Protection Program for Dairy that many dairy organizations said was not working.

The new Dairy Margin Coverage program has more coverage options and more flexible tools for less money.

The 2014 Farm Bill expired Sept. 30, but many provisions were funded through the end of the crop year.

The Margin Protection Program for Dairy was set to expire at the end of the year had Congress not taken action.

The U.S. Senate approved the farm bill in an 87-13 vote Dec. 11.

Both senators from Texas, John Cornyn and Ted Cruz, voted in favor of the legisla-

The farm bill passed the U.S. House of Representatives in a 369-47 vote Dec. 12.

All but five members of the Texas Congressional delegation voted in favor of the bill: Congressmen Lloyd Doggett, Louie Gohmert, Jeb Hensarling, Sam Johnson and John Ratcliffe.

On November 30, 2018, Oncor Electric Delivery Company LLC ("Oncor"), Sharyland Distribution & Transmission Services, L.L.C. ("SDTS"), Sharyland Utilities, L.P. ("Sharyland"), and Sempra Energy ("Sempra") (collectively, "Joint Applicants") filed a Joint Report and Application for Regulatory Approvals ("Joint Application") with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC" or "Commission"), copies of which are kept at Oncor's office at 1616 Woodall Rodgers Freeway, Suite 6000, Dallas, TX 75202. The Joint Application requests Commission approval of three transactions (the "Proposed Transactions"), as described below, that will result in SDTS becoming an indirect wholly owned subsidiary of Oncor that will own transmission and distribution assets held today by Sharyland and SDTS in central, north, and west Texas, and Sharyland will remain a utility in south Texas, with Sempra owning a 50 percent indirect interest in Sharyland. First, Sharyland will transfer its assets in north Texas, along with associated assets, liabilities, and working capital, to SDTS. In return, Sharyland will receive all of SDTS's assets located in south Texas. In connection with this asset exchange, Sharyland's equity interest in SDTS will be cancelled, and the certificates of convenience and necessity of Sharyland and SDTS will be amended to authorize the "North Texas Utility" (referring to the post-closing assets to be owned by SDTS) and the "South Texas Utility" (referring to the post-closing assets to be owned by Sharyland) to own, operate, and maintain their respective post-exchange assets. Second, Oncor will acquire InfraREIT, Inc. ("InfraREIT") and InfraREIT Partners, LP and, as a result, will own and operate all of SDTS's posttransaction assets. Finally, Sempra will purchase a 50-percent indirect limited partnership interest in a newly formed Delaware limited partnership expected to be named Sharyland Holdings, LP, which will own a 100-percent interest in Sharyland. The Joint Applicants also request Commission approval of certain regulatory terms listed in Exhibit A to the Joint Application, some of which are regulatory conditions to closing.

The Joint Application does not seek Commission approval of a modification to Oncor's rates. Oncor is requesting a Commission finding, however, that Oncor may consolidate the North Texas Utility's wholesale transmission rates with Oncor's rates as part of Oncor's next base-rate case. Oncor also requests Commission approval to establish a regulatory asset to track any make-whole payments or other expenses that may be required to extinguish, transfer, or restructure the debt of InfraREIT and its subsidiaries under the Proposed Transactions, so that Oncor may seek recovery of that regulatory asset in its next baserate case. The Joint Applicants also seek Commission approval to split the current Sharyland wholesale transmission service tariff into two separate tariffs—one for the North Texas Utility and one for the South Texas Utility—which rates, when taken together, would be equal to Sharyland's rate in effect at the time the Proposed Transactions close.


