## Tribe defeats Quanah, brings home district win

The Tribe traveled to Quanah last Friday night to do battle with another group of Indians. Quanah jumped out early, leading Haskell 15 to 8 at the end of the first quarter. Our Tribe put up 10 unanswered points in the second quarter giving Haskell an 18 to 15 lead at halftime.

Haskell put up 14 more points in the third quarter, while Quanah scored 7 bringing the score to 32 to 22 at the end of three. The Indians from Quanah wouldn't go away though as they shut out Haskell in the fourth quarter and put another 7 points on the board. But, the clock would hit zero with Haskell bringing home a 32 to 29 victory.

Senior quarterback Alec Roewe accounted for every touchdown—throwing one through the air and running for three more. He carried the ball 26 times for 145 yards and 3 touchdowns.

Speaking with Coach Grady Benton over the weekend he said about his team, "I knew my guys

were not happy with the outcome of a week ago. They take pride in playing well and representing this community. With that said our approach was that of a team backed into a corner

with a choice to make. That choice was evident all week. Very happy to see their efforts were rewarded. We had a chance to put Quanah away on several possessions in the fourth quarter, and

couldn't do it for several reasons, mainly us. Proud of my guys for continuing to grind, staying together and finding a way to win."

# Early voting begins Mon., Oct. 24

As the countdown to the November 8 general election quickly approaches, candidates are making a final push to encourage voters to cast a vote their way.

There are several contested races to be decided by voters in the upcoming election. One of great importance for our country, is the next president and vice-president of the United States. The Democratic team of Hillary Clinton and Tim Kaine, are challenged by Republicans Donald Trump and Mike Pence. Libertarians Gary Johnson and William Weld are also on the ballot.

Representative in District 19 are Republican Jodey Arrington, Libertarian Troy Bonar and Green Party candidate Mark Lawson. Wayne Christian, republican and Grady Yarbrough, democrat are vying for Railroad Commissioner.

Several Justices for Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals Judges will also be determined.

On the state level, uncontested races include Charles Perry for State Senator, District 28; Drew Springer, State Representative, District 68; and John Bailey, Justice for Court of Appeals, Place 3.

Locally there are only two contested races. Chris Rogers,

republican and Winston Stephens, democrat are seeking the office of Sheriff, while Scott Langford, republican and Elmer Adams, democrat are hoping to be the next County Commissioner for Pct. 2.

Also on the ballot, but unchallenged are Mike Fouts, District Attorney; Kris Fouts, County Attorney; Connie Benton, Tax Assessor/Collector; Bill Hester, County Commissioner Pct. 1; Kenny Thompson, County Commissioner Pct. 3; and Kim Bassett, Constable. Debbie Gressett is running for the unexpired term of District Clerk.

The last day to register to vote in the November election was Tuesday, October 11. Early voting begins Monday, October 24 and continues through Friday, November 4, at the Haskell County courthouse, Monday-Thursday from 8:30 to 5:00 and Friday 8:30 to 4:30. They are closed for lunch from 12-1 p.m. Friday, October 28 is the last day to apply for a ballot by mail.

Church of Haskell, serving as a deacon and on various committees.

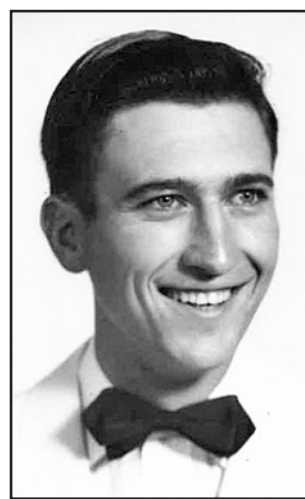
He was preceded in death by his wife and parents, his sister Virginia Cox, and his grandparents Sanders and Tennie Dishongh.

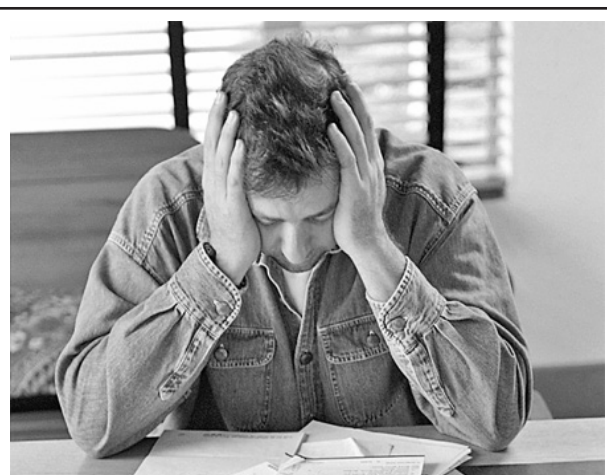

## Wichita Brazos Musuem

A large crowd was in Benjamin Sun., Oct. 9 for a presentation by Donald Beard, superintendent of Caprock Canyons State Park, to complement the arrival of a new star at the museum, a bison on exhibit with her court of attendant wild creatures of Knox County.

Donald Beard spoke about the herd safeguarded by him and his staff at Caprock Canyons State Park, noting that Charles and Mary Goodnight played an important role in saving the bison from extinction. DNA of the herd can be directly traced to origins of the animals that Charles and Mary Goodnight had saved from slaughter on the plains and had raised as the "Goodnight Herd."

Beard stated that in 2010, there may have been 50 bison at the park kept in a 300 acre area and now there are approximately 150 bison kept in a 12,000 acre area.

The park's visitors have steadily grown. In 2011, 36,074 visited the park and by 2016, 99,972 visitors made

their way there to see the bison herd and enjoy the beauty of the park.

A question and answer period followed the program and refreshments were served.

In other museum news, plans are being made for the annual Veterans Day program on Fri., Nov. 11. Other important news, that we are very happy to share, is that our collection of old newspapers were taken by Tai Kreidler of the Southwest Collection/ Special Collections Library at Texas Tech in Lubbock, to be digitized.

The varsity team placed second. Individual results were: 1. Franzi Lutz; 6. Kobie Walker; and 7. Hollyn Hadaway.

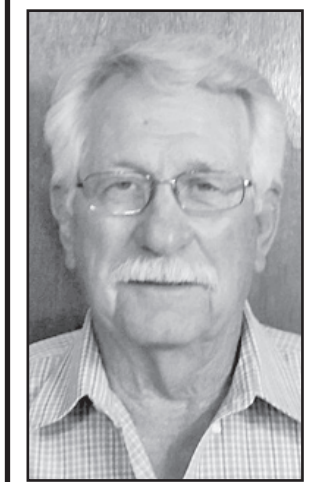

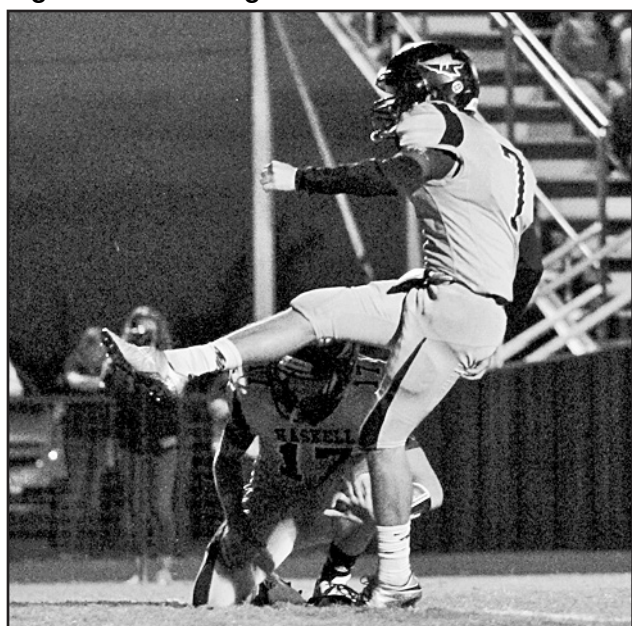
### Health fair

**ADDS POINTS**—Haskell Indian #7 Caleb Wheat put all extra point kicks and one field goal through the uprights for the Haskell Indians.



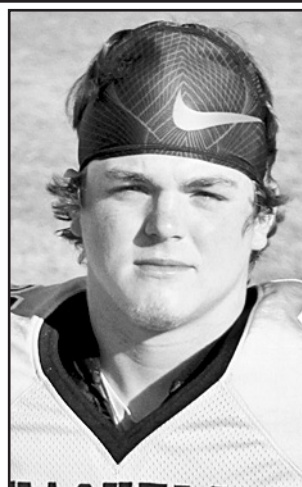
**INDIAN WALL**—The Haskell Indian offensive line provided protection during the win over Quanah.

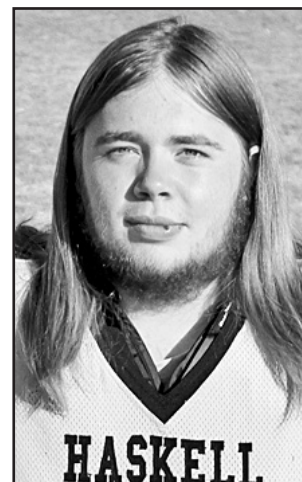

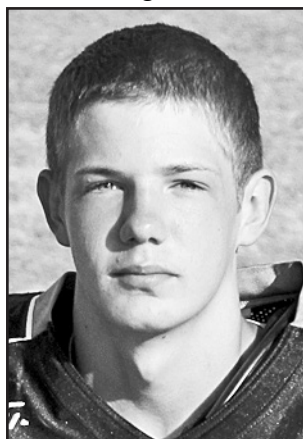

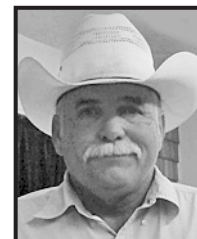
