## Paint Creek students honor Veterans

Paint Creek School held a Veterans Day Ceremony Thurs., Nov. 11, to honor some local Veterans.

Veterans in attendance were:

Joseph Ray Perry, 1943 Paint Creek graduate, who served in WWII as a Tail Gunner on a B17 and

completed 35 missions over Germany;

Truett Kuenstler, Paint Creek Class of 1944, served in the Navy on the USS Cabot during WWII from 1944-1946. His MOS was Shipfitter and his rank was 2nd Class Petty Officer;

Bob Earles, 1967 Paint

Creek graduate, served in the Navy during the Vietnam War;

R.V. Earles, 1937 graduate of Haskell, served in WWII, MSG, 547 Air Force Training Command;

Clarence Dukatnik, 1970 Paint Creek graduate, served in the Air Force from 1970-

74 and the Army beginning in 1974. He served in Vietnam, Desert Shield and Desert Storm with the 101st Air Borne Division. His last rank was 1st Sergeant;

W.C. Davis served in the Army from 1963-84. He was in Vietnam from Sept. 1965-Oct. 1966. He retired

as a MSG;

J.D. Harrell served in the Navy from 1966-70 during the Vietnam War. He was a Quartermaster-Navigation with his homeport being Newport, Rhode Island;

Waller Overton, Paint Creek Class of 1957, served in the Armored Cavalry from 1961-63. He was a member of G Troop 2nd Squadron 14th Armored Cavalry. Overton served as a Platoon Leader/Border Officer and was stationed in Bad Kissingen, Germany. He retired as a Captain;

Walter Buerger, Paint Creek Class of 1949, served in the Army from 1953-55; He was a member of B-Battery 537 Artillery;

Raymond Medford, Paint Creek Class of 1946, entered the Service as a pilot in 1953 and flew B-25, B-29, C-54, and C-141 planes. He was stationed in Bermuda, Charleston, South Carolina, Fairfield, California, Korea, and Vietnam. He retired from active duty in 1974;

Kenneth Marr, Paint Creek Class of 1963, served in the Army during the Vietnam War, 1966-68;

Dan Griffith, Paint Creek Class of 1958, served in the Army as an Amphibious Officer. He was stationed in New Orleans, Louisiana, Fort Benning, Georgia, and Fort Story, Virginia;

Jacob Alexander served in the US Marine Corp from 1996-2008 and spent one year in Afghanistan and 38 months in Iraq;

Jerry Terrell, Paint Creek Class of 1951, served in the Army beginning in 1953. Shortly after entering, the Korean War ended and he was stationed at Fort Hood. Terrell worked in the Provo-Marshalls Office and was discharged in 1954.

The school is looking to include in their next event all local Veterans living in the community who are Paint Creek graduates.

## Junked vehicles law to be enforced

The Betterment Committee of Haskell would like to inform the citizens of Haskell of their intent to enforce the Texas State Statute on Junked Vehicles. This is found under the State of Texas Transportation Code, Section 683.071.

The committee's intent is to get junked vehicles, as defined by the statute, off of overgrown lots with dilapidated houses or buildings. The committee sees this as the first step in cleaning up these lots.

The committee wants you to know that if these vehicles are out of compliance with the statute and if towed off

the owner will receive \$100 if they have the title and \$50 to owners of vehicles without a title.

The Committee sees this as a crucial step to getting the community looking better and taking pride in Haskell.

## Craft show to be held Saturday

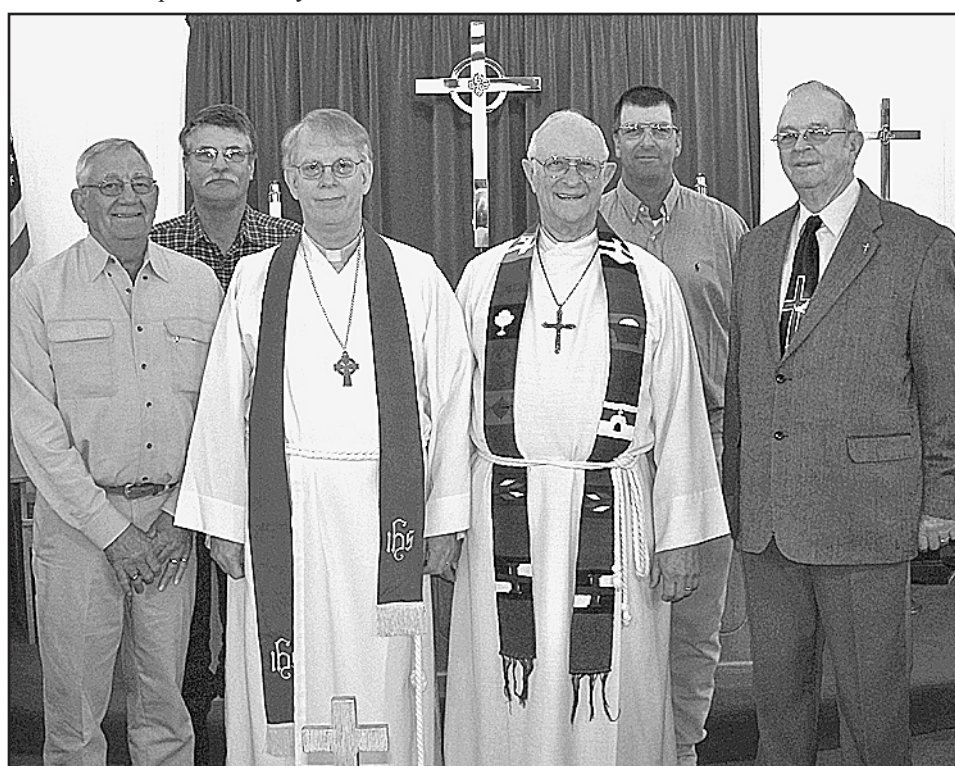
Need some Christmas gift ideas? There will be something for everyone on your list, at the Haskell Young Homemakers Arts and Crafts Show.





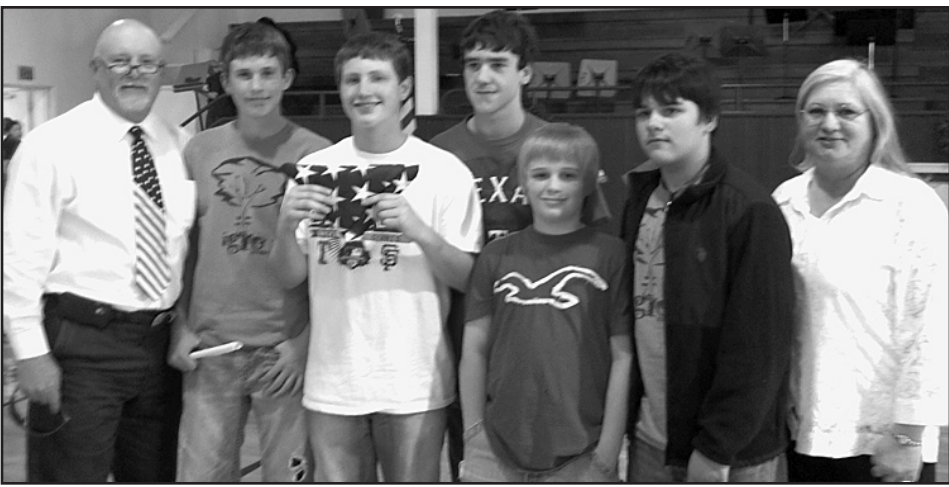

Fall is the time of year that many people enjoy most—me, I prefer summer. Anyway, fall brings on many changes—the summer heat is gone, allergies tend to attack almost everyone (even those of us who never realized that we had any allergies), baseball season is over and football season is winding down while basketball season is just beginning, and the leaves on many of our trees are turning to some very vibrant colors and then they turn loose. I believe that once they make it to the ground, they begin to multiply. Every time I rake or mow my yard, the amount of leaves there the next day is even more than I removed.

I am sure that you are wondering by now just exactly where I am going with this discussion. It concerns where we put the leaves that we rake and mow. We are not supposed to put them in the dumpster unless they are bagged. Why?

Because they will start rotting and rust out our dumpsters and these things are not cheap. We are currently looking for some that could withstand our grass clippings and leaves without rusting. So, in the meantime, put your grass clippings, leaves and other vegetation into bags before depositing them into the dumpster.

One other thing about fall is that we are getting closer to winter. That means you should check the level of antifreeze in your vehicles. I have been told that a busted motor block due to freezing weather is expensive to fix. You will also need to winterize the exposed water pipes and faucets that you have. If you plan to flush the radiator of your vehicles, be sure to catch the flushed out material in a container and pour it down a drain in your house. Antifreeze is extremely toxic to dogs and cats, and they love the sweet taste of it so be sure not to leave it in any open containers where

animals can get it.

## FSA committee elections underway

Glenn R. Brzozowski, Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Haskell County announced that the county committee elections are in progress. Ballots were mailed to eligible voters and completed ballots must be returned by mail or to local FSA offices by Dec. 6, 2010.

"I strongly recommend that producers vote because the county committee members play a huge role in the Agency, especially at the county level," said Brzozowski. "County committee members make decisions on how federal farm programs will be administered locally," he said.

County committee members are elected to office by their peers and serve as the representative voice for agriculture producers in the county, and they are responsible for communicating with USDA to ensure that national programs are adapted to fit local needs. County committees are responsible for making decisions on

issues including commodity loans and payments, conservation programs, disaster assistance programs and emergency programs.

Brzozowski encourages minority and female producers to serve as county committee members in the future. It is important that the county committee is comprised of members who reflect the demographics of the local agriculture community.

Farmers and ranchers who participate in FSA programs are eligible to vote. If eligible voters do not receive a ballot by mail, one will be provided by the local USDA Service Center. Ballots returned by mail must be postmarked no later than Dec. 6, 2010. New county committee members will assume their role and related responsibilities on Jan. 1, 2011.

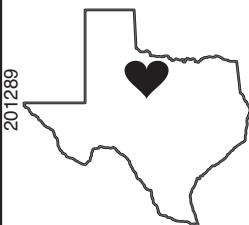

The proposed project consists of abandoning the existing non-compliant wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) ponds and constructing two (2) new ponds that are in compliance with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) rules and regulations governing same. In addition, a wastewater effluent irrigation system will be installed on an adjacent property to land apply treated wastewater effluent. Three (3) alternatives were considered to the proposed project and include the following:

The option to renovate the existing ponds would involve dewatering one pond, while leaving the others in service. Once dewatered, the sludge from the first pond would be removed and the pond relined. The newly reconstructed pond would then be placed in service and the same process would take place for the other ponds. The second and third ponds would be combined to create one larger pond in the reconstruction process.

The second alternative, and proposed action, is to construct two new ponds such that construction will not interfere with the existing ponds. Once construction is complete, the existing ponds would then be abandoned and closed in-place.

The third option would be to build one new pond and rehabilitate one of the existing ponds. This will allow the new pond to be built without interfering with the operation of the existing pond. Once the new pond is constructed, the water can be diverted to the new pond while the existing pond is being rehabilitated. Once rehabilitation of the pond is complete, the other existing pond can be abandoned and closed in place.

To avoid and or minimize impacts to environmental resources, the following mitigation measures are proposed:

Biological Resources: The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) made the following recommendations regarding migratory birds, invasive plant species and rare and protected species.

If migratory bird species are found nesting on or adjacent to the project area, they must be dealt with in a manner consistent with the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA). TPWD recommends excluding clearing activities during the general bird nesting season, March through August, to avoid adverse impacts to this group.

Invasive species pose a significant threat to the existence of native plant communities in disturbed landscapes. TPWD recommends that the banks of the new storage ponds be vegetated with site-specific native vegetation. Planting native vegetation would provide habitat for wildlife, help prevent erosion, and ensure that native plant species are provided an opportunity to compete with undesirable, non-native, invasive plant species. TPWD recommends practices be implemented to prevent the establishment of invasive species like Johnson grass, particularly during the early stages of re-vegetation.

If during construction, the project area is found to contain rare species, natural plant communities, or special features, TPWD recommends that precautions be taken to avoid impact to them.

There may be suitable habitat at the proposed project location for the Texas horned lizard (THL). To avoid potential harm to the THL, the consulting engineer and applicant will be responsible for implementing the following measures: 1) All construction personnel will be instructed to avoid killing, injuring, or any type harmful disturbance to the THL during construction; 2) Pipeline trenches which remain open overnight, and or for more than two daylight hours will be inspected for the presence of the THL prior to backfilling; 3) Texas Horned Lizards discovered in any open trench will be carefully removed and relocated safely away from the construction area by a project inspector possessing a TPWD scientific collection permit; 4) Any THL relocation(s) will be reported to the Consulting Engineer, the USDA State Environmental Coordinator at (254) 742-9789 and the TPWD at (512) 389-4579.

Historic Properties: If cultural materials are encountered during construction, work will cease in the immediate area of the discovery. Work may continue in those project locations outside of the discovery area, with written approval from USDA Rural Development. In the event of discovery, the contractor must immediately notify the Owner, Project Engineer, the Texas Historical Commission (512) 463-5867 and the USDA Rural Development State Environmental Coordinator (254) 742-9789.
