2015 began with a new county judge, Marty Lucke, calling his first county commissioners' meeting into session in January.

January also started the First National Bank of Floy-Floydada Volunteer Fire Department.

In February the Lockney Longhorns boys' basketball team advanced to the first round of the bi-district playoffs, taking on the Claude Mustangs in Dimmitt. The Longhorns fell to the Mustangs in a double overtime squeaker, 58-55, and finished the season at 19-8.

Also in February the Lockney Senior Citizens Center got a new roof

through a combination of new sent 12 students in four events to the state UIL academic contest in Austin. The 86th Annual Floyd County Old Settlers' Reunion was celebrated in Floydada in May with the dedication of a historical marker near Blanco Canyon.

> In June Floydada Independent School Board Superintendent earned his PhD, and Dr. Trevino was recognized by Region 17 as the Superintendent of the Year. Also in June Don Hardy Race Cars celebrated its 50th Anniversary with a community-wide party in Floydada.

> In July the Lowes Market in Floydada brought back the annual 4th of July Celebration with hot dogs, music, and train rides for the kids. First Baptist of Lockney named a new minister, Joseph Tillery.

In August Floydada ISD

won two more awards, including Region 17 Board of the Year and Region 17 Secondary Principal of the Year Wayne Morren. Also, in August, the new Floydada city pool opened, and Lockney celebrated Old Fashion Saturday.

In September the Floyd County Fair—a tradition dating back to the 1900s kicked off with more events and more entries. Also, in September, Lockney reclaimed the football championship of Floyd County beating the Floydada Whirlwinds, 13-7, in the annual cross-county rivalry.

In October Floydada celebrated the 28th Annual Punkin Day festival with car show, chili cookoff, games, food vendors and more. The Floydada Whirlwinds opened district play dominating the Olton Mustangs,

from behind to beat Clarendon, 18-15 in its district opener. By the end of October the Lockney Longhorns secured their first playoff berth in 10 years.

In November the Floydada Whirlwinds fell to the Stratford Elks 42-14 in the bi-district playoff in Bushland. The Lockney Longhorns fell to the Seagraves Eagles in their playoff 56-22 in Lubbock.

In December the Cowboy Christmas Ball was held at the Unity Center, and Carr's Chapel celebrated its 110th Christmas Eve Service. Two days after Christmas the Panhandle and Plains areas of West Texas saw their third worst blizzard in recorded weather snowfall amounts with some areas in and around Floyd County receiving from 11 to 18 inches.

## Weekend Storm Brings High Winds, Snow

LOCKNEY - High winds and snow paid a visit to western half of Texas including the Panhandle/South Plains following a warm week leading up to Christmas Day. On Saturday, high winds set the tone for what would hit later in the evening.

For the previous week, all the forecast models had pointed to extreme conditions to hit an area from Wichita Falls to the Mexico border and west into New Mexico including El Paso. The snow began in El Paso during the day, impacting the Sun Bowl game and the system continued to push to the east and north.

As rain, sleet and thundersnow storms developed in this area, severe weather from the same system was pounding north Texas near Dallas and Fort Worth. A massive, EF-4 tornado tore through Rowlett and Garland Saturday evening leaving at least 11 people dead and millions of dollars in

By late Saturday, snow was impacting much of the region as well as gusty winds from the north in excess of 65 mph, including Sundown reporting an 88 mph about 8:40 P.M. With the strong northerly winds, drifts began developing causing travel issues around Lockney and Floydada as well as the entire area. All of eastern New Mexico from the Colorado state line to the Texas state line was shut down because of all the snow and wind.

Sunday morning, travel was also discouraged through much of western Texas. I-40 was closed from the New Mexico state line, through Amarillo and all the

Driving was difficult even for the Texas Department of Transportation. This snow plow overturned south of the intersection of FM 97 on SH 207. TxDoT had crews from as far away as Dallas assisting with snow removal throughout the blizzard of 2015 which was called 'Goliath' by the National Weather Service. The storm forced churches to cancel services on Sunday and many businesses and government offices to close on Monday. The Floydada Post Office was open but mail was not being delivered due to the mail truck to making it in from Amarillo.

way to the Oklahoma state line on Sunday.

Late Sunday evening, most roads west of a line from Junction to Wichita Falls were snow packed and ice covered with travel advisories for the entire area. Roads in the Lubbock area that were closed included I-27 from Plainview to Canyon, many roads around Brownfield, Seminole, Tulia, Muleshoe, Friona and Hereford were closed

The National Weather Service in Lubbock reported snow totals ranging up to 18 inches in Friona and drifts has high as 10 feet in many areas. In the Floyd County area, drifts up to six feet high were reported. Near FM 97 and SH 207, a Texas Department of



Transportation snowplow flipped over trying to take care of the roads.

On Sunday, most churches canceled services then on Monday, many businesses including the Floyd County Courthouse, the Lockney City Hall, Cogdell Clinic and West Texas Family Medicine closed for the safety of their patrons and staff. 

## **Expert: Cattlemen should** be 'steeling' for the future

AMARILLO — Cow-calf producers have made some money and now need to be "steeling" for what is to come, a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service specialist said.

Dr. Ted McCollum, AgriLife Extension beef specialist in Amarillo, spoke at the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show recently. He said the definition of steeling as a verb is "to prepare oneself for something difficult or

"We are just out of the drought of the decades and rangeland recovery is underway," McCollum said. "But the strong El Nino is over next spring and we could revert back to dry conditions very quickly."

The question is whether conditions will return to the longterm normal or "do we run the risk of dry weather," he said. Couple that with the end of a long bull cattle market that is settling back into a lower trading range, a strong dollar that is hampering exports and incentivizing imports, and large meat supplies after both the poultry and pork industries overcompensated to recover from bouts with disease issues.

"Where will the trading range 16.65 ft. low. Black bass be for the calves we are producare slow on split shot ing? The price of cows and replacements hit all-time highs," We, the cow-calf producers, have some money in our pockets and need to be investing in the

He said some measures to be taken at this time of profitability would be those that will help maintain productivity during the drier times: Improve rangeland resources by building ground cover and improving water infiltration, manage woody plant competition and enhance grazing distribution by improving water and fencing layouts.

"Set some money aside to invest in these rangeland resources," McCollum said. "The longer we wait to do some of these things, the more the cost will be, especially on suppression of woody plant competition such as mesquite and redberry juniper." He also said that the invest-

ment in cows today is relatively high, and producers need to set themselves up to maintain productivity and profitability from those high-value assets. This will require efficient cows able to convert forage resources to pounds of calf or beef.

The continued increase in

cow size has been a point of discussion in the industry for several years, McCollum said. As cow size increases, more land and forage resources must be allocated to the cow, thus the herd size that can be maintained on a finite resource is reduced.

The question of efficiency revolves around whether the larger cows will wean proportionately heavier calves to offset the reduced herd size, he said. Based on averages, this is not the case.

Producers need to strive to reduce the upward drift of cow weight on their operations or manage the larger cows so that their production is proportional to their size, McCollum said. In either case, bull selection and sourcing of replacement heifers will be focal areas.

He also recommended producers study "Key Performance Indicator Targets for Cow-Calf Operators" by Stan Bevers, AgriLife Extension beef economist in Vernon. Bevers outlines 15 indicators of financial performance that will help producers evaluate their operations and prepare for the future.






